Cathy Watson, Nursing 1984

Nursing... it runs in the family.

Alumni Profile...

Sixteen hours in surgery, with no break and Cathy Watson is dead tired. But her efforts along with other members of the cardiac team have saved the life of a child. And, the feeling of accomplishment and satisfaction knowing that the child will be okay is something that Cathy says is worth the long hours and hard work.

Cathy Watson is a nurse in the Cardiac Unit at the Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario (CHEO) in Ottawa. A native of Kemptville and a 1984 graduate of the Nursing program at St. Lawrence, Brockville, Cathy plays an integral role in the operation of the Cardiac Unit at CHEO.

Cathy says it was the influence of her mother and older sister, both nurses, that prompted her to go into nursing. And it was the small friendly, city environment of Brockville that drew Cathy to the Nursing program at the Brockville Campus of St. Lawrence.

It was the six week consolidation section of the Nursing program that placed Cathy at CHEO and eventually got her a Nursing position at CHEO. Cathy says that although the clinical placements provide good hands on experience there is a big difference between being a supervised student on the ward and being on your own as a full nurse.

Cathy always wanted to work in paediatrics and her mother was an operating room nurse. The operating room at CHEO has ten surgical rooms and in the past each nurse would rotate through the ten. Recently the hospital has assigned a "charge" nurse to each of the ten surgical rooms. Cathy is the charge nurse for the cardiac unit and is responsible for all preparation and assisting in cardiac operations.

Cathy spent several weeks at the heart institute, at the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto and in a hospital in Newfoundland observing and learning operating room techniques.

Since May of 1991 Cathy's cardiac unit has worked on 90 patients. Each patient is given the best care and a lot of emotion goes into the work of the unit says Cathy. Cardiac patients require long periods in recovery and Cathy spends much of her time outside the operating room visiting and checking up on patients in the recovery room. Cathy says that there simply isn't time to deal with the stress of the job.

The St. Lawrence Nursing program at St. Lawrence, according to Cathy, is very good. She would have liked to have spent more time observing in the operating room but realizes that the program is already condensed into a short period of two years. Her advice to those thinking of taking the program is to complete grade 13, work hard at science subjects and listen to the teachers.

Pat Speyer, was Cathy's teacher and inspiration. Cathy was inspired by Pat because of her love of working in the operating room, because Pat went back to school at night to get her degree and is teaching now. That's what Cathy wants to do. Often Cathy and Pat meet at CHEO and Brockville nursing students are given special treatment in the cardiac unit.

