Citation and Referencing Quick Guide

In-text Citation

In-text citations, in most cases, combine the element of the author of a work and the year of publication. Direct quotations also include the page number, paragraph number, or time stamp, in parentheses following the closing quotation marks. For example, "A quote" (Smith, 2019, p. 2).

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Benjafield (2012) was a valuable resource in this study.

Students might have financial and academic questions (Brown, 2005; Lee, 2010).

Canadian Nuclear Laboratories (n.d.) claims the site "holds unique expertise" (para. 1).

The work was "a major teaching triumph" (Moghari & Marandi, 2017, p. 369).

Vizzini finds the situation "inconceivable!" (Reiner, 1987, 16:26).

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References

Different types of references require different information, but they generally follow the following model. References should be arranged alphabetically in a reference list at the end of the paper.

General Reference Entry Format:

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Author(s). (Date of Publication). Title. Publisher. Or Journal Title, Volume(Issue). Page Range

(for Chapters or Journal Articles). Retrieval Information (DOI or URL).

Remember: Google is a search engine, not a source. Consult more than an abstract or an image from a web search. Examine the original source and determine its credibility before using it.
