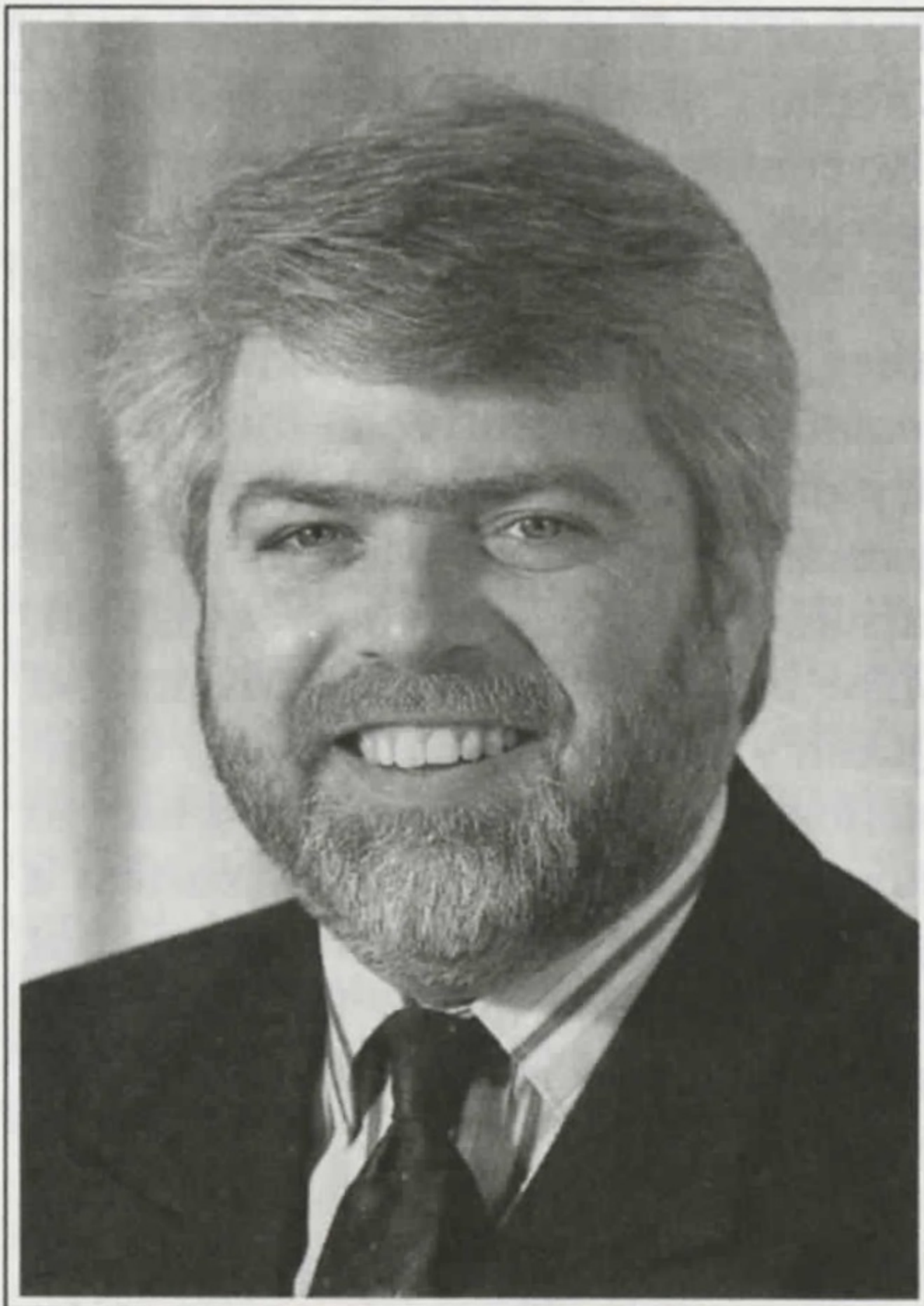
"November Morning",

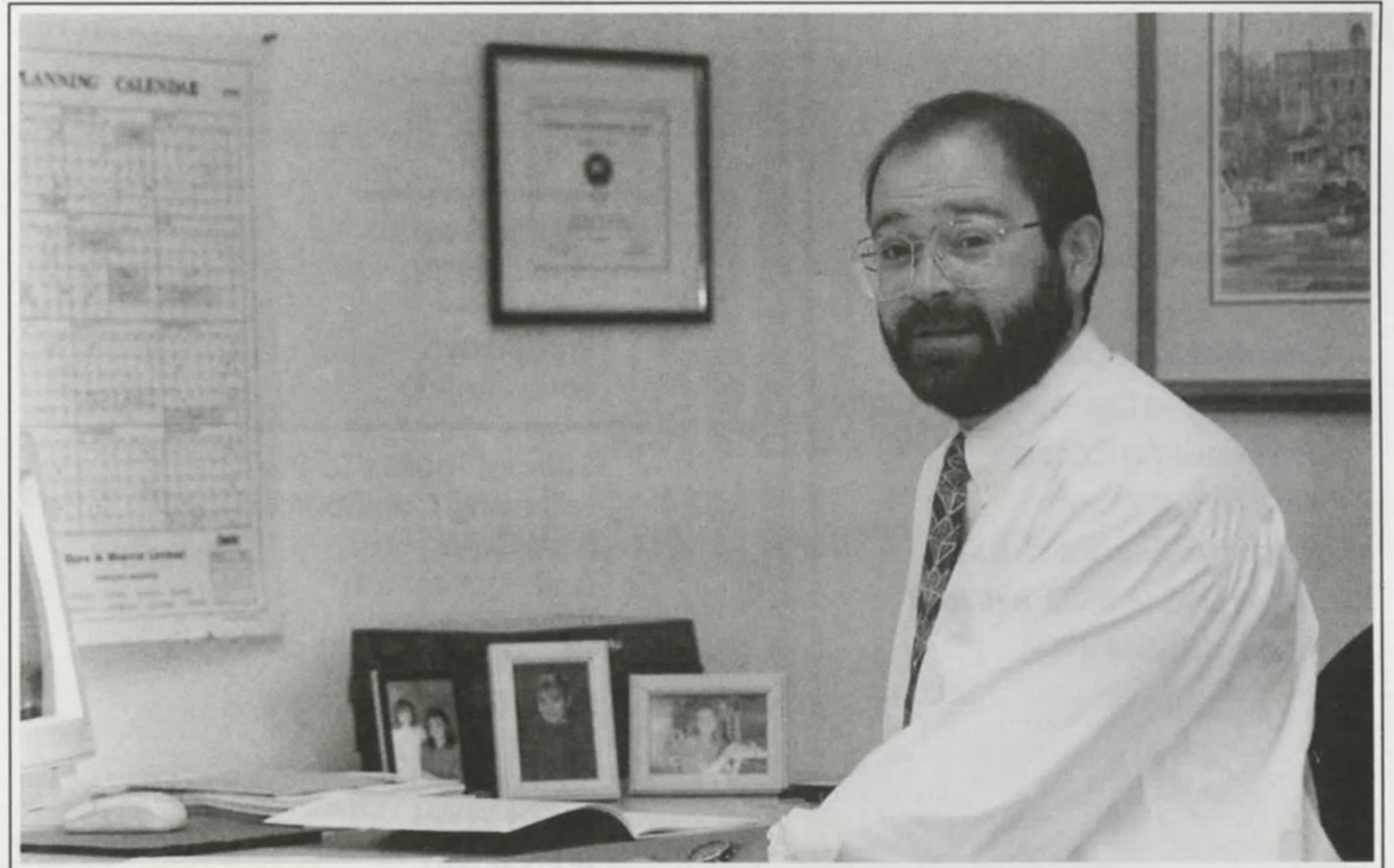

Mike Hulley

*Just as water runs in a cycle
from rain to rivers to oceans
to rain again, Mike Hulley has
come full circle with
St. Lawrence College.*



In 1975 Mike Hulley, Water Resources Engineering Technology /78 began his studies with the College. Almost 20 years later, Mike is back at St. Lawrence in an advisory capacity as Chair of the Civil and Environmental Engineering Technology Program's Advisory Committee at the Kingston campus. And, there is likely no one better qualified to hold this volunteer position.

Mike is currently the Manager for Gore and Storrie's Kingston office. Gore and Storrie, one of Canada's oldest consulting companies, specializes exclusively in the environmental engineering field. Their annual report states that the company offers complete environmental consulting services to clients in both Government and Industry. The company is Canadian and is owned by its senior engineering staff.

"We are working on projects all over the world," explains Mike. "We tend to work on smaller projects and each area manager may be responsible for several projects at one time."

Mike is a relative newcomer to G & S, having joined the company in 1991. For the fifteen year period between St. Lawrence and his present position, Mike worked at Royal Military College in Kingston. But during this period Mike also continued to study and continued to study and yes, continued to study.

After joining RMC as a Technologist he began part-time studies at the University of Waterloo through their correspondence program with the goal of earning a degree. With degree in hand, Mike began work on his Masters at Queen's University in Kingston. Completion of his Masters allowed him to move ahead at RMC and he earned a lecture position with the university. But Mike didn't stop there. His next goal was a PhD and in 1991, this goal was achieved.

"After my PhD work at Queen's I felt it was time to into the private sector so I made the move from RMC to Gore and Storrie," explains Dr. Hulley. "And, I can confirm that managing is certainly different than teaching."

It was around this time that Mike formally re-established his relationship with St. Lawrence as a member of the Civil - Environmental Program Advisory Committee.

"Well, St. Lawrence gave me my start," says Mike. "This is one way I can give something back to the program. Although the old Water Resources program that I took was suspended in the early 1980's, it has come back in the form of Civil - Environmental Technology. What I do in my work at Gore and Storrie is directly related to the program."

