Development Office Growing to Serve



Last fall, the College's Board of Governors approved a "Three Year Development Plan" for the St. Lawrence College Foundation. The plan positions the Foundation to oversee all aspects of fund raising for the College. The Foundation receives its support from the College's Development and Alumni Office. Since the approval of the plan in November, a number of changes have taken place to help ensure the Foundation meets its objectives.

Frank Lockington (Businesss- APR/83) has been appointed Director, Development & Alumni. Tyler Forkes, the College's former Athletic Director in Brockville has joined the team as the

Development and Alumni Officer for the Department. Kathy Gray (Business-Accounting/78) will be maintaining the Alumni database and working on various aspects of VOYAGEUR. Luetta Trenholme, (Business - Human Resources), Marketing Officer joins the Department with responsibility for supporting the marketing, promotions and media relations activities at St. Lawrence.

Over the summer, two students, Kelly Clarke (Computer Eng. Tech/00) and Cormac Evans (Business - APR/00) have been working on special projects including the implementation of a new alumni and development computer information system.

"The mission has served as a check to keep us focused on why we exist. It's easy to get distracted when pressures come to bear," says Dan.

Dan has been an advocate for the Ontario community college system as well. Through the Association of Colleges of Applied Arts & Technology (ACAATO), Dan has lead several provincial committees including CON*NECT and the Advocacy Committee which has had major success in raising the profile of the college system and its graduates. In his capacity as President of St. Lawrence, he has also been a member of the Board of the Canadian Labour Market and Productivity Centre.

An active College Foundation, a budget surplus, ISO recertification, positive key performance indicators, above average graduate placement statistics are all achievements realized in the last two years of Dan's term.

As Dan prepares to depart from the College, he will carry his commitment to "Quality" with him.

The NQI, the next step in Dan's career, is an independent not-for-profit organization focussed on the adoption of quality principles and practices across all sectors of the Canadian economy. It also administers the Canadian Awards for Excellence program.

"He's going on to something he really wants to do," says Wilsie.

Jim Brown, Chair of The St. Lawrence College Foundation, recalls that when he first met Dan he had just come to the College.

"He talked to me about how important it was for the College to be in partnership with the communities in which it operates as well as being somewhat more 'business like' in the way in which it operates," says Jim. "I have had the privilege of being around to see him accomplish that. I am pleased to see that he did the job and that he is leaving the College in good stead."

"It has been my privilege to serve as President of St. Lawrence College and to work with scores of people both in the College and in our various communities, who have a commitment to making a difference in people's lives," says Dan.

"Our graduates are our success story and proof of our quality. Our many community partnerships are proof of the value which we have, in contributing to the competitiveness and well being of the region."

From time to time, the Board of Governors of St. Lawrence recognizes the outstanding achievements of individuals or groups whose accomplishments are of such excellence, inspiration and leadership that they serve as an example for the graduates of our college.

Such was the case this past June when grads of the Kingston campus convocation found themselves in the same graduating class as The Tragically Hip, one of the most popular rock bands in Canada.

A rock band might seem to some to be an unusual choice to receive such an award, but in fact The Tragically Hip emulate just those values we associate with an honorary diploma at St. Lawrence.

The Tragically Hip, formed in 1984, are fronted by Gord Downie, along with Rob Baker, Johnny Fay, Paul Langlois and Gord Sinclair. Since their debut album, the band has released an additional seven albums, including their current release *Phantom Power*. They tour extensively, often selling out concerts, and have record sales in excess of 5 million copies. Their success demonstrates excellence in the eyes of their peers and the eyes of their fans.

With the success of this band comes the success of others. The Tragically Hip have clearly broken new ground for other musicians from the Kingston area. They have demonstrated first hand that a group of very committed and very determined individuals from eastern Ontario can come together as a group and make it in the music business; this against incredible odds.

Perhaps more than in all other areas, it is in the area of leadership that the band espouses the values we link so closely with our honorary diploma.

On the national level, The Tragically Hip supports over 100 charitable organizations annually. Locally, they have supported Camp Trillium for many years, as well as Kingston General Hospital, St. Martha's School, and Almost Home.

Due to the band's growing popularity throughout Canada and around the world, they have taken the role of ambassadors for Kingston. They have chosen to maintain their ties to the community, and have helped to place Kingston on the map for a whole generation of music fans around the world.

"We try to help the community we came from," said lead singer Gord Downie. "And anything we may have done probably isn't enough."

