# St. Lawrence College International Arrival Guide Your step by step document for a comfortable arrival

## **Applying For Your Visa**

If you wish to study in Canada longer than 6 months, you will require a study permit. You need to apply for a study permit before coming to Canada. Some nationalities will also require an additional document that is called a Visitor Visa (or Entry Visa). If you are from a country that does not require a Visitor Visa, you will need to obtain an Electronic Travel Authorization (ETA). Please visit the nearest Canadian embassy or Consulate in your country, and visit the Immigration, Refugees, and Citizenship Canada website (**www.cic.gc.ca**) for more information.

When applying for your immigration documents, please remember that processing times can be anywhere from 1-6 months, depending on the country you are applying from. You can also find processing times on the **www.cic.gc.ca** for planning purposes.

Many students who wait too long to apply have very little time between receiving their immigration documents and needing to make arrangements to come to Canada. This can be hard to get everything done. Give yourself lots of time!

Note: If you are a mature student coming to Canada with your family, you should look into elementary or secondary schools for your children before arriving. We are happy to provide assistance with this. Be sure to plan ahead for their immigration documents as well.

#### Immunizations

Your program may require immunizations for laboratory and placement participation.We recommend getting them before you come to Canada.

#### **Health Insurance**

An international health insurance policy is included in your tuition fees. Once you arrive to Canada you are covered immediately. You will receive a copy of your policy by email within the first two weeks of classes. Make sure you read the policy to see what is covered on your insurance plan.

## **STEP 2: HOUSING**

Sorry, you won't be staying in an igloo.

## Residence

There are single rooms (CAD\$7,130 per academic year) and double rooms (CAD \$6,230 per academic year) as well as common areas for studying and visiting with neighbours. Meal plans are mandatory and are CAD\$1,700 per academic year. Please note that a meal plan does not cover all meals for the school year, you will need to purchase some food on your own.

## **Shared Off-Campus Room Rentals**

You can rent a room in a house off-campus that will have shared living space with other students, but your own private bedroom. The average cost to rent a good, clean room is approximately \$500 per month, due at the beginning of every month, and usually includes internet and all utilities (heat and electricity). You may need to pay your final month's rent in advance when signing your lease\* or provide a deposit (it is illegal in Ontario for landlords to ask for both). Be sure to browse through many listings and find one that works for you. You will need to contact landlords and book appointments to view potential houses. Please note that this process could take up to a week.

## Homestay

The cost for homestay is \$33 per day for Kingston and \$30 per day for Cornwall and Brockville, and includes a furnished room, breakfast, lunch and dinner, internet, laundry facilities and a welcoming family to live with. You will also need to pay a one-time \$250 Homestay Placement Fee. Homestay requires a 4 month contract. Canada Homestay Network (CHN) is SLCs provider for homestay and you can find out more information about the program **here**.

## **Private Rental**

The average cost for a 1 bedroom apartment in Kingston can be anywhere from \$850 to \$1000 CAD per month, depending on the location, quality of the apartment, and whether or not utilities\*\* are included.

#### If you are unable to find a place to stay before arrival, please email: newstudentarrivals@sl.on.ca for more information for short-term places to stay.

\*Your lease is a contract that you will sign with your landlord outlining the responsibilities you will have as a tenant. This lease also outlines the amount of time you must live in and pay for your apartment without being penalized. This is usually 12 months, but there are sometimes contracts you can make for shorter amounts of time. The lease also includes responsibilities of the tenant and landlord. This may include not painting your room, costs in the event of damages, etc.

\*\*Unless you find a place that includes utilities, you could pay \$50 to \$200 CAD a month for heat and electricity.Water is usually included in your rent, but your landlord will let you know if it or any other services are extra.

# **STEP 3: PACKING**

Don't forget your sense of adventure!

## Don't forget to bring:

- Passport
- Letter of Acceptance
- Entry Visa or ETA (if applicable)
- · Letter of Introduction (official document indicating that your Study Permit has been approved)
- · Prescription drugs: Bring several months supply if possible.
- Medical Records: Records of immunizations/vaccines. copies of prescriptions, history of medical condition (if applicable)
- · Something personal to remind you of home, such as photos of your family
- · Long distance phone card
- International credit card or debit card
- · Canadian money: Plan to have enough cash on you (at least CAD\$200 - \$300) when you arrive for your immediate needs (e.g. food, accommodation and transportation) in case you are not able to use your debit or credit card
- · Transcripts or certification from your previous school
- A power adapter for your electric devices, if needed
- · Cellphone: It reduces the cost for your phone plan if you bring your own mobile phone that can be used in Canada
- · If you have a license in your home country and would like to drive while you are in Canada, it would be a good idea to get an International Driving Permit (IDP) before you arrive

## Items not to bring:

- · Towels and bedsheets/blanket: You can buy an inexpensive set of sheets etc., in Canada
- Too many school supplies: They take up space and are easy and inexpensive to purchase in Canada
- Food: Other than a few favourite snacks, wait until you arrive in your campus town to buy food. If you do bring food, you risk having it taken away from you by Customs. Your family and friends from home can send you favourite foods later

## Accommodations

#### **HELPFUL LINKS!**

If your move in day is later than when you arrive, you should arrange a hotel or a place to stay. For example, if you arrive in Kingston on August 29th and your move in day is September 1st, you will need to find a place to stay for those two nights before. Book any hotel rooms well in advance; you do not want to be left without a place to stay.