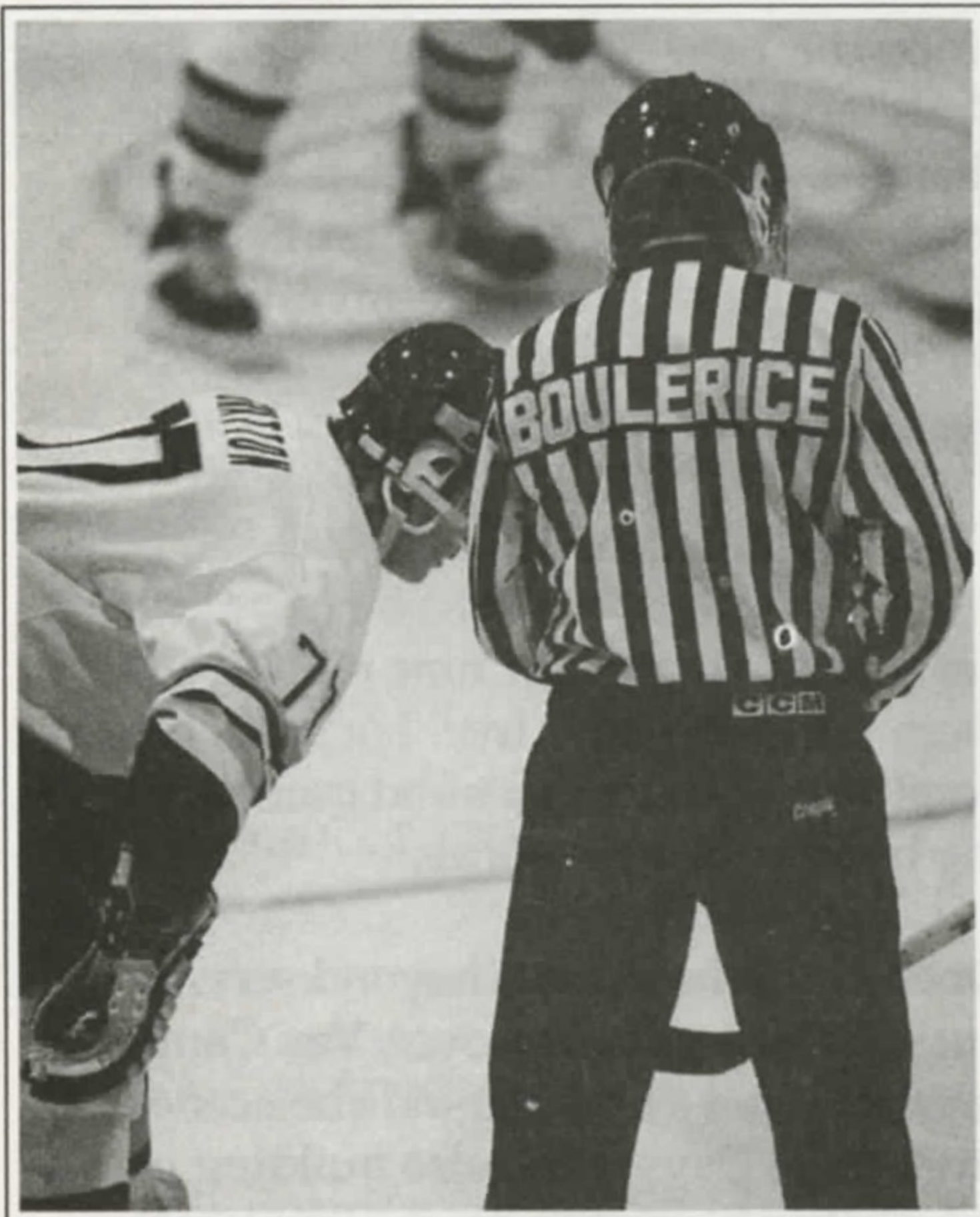

This scene is repeated over 100 times each year for Sean Boulerice, Business Administration - Industrial Management and Business Accounting/85 - Cornwall. Although refereeing major league hockey is more of an interest than a career for Sean, it can be serious business.

Sean is one of only sixty Certified Level VI Referees in Canada. This means that he can officiate in the major Junior A league, the CIAU and American Hockey League. In fact, you can sometimes find Sean between the lines of the Cornwall Civic Complex overseeing the Cornwall Aces and their weekly rivals.

"I was officiating while I was a student at St. Lawrence in the mid 80s", explains Sean. "Those were interesting days for me. Full-time school, full-time work with Kraft and refereeing two or three games a week was a lot. Probably too much."

Hard work has never been a barrier for 'the Ref'. Following his graduation, with distinction from two diploma programs in 1985, Sean began a career with Combustion Engineering in Cornwall.

"My first job was in the Accounting Department", says Sean. "I started at the bottom."