Following the receipt of their diplomas, Downie and drummer Johnny Fay performed the unrecorded tune, "Never Ending Present," which was followed by a standing ovation by the graduates.

In his closing address, St. Lawrence President Dan Corbett was quick to add, "We've got a lot of hip graduates, too!"

ONTARIO COLLEGE MEETS GLOBAL QUALITY STANDARD

St. Lawrence College has been re-certified to the ISO 9001 quality standard, auditors from KPMG told College officials in late April.

St. Lawrence became the first college in North America to certify its core processes to the global quality standard in 1996. However, the certification only runs for three years. So, the college was required to undergo a complete audit of its systems and processes this spring, to ensure that they continued to be in compliance with the demands of the standard.

"We are very proud of this achievement," says academic vice-president Jeanie Sawyer. "The bar on quality is rising constantly, and so are the demands of the standard. To be re-certified means we are able to clearly demonstrate that continuous improvement is taking place within the college."

The ISO series of standards has been endorsed by most of the countries of the developed world. Adherence to those standards has become a baseline re-

quirement for doing business with many multinational organizations, and it is rolling out to smaller organizations and to the service sector. St. Lawrence has been leading the charge in the education sector in Canada.

"We've shared the ISO experience with post-secondary institutions from British Columbia to Newfoundland," Sawyer says. "Equally important, our grads are beginning to tell us that their exposure to the rigours of an ISO environment is serving them well in the employment marketplace. It really does make a difference."

What's next?

KPMG will continue to audit the college's quality system at six-month intervals, to ensure compliance with the standard. The college will also continue to conduct its own quality audits on a monthly basis.

"Improvement of our quality system is an on-going process," Sawyer says.

COLLEGE MANAGEMENT REPORTS \$1.029 MILLION SURPLUS

The Annual Audit and the College Report on Operations for 1998 - 1999 was presented at the Board of Governors meeting on June 29th.

The College management reported a significant turnaround in the financial operations of the College. The report outlined how the College achieved a \$1.029M surplus on the 1998-1999 financial year. That amount was made up of two items: \$632,000 from ongoing operations and a onetime amount of \$397,000 from the sale of the residence building in Cornwall.

This year's surplus of \$1.029M in the Operating Report compares to last year where the College reported a deficit of \$3.27 million as a result of restructuring.

"I want to thank all of St. Lawrence College employees and especially the management group who have performed beyond expectation to make this happen", says Dan Corbett. "With this year's result we will eliminate a large part of the deficit incurred from the loss of public funding and we can now move ahead with the development plans for our campuses. I am also pleased that this positive result will make life easier for my successor when I leave the College."

The St. Lawrence Board of Governors has selected former Mobility Canada president and CEO Charles Labarge to serve as interim president of the College.

Labarge is a career employee of BCE Inc.. He has held a series of increasingly responsible positions with the organization, including president and CEO of BCE Telecom International, chair of BCE Corporate Services Inc., president and COO of Bell Mobile Communications, and president and CEO of Mobility Canada. He holds an MA from the University of Western Ontario and is fluently bilingual.

"Charles has enjoyed a successful career with one of Canada's leading corporations, and his experience will be valuable to the College," board chair Wilsie Hatfield said. "In addition to carrying out all duties associated with the St. Lawrence College presidency, he will also review the organization and make comments as to where there are opportunities to strengthen performance."

Labarge will be hired on contract by the College for the period beginning September 7, 1999 and ending one month after the new full-time president has assumed the role. A selection advisory committee comprising eight members of the board - including Hatfield as chair of the committee - expects to fill the role of president on a full-time basis by June 1, 2000.

Mobility Canada is a consortium of the cellular affiliates of the Canadian telephone companies. Together, they offer national wireless services in cellular, paging, radio, and satellite service areas. Mobility Canada members are the market leaders in wireless services on a national and regional basis.

ST. LAWRENCE, COLLEGE SYSTEM GET HIGH MARKS

St. Lawrence College is working well and so is the Ontario college system, according to the results of the Key Performance Indicator (KPI) survey released on March 9.

Highlights of the survey include the following: 86 % of recent St. Lawrence grads were employed within six months of graduation (the average was 89 % across the Ontario college system);

84 % of employers were satisfied with the quality of the educational preparation of St. Lawrence grads (the average was 80 % across the Ontario college system);

71 % of recent St. Lawrence grads were satisfied with the usefulness of their education in achieving their goals after graduation (the average was 69 % across the Ontario college system).