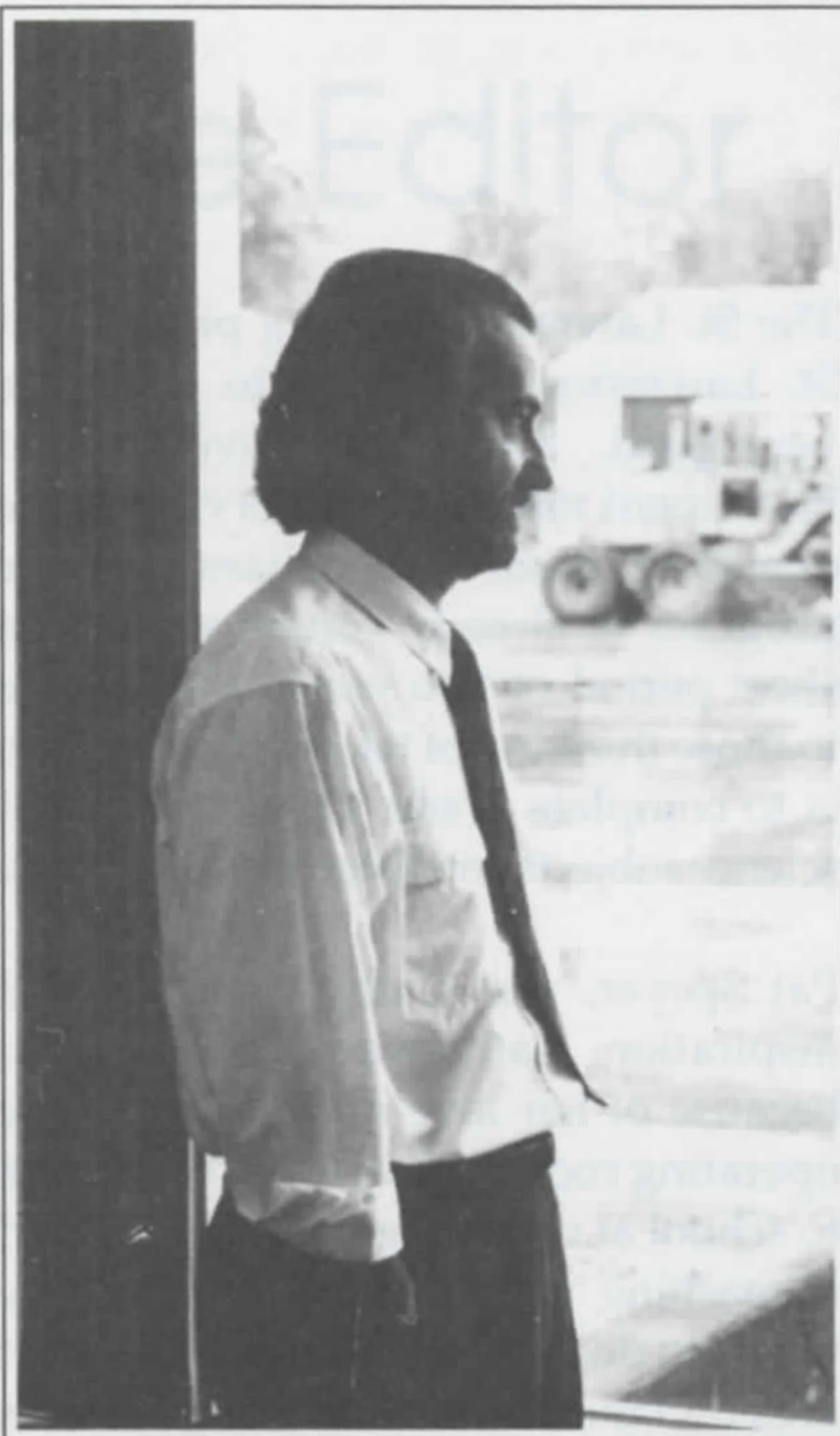
Cathy is not finished her formal training. She is enrolled at the University of Ottawa pursuing her Bachelor of Nursing Science and will graduate in two years.

Even though the interview with Cathy was over the telephone I sensed a warm, compassionate person whose goal in life is to help sustain life in those who are sick and need help. We're proud that Cathy Watson is a graduate of St. Lawrence College.

Alumni Profile...



Commitment is certainly one way to describe Fern Hamelin's relationship with St. Lawrence College.

Fern graduated from the Civil Engineering Technology program in 1972, and for nearly twenty years he has continued to stay in touch with the college.

"I was actually a student at the Cornwall Campus of the college before the college was established," explains Fern. "The old Classical College, a private high school, was located in Moulinette Hall at that time and I studied grades nine through 12 here."

In the early sixties Fern's father, a pilot on the St. Lawrence Seaway moved his family from Montreal to Cornwall.

I recall we had about ten or 12 students in our second and third years in the Civil program at St. Lawrence, says Fern. During his third year, Fern met with on-campus recruiters from the Ministry of Transportation and secured his first full-time job.

At the time highway #417, which stretches from Ottawa to Hawkesbury was being built. As a highway inspector, Fern had the opportunity to demonstrate some of the skills he had acquired through the Civil Engineering program. Fern's stint with the ministry lasted four years.

When a position with the Public Works Department for the City of Cornwall became available, Fern jumped at the opportunity.

"I recall my first assignment with the department was to oversee the painting of the city's old water tank," explains Fern.

Over the next ten years Fern held increasingly more responsible positions within the Public Works Department. Road Supervisor, Public Works Superintendent and today, Manager of Public Works.

"It was during this period that I came back to the college, initially to study management on a part-time basis," explains Fern.

With increased managerial responsibilities at work, Fern turned to the college for post-diploma training in Accounting, Business Law, Personnel Management and Marketing. As Manager of Public Works for the City of Cornwall, Fern oversees a staff of 84 people and an annual budget of \$10 million. He can often be seen before city council, presenting budget proposals or answering questions regarding any of a number of services provided through his department.

Working full-time for the City of Cornwall, and as a Member of the Board of Governors can be more complicated than appears on the surface.