Over the next nine years, Sean worked his way "up the ladder" and through several positions with Combustion. When he ended his term with the company earlier this year, he was Manager, Financial Accounting for the company, responsible for all site accounting personnel for the company's Eastern Canada operations. Along the way, Sean earned his CMA from Carlton University in Ottawa.

"As with a number of organizations, Combustion underwent a major restructuring and downsizing of their organization during the recession. Essentially, I worked myself out of my job as I was a member of the team that undertook the downsizing. I knew what to expect", explains Sean.

Sean has used the career change opportunity to explore some of his other interests including teaching and writing.

"In August of this year I took on a contract teaching position with St. Lawrence's Centre for Business and Industry Services," Sean says. "Training has always been a part of my work but through the Centre, I am able to concentrate on helping others to develop skills in finance and industrial management.

With his keen interest in Sports, Sean, together with two partners recently wrote a book on NHL facts and statistics, to assist people who play sports lotteries. This product was endorsed by the Ontario Lottery Corporation and Canadian Special Olympics. The endeavour involved data research, data base creation and as Sean states it, "extensive negotiations for production and distribution."

"Researching the facts and writing the book was really the easy part," explains Sean. "We were doing it for ourselves anyway and thought, why not publish this and sell our information to others who play sports Lotteries."

And they have some success of their own to back up their new book 'RESULTS'. "Together with my partners, we have combined winnings of almost \$70,000. playing Proline Sports Lottery."

"With all this going on, it's obvious that I have a very supportive family." Sean and his wife Sherry, (nee Black) a graduate of the class of '84 Legal secretary Program at the Cornwall Campus, have two children, Megan 5, and Jaime 3.

Though dedicated to his family, the on ice action is never far from Sean's mind. "From my perspective, the on ice official has the best spot in the house from which to watch the game."

His goal is to referee in the Olympics. A goal which, given his success to date, may not be that far out of reach.

Hotel/Restaurant Management Graduate is Now Days Inn's Front Office Manager

It isn't surprising that St. Lawrence College graduate Glenn Van Camp took the Hotel/Restaurant Management course. After all, at one point he temporarily lived in a motel.

Van Camp graduated from the Brockville campus' Hotel/Restaurant Management program in 1989, after completing one year of Business Administration at the Kingston campus. While attending college in Kingston, Van Camp worked at the Beaver Motel on Highway 15 in exchange for a room to stay. "I just needed a place to live in town," he says.

The motel job meant Van Camp had an idea of what to expect in the Hotel/Restaurant Management course. "I think I knew what I was getting into," he says. "I enjoyed (the hospitality industry), so I switched (courses)." The two-year Hotel/Restaurant Management course covered an array of topics, including accounting, French, culinary skills and computers, says Van Camp, originally from Enterprise, Ont. "You took some of everything."

"There's a lot of stuff." The program prepares you for a variety of career options, Van Camp says. "You could probably go for anything in the hospitality industry." This certainly holds true for Van Camp. He's now the front-office manager at Days Inn Kingston (formerly the 401 Inn) and has been there for over three years. Van Camp also served as a night auditor and manager/restaurant supervisor at Days Inn.

Apart from working at the Days Inn, Van Camp also served as a weekend bartender and worked at Gananoque's Carriage House Motor Inn in a dining room/waiter capacity, and - as he puts it - whatever else they needed him for.

What's a typical day for Van Camp? "It changes daily," he says, adding that the hospitality industry is "not a set nine-to-five job." His duties include verifying records to make sure guests are happy with their stay, reservations, dealing with the public, and paperwork. Despite being on call, Van Camp has managed to take several college courses - including a small-business one - since graduating.

Down the road, Van Camp says he'd like to become an assistant manager or general manager. "I'd certainly like to advance in the industry." Within the hospitality industry, there has been a big push to improve customer service, says Van Camp. He participated in a tourism program operated by the Kingston Area Economic Development Commission (KAEDC) that involved visiting nine local attractions to "become familiar with what Kingston had to offer the public," says Van Camp. He also received a certificate for participating in a local customer-service course held at various locations, including the Grand Theatre and Ambassador Motor Hotel.

Van Camp recently received the title of Certified Rooms Division Executive by passing a test given by the American Hotel and Motel Association. The test

"relates to all areas of the industry," he says, including security and front-desk operations.

Since the time Van Camp joined the Days Inn staff, the hotel has undergone changes, he says, adding that he was there when the business first became the Days Inn. "They're re-investing in the industry," he says, and "giving people quality for their dollar."

"They're quite active."

For guests, staying for nine nights gets them the 10th night free. For staff, the hotel offers CPR courses and training in the handling of chemicals.

Operating a hotel goes beyond serving guests who are staying over, Van Camp says. "There's a lot of behind-the-scenes stuff." The Days Inn is also building its reputation by pursuing the corporate market, as the hotel holds company banquets. The Days Inn is "still pretty young," says Van Camp. "They're still feeling around."