"This is good news for St. Lawrence College and the college system," says St. Lawrence president Dan Corbett. "At St. Lawrence, we have been strong supporters of the KPI initiative since its inception. We believe the public needs to know where we're perceived to be adding value to the economic and social development of the region, and where we have room for improvement."

The colleges are the first group to take part in the Ontario government accountability initiatives.

"These results prove that Ontario's colleges of applied arts and technology are doing an excellent job, and so are our grads," says Dr. Robert Gordon, chair of the Committee of Presidents, in a release from ACAATO. "Clearly, this performance record merits increased public investment."

A small portion of provincial government funding will be tied to the results of the KPI surveys on graduate employment, graduate satisfaction and employer satisfaction. Results from two additional system-wide surveys, on student satisfaction and graduation rate, will be released after the studies are completed later this year.

COLLEGE SECURES FUNDS FOR TECHNOLOGY PROGRAMS

The College has secured \$1.12 million from a special Ontario government fund to increase the number of seats available in high-demand engineering technology programs.

"The job placement rates for these programs are very high and are expected to remain high," says academic vice-president Jeanie Sawyer. "Consequently, we are encouraged by the government's commitment - through the Access to Opportunities program - to support the growth of these programs. Graduates from engineering technology programs will be absolutely essential to the future competitiveness of the province."

The Access to Opportunities program was announced by the Ministry of Education and Training in the 1998 budget, to respond to the shortage of skilled and high-tech professionals in Ontario. The program aims to double the number of university spaces in computer science and high-demand engineering programs and to increase enrolment by 50 percent in targeted college programs. Through the ATOP program, the government is investing \$150 million over three years in Ontario colleges and universities for start-up and operating expenditures, and to provide ongoing operating funding in subsequent years.

At St. Lawrence, the number of student openings will be expanded in the following programs:

Computer Engineering Technology (K)
Computer Program Analyst (K)
Electronics Engineering Technician (C)
Electronics Engineering Technician (K)
Electronics Engineering Technology (K)
Microcomputer Engineering
Technology (C)

Overall, 319 new students are expected to be enrolled in these programs over the life of the ATOP initiative.

Colleges and universities are also required to raise funds from the private sector to help offset the start-up costs. At St. Lawrence, partners from DCMC Americas, IBM Canada, Daltco Electric, Altera Software, and the St. Lawrence College Foundation have pledged \$2.35 million through cash or in-kind donations.

"We are grateful to have these kinds of partners," Sawyer says. "Without their support, we would not have been able to take advantage of this opportunity."

The funds will be used for the acquisition of hardware and software, start-up faculty costs, and some building renovations.

JOB TRAINING SERVICES CONTINUES TO SUCCEED

One of the primary goals of St. Lawrence is to add value to our communities. The *Job Training Services* division in Brockville and Kingston does this by providing staffing and human resource services for individuals and employers in Frontenac, Leeds & Grenville counties. *JTS* currently delivers two provincially funded programmes that match people looking for jobs to work that needs to be undertaken. These are *Job Connect* for youth between 16 and 24 who are out of school and out of work and the *Summer Job Service*. In the Kingston area, *JTS* also manages the *Targeted Wage Subsidy* programme for employment insurance eligible individuals on behalf of Human Resources Canada. In addition, staff provide important links to the business community and make referrals to other College services including full and part time studies, job lead information for College placement officers and sales leads for the Business and Industry Training Services.

The division is in the third year of existence. The current staff includes some programme veterans, notably *Alan Hoy*, *Michael Payne* and *Ray Dixon*, who bring many years of placement experience and a wealth of contacts in the employer community. Since the inception of the new programmes, a number of staff members well regarded in other divisions of the College have joined, adding a fresh perspective to the core group. *Glenna Schaillee*, *Rosemarie Gavin* and *Janet Ashford* have joined the team as Job Development consultants, with active support from *Pat Campbell* and *Lynne Sykes* in Kingston and *Alison Wilson* and *Chaela Walker* in Brockville. *Robin Martin-Penrose* has been working in the job development field for some time and is a welcome new hire to the Kingston office.

The Summer Job Service staff of *Claire Devaney* and *Karl Gough* keep that programme under close scrutiny. Director *Barry Keefe* says he finds it very rewarding to work with such a dedicated and positive group of people.

