


What a difference a year makes!



A tribute...

Controversy
and commitment
are interwoven themes
running throughout
the nearly 22 years
Bill Cruden has been president
of St. Lawrence.

Coming to St. Lawrence in its earliest days and then assuming the president's role when the college was just three years old, Bill has led development of a large and varied academic program with 4500 full-time students and 7500 part-time students. There are 700 full-time staff and the equivalent of another 240 positions

filled by numerous people working part-time on three main campuses and several small centres 160 kilometres apart on the St. Lawrence River.

You won't be surprised to observe that an organization of this size, with its considerable diversity is occasionally immersed in controversy. And Bill could be found in the middle of just about any controversy that emerged at the college. It suits the role; it suits the man.

Bill thought about students first. They were his highest commitment. He wanted St. Lawrence to be a student centred organization. Had you been here in the early 70s you would have been aware of a

debate about our grading and evaluation system. For a while we experimented with a modified 'pass - fail' grading approach. It grew out of Bill's belief that a competency or outcome based curriculum was most likely to help students succeed. He also wanted a grading system that focused attention on learning, not on grades and perhaps artificial distinctions between students.

Fuelled by the youth oriented social changes and the student movement in the 60's and early 70's, Bill led in introducing students to all aspects of college life and operation. Today we take for granted the participation of students in college governance and decision making. When students came, first as observers, later as full members to the Board of Governors it was considered to be at least a risky, if not radical, move.

Students sit as full members and participants on the college's Academic Council. It is arguably the case, that their presence helped St. Lawrence and Bill Cruden maintain an 'open door' admission policy. Bill's belief was that the college was about creation of opportunity, not just provision of service to those with existing advantages. He knew that good teaching combined with student motivation could produce the elixir for success that might not have been evident in a student's previous academic history.

The combination of Bill's commitment to students and their participation on the Academic Council also contributed to a generous student appeals policy and

procedure. All academic decisions are subject to due process review. Modifications have been made to improve the balance of the procedure but the commitment to due process remains.

Bill has made a significant contribution to governance in Ontario's Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology. He gradually developed an admired and imitated approach to working with our Board of Governors. It involves clear definition of the role and responsibility of the Board. Board members learned the role of policy makers with Bill's help. They adopted a mission statement for the college and an accompanying document known as the Framework for Action. The "Framework" became a blueprint outlining the college's approach to decision making about students, staff, programs and services.

With the help of these documents and the clear vision of their use, Bill created a planning cycle for the Board and college management to follow. Each year the Board participates in a workshop or retreat which starts the annual planning process. The Board sets priorities for the year at this event. The result of having the 'framework' documents and the annual planning process is a relatively smooth functioning Board of Governors and clarity about decision making responsibility between board and administration. If you have to work with, or on, a board of some kind, you would find it helpful to examine the practices Bill developed here.

A natural outgrowth from the Framework for Action was the Statement of Beliefs. To develop commitment to the college, its students and programs Bill proposed a series of departmental and campus based workshops aimed at producing fundamental statements of the educational and organizational values underpinning the college. These statements are known as the 'Beliefs'. They represent a philosophy that college staff can accept and support. Unfortunately they have not become the unifying force Bill had envisioned. The development of the Belief Statements had the misfortune to occur at the time of a significant province wide dispute over workload. That dispute led to a strike, followed by two studies/reports, the Skolnick and Pitman reports, which were critical of aspects of colleges' management and structure. The Beliefs were criticized as being empty rhetoric in the face of management practices that seemed to contradict them. Internal changes in St. Lawrence were viewed as evidence of lack of commitment to the Beliefs on the part of Bill and the rest of management.

Nevertheless, the Beliefs stand as simple statements of what our college is about and are a vital part of Bill's legacy.


He has been an enthusiastic supporter of the development of equity policy. Again, of course, not without controversy. Affirmative action programs have aimed at changing the representation of women in fields they've been traditionally excluded from. Over the objections of some, Bill has introduced

a strong policy at St. Lawrence. The result is that many very effective women have assumed leadership roles at St. Lawrence.

Bill has also been the author of a controversial 'no layoff' practice. It has been Bill's belief that the college's commitment to its staff includes doing everything possible to prevent them from losing their employment. To operate on this basis it has been necessary to move people around from one function to another as demands on the organization change. Often there is unhappiness, even bitterness, associated with the personnel shifts. And from time to time it has not been possible to avoid all layoffs.