Outside of work, Van Camp is a service provider for a home-sharing program operated by the Kingston and District Association for Community Living. The program involves sharing a dwelling with an individual and making sure they are living properly - for example, ensuring they get a proper diet.

Van Camp also enjoys reading, cycling and weight lifting. "I'm not huge or anything," he laughs.

College becomes a video pioneer...

The three campuses of St. Lawrence College are now linked through a new state-of-the-art conferencing system featuring completely interactive video capabilities, Educational Technologies Director Gord MacDougall announced recently.

St. Lawrence is the first community college in Ontario with this level of technology.

"We're the first but by no means the last," MacDougall said. "Every week we get calls from many other organizations who are in the midst of similar projects and recognize St. Lawrence as a leader."

Though the video component is certainly the most glamorous, the system actually represents the convergence of three proven technologies with which most of us are quite familiar: telephone, video and computer. When linked they create a fully interactive classroom environment which allows classrooms to be extended across our campuses and beyond.

There is an identical 36-seat facility at each campus, with the several major features:

- two-way interactive video between sites
- two-way interactive audio between sites
- document cameras, which replace the traditional classroom overhead projector and allow for the display of transparencies, hardcopy documents, books, 35 mm slides, and any other objects
- VCRs, all of which broadcast videotapes across campus sites
- Fax machines to allow transfer of hardcopy documents back and forth
- Electronic whiteboards, which replace the traditional chalkboard and are fully interactive, allowing participants on any site to use them simultaneously
- Computer-based applications may be shared between sites

The system is up-and-running now. The School of Human Studies will be the major user this fall, delivering better than 40 hours/week of programming to second-year LASA students in Cornwall and Brockville. The School of Continuing Education is also using the system to deliver the Critical Care Nursing program in the evenings and expects to do the same with the PLA Portfolio.

MacDougall also expects that professional development activities, workshops, seminars, and meetings will be facilitated by the system. The Centre for Business and Industry Services will also be exploring contract training opportunities to deliver programming to our communities simultaneously, and to other video conferencing sites throughout the world.

The supplier of the video technology is VTel of Austin, Texas. VTel has over 700 installed educational sites throughout North America and around the world. They join Mitel and Newbridge of Kanata, Ontario as a key technology partner at the College.

St. Lawrence's Legal Assistant Program Goes International!

Canadian flags were on prominent display in the Hungarian city of Gyor during the first week of September this year. September 5th not only marked the beginning of another academic year at Szechenyi Istvan College, but heralded the formal partnership between that school and St. Lawrence College. With the support of the Bureau of Assistance for Central and Eastern Europe, an International Legal Assistant Program has been launched in Hungary. St. Lawrence's curriculum and faculty are central to this innovative programming.

St. Lawrence College's President, Dan Corbett and Executive Director, Dan Dexter were on hand in Gyor to represent the College at this formal occasion and underscore our excitement in this joint project. For their part, our Hungarian colleagues responded with a full day of events to mark the partnership and new program. Dan Corbett and Dr. Tamas Szekeres, Rector of Szechenyi Istvan College signed a formal agreement of partnership before attending a reception hosted at the City Hall by the Mayor of Gyor, Mr. Erno Kolozsvary. A further honoured guest to the inauguration was Mr. Rodney Irwin, Canadian Ambassador to Hungary.



The International Legal Assistant Program is unique to college programming in Hungary in that it represents the first time in over 50 years that such training has been undertaken. Graduates will have extensive English language training in addition to their other law-related placements and courses. They will graduate with a bilingual diploma from both colleges. Initial response to this career-oriented program from the local and international legal communities in Hungary has been strongly positive.

Previous news of this project, supported by the Bureau of Assistance for Central and Eastern Europe, was reported in *Voyageur* Spring 1994. One of the Canadian coordinators for this project, Allan Parkin, International Programs

spent August in Gyor working alongside Hungarian counterparts. Two St. Lawrence faculty, Kathy Lawton and Alison Motluk are now in residence and providing English language training. In addition, Kathy will be working with professors of Szechenyi Istvan College on various curriculum development activities. Another project coordinator, Joe Jordan, will be travelling to Hungary in mid-November to continue monitoring our efforts. In addition, Joe will explore some further international activities and initiatives which will grow from our presence in Hungary.

New Cornwall program focuses on Seniors

Meet Beverly Hincks...she initiated Encore: Seniors' Education Centre.

One year ago, Beverly began researching Senior Study programs across Canada and the United States. Since she was already giving weekly fitness classes to several seniors in Williamstown, she knew she would enjoy coordinating a full study program geared specifically towards seniors.

"Today's seniors are very active," says Beverly, "and they like to keep their mind busy."

So, Beverly contacted Eugene Cardinal, Director of Continuing Education, and made her proposal.

"He was sold on the concept immediately," she recalls.

