A History of Indigenous Peoples (45 hours)

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| SLC Course Code GENE 175 | This course examines the history of Indigenous Peoples in the land we now call Canada, from pre-contact to modern times. Students will learn about the diversity among Indigenous Peoples, their world views, and the importance of land and sustenance. They will also discover the ways of living that emerged as a result of geography, and the changes in these ways of living that were brought about by European contact and subsequent colonization processes. Students will briefly explore the current circumstances of Indigenous People in Canada in the context of the historical events that shaped and continue to shape their lives. 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| SLC Course Code GENE 165 | This introductory online course highlights the complex and dynamic components of cultural groups and their interactions. Based on concepts of history, power, and identity, students learn how intercultural communication is affected by language, non-verbal communication, culture shock, popular culture, |

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| SLC Course Code GENE 36 | This course enhances your knowledge and appreciation of the importance of nutrition to health and wellbeing and the connection between excess and deficient nutrient intake and ill health. Topics include the Canada Food Guide, the basic nutrients, the processes of digestion/absorption, nutrition related diseases, weight management, and food labels and nutrition information reliability. Students analyze their personal dietary intake and activity level and subsequently plan meal patterns |

| SLC Course Code GENE 24 | This course is designed to teach students how to apply critical thinking concepts to ethical problems. Initially, students learn various aspects of critical thinking and evolve from the knowing stage of critical thinking to the evaluation stage of critical thinking. Students also have an opportunity to explore the ethical process and are exposed to the philosophical aspects of ethical reasoning and progress toward problem solving strategies in relation to controversial issues. | Child Development II *Pre-requisite CHIL 1004 Required (45 hours) | |
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| SLC Course Code | This course explores development from ages 2.5 through 12 to understand the systematic changes in social, emotional, physical, and cognitive functioning of the child. Theories of development are examined which highlight progressive changes and integration of functioning. Students will examine current research in child development applicable to the preschool and school-age child. 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| Criminology (45 hours) | |
| SLC Course Code | This course provides an examination of various theoretical explanations of criminal and deviant behaviour including the sociological, biological and psychological perspectives. Criminological theory provides an explanation of criminal activity and crime causation. The reality of crime in Canada including victimology is examined through crime statistics and issues of criminal behaviour. The impact of criminological theory on the development and effectiveness of the criminal justice system is discussed with an emphasis on future trends within the system. |

| SLC Course Code | This course provides the student with a transitional analysis of issues relating to criminal law within the Canadian Justice System. Students explore the foundation of criminal law in Canada, identify and interpret statute and case law relating to procedural and substantive law, identify the function of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms within Canada, along with applying the fundamental principles of criminal law as they apply to pre-trial, trial and sentencing matters. | SLC Course Code HUMA 53 | This course provides students with an understanding of human resources management functions within organizations. Course content focuses on the purpose and the application of Human Resources activities which will assist organizations in achieving their goals and objectives. | Object Oriented Programming - **Must have Prerequisite: Game 102 (75 hours) | |
| SLC Course Code GAME 202 | This course introduces the student to the concepts of object oriented programming (OOP) used in the making of modern video games. Topics include the basics of object oriented design such as inheritance, encapsulation, abstraction and polymorphism. This course explores these concepts using C++, the programming language most widely adapted by the video game industry. Students obtain hands-on experience through lab and lecture creating their own classes, using existing classes and incorporating multimedia libraries to build interactive 2D games. Students are also introduced to the Standard Template Library of C++ and explore algorithms, containers and iterators via in lab activities. |

| Mobile Development (45 hours) ** Prereq GAME 111 | |
| SLC Course Code GAME 211 | In this course students create mobile web apps and games while studying the differences between console and mobile games hardware, design, and economics. Through a combination of labs and in class activities, students learn advanced HTML5, JavaScript and CSS to create games and format visuals to support a wide variety of device resolutions and dimensions. Students build fully functional mobile games which include user input (touchscreen and mouse), animation of characters, 2D physics, sound effects, music and the loading of images and JSON files. Students build a progressive web app (PWA) that emulates an iOS & Android app experience which is accessible offline and also leverages the use of the devices camera and the ability to send push notifications when applicable. |
