The Alumni Development Project

Last fall, I undertook a project to examine the relationship between the college and our alumni. The Alumni Development Project has proven to be as challenging and interesting as any of my assignments here at the college.

The number of students who have attended St. Lawrence over the past twenty three years is estimated to be 150,000. The number of graduate alumni exceeds 35,000.

So where does one begin?

Well, certainly not from scratch.

In 1985, a report written by a committee of alumni entitled, "Future directions for Alumni at St. Lawrence" was presented to the college's Board of Governors. Many of the recommendations found in the report continue to be valid. These have also provided a framework for planning the alumni development project.

There is also recognition that a variety of alumni activities have taken place over the years. In fact, there are a number of very strong alumni associations at the program level here at St. Lawrence. The Animal Care TechnolChildhood Education Alumni and the Business - Advertising and Public Relations Alumni are excellent examples of these successful initiatives.

At the campus level, Cornwall has organized two successful homecomings over the years. The Brockville alumni have participated in a series of recreational events in support of area charities.

Clearly, these initiatives are an excellent starting point.

There is however, a majority of our alumni who have had little if any contact with the college since they attended St. Lawrence as students. For many of our alumni, this magazine may be the first correspondence they have received from the college since graduation.

The alumni development project is all about building on the past and expanding efforts to recognize all alumni of St. Lawrence in the future.

The first step in the plan to develop alumni is to establish a comprehensive record system. If we don't know how to reach you, how can we expect to reestablish a relationship. With the groups, our career services offices and our college staff we have accelerated our search for lost alumni.

Earlier this fall, together with the assistance of two third year Marketing research students, I surveyed a cross section of graduates. The purpose of the study was to examine the demographics of who and where our alumni are, what services they would like to see the college extend to alumni and in what ways graduates would like to make a contribution to St. Lawrence. The findings were very interesting.

Surveys were received from almost 300 graduates. Eighty percent of these individuals still live and work in Eastern Ontario. Over 94% considered their experience here at St. Lawrence a positive one. The study also showed that our graduates are very interested in post diploma training, gaining access to the college's facilities, receiving a regular newsletter and maintaining contact with our Career Services offices at each campus. Many of these services have been available to alumni although not really promoted as such. The introduction of other services available to alumni will be ongoing.

150,000 students have attended St. Lawrence in the past 23 years...

When asked how they, as alumni of St. Lawrence, would like to make a contribution back to the college over 50% indicated they would act as a contact person in their place of employment to support graduating students seeking full-time careers. Respondents also felt they could assist with recruitment and marketing efforts. About 30% suggested they would make a financial contribution to support a variety of needs, should the college ask. Efforts are currently underway to ensure these volunteers have the opportunity to support St. Lawrence through the avenues they have indicated.

The development of a quality publication was the next step. With the support of college staff, many of whom are also St. Lawrence alumni and graduates working within the publishing industry, we have put together our first edition of "Voyageur". Our intent is to publish the magazine three times each year and distribute it to all St. Lawrence alumni with a current mailing address on file at the college.

The funding required to initiate this project has come from St. Lawrence College. However, a key objective for

which could support alumni services on an ongoing basis. Progress has already been made on this issue.

With an endorsement from the student governments at each campus, full-time students will begin contributing to the cost of alumni services through their activity fees beginning this fall. In essence, students will be paying for their alumni membership in advance.

Other sources of funding will include revenues from the sale of advertising in future issues of Voyageur. This is expected to generate revenues which will help offset the cost of distributing this and other alumni publications.

The Alumni Development office is also investigating the possibility of partnering with a major bank to establish a St. Lawrence College affinity (credit) card program. This initiative would also generate revenues to support alumni programs and services.

The project to develop alumni services will also examine ways in which alumni could provide support to larger capital fund raising campaigns here at St. Lawrence. With one campus centre

"feasibility" stage we want to ensure alumni wishing to support these types of projects are given the opportunity.


Revitalizing our alumni association board, encouraging the college to continue the development of "post diploma" training programs for our graduates and the introduction of alumni cards are just a few of the other initiatives we are working on in the alumni development office.

Support for the alumni development project from management at St. Lawrence has been excellent. Cooperation from St. Lawrence staff, many of who are our alumni as well, has been beyond expectation. Every day we talk with or receive a letter from one of our alumni indicating their support and enthusiasm for this project. These are the things that drive us to accelerate the pace of alumni development at St. Lawrence.