The staff work in close partnerships with other agencies to manage the programmes. *Job Connect* is delivered in association with Kingston Employment and Youth Services in Frontenac County and with the Employment and Education Centre in Leeds and Grenville.

The consensus among the staff is that the programmes delivered are improvements over past designs. Employers are much more a part of the process. Participants are placed where actual work exists to be undertaken. They no longer work for free. Employers have to commit to pay the individuals. In return, they may qualify for a training incentive in recognition that there are expenses related to starting a person in a new job. The consultants have found that they often need their negotiation skills, but the long term success of those finding ongoing work is substantial. It has been our experience that the chief service offered is to find the right person for the right job.

This has translated into meaningful numbers for our communities. In the past year, staff have managed to place over 900 people in full and part time work from the Brockville and Kingston offices. That translates into an approximate infusion of over \$1.4 million dollars to our employers for training incentives. The staff have a goal to exceed those statistics for 1999-2000.

6. Honorary

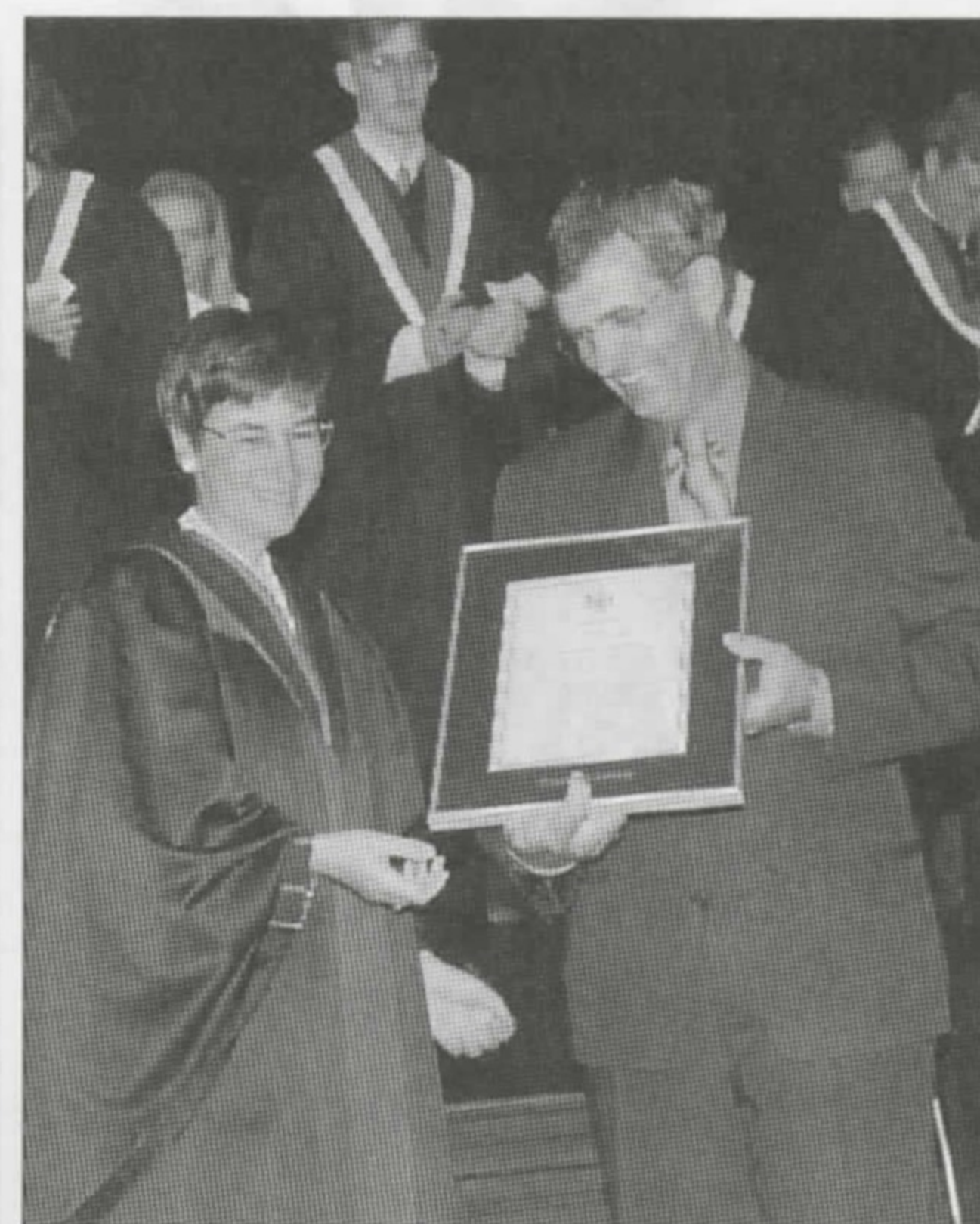
Any graduate of a college program may be nominated. The person must have demonstrated outstanding career success and contribution to their community or society.