Transportation: VIA Rail UP Express Megabus Air Canada

We do not recommend taking a taxi to any campus from Toronto, Montreal or Ottawa, as this could be very expensive. Just to get from Toronto Pearson Airport to Kingston, you will pay over \$500 CAD without considering traffic.

## KINGSTON

VIA Rail You must take the subway to Union Station to catch the VIA Rail train out of Toronto. The easiest way to do this is by the UP Express. UP Express is a 25 minute train to Union Station that leaves every 15 minutes from Terminal 1 in Pearson Airport. A ticket is \$12 CAD.

The cost of an average train ticket between Toronto and Kingston by VIA Rail train is about \$60-\$120 CAD or more, less for Youth under 26 years old. To learn more, visit **VIA Rail**.

- **Megabus** There is the Megabus Airport Shuttle directly to Kingston from Toronto Pearson Airport that costs an average of \$50 CAD, but can sometimes be found for much cheaper if you book well in advance. To learn more, visit **Megabus**.
- Air The cost of a flight from Toronto to Kingston is approximately \$200-\$500 CAD. Book your ticket in advance through your chosen airline (such as Air Canada). There are only 2 or 3 flights from Toronto each day so you may have to wait a bit.

## BROCKVILLE

VIA Rail The cost of a ticket to Brockville is approximately \$60-\$120 CAD.You will also need to take the UP Express (see above for details). To learn more, visit VIA Rail.
Megabus To get to Brockville by Megabus, there is no airport shuttle; you will need to travel to

Please note, you cannot get to Cornwall from Ottawa with public transportation. Fly to Montreal.

downtown Toronto and catch the bus from the Bay Street location.

- VIA Rail The cost of a ticket between Montreal and Cornwall by VIA Rail train is about \$60 CAD or more, less for Youth under 26 years old. To learn more, visit VIA Rail.
- Megabus Between Montreal and Cornwall, a ticket is approximately \$30 CAD.



# **STEP 5: CULTURE**

Cheese, gravy, and french fries... Give it a try!

One of the best things about arriving in a new country, is all of the adventure and opportunity that awaits you. Most people find it so interesting to learn about a new way of life, how other countries operate, try new food, meet new people, and learn how to live in a new place.

With all of the new things you will experience, this can become overwhelming. When arriving in a new country, mentally prepare yourself to feel a little confused and/or lost. This is completely normal and it happens to everyone!

When you first arrive, you may experience culture shock or homesickness. The good news is, these feelings are only temporary. Try your best to adjust by keeping an open mind and heart when you find yourself in situations that seem strange to you. Try and be positive, and get comfortable being out of your comfort zone.

The best way to adjust is to physically go out and immerse yourself in the culture as much as possible; even if this means trying new things! This will add to your experience and help you adapt to living in Canada. If you are feeling this way when you arrive, come talk to us in the international office. We can help!

## Languages

## **English & French**

Canada's primary language is English. It is the language most used in Canada, however, French becomes more popular the farther east to the Quebec border you travel. Cornwall, being close to Quebec, has a rich French demographic. It may be useful to pick up on a few conversational words when you arrive, no matter which campus is your final destination.

## English is the official language required to study at SLC and to live in our cities.

## **Classroom Differences**

## **Group Work**

At St. Lawrence College and many other institutions, we try to mimic the dynamic you will see in the workplace. Many of your courses will require you to complete assignments in groups.

## Accumulative Grading

Many countries focus on one main test at the end of each semester. In Canada, we split our grading into percentages that add up to your total mark, which includes more than one test/ assignment per semester. If you do not do so well on one test, you can get a tutor (offered to all students) and try and make up for it on the next one.

## Plagiarism

Plagiarism is the act of presenting the ideas, thoughts, or expressions of another person as your own. You can avoid plagiarizing someone else's work if you properly cite your sources. Depending where you are from, presenting someone else's ideas may be valued, however, in Canada this is not allowed. Please ask for help how to properly document someone else's work. You can refer to the academic honesty policy once you are here.



# **STEP 6: SETTLING IN**

## What To Do Before Your Courses Begin:

## Get your student ID card

Visit Student Services and get your student ID card. Please bring an official photo ID card (passport and driver's license).

## **O**pen a bank account

If you need to apply for a credit card, make sure you choose a bank with credit cards for international students and those without a credit history. You can visit a few branches to find which one best suits you. Examples of banks in Canada are: Scotiabank, CIBC, TD, BMO, and Royal Bank.

## Sign up for a phone plan

Prepaid plans are available for people without a credit history. Canadian phone companies include Rogers, Bell, Freedom Mobile, Koodo, Fido, Telus, Chatr, and Virgin.

## Get a Canadian I.D.

The price of a government I.D. is \$35 CAD. Having an I.D. allows you to leave your passport somewhere safe and removes the risk of losing it. It also helps when applying for credit cards. For more information visit **www.ontario.ca/page/ontario-photo-card**.