Nonetheless, it is unquestionably the case, that many people's careers in the college have been preserved, when a less accommodating policy would have seen their contribution lost.

What is really interesting to note, is that public policy on a larger scale is now getting in step with the practices Bill has employed for years. The Public Service Alliance of Canada has recently acquired new layoff protection in return for accepting wage restraints. Undoubtedly the NDP government of Ontario will do what it can to protect workers from losing their positions. And all of this is taking place against a backdrop of highly touted Japanese management strategies which include, in their larger organizations, employment for life.



Bill...

At a personal level, Bill has been remarkably sensitive. More than one individual has gone to see Bill when personal life or career were at a crossroads. His support, both personally and professionally, has meant a great deal to those individuals who have sought his help. There are active, important contributors working for the college today, who would not be, if Bill hadn't been there for them when they needed him.

Some of our staff development practices, over the years, have been the envy of many other organizations. Early in our history Bill created staff development positions. The people in these jobs were charged with the creation of development opportunities for all who work at the college. The crowning achievement in staff development has been the teacher training initiative. Bill led the college presidents in the development of a joint program for new teachers.

These programs were designed in stages to be implemented throughout the first few years of teaching, beginning with

A few colleagues that I bumped into read it too.

The piece focuses on many serious issues that Bill dealt with and led us through as President.

It doesn't capture the fun he has and the fun it is to know him and watch him work.

Bill has boundless energy. He works all the time and is willing to do whatever needs to be done, whenever it has to be done. He can be found sitting in one of our cafeterias writing reports, studying documents, meeting with one of his staff and hailing passersby, often with good natured teasing and jibing... all of this at the same time.

He hates being late but never wears a watch. If one conversation went on too long, he'd get up and run through the halls and bound up stairs to get to the next meeting. Of course, shirt tails would be flying. His hair would be wild. On the way he'd drop assorted pens and papers and maybe a pair of glasses would fly out of a pocket. If you got in his way you risked a dousing with tea. If he'd just left your office, you'd need to forward one of his cups, but you wouldn't bother washing it... he never does.

an intensive week long, residential workshop in the month before the new teacher starts to teach. The new staff have been uniformly positive in their praise of this event. Many report that it has been the best training experience they've ever had. Bill's vision made it happen.

Eastern Ontario enjoys the exciting mix of two linguistic groups and cultures that are at Canada's foundation. It also experiences some of the associated stress and tension. ST. LAWRENCE COL-LEGE SAINT-LAURENT, under Bill's leadership established a variety of bilingual programs and services. Some very sensitive negotiating prepared our Board of Governors to give essential control of French language programs and services to its francophone members. The francophone community at large, however, sought and eventually obtained, a separate French language college now known as La Cité collègiale. This development necessitated more sensitive negotiating, as programs, services, staff, students and facilities moved to the new college.

Throughout these changes, Bill remained unfailingly positive and committed to both organizations. At the collective bargaining table he negoti-

ated arrangements for staff transfers. At the ministry of Colleges and Universities, he helped negotiate the necessary financial arrangements. With the new college he led the implementation of procedures for transferring students, programs and resources. His leadership caused a remarkably smooth transition, free of the rancour and strife that could have accompanied such developments. Some wags would also have it that it saved us all from having to listen to his halting attempts to fracture the French language. Kidding aside, as Canadians, we could learn much from the generosity, understanding and respect that Bill displayed for our francophone partners in community college education.

No attempt to capture the combination of controversy and commitment in Bill Cruden's career would be complete without a discussion of collective bargaining. It was in this arena that Bill would exercise his penchant for logical argument. It was here that he could practise his tremendous commitment to the system and its people. This was where his tenaciously positive outlook could steer the CAATS through the minefield of divisive and sometimes acrimonious labour management relations. The responsibility for chairing

the management negotiating team normally falls to the college presidents. Many do not seek it. Bill has chaired the teams for both academic and support staff bargaining several times. Even during the academic strike of 1989, Bill emphasized the legitimate rights of staff in discussion with sometimes discouraged managers. He found positive challenges throughout the process and helped us recover when the strike ended. With his optimism Bill laid the groundwork for what is currently a much improved relationship between management and the Ontario Public Service Employees Union.