For each nominee, prepare a one-page summary of the nominee's achievements. In point form, use the following outline to highlight the merits of the nominee.

- Name
- Program of study and year of graduation
- Highlights of career achievements
- How their college education directly contributed to career achievement
- Social / community contribution
- Other achievements / awards / professional or community recognition
- Title and description of current position
- Place of current employment and description of organization

For each nominee, you must also prepare a detailed profile of the nominee and their achievements. This profile should be typed and must not exceed 6 type-written pages (3 pages double sided). Any supporting material (eg. media coverage) must be included in the 6 pages. Be sure to number the pages.

Organize the nominee's profile using the following guidelines:

- College program(s) of study and year of graduation
- Other education
- Career achievement
- Current title and description of position
- Current employer and description of organization
- Contribution to society / community
- Has this person received other awards? Other accomplishments?
- Professional or community recognition?
- How has this person made a difference in people's lives?
- What makes this person's achievements / success exceptional?
- How has college education contributed to this person's success?

Include along with the nomination a photograph suitable for reproduction, and a copy of the signed release form (available upon request from the St. Lawrence Alumni Department).

An internal college selection committee will review all submissions, endorse one nominee in each category and forward them to the Premier's Office. Submissions must be received by the St. Lawrence College Alumni Department no later than Friday, October 15. Please forward all nominations to:

DISTANCE EDUCATION PROGRAMS COMING TO BROCKVILLE

St. Lawrence College's distance education programs will be managed from the Brockville campus, academic vice-president Jeanie Sawyer told the board of governors at their May meeting.

"Technological change had made distance education a reality," Sawyer said. "It's a growth market. Bringing the management of the college's efforts in this area under one roof in Brockville will help us take advantage of this opportunity."

A key element of the college's distance education strategy will be participation in the Contact South consortium: "Contact South jump starts our entry into the business of delivering programs over the internet," Sawyer said.

Contact South is a consortium of Ontario colleges whose mandate is shared development, expenses and delivery of courses on-line or over the internet. It started with two courses in 1996, and is now fast approaching over 100 courses. Students can register for individual courses or work toward certificates and diplomas in areas including: business, adult education, internet multimedia, and information technology.

"We recognize that not everyone has the time to come to the campus and sit in a traditional classroom," Sawyer said. "Therefore, we will be developing new certificate programs to be offered through this new channel."

Additionally, management of the more traditional correspondence programs - such as the popular early childhood education correspondence program currently managed from Kingston - will be transferred to Brockville.

"Given that we now have a very busy child care centre on campus in Brockville, there may be other associated programming opportunities in this area," Sawyer also noted.



Molly Decarie Memorial Bursary

Students, staff, alumni, family and friends of Molly Decarie were all saddened to learn of her passing last year. Molly was a fixture at the College's Kingston Campus and in the eyes of all who knew her.

An endowed fund was established by the College at the request of her family. To date, the Molly Decarie Memorial Bursary Fund has raised almost \$10,000 and this amount has been matched through the College's Opportunity Trust Fund. Interest from the fund will be used again this fall to help a student in the Office Administration Medical Program.

Both the College, and Molly's family, are grateful for the generosity shown by the many donors to the fund. Although she is not with her students to start the fall semester this year, the spirit with which she helped students succeed will live on through her award.

Gifting Corner

The College has been the beneficiary of several new major gifts in recent months. The City of Cornwall pledged \$50,000 to support the creation of a new "High Tech" computer lab at the College's Cornwall Campus. The Student Union at the campus added \$26,000 to the fund to help advance the project.

DuPont Canada recently donated \$20,000 in support of the College's new Biotechnology Program. Half of the gift will be used to purchase new equipment while the balance will be matched through the College's Opportunity Trust Fund to create a new endowed bursary in DuPont's name.