Two members of Cornwall Council are Alderman Dennis Carr, and Alderman Guy Leger, they both work on the Cornwall Campus. In a sense, they work for each other depending upon whether they are in their employee role or that of appointed or elected officials.

Career Decisions:

Have you thought of working for yourself?

In 1982, Fern became involved with the college's French Language Programming Advisory Committee. Four years later, he became a member of the College's Board of Governors.

The Board of Governors is the legal decision making body for the college. Fern is one of twelve external members of the board.

"I decided to accept the appointment because I wanted to give back to the college some of what I had received," Fern states.

His first year on the board, Fern chaired the Personnel sub-committee. During this period, the provincial government introduced Bill 8, the French Language services act.

Backed by his experiences with the French Language Programming committee, Fern worked on a special College task which was examining the future of education in French at St. Lawrence. The task force recommended the creation of a fourth campus of St. Lawrence, to be based in Cornwall and offer education in the French Language.

These recommendations were never implemented because at the same time, the province created LaCite, Ontario's 23rd Community College.

After community forums and many meetings, the Cornwall community elected to have LaCite provide the French Language skills training they were seeking.

"It was a particularly difficult issue to deal with but at the same time very interesting," explains Fern. "The other members of the Board of Governors really supported my efforts on this issue. It was a good feeling to have the confidence of the Board."

For almost a year now, Fern has chaired the Board's Finance Committee. It has been a particularly challenging year financially for the College.

"My previous experiences of cutbacks with municipalities has helped me gain an appreciation for the budget constraints the college is experiencing." On the whole, Fern believes the board works well as a team.

"Personally, I don't see us as a "yes" board," says Fern. "Board members are genuinely concerned about the issues before them. People coming before the board need to do their homework. Because members of the board are appointed rather than elected, we are not out in the community trying to make personal points. It is really a down to business board."

August 1992 will mark the end of Fern's term with the colleges Board of Governors.

In his assessment, he believes the strength of St. Lawrence is the dedicated people who work here.

"This is a close knit group who care about what they are doing but the college is at the turning point," Fern states. "Our client groups are changing and our communities are changing too. It is a time for changing direction at St. Lawrence as well."

It used to be that parents came to convocations to congratulate their children. More and more it is the parents who are graduating and their children are in the audience.

As we approach the 25th anniversary of the college, Fern believes we should do more than the traditional "Home Coming" type of celebration.

"We must promote the many things that we have accomplished over the past 25 years," Fern claims.

It could be that we at St. Lawrence should be promoting the fact that our college graduates successful individuals like Fern. Alumni, who through their commitment to the college, enhance the value of a St. Lawrence education.

Alumni Profile...

In 1977, St. Lawrence College convoked its first graduates of a new and exciting program, Human Resources Management. Michael Nolan was in that first class and certainly made the most of it.

Fourteen years, several personnel positions and five companies later, Mike is Employee Relations Manager for Mobil Chemical of Canada in Belleville, Ontario.

"Ours is the only manufacturing facility Mobil has in Canada," explains Mike. "We have two plants on the Belleville site here."

The company produces films for food packaging, plastic bags and skid wraps which are used in manufacturing industries as an effective way of securing and protecting materials which are normally shipped on wooden pallets.

