Learners will be introduced to applied behavioural analysis techniques, life skills training, and behavioural intervention strategies as effective ways to manage, alter and redirect challenging and atypical behaviours. The learners are presented with techniques to evaluate the level of relationship between them and the child/youth and to intervene in ways to enhance this relationship through behavioural interventions. Object Oriented Programming - **Must have Prerequisite: Game 102 (75 hours)

SLC Course Code GAME 202	This course introduces the student to the concepts of object oriented programming (OOP) used in the making of modern video games. Topics include the basics of object oriented design such as inheritance, encapsulation, abstraction and polymorphism. This course explores these concepts using C++, the programming language most widely adapted by the video game industry. Students obtain hands-on experience through lab and lecture creating their own classes, using existing classes and incorporating multimedia libraries to build interactive 2D games. Students are also introduced to the Standard Template Library of C++ and explore algorithms, containers and iterators via in lab activities.

Mobile Development (45 hours) ** Prereq GAME 111

SLC Course Code GAME 211	In this course students create mobile web apps and games while studying the differences between console and mobile games hardware, design, and economics. Through a combination of labs and in class activities, students learn advanced HTML5, JavaScript and CSS to create games and format visuals to support a wide variety of device resolutions and dimensions. Students build fully functional mobile games which include user input (touchscreen and mouse), animation of characters, 2D physics, sound effects, music and the loading of images and JSON files. Students build a progressive web app (PWA) that emulates an iOS & Android app experience which is accessible offline and also leverages the use of the devices camera and the ability to send push notifications when applicable.

The student gains an appreciation of aesthetics and composition through discussions, critiques and writing an artist statement. Music Rudiments II *** Students must have MUSC 3R (45 Hours)	
SLC Course Code MUSC8R	This course is designed to continue the study of the foundational elements of music theory begun in MUSC 3R. All the topics covered in MUSC 3R are expanded upon and new components are added. The course content includes: Notation (all accidentals), scales (major and minor with technical names of degrees: relative and parallel relationships; enharmonic relationships; select synthetic scales), intervals (all simple intervals above and below), triads (major and minor in root position and inversions), time and rhythm (simple and compound time with regular and irregular groupings), transposition (major keys upwards by any interval), cadences (authentic, plagal and half), and select musical terminology (musical terms and signs). This course introduces the student to how accounting information is used by and meets the needs of both internal and external users through effective and efficient communication, as well as what accounting information is required by a business concern to clearly reflect the operating results of the enterprise over its operating life. Throughout the subject, students will be introduced to generally accepted accounting principles, the interpretation and preparation of financial statements and how this information is recorded in the various business records. <i>Note: Students should have completed Grade 11 college math, at a minimum for this course</i> Related Programs: <i>Business Administration, Human Resources, Fundamentals, Accounting or Marketing</i>

The first segment of the course concentrates on the role of marketing in contemporary organizations and the environments affecting marketing practice. The second segment dwells on strategic planning procedures, market segmentation, information collection and buying behaviour principles. The third segment examines the first element of the marketing mix in detail: product strategy and management. SLC Course Code COMP 222	This is an introductory computer course that familiarizes students with the functionality of internal college systems and the current version of Microsoft Word, Excel, and PowerPoint. It also explores theory and concepts of computer hardware and software, with a hands-on introduction to the Windows operating system, file management techniques, and Internet browsers. This course allows students to navigate through the software applications and learn how to create effective documents, spreadsheets and presentations. Introductory Business Mathematics (45 hours) 7 week block	
SLC Course Code MATH 35	The purpose of this course is to prepare students to be successful in business and financial mathematics. This course emphasizes the development of business-related numeracy and algebraic skills. Topics covered include order of operations, percentages/fractions/ratios, exponents, logarithms, algebra, linear equations, linear systems, linear inequalities, and simple and compound interest. These topics are applied to business concerns such as taxation, allocation, currency conversion and the consumer price index.