The difficulty was finding the funds to get the program off the ground. Beverly looked at alternative funding methods: grants, corporate support, service club support. When all else failed, Beverly returned to Eugene who agreed that the program deserved a fair starting chance. So, with a classroom and some office space, Beverly is giving it her best shot. Twenty-two people showed up at her first meeting on Monday, August 22 and five others called to say they would join her at the first official advisory committee meeting. Her goal is to get 75 to 100 registrations during an Open House which she is planning for the end of September.

"Statistics show a 40% growth rate after the first registration," quotes Beverly, "and with approximately 100 people, we can expect the program to take off."

The study topics are limitless. Beverly is already planning a range of courses that will cover Retirement Financial Planning, Garden Biology, Fitness, Legal Issues in Estate Planning, Travel Concerns, Great Composers, Famous Authors, and more.

The Centre For Business and Industry Services at St. Lawrence College is one of Ontario's newest community enterprise brokers. The Community Enterprise Program will help to create at least 65 jobs for jobsOntario. Training participants through self-employment initiatives and community businesses in the Kingston area over the next year.

There are many kinds of community enterprise and this eight week program will help participants decide which is right for them.

A few types of enterprise include:

- Self-employment, in which you start your own company and run it alone
- Community Business, in which you share the responsibility and challenge of running a business with one or more partners or an existing community group
- Cooperatives, in which overall ownership and control is equally shared by member workers

The Community Enterprise Broker offers the following:

- a general information session to introduce the program
- assessment of your eligibility and your business idea
- assistance in obtaining childcare subsidies that can be used in a licensed non-profit homecare program or childcare centre
- information on other non-subsidized but affordable childcare
- formal business training
- individual consulting/counselling
- a variety of practical start-up services
- follow-up support, monitoring and troubleshooting
- additional services specific to your broker

On September 8th the first group of 18 clients graduated. Among them were a wide range of energetic entrepreneurs. One such person is Margaret Knapp who is running a professional fundraising enterprise.

Bob Lamont, a recent St. Lawrence College graduate is starting up his business in computer assembly, sales and service. Debbie McMillan also a recent St. Lawrence College graduate will be providing home companionship to the elderly in the Kingston area. The Centre's tournament has helped us to develop and sustain a presence in Brockville, Kingston, and Cornwall."

The tournament was organized by Greg Libitz, Joe Jordan, and David White, with able assistance from Lynn Walker and Carol Schaefer. According to Libitz, "Events like the tournament provide a tremendous opportunity for the College to forge relationships. They show that those of us taking part in these activities aren't just talking a big game; we're getting out there and getting it done."

Post secondary training options.....

Ruth Tracey, a Professor at the Kingston campus has been examining some existing college to university models as part of her continuing studies at OSIE. The following are some of her findings.

An increasing number of community college graduates are taking post diploma programs at university with the goal of earning a degree. A great deal of study and consultation has gone on between colleges, universities and government officials with the aim of making the transition between college and university as open as possible.

Many colleges such as St. Lawrence have formal articulation agreements with some universities for selected programs. Others are under development.

ONTARIO OPTIONS: CAAT/UNIVERSITY LINKAGES

Inter-sectoral transfer (between colleges and universities) in Ontario will not be a simple process. A 'made in Ontario' solution must be developed ... (p.147) No Dead Ends, M.E.T., 1993.

Excerpts from No Dead Ends

Some 15,000 questionnaires were distributed to CAAT graduates. 73% of the respondents agreed that sooner or later, more training is necessary.

The province has a differentiated post-secondary system, and lacks the connective mechanisms that could provide the means for change and development.

Students are evidently "voting with their feet" and demanding a type of education that provides both applied and theoretical training; the characteristics of combined CAAT and university study.

[The availability of university] credit for CAAT courses has not been widely publicized or prevalent. On registration, almost half of the sample received no credit. Individuals, negotiating on their own, did not do well. To put it more bluntly, the student who attended a CAAT which did not have formal linkage arrangements with an Ontario university was penalized, even though the program may have been similar in content and equally vigorous.

THE ONTARIO PICTURE

Linkage agreements are being negotiated between individual Ontario CAATs and some Ontario universities. Two major trends seem to be emerging - which are best illustrated by identifying highlights from the new 1994 Seneca/North York Board/York University and Mohawk College/McMaster University master agreements. These are the two high profile prototypes in the province - although most CAAT's now have some universalized linkage agreements in place.

Two issues are core to understanding the divergent approaches:

1. Integrity/quality of post-secondary academic credits ...

In the Mohawk/McMaster agreement, the arrangement calls for academic courses to be provided by McMaster University, for dual credit.

Seneca prefers to retain their own control over academic post-secondary courses, and undertakes to meet standards required by their university partners - in terms of curriculum, resource materials, faculty qualifications, etc. In the near term at least, this approach offers more transfer potential for current CAAT graduates from a wide variety of programs.

