For as long as the OCMC has challenged marketing students from colleges across Ontario, St. Lawrence students have been near the top. See page 12 for more on this year's competition.



Structural Change Will Improve Efficiency

The reality is that the restructuring of the global economy is far from over. As the citizens of Ontario respond to this new environment by developing new skills, the services of our colleges will continue to be in great demand. At the same time, the Province's fiscal difficulties are also far from over. Social Contract negotiations were aimed at simply keeping the deficit at a manageable level, not at eliminating it. It's clear that we'll have to do more with less.

Here at St. Lawrence, we've been responding to this challenge by streamlining our operations and making them more efficient. Of particular note is the reduction of our college divisions from six to four, and the restructuring of our academic division into five, tri-campus Schools. To function effectively with this leaner management structure, we must focus on empowering our work groups to trust their own skills, knowledge, and judgement to make decisions which will best meet the needs of our customers.

With this new structure in place, I believe we will be well-positioned to carry out our strategy of becoming a quality institution. We are one of the few colleges anywhere that is implementing the tools and techniques of Total Quality Management on both the administrative and academic sides of our operations. I firmly believe that as we proceed with the implementation of this strategy, we will successfully become a center of college excellence in Ontario.

Changing Environment Demands Focused Strategy

Recently, St. Lawrence retained the services of Price Waterhouse to conduct an analysis of the competitive environment in which we operate.


The consulting firm spent 3 months examining our strengths and weaknesses relative to the opportunities and threats in the environment, including the competitive threats poised by other colleges, school boards, and private trainers. What emerged from the analysis was the idea that St. Lawrence could best capitalize on opportunities in the market-place and defend itself from competitors by positioning itself as a Total Quality institution.

In the last issue of Voyageur, Total Quality Facilitator Diane Lalonde explained the nature of TQ and how we're going about implementing it at St. Lawrence. Though other colleges are doing it too,

what makes us unique is our goal of implementing Total Quality on both the administrative and academic sides of our operation. We will be using the principles and practices of Total Quality to not only make our operations more effective but also to differentiate our graduates from other colleges. For example, we believe (and our research supports the notion) that a graduate of a business or engineering technology program who is schooled in the application of TQ practices, will be more marketable than one without those skills.

The change won't take place overnight, but in the issues [of Voyageur] to come, you will clearly see our progress toward this goal.

Tony Barnes New Chair Of The Board Of Governors



Tony Barnes is a business graduate of the Manchester College of Commerce in England and a Fellow of the (UK) Chartered Institute of Management Account-

ants. He was transferred from the UK in 1980 as controller of Henderson Barwick, a stainless steel pipe manufacturing plant in Brockville.

For the last ten years, Tony has been the General Manager of the plant, responsible for all aspects of production, marketing and administration. In November 1989, the plant won national honours for productivity in the Canada Awards for Business Excellence program. In January 1993, the plant became the first in its field in Canada to receive the ISO 9002 certification.

Since the mid-eighties, Tony has been active on the training scene as a member and eventual Chair of the Leeds and Grenville Skills Training Committee. He has been a Director and Treasurer of the

Brockville District Chamber of Commerce and joined the Board of Governors of St.Lawrence College in January, 1991. He is also a Board member and Finance Committee Chair of the St.Vincent de Paul Hospital in Brockville.

Tony is married to Jennifer, who teaches in the primary division of the Leeds and Grenville Public School Board. They have two children, a daughter in high school and a son attending St.Lawrence College, Cornwall campus, in the Marine Engineering Program.



Strong Alliances Are Formed Through C Committees

In early July of this year, president Dan Corbett received a letter from an advisory board member.

It read like this:

"I am compelled to write this letter to express my appreciation of your organization's openness to associates. As an advisory board member, I play a small part in the overall activities within

St. Lawrence College yet I feel that I am an integral part of the [College] community. This feeling comes from your policy of inviting associates to various college functions, considering associates for special activities and providing regular copies of the College

News.

In my opinion, you are definitely doing the right thing right".