Big Sisters in Kingston is working to raise \$10,000 in support of a new Big Sisters Bursary to ensure their "Little Sisters" have financial support to continue post secondary studies at St. Lawrence.

Quality Assurance / Quality Control Co-ordinator
Lakefield Research (ISO/IEC Guide 25 Accredited)

A grad of the Biotechnology program in '98, Diane went on to Trent University and earned her B.Sc. in only one year, a result of having been granted advanced standing for her St. Lawrence courses. As important as her academic qualifications are, it was perhaps her familiarity with Total Quality Management and ISO concepts which assisted her most in securing her present position as the Quality Assurance / Quality Control Co-ordinator at Lakefield Research in Peterborough.

"I had my last field placement from St. Lawrence with Lakefield, which turned into a full-time summer job. After that they kept me on part-time while I was at Trent," says Kelly.

Earlier this spring the QA/QC Co-ordinator's position came up, and she decided to go for it.

"In preparing my application, the first thing I did was pull my TQM notes, and began reviewing the basic principles of ISO and Continuous Improvement," explains Kelly. "In addition, I did a web search and found that Sir Sanford Fleming College offered a Quality Assurance Certificate program. Although I felt I didn't have the time to spare, I knew I needed to set myself apart from the other applicants - I was going up against some very qualified people. It was a very intense interview in which we discussed my background at St. Lawrence in great detail. One week later I was offered the position. I was told that although I did not have as much experience as many of the others, I was the only one who showed an initiative for the position by enrolling at SSFC. In addition, I was the only one with a demonstrated knowledge of ISO and the importance of Quality in the workplace."

Kelly's position with Lakefield Research involves maintaining the firm's ISO/IEC Guide 25 practices, and co-ordinating the Quality Assurance / Quality Control program for Analytical and Mineralogical Services. She is the lab liaison for accrediting organizations, and works to maintain and expand the scope of lab testing. "I am also in a position that involves a great deal of travel," says Kelly. "This October I will be heading to South Africa, to one of our sister labs, to help prepare them for their first ISO audit to determine if they will receive accreditation by the Standards Council of Canada. In addition, I will be traveling to our other affiliated labs in Chile, Brazil, and Peru in the upcoming months to do the same."

Diane has fond memories of her time at St. Lawrence, where in addition to working with Liaison Officer Bob MacCallum as a Student Ambassador, as well as in the Admissions office, she was the graduating class Valedictorian for Health Sciences. "I was always impressed with Diane's eagerness to succeed," says MacCallum. "She had a clear vision of what she wanted to do, and I'm delighted to see that her vision is becoming a reality."

Those sentiments are echoed by V.P. of Academics, Jeanie Sawyer: "Diane has such an exciting future ahead of her. I am so pleased that St. Lawrence was able to provide her with a good foundation and I appreciate her very positive feedback."

Positive feedback indeed. In closing, Diane noted, "I felt, and continue to feel, a deep sense of pride that I was lucky enough to have attended such a wonderful school. To you at St. Lawrence, I say thank you!"



Eleonor Egidio

Kingston & District Association For Community Living

There is a sign on the wall in Eleonor Egidio's office which states,

"It is more important to have a dream than to have a way to achieve it. If the power of our passion is strong enough, we will figure out a way to make our dreams reality"
(Alan Hobson).

Those words, stressing the importance of having passion for what you do and a determination to make things happen, are a fitting description for Eleonor Egidio, a 1988 Graduate with Distinction from the Behavioral Science Technology program, and current Volunteer Services Coordinator with the Kingston & District Association For Community Living. It is clear that Eleonor is a passionate believer in the work of the KDAFL, an organization which serves over 300 adults and children who have developmental disabilities in individualized and flexible ways.

The Association was formed in 1953 when parents began to refuse having their children with special needs institutionalized. Their philosophy is that all individuals have the right to inclusive education, access to meaningful work and recreation, and strives to increase the well being, dignity, self-respect, and security of the people they serve.

"The people that work here are here for the right reasons," says Eleonor. "This isn't one of those jobs where you dread having to go every day. I like coming to work."

Eleonor's first contact with the KDAFL was during a field placement in the BST program. Following graduation she traveled throughout Europe, and then started working at the Association on a part-time basis in the spring of '89. Soon after she was offered a full-time position, and has worked in several areas before being recruited to take on her current role as Volunteer Services Coordinator, a position which she has held for nearly two years.