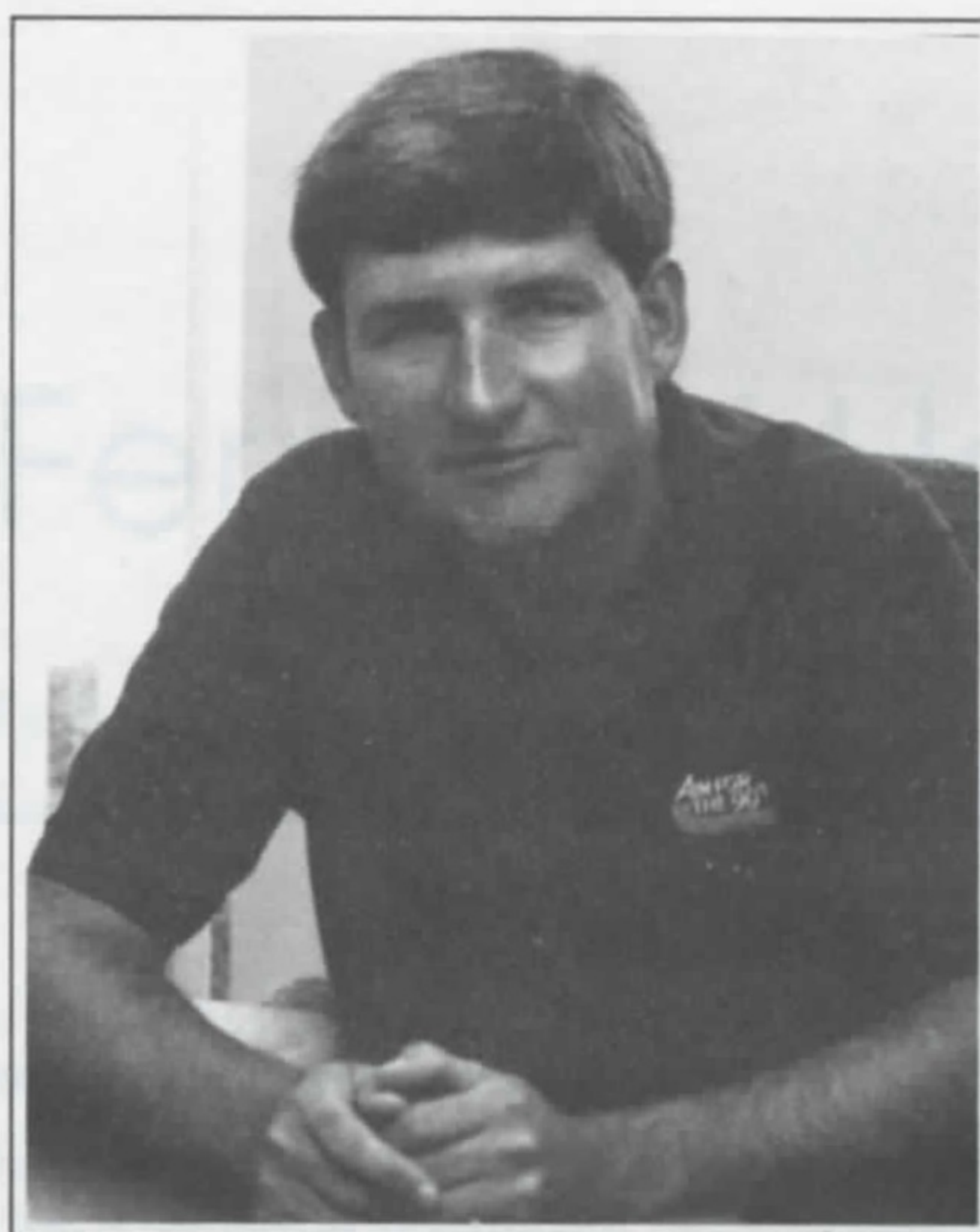
With 290 employees on the site, Mike reports directly to the Manager of Canadian operations for the company.

Mike joined Mobil in March of 1987 but before there, worked at Alfa-Laval in Peterborough, Westclox in the same city, Rio Algom in Elliot Lake in Northern Ontario and Atlas Steels in Welland. The position at Atlas, Personnel Officer, was his first in the H.R. field following graduation from St. Lawrence in '77.

"Each job had its own challenges," says Mike. "But I knew I wanted to stay in the Human Resources field. Each move provided me with a new experience and increased responsibilities."

As Manager for Employee Relations at Mobil Chemical today, Mike has responsibility for labour relations recruitment, training, health and safety, payroll and security for the Canadian operations.

"Safety is a major priority for us here," explains Mike. "We've had only one lost time accident in the past four years." "Mobil Chemical in Canada is a non-unionized company," he adds. "We've

never had a layoff in the history of this company. In my position, I still need to earn the respect of each and every one of our employees."

As I toured the Mobil Chemical plant with Mike recently, it appeared to me that he had done just that. We saw several of the production employees during the tour and there was always a 'how is it going Mike', or a wave here and there. A few stopped us to explain to Mike something new in their area which was affecting production. Always, their seemed to be the mutual respect that is inherent in a well run organization.

Mike recalls his days at the Kingston Campus with a great deal of fondness.

"College was a lot of fun," Mike states with enthusiasm. "Our class really stuck together and participated in intramural sports and things like that. I remember Gerry McCreedy was one of our key instructors."