2. Broader versus targeted application ... Seneca's extensive use of program specific articulation agreements with Toronto area Boards of Education reflects Seneca's very pro-active recruitment program with feeder Boards. The pay-off for students is the real possibil-

ity of 'fast-tracking' through the system, obtaining both the practical training provided by the CAATs, plus the status of a university degree - in the same time period, for less money (lower tuition fees, etc.).

The Mohawk/McMaster Agreement is Ontario's prototype of CAAT/University collaborative provision of post-secondary education. The obvious goal of the Seneca model is acceptance of a broader range of CAAT post-secondary credits by Ontario's universities. The number of Seneca/University transfer agreements is growing each year, and the idea is to remove the onus for the negotiation of blocks of transfer credits from the individual student, who rarely has the same clout or bargaining power as an institution.

SENECA/NORTH YORK BOARD/YORK UNIVERSITY NETWORK (Articulated Pathway)

Seneca's Model

The available data indicates that students from linked programs (i.e. C.A.A.T. - University Articulation) obtain the greatest number of university credits for their C.A.A.T. courses.

A HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT'S IDEAL SCENARIO

(Totally Articulated Networks)

Student completes secondary school - strong program "focus".

CAAT Program

A student enters CAAT with several

FAST TRACKING IN THE '90s

MOHAWK-MCMASTER JOINT HEALTH SCIENCES CENTRE (The Collaborative Model)

The Site:

Joint occupancy of a new building on McMaster campus. It is proposed that the new building be owned and operated by a corporation (ownership on a 50-50 basis) and each institution pays an annual rent to the corporation sufficient to cover all expenses.

Programs:

Three Year

- i) Diploma Nursing
- ii) Medical Laboratory Technology
- iii) Medical Diagnostic Imaging

Structure of New Joint Programs:

The first two years will be taught by a combination of Mohawk and McMaster faculty, and the program is designed as that, at the end of two years, students who have demonstrated appropriate competencies will be offered the option of taking one more year for a diploma or two more years for a bachelor's degree.

Details:

Fees and entrance standards are lower than McMaster's, but higher than Mohawk's. Each institution receives half its normal fee for each student each year - and half its basic income unit revenue from the Province.

Academic courses will be taught by McMaster faculty, and clinical, field work and professionally related courses

by Mohawk staff. The breakdown of instructional hours would be 50:50 between each institution. There are on-going discussions about McMaster 'accrediting' and seconding Mohawk faculty whose academic credentials meet McMaster's requirements.

Students enrolled in the M o h a w k - McMaster Institute will enjoy full access to McMaster student services (library, sports facilities, etc.).

Professor Tracy is currently on leave from St. Lawrence College, and completing her doctorate in Educational Administration at O.I.S.E. Her dissertation research focuses on transferability of post-secondary credits and intersectoral linkage developments in Ontario. As part of the S.O.Q.P. program, she studied articulation agreements negotiated between Toronto CAATs and Toronto area Boards of Education.

SACRED COWS STAMPEDE THROUGH KINGSTON

KINGSTON: - Take a cow home; that's all that local writers Seth Cullen and Mike Coville ask of you.

Cullen and Coville have launched Sacred Cows, a free humour magazine featuring their own articles and cartoons and a selection of hilarious stories, quotes and trivia gathered from various media sources. The 16-page publication trampled the streets of downtown Kingston in early July, with about 400 copies available in bars, cafes, restaurants, music and clothing stores.

"We've aimed it at the politically and socially aware," says Coville, "from teenagers to seniors. The content is bits of news from all over the world, enhanced by our own narrow views on topics we're not qualified to comment on."

Cullen and Coville are graduates from the Advertising and Public Relations program at St. Lawrence College, where they were writers/editors for the campus newspaper, The Nomad. "Working on The Nomad was good practice for Sacred Cows," says Cullen, "be-

cause both processes are similar - you gather articles, sell ads, do the layout and distribute it.

"However, with Sacred Cows we now have full control over the content and we can say whatever we want, although we're not out to offend anyone. After all, we still have to work in this city," says Cullen.

"Actually, I intend to offend as many people as possible," argues Coville, "Especially those in a position of power and prestige, which will certainly damage our chances of employment anywhere. Perhaps Seth should have considered using a pseudonym."

The magazine is intended to fill a void in the growing sea of small publications, as it's an independent, locally written all-humour magazine. For the fall issue, Sacred Cows hopes to receive outside editorial submissions and expand its list of advertising clients. "So get out your cheque books (or cash is nice)," says Coville.

Update on fundraising

Raising funds to support our College has never been more important than it is today. Reductions in government funding and the need to keep pace with technological advancements have prompted St. Lawrence to focus more energy on the area of fundraising.

The College's first major fundraising initiative, "Sharing Our Future" has achieved two thirds of its objective. With a goal of \$1.5 million, the campaign was launched last year. To date,

the campaign has raised \$600,000 in cash and pledges, plus an additional 500,000 in "gifts in-kind".