Signed, Gary Bazowsky-CET, Section Manager Professional Development Bell Canada. At our College we have an active advisory committee for each academic program at each of our campuses. We are indeed fortunate to have approximately 65 advisory committees, all made up of volunteers from our communities. In fact, throughout all of Ontario, advisory committees have been established to assist each community college's Board of Governors (BOG) with advice about programming, i.e. currency of program offerings, community needs, etc.

Advisory committees are made up of experienced professionals who help us to be more realistic in our program development and in our educational services. People in our communities see the knowledge we teach being put into productive practice every day. Who better to provide practical, meaningful recommendations?


Advisory committees are appointed by the College's BOG and we encourage graduates of our programs to become involved as committee members. Consistent with provincial guidelines, the normal term of office for a committee member is three years and members may be re-appointed for a successive three-year term. Gary Bazowsky has been on the Business Technology Advisory Committee for just over two years. When he was asked what prompted him to write the letter, he said "I've felt that way for the longest time." He recalled attending a convocation in February and sitting in the audience. He thought, "Here I am; they've taken the time to invite us."

It's not just the convocation invitations. It's the Career Day invitations, special committee work, being provided with access to OfficeVision, the College's electronic mail system, and being asked to provide opinions above and beyond the advisory committee agenda. "They're perhaps minor [to college staff] but every gesture of this kind draws us closer", says Gary. He enjoys meeting the students at the advisory committee meetings and then later seeing them at convocation. That's what Gary calls "involvement".

When the idea of a mock interview came up at a meeting, Gary and his Bell associates in Human Resources set up the whole process from fictional employment advertisement to employment interview. They teamed up with the Bell Canada office in Ottawa to play the role of the hiring company.

It turned out to be one of Gary's fondest memories for when one particular interview was done, the student mentioned in passing that it was a good thinghe/she had driven up on the weekend to find the place because the student had car problems that morning before the interview. Gary and his team

were shocked! "This person made no mention of the problem before the interview. This person was on time for it and handled it well. We had no idea it meant so much!" Gary added that it was a real learning experience - for them. When asked if he would do it again, he said he would like to "if it was deemed something useful".

That's what it is all about for advisory committee members like Gary. He feels strongly that if he and his colleagues in industry don't tell us what they need, no one will. "Don't rely on the politicians", he added.

Gary sees Canada as needing more doers rather than just thinkers. He feels that doers can become thinkers later on. That is one reason why he likes the Business Technology program. It combines doing and thinking.

On-the-job training is Gary's responsibility at Bell. "The company expects that our people are capable when they apply for a position; otherwise they aren't hired". The kind of training that Gary's group does is a blend of both system-wide programs such as Total Quality and more tailored programs. For example, the role of the technician is changing. According to Gary, technicians have become more than just "fixers". They also have to assume the role of "changers", using a broader systems analyst approach. For this, the professional development team provides training in technical as well as business skills.

Gary sees his role on our advisory committee as one of an influencer. Bell Canada knows, as do most Canadian firms, what their future needs are. There is a team in place at Bell that forecasts those needs. What Gary learns, he passes along to us.

Gary participates on other advisory committees at other colleges. He said that when he compares all these committees, he attempts to convince the others to model themselves on our format.

Gary used the term "associate" several times during our interview. It seems more appropriate these days.

The upcoming presentation of *Guys and Dolls* at the Grand Theatre in Kingston will feature one of St. Lawrence's more colourful alumni. Once again, Tim Walsh is on centre stage.

Tim is never far from the theatre.

"My first interest in acting came when I was six years old and attending Prince of Wales Public School in Brockville," says Tim. "Even when I was attending St. Lawrence, I was involved with the theatre performing at the civic centre in Brockville. There was no theatre at the college."

A graduate of the Behavioral Science program, Tim graduated from the Brockville campus in 1973.

Following his studies in Brockville, Tim moved to Kingston and began a 14 year career with the Department of the Solicitor General were he worked as a Recreation and Physical Education Specialist in Kingston area prisons. During this time, the budding actor also began studying at Queen's University on a part-time basis. Five years later, Tim earned his degree in History and Drama.

"Acting always came first," explains Tim. "A number of employers over the years have had a hard time understanding my obsession. I would take time away from work so I could perform."

As he reflects on his activities over the years, Tim measures the time in terms of what performances he has been involved with.