The student pub must have strong memories for Mike as well because it was at a pub night on the Kingston Campus that he met his wife Brenda. Mike and Brenda now have two boys. Tyler is six and Trevor three.

Looking back to some of the things which Mike believes has helped his career, he offers some suggestions for HRM students and alumni of the program. Networking with others is something which Mike feels makes a major difference. Volunteering some of your time is important and people in Mike's position look for that type of initiative when recruiting employees.

Over the years, Mike's volunteer efforts have benefited organizations such as the IAPA, Junior Achievement and the Community Industrial Training Committee in Peterborough.

"See your position in Human Resources Department as a 'service' to other areas of the company," Mike states. "In our organization I have 290 customers for our human resources services. I work for everyone at our site."

While at Westclox back in 1981, Mike became involved with the Federal government and helped influence the development of government policy regarding work-sharing programs in Canada.

"People in this position have a lot of responsibility," Mike states. The H.R. position can be very lonely at times because you can't simply talk to anyone about a personal situation involving another employee."

Preparing the company to deal with major legislated employment and environmental issues is a key challenge for Mike in the 90's.

When he is not working or spending time with his family, Mike can be found at the golf course or maybe playing pick-up hockey.

"We still keep in touch with a number of the group from our class at St. Lawrence," says Mike. College was a good time and it certainly helped me get started to where I am today."

Career Directions: Have you thought of working for yourself?

Entrepreneurship is an option in virtually any field of endeavour, says Darlene Cullimore, Director of the Eastern Ontario Centre for Entrepreneurship, and a staff member of the Kingston campus of St. Lawrence.

"At EOCE in Kingston we have worked with over 4000 people in the last two years who are considering owning their own business, or who are in the early stages of operation," Darlene says. "Some are just out of school, others have varying degrees of experience working for someone else. However, all our clients want to have more control over their careers and think entrepreneurship may be the answer."

Stacey Maraldo, a 1989 graduate of Advertising and Public Relations, became an entrepreneur just one year after graduation. She says her experience of working for others "made me start my own business". Now the busy owner of CATS (Consumer and Trade Shows), Stacey has marketed several successful shows in Eastern Ontario and is about to export her service to New York State. "I wanted to give my customers what they were looking for but couldn't find," she says, admitting that her desire to find other like-minded business owners and bring them together was the seed of the idea that led to her trade show marketing business.

Stacey is glad she struck out on her own, but she says it is not something everyone could do. Her capsule summary of what it takes to be an entrepreneur is to be someone "who is

dynamic and who doesn't like people around you who are going to slow you down." She adds, "You can't be in business unless you can listen". Admitting that some of her good ideas have bombed in practice, Stacey advises any entrepreneur to listen to customers and to advice from every quarter. "Every bit of advice, even if it is offered facetiously, is good advice," she says.

The starting point Stacey recommends for anyone thinking of becoming an entrepreneur is to approach the closest Centre of Entrepreneurship or Business Self-Help Office. "Ask yourself why you want to be in business and why you have chosen your particular business idea," Stacey says, "Is the idea a good one for that market at this time? Are you prepared to take the risk?" She adds, however, that the risk is often not that big. "Start up, especially in the service sector, doesn't have to cost a lot. And there are loans available for new entrepreneurs," Stacey says, herself a recipient of a Youth Venture Loan at Start up.

Staff at the Eastern Ontario Centre for Entrepreneurship and the Greater Kingston Business Self-Help Office help potential entrepreneurs step through the maze of government regulations and ensure that the information needed to develop a particular business idea gets across at the right time.

"We offer support and encouragement in a confidential setting, as well as a perspective on the concept's marketability before you approach your banker," Darlene says.

"We are also sensitive to each entrepreneur's need for further training, and direct them to appropriate seminars and courses," Darlene adds. "Most people in our society have been educated as specialists and have worked in specialized areas, which has not necessarily given them general business management skills." She says that the potential business owner has to be prepared to juggle many hats. "For most, this means getting some form of further training."