"I am the first point of contact for anyone wishing to volunteer with our programs," says Eleonor. "The major portion of my job lies in the recruitment and screening of potential volunteers. We have a number of volunteers who assist on a part-time basis, as well as families and individuals who share their homes with people who have developmental disabilities. We certainly would encourage anyone who is considering becoming a volunteer to visit our office at 60 Queen Street in Kingston."

The KDAFL and St. Lawrence have a close partnership, with many students from the BST as well as the Child & Youth Worker and Developmental Services Worker programs choosing the Asso-

ciation for their placements. In addition, there are approximately 45 St. Lawrence grads currently on staff, including 3 managers and 9 coordinators.

"The BST program was really helpful for me, especially when I was doing front line work. You know, it's the teachers that can make or break a program, and we had some great teachers. I found the field placements particularly useful for hands-on experience, networking opportunities, and for the chance to see all the diversity in the field."

"I still keep in touch with a number of my BST class mates, and as a matter of fact two of my best friends are from St. Lawrence. Lisa Pennock, for example, traveled a lot after graduation, got her degree, and is now one of the facilitators here at the KDAFL. I also stay in close contact with Micki Mulima, who went on to get her degree and is now teaching part-time at St. Lawrence in the Human Resources Management program."

On top of her duties at the KDAFL, Eleonor is the Treasurer for the Kingston Chapter of the Autism Society of Ontario, and makes time to be a volunteer herself for a number of other local organizations.

"I have my hand in a lot of different things, but I really like the philosophy here. We're creative, flexible, and we're growing. I have no intention of going anywhere else."

That's good news for everyone at the Kingston & District Association for Community Living.

An education, a career,

George Howard

A variety of jobs kept George Howard and his family going over the years, but a decision to return to school and upgrade his education gave him both a new career and a chance for a more stable future.

Today, as a St. Lawrence College graduate and professional at Black and Decker, Howard says that his return to school was one of the best choices he has ever made.

Howard chose the 3 year Business Administration program at St. Lawrence College in Brockville to allow him to stay near family while he studied. During the program, he says that the teachers helped him immensely, particularly as he needed to adjust from working to studying. "The teachers were very helpful, and easy to approach with questions," he says.

Though the work was challenging, Howard excelled in the program, earning the CGA Award in 1998, as well as a spot on the President's List for his high marks. He also received recognition for tutoring special needs students, and was Student President during his final year at school. Today, Howard works as the Assistant Credit Manager for Black and Decker Canadian Operations in Brockville, handling Accounts Receivable and determining credit limits for customers. He says that his education and the College's work placement program gave him the skills he needed to thrive in his new career.

Stuart Radley

Stuart Radley was looking for a new career in 1991 when she decided to try the Nursing program at St. Lawrence College. It turned out to be the right choice - today, Radley not only enjoys a challenging nursing career, but also shares his education, teaching a number of courses and working with others to improve the quality of health care in the Cornwall area.

Radley graduated from the St. Lawrence College nursing program in 1993, and began working at the Hotel Dieu Hospital as a surgical nurse. A night in Pediatrics showed him where his interests lay, however, and he soon became a regular nurse on the ward. Along with his pediatric duties, Radley also works in the Asthma Care Centre at the hospital. Radley says his education fully prepared him for his new career. "The teachers were very good at the College," he says, "and the six-week enrichment program gave me an excellent opportunity to learn on the front lines."

The nursing enrichment program involves the pairing of students with nurses in real-life situations, to give students experience outside the classroom. One of the greatest benefits to Radley's education, however, is his ability to pass that knowledge on to others. He instructs others in Pediatric Advanced Life Support Skills, and is certified as both an emergency nurse and an Asthma Educator. "I love what I'm doing," he says. "Getting my diploma was one of the best choices I have ever made."

Debbie Jefferies

As Production Manager for the "creative" at The Kingston Whig-Standard, Debbie Jefferies needs a keen eye for design, as well as the ability to supervise complex assignments under constant deadlines. Her St. Lawrence College education, she says, gave her the basic skills she needed to get into the advertising business, and the opportunity to create a challenging career.