In 1985 Tim won the Dominion Drama Festival's "Best Supporting Actor" award for his performance in *Translations*.

"Around this time people were saying I should try to make a go of acting professionally. I found an agent and began to take roles in films and TV commercials, says Tim." "There was lots of work but never any real money in acting part-time."

After 14 years in Corrections, it was time for a change. A series of sales and management positions in the automotive industry took Tim across the province until last year when the idea of starting his own business began to take shape.

This past June marked the official opening of "Scene Dock" in downtown Kingston. The furniture and art store takes its name from the side stage in a theatre where the furniture is stored prior to being moved on stage.

Tim recently opened a second outlet of "Scene Dock" in a shared facility with another St. Lawrence grad, Marc Pilon, who owns Seabo Hot Tubs on Princess St. Tim's wife, Brenda, also helps out at the store when she is not working as a

dietitian at Kingston General Hospital. Says Tim, "I have a great deal of respect for the work that goes on at St. Lawrence. In fact, I'm sort of surrounded by St. Lawrence people. My son Justin, from my first marriage is a grad, my nephew is studying at St. Lawrence in Kingston, my business partner attended the college, and the list goes on."

Tim remembers his first day at the college in 1971 and recalls registering with Wayne Dailey who still works at the college. While at the college, Tim played several sports including hockey.

"Al Hoy who also works at the college was in my class and Doug Hone was also a student at the Brockville campus then," explains Tim. "I like to get back to the college whenever there is an event going on where you can see old friends and share a few beers."

With "Scene Dock" open and operating, Tim is back in his role as actor this fall with a major performance in *Guys and Dolls*. The classic production runs at the Grand Theatre November 12th to 27th. Tickets are available by contacting the Grand at 530-2050.

Tim's performance is certain to be enjoyable, as always.

Alumni network in action

Helping recent graduates find employment is not a new concept for St. Lawrence alumni but Lorne Garlough, (Computer Engineering, Process Control/Cornwall-88) knows just how important it can be.

Through the efforts of committed staff and an alumnus, Lorne was afforded the opportunity of an interview with Bailey Canada, and since 1988 he has been working as a Systems Specialist for the large process engineering firm based in Burlington, Ontario.

"I guess it got started because C.K. in the Technology Department in Cornwall kept in touch with a former St. Lawerence graduate at Bailey, Brad Loewen," says Lorne. From there, I sent my resumé and followed with a couple of interviews."

Lorne is not the only graduate to benefit from this positive relationship.

"Pete Harte and Luc Lemire are working in the Pulp and Paper department with me on the application engineering side. Brad Loewen is our department Manager. In our department, 10% of the staff are from St. Lawrence." Adds

Lorne, "Bill Sinfield, a grad from Cornwall is also here at Bailey in the Utilities division of the firm."

Lorne's work at the company has involved travel to pulp and paper mills across Canada and, most recently, Indonesia.

A native of Williamsburg, Lorne first attended college in Belleville at Loyalist were he earned a diploma in Mechanical Engineering in 1982. After working for the St. Lawrence Parks Commission for a few years, Lorne elected to return to college full-time in Cornwall in 1986.

The College kicked off 25th anniversary celebrations with a "Voyageur Expedition" along the St. Lawrence River from Kingston to Cornwall from June 27th-July 1st, 1992. The trip was organized by Frank Lockington and Robin Pepper of Marketing Services to increase college awareness among our communities and to help locate "lost" alumni in our 25th year. About 45 voyageurs participated in the five day paddle and were greeted warmly by dignitaries and local media along the way. Provincially, July 12, 1992 was declared

College Day at Canada's Wonderland and on October 3, 1992 staff and alumni attended College Day at the Skydome to watch the Blue Jays take on the Detroit Tigers.

To help mark our 25th anniversary, St. Lawrence selected two Hillebrande Estates wines for special bottling. The white was Hillebrande's Chardonnay

The three daily newspapers in our region, the Brockville Recorder and Times, the Cornwall Standard Freeholder and the Kingston Whig Standard each published a special 25th anniversary supplement during Fall 1992. They highlighted our history and news about innovations in college education.