It is however, the belief that both the college and the people who choose to study here can benefit from a stronger relationship that ensures alumni development at St. Lawrence will succeed.

Over the years St. Lawrence has changed. In particular in the last couple of years we have pulled together more as one College while still maintaining a high level of service at each of our campuses. We hope this will provide a more coordinated approach to our support services including assistance to the Alumni Development Office. Change is the norm at St. Lawrence. 
Her high stamina and unflinching drive to achieve her goals has been demonstrated by her accomplishments to date and continues as she sets new and higher goals for herself.

As a Control Software Designer for the Urban Transportation Development Corporation (UTDC), Larry has spent the last year working with a team of engineers and technologists designing and installing a new automated baggage handling system. The location: Singapore.

So how does one get from the shop floor of a Kingston trucking sales and service centre to one of the busiest airports on the other side of the world? For Larry it started with a single decision, to return to school.

"I had been away from school for a number of years and was working at Eastern Rentals in Kingston when a friend convinced me that further education would give me the opportunity to make a successful career change," explains Larry.

Larry's friend, Lori Raybould (ECE '81/Kingston), is now his wife.

"Istudied for a year part-time at Queen's and then, made the jump to St. Lawrence as a full-time student in the Computer Engineering Technology program," says Larry.



With Loriemployed full-time as a teacher, Larry was able to leave work behind and concentrate completely on his studies.

"I didn't really have time to participate in a lot of extra curricular activities," says Larry. "I found the technology program challenging enough and spent most of my time in the classroom, labs or working at home on assignments."

All this hard work paid-off for Larry as three years later, he completed his studies and was rewarded with an academic achievement award by the college. Convocation in the spring of 1989 was especially memorable for Larry and his family as he rose to address the students of his graduating year as valedictorian.

By graduation, Larry had received a couple of employment offers and through an interview with on-campus recruiters from UTDC was able to

secure a full-time position with the corpany. Larry believes the technical aport he worked on in his final semest helped him to land the job.

"At the time, company officials he suggested there may be some travinvolved," Larry says. "I had no id I would be spending close to a yeaway from my wife and family in foreign country."

"The project involved the installation of an automated baggage transfer system at the Changi airport and includ some of the technology used in UTDO streetcar and subway transportationsystems. The system was designed increase the speed at which passeng luggage could be moved from one aport terminal to another."

The airport in Singapore is one of the largest in the world and is considered to be the "gateway to the east".

After spending nine months at UTDC's Kingston facility, Larry bid farewell to family and friends and boarded the plane for the 20 hour flight to the far east.

Making the adjustment to living in Singapore was not as major an adjustment as expected.

"The project had us working 12 hours each day, six days a week," explains Larry. "We lived at the hotel right at the airport so although it was convenient, we really didn't have a lot of time to spend sight seeing."

"We did take off one Sunday, rented a boat and went water skiing in the South China Sea. When I lived in Kingston I belonged to the Collins Bay waterski club. Our day at the sea was memorable although I recall it took some time to get accustomed to the salt water," says Larry.

Although there were lots of places to eat "western" food, Larry says he preferred to try a variety of dishes including Chinese, Malaysian and East Indian dishes from the "hawkers centre". A full meal there was about \$5.

News from home was welcomed. There wasn't always news in the paper or on TV about Canada. Most western infor-

entry into the conflict was covered in the papers in Singapore. "When we did have time to relax and maybe watch TV we were limited to re-runs of old American programs such as "Get Smart".

While away, Larry's wife Lori finalized the purchase of their home in Odessa where they now live. "The mortgage papers arrived via fax," Larry recalls.

Lori's job as a teacher allowed her to travel to Singapore during the summer for a visit. Family members of other UTDC staff involved with the project team also made the trip. On the job site, English was the language used although it was sometimes difficult to understand the people from Malaysia involved with the project.

The technology supporting the project was so advanced that the status of baggage carts at the airport could be monitored through the computer system at the UTDC base in Kingston, Canada. The Onx operating system used for the computer controls is the same type as is used in the technology labs at St. Lawrence College in Kingston.

"This Onx system allows for 'real-time' control and is used world-wide, explains Larry. "I think graduates of the college today will have an opportunity

The project at the airport took over nine months to complete but in March of this year, Larry packed his bags and headed home.

Back home, Larry has been working on another project at the UTDC research facility in Kingston.

He says, "I don't expect to be travelling immediately, although the project I am involved with now could take me to California at some point in the future."