Jefferies graduated from the Graphics Design program in 1991, with a good balance of design basics and computer skills. "The program really taught me the golden rules of design," she says, "as

well as the key skills I needed to get going in the real world." A placement with 3M in London also helped her understand the complexity of her chosen career, and gave her a taste of what she could expect after college. Jefferies started in the newspaper business immediately after graduation, and worked her way up from ad builder to Production Manager, a position she holds today. A polished professional, Jefferies relies on her education to manage three departments, and ensure a smooth transition in the paper's advertising process. She also keeps in touch with her alma mater, taking St. Lawrence College students for placement opportunities, and hiring graduates.

CORNWALL LIBRARY DONATIONS APPRECIATED

When the Cornwall library scaled down its collection in a move towards an Information Commons, it was left with an interesting dilemma: What to do with the large number of books that had been weeded out?

"We discussed trying to sell the collection, about twelve to fifteen thousand volumes, but in the end we all felt that this was an opportunity for us to give something back to the Cornwall community," says librarian Janice Shea. "The books we chose were somewhat outdated, and were not serving the needs of our Cornwall clientele, but they were still quite useful."

When the decision was made to open up the collection to local high school libraries, the response was overwhelmingly positive. "We invited a number of

secondary schools from the Cornwall region, including: Cornwall Collegiate, St. Joseph's, General Vanier, St. Lawrence, Char-Lan, Rothwell-Osnabruk, Tagwi, Glengarry, L'Heritage, and La Citadelle," says Shea. "The schools seemed very pleased that we had thought of them, and we received several thank you letters from Teacher-Librarians."

Typical of the accolades received were those of Gerald Lauzon, Teacher-Librarian at St. Joseph's Secondary School, who wrote, "I want to formally thank you for the recent offer of books from the weeding operation at the Cornwall Campus."

It is appreciated that you thought, in the first place, of making such an offer as a priority to local high school libraries. Having met there other locals of our

calling, I know that we all found some things of use and of value to our collections."

The Cornwall Public Library also took advantage of the offer to enhance their collection with about 3000 volumes, mostly of literature. Even Cornwall campus staff were allowed to go through the collection and choose something of interest as well.

The remainder of the books not chosen by local schools will go towards enhancing education in more distant destinations. "We are working with the Rotary Clubs in Cornwall and Kingston to ship the rest of the books to educational institutions in Jamaica," explains Shea. "It's nice to know that we found good homes for all of them."

VIKINGS INTRODUCE SPORTS WALL OF FAME

A sold-out crowd was on hand at the Cataraqui Golf and Country Club this past April when the Athletic Department of Kingston campus inducted its first members into the Viking Sports Wall of Fame.

Based on a suggestion by former varsity athlete Paul Pennell (CYW '98), the project was one that Athletic Director Diana Drury strongly believed in, and had been working toward for a number of years. The event was generously sponsored by Roots Canada.

In the "Founders & Program Builders" category, St. Lawrence honored past Athletic Directors Brian Murphy and the late Jack Kelly, as well as former varsity coaches Ted Batchelor and Brad Hill.

Hill was the Master of Ceremonies for the evening, and his induction was a surprise announcement which was not listed in the program. "It means that all the athletes that I coached, the people that I've been associated with....they'll all be remembered because I've been remembered," said Hill. "As much as recognizing me, they're recognizing the teams we had."

Hill coached the college's cross country teams to four consecutive OCAA championships.

Batchelor was a student-athlete (Bus. Admin. '71), professor, and successful basketball coach for many years. "I like to think that I taught a lot about accounting and basketball, but at the same time I learned every bit as much from my students and athletes as I taught them," he said.

Kelly and Murphy are former Athletic Directors. Kelly also served as president of the Ontario Colleges Athletic Association (OCAA). Murphy is currently a financial aid counselor at St. Lawrence. "I think in terms of the number of student-athletes that have gone through St. Lawrence and how I still hear from those people," he said. "They come in to say hello, they've got a story to relate, or they're trying to find someone else from those days. It's nice."

Another category recognized "CCAA (Canadian Colleges Athletic Association) All-Canadians and CCAA Coaching Excellence Award Winners." All-Canadians included soccer players Denise Morey (BST '89, RN '94), Victor Mendes (Bus. Admin. '94) and Colleen Webster (Biotechnology '98). Diana Drury was the national women's soccer Coach of the Year in 1992.

Drury says that the wall will be expanded with new inductees every few years. "I would like to develop something for the future, get our athletes back to support teams today and perhaps give back somehow," she explains, "whether it's for a building fund, to come back and coach, or anything like that. Those are the type of coaches that you need, who have been athletes and know what it takes, and are willing to give their time."