The in-kind contributions have come in the form of computer software, automobiles and equipment for labs.

Students are the ultimate beneficiaries of the appeal. Several new student awards have been established and plans to construct a new Campus Centre in Kingston are moving ahead.

Our second Alumni Annual Appeal got underway in October. Alumni are being provided the opportunity of making a contribution to the College or directly to their program of study. Funds will be used to help purchase much needed equipment, computer software and assist with adding to our student assistance fund.

A comprehensive report on "Giving to St. Lawrence" will be published later this fall.

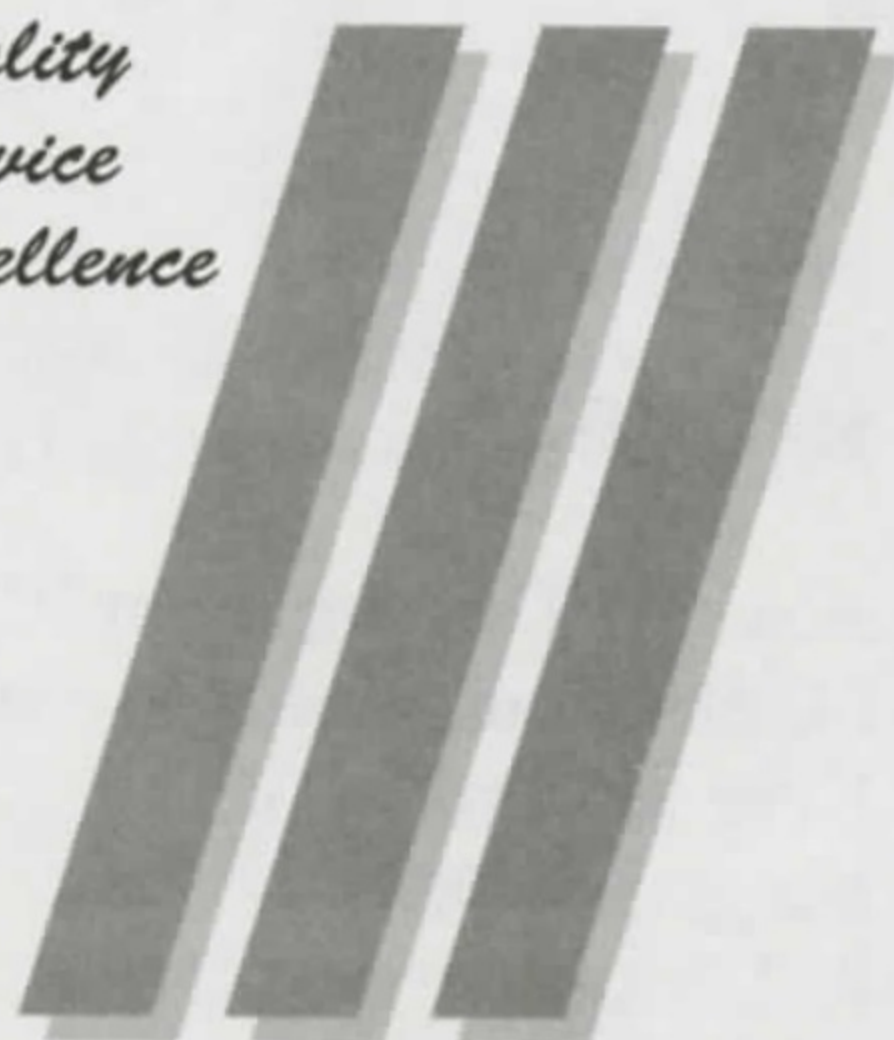

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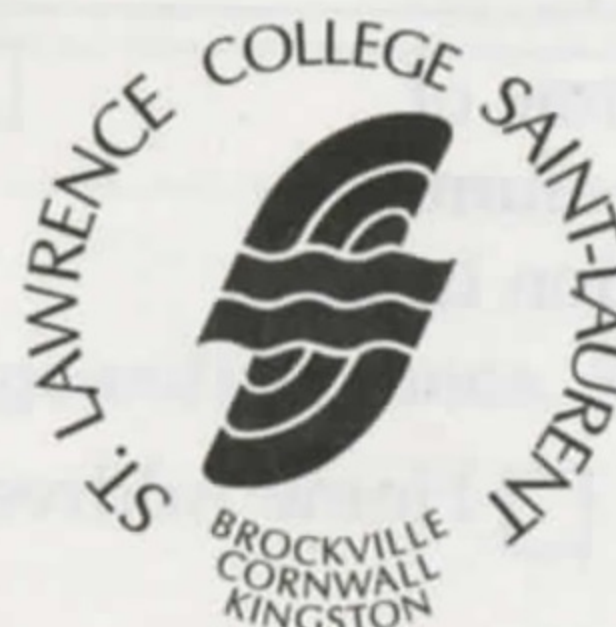