On October 30, 1992 some 700 employees of St. Lawrence gathered in the Aultsville Theatre at the Cornwall Campus to hear President Dan Corbett's vision of our Strategic Plan and to focus on actions necessary to implement strategic initiatives to set future directions for the College. It was also a time to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the College. Each campus celebrated the 25th anniversary with a Homecoming Reunion....

Brockville had their Homecoming last September. An official ribbon cutting ceremony with local politicians and members of the Board of Governors was held on September 24, 1992. President Corbett officially opened the 25th Faculty Art Show and visitors were invited to view the memorabilia exhibit in the gym. A Wine & Cheese party followed the next evening on September 25th for alumni and staff. Saturday afternoon, the 26th, alumni were invited to meet former classmates and teachers at a reception followed by a dance/coffee house that evening. On Sunday, September 27, Homecoming wound up with an Ecumenical Church Service, brunch and the planting of a silver maple tree donated by the Ministry of Natural Resources.

Cornwall's Homecoming Reunion took place May 7 - 9, 1993. A Friday evening Wine & Cheese Party was followed by an official opening on Saturday, May 8th, complete with a memorabilia display, a barbecue and special Homecoming Cake. Saturday night, over 400 people filled the gym for the last of the "old-fashioned bashes" to hear the Butlers play. Everyone got exactly what they came for from the very first song to the last waltz. The Butlers had everyone back in the 70s and dancing like they were 20 again. Homecoming festivities ended with a brunch Sunday, May 9th.

A year after the Voyageur Expedition, Kingston held its Homecoming Weekend on June 25, 26 and 27, 1993. More than 300 alumni from around Kingston and across the country returned for the college's first reunion since its founding 25 years ago. The theme of the reunion was "Get Back To Where You Once Belonged". A Wine and Cheese Party in the Student Centre was held on the Friday evening. Memorabilia abounded from old photos to old music. A barbecue and slo-pitch baseball game were held Saturday afternoon, and some academic programs organized dinner gettogethers. A "GET BACK" Dance was held in the Student Pub Saturday night. Brunch was offered on Sunday followed by the sealing of a time capsule with donations from students and staff. Other events in Kingston during 1992-93 included a Staff Golf Tournament, BBQ and Dance on August 27, 1992 featuring our staff band "The Committed", Staff Recognition Night on October 1, 1992, an historical display in the



The answer is that they all work with the College's tri-campus
business & Industry
Services Department
led by Director Dan Dexter.

This department of the College works with large and small organizations to match the training needs of the client with the resources available through St. Lawrence. Brockville's Denyce Diakun has been developing programs for businesses that include courses in such areas as PLC's (programmable logic controllers), electronics and academic upgrading. Working with Brock Telecom, she has helped put together a course for industrial maintenance mechanics. In the hospitality sector, she has worked on a session to upgrade skills in food and beverage service for the hotel and restaurant sector.

In Kingston, consultant *Barry Keefe* has been working with a wide range of clients for several years. A company might require a course on Statistical Process Control. Barry will find a way to deliver it. Or there may be a request to help develop a customer service program or to cross-train a number of skilled trades persons. Drawing on the strength of existing College faculty and individuals from the wider community, Business & Industry Services is able to provide a wide range of training and development services in a practical and cost-effective manner.

seamless educational opportunity. This one is referred to as the Black and Decker Consortium, as it was initiated by the manager of Black and Decker in Brockville. It in essence has the capabilities of providing current high-quality certified training to the existing broadbased manufacturing workforce and to attract the next generation of workers. The partnership is modeled after a very successful strategy used by Black and Decker in the United States.

Other partnerships have been secured through the efforts of the college senior administration and include Canadian Microelectronics Corporation at Queen's University who are the research arm of the Science Council of Canada in microchip engineering.

Skills Dynamics Inc., the training arm of IBM has formed a partnership with our college to deliver its established stateof-the-art training in a format that complements our current offerings.

Other existing partnerships exist with Kemptville Agricultural College, Sir Arthur Lewis College in St.Lucia and Szecheyni Istvan College of Technology in Hungary.

An example of the quality of partners Potential partnerships are being negotiated with Niagara College and New York State University to deliver university-level courses by satellite in order to participate in the envisioned "educational" channel and the Canadian Manufacturers Association to deliver their certificate program through external funding.