Inventors are frequent visitors to EOCE also, Darlene notes. "There seems to be much less systemized support for product innovation both in terms of financial help and places to turn," she says, adding that many inventors encounter negative reactions and brick walls even when their ideas are very good. Putting inventors in touch with agencies and people who can offer real help is one of EOCE's main objectives, Darlene says. To this end EOCE is hosting a conference for inventors on December 13 which will focus on the resources available in Eastern Ontario to assist inventors and the steps involved to commercialize a product idea.

Appraisal and Assessment Program...

ST. LAWRENCE COLLEGE continues to review and re-evaluate all of its programs, and to examine new ways to deliver quality education within the confines of available funding. The Appraisal and Assessment Program in Cornwall was amongst such programs during a special task force program review.

"It was targeted as a program which should be further evaluated to determine ways of improving its financial performance", reports Arleen Cain Roy, principal of the Cornwall campus. "I would like to assure everyone, however, that the Appraisal and Assessment program is alive and well."

Cy Page, Chair of Business, in Cornwall has no doubt that Appraisal and Assessment is a quality program: "It has unique features that make it invaluable to the province."

It is the only program in the province which prepares students for a career in both assessment and appraisal functions. Graduates can work for the provincial government assessing property for taxation purposes or work for the private sector, appraising properties for financing and for making business decisions.

Graduates also have the academic requirements for Associate membership (AIMA) from the province's certifying body (The Institute of Municipal Assessors - IMAO), for the Canadian Residential Appraiser (CRA) and for the Accredited Appraiser (AACI) by the Appraisal Institute of Canada (AIC). Faculty are also real assets to the program. Tony Barber and David Enns have full membership status with these institutes and are active professional practitioners.

"This close association with certifying institutions is very valuable to us," says Page. "And, the delivery of this program in a bilingual district gives St. Lawrence College an edge on supplying trained bilingual candidates."

"There is equal opportunity for both men and women in this field. It would be easy to place every single graduate if they were willing to relocate," insists Page. "The jobs follow the value of real-estate. For every job in real estate assessment and appraisal in Cornwall, there are 10 in Ottawa and 1000 in Ontario."

There is an insufficient number of graduates to keep up with the province's needs. This type of program commonly attracts mature individuals who become aware of the program's benefits through the industry. Since most of the college's marketing efforts have been through the high school system, this program has suffered low enrolments. "But enrolment numbers are increasing", reports Page.

"We have big plans for this program," he continues. Keeping in mind the increasing demand for university level education by more and more certifying bodies in many areas, the Business department, along with its advisory committee, will be looking at the possibility of offering a post-diploma and post-degree opportunities that would allow business graduates to complete the specialized academic requirements of certifying institutions. High school graduates would still complete a 2-year Assessment and Appraisal program at the college level in two years and business graduates would complete the certification requirements in half the time--one year.

But when you are dealing with an annual budget in the \$60 million bracket that level of deficit is manageable; particularly if you have a reserve fund that can cover the deficit. This year the money challenge hasn't gone away but we are forecasting a balanced budget.

Tech/Tech

Keeping pace with technology is a phrase we hear almost daily. For those who actually work in technical occupations, it's not just a phrase but a daily challenge.

The Technician/Technologist Updating Program is designed to make that challenge a little easier.

Sponsored by the Ministry of Skills Development and delivered through Ontario's Community colleges, the program is designed to encourage post-diploma training specifically for college graduates working as Technicians and Technologists.

"The program provides an excellent opportunity for alumni of technology programs to update their skills in very specialized fields," explains Donn Atchison, Chair of Business and Technology at the Brockville campus. "Introduction to Programmable Logic Controllers (PLC's), Computer Aided Design and Hazardous waste management are a few of the courses offered recently to graduates."

Jeffrey Stafford, Instrumentation Technician '91/Kingston is back at St. Lawrence this fall studying Advanced P.L.C's under the Technician/Technologist updating program.

"I'm working part-time and studying part-time to complete my Technologist designation in Instrumentation," explains Jeff. "The Tech/Tech course in P.L.C's is over and above the courses I have been taking in Technology. I think it will be an advantage for me at my work."

Tuition for the program is paid for by the Ministry of Skills Development. St. Lawrence plans to continue to offer a variety of courses through the program based on the specific needs of industry in Cornwall, Kingston and Brockville.

As most Colleges of Applied Arts & Technology in Ontario are participating in the program, graduates living outside the St. Lawrence area can also take advantage of this post-diploma training opportunity through the Community College nearest them.