As Bill ends his term as President of St. Lawrence and returns to his role as a teacher, he can look with great satisfaction on nearly 22 years in the presidency. This generous, self-effacing man takes little personal credit for the great contribution that our college makes to the people of Eastern Ontario. But he has sought to lead on the basis of education's highest principles. Bill has often been at the centre of controversy and he has always displayed the highest commitment.

Tearing up and down the 401 with him was better than any carnival. And riskier. There was usually a debate roaring about something - human resource policy, program development, the effective use of advisory committees, grading and evaluation, the role of the academic council or whatever. On occasion, if you were contrary enough, Bill would turn from the wheel one hand gesticulating and look you in the eye while he made his point. Even if you were in the back seat. When Bill was driving alone on the 401, he'd talk on the phone or perhaps read his mail. Yup. Normally at hell for leather speed. Although a world class collection of tickets, at least one visit to the lecture you get if you collect too many demerit points and regular badgering from his terrified passengers has perhaps slowed the pace a little.

When he got to his destination, if the debate or the coming meeting was occupying his thoughts, Bill might overlook some minor detail. One night after work he couldn't find the car. He'd forgotten to put it in 'park'. It had rolled across the parking lot and into the field beside, completely missing other cars, light standards and even a tree. Not a scratch. Other vehicles weren't so lucky. He drove one up onto a guard rail, tearing the bottom out. Another met an untimely fate against a scenic rock face having slid on a patch of ice. Bill walked away from both, a bit puzzled by how these things happened.

Bill's going to another phase of his career now. Maybe he'll have a bit more time for other stuff he likes to do. Want your book case moved? Need a package sent to another campus? How about taking a computer and a printer to a workshop? Never standing on ceremony, Bill did all these things to pitch in with the gang. And if he was carrying stuff out to the parking lot and knew someone else needed a hand, he'd put his box down to offer help. His energetic, enthusiastic approach to all his projects and life in general was a treat to be around and made everybody he worked with keen to do more for the place and its people.

Making a difference!

"Every day I am making a difference in the lives of people who have problems coping with their lives.

I have such purpose in life and I'm so committed to my work!"



These are the words of Mitch Robinson, alumnus of the Child Care Worker (now Child and Youth Worker) program at St. Lawrence, Brockville.

Mitch says that many other child and youth workers share his same purpose, commitment and feelings of accomplishment. He says these emotions stem from amazing people that he helps who have such courage and determination to overcome their disability.

After graduating from St. Lawrence in 1978 Mitch became part of a special services team of the Leeds and Grenville Public School Board. He worked with teachers to observe and help students with special needs. One year later he commenced what he explains as his first real experience with child care work at the Regional Mental Health Centre at the Royal Ottawa Hospital. As a member of a unit team that involved psychiatrists and child workers Mitch gained experience with helping children from the pre-school age to adolescence. He said it was an incredible experience. What made the experience in Ottawa all that better was that his wife worked in the same hospital in a neighbouring unit. Mitch met his wife while attending St. Lawrence. Together they are able to share their experiences and Mitch says that this sharing has contributed greatly not only to their

Mitch says that there is an amazing variety of opportunities in the child care field. His first work experience was in the educational sector which he says is very different from child care work in traditional mental health settings. In the more than seven years that he was at the Royal Ottawa Hospital Mitch experienced a variety of different aspects of child care work. He suggests that to be successful in this kind of profession you need a caring and supportive attitude and a solid understanding of the fundamentals of helping children with personal or mental problems. That solid foundation, Mitch said, came from the Child Care Worker program at St. Lawrence College.

What did he learn at St. Lawrence?? Mitch said that it was the teachers who introduced him to the profession which he is so dedicated to. And, it was the teachers who instilled in him his basic philosophy of advocating for the rights of children and helping children reach their full capacity to live healthy, meaningful lives.

Holistic health is a term that Mitch uses a lot. He believes that it is his job to take care of the whole child. First he says you must help the child build their self esteem, confidence and their autonomy. Then you must help them take control of their life by teaching them how to think and solve problems - to examine various options and not be caught in patterns of behaviour that are destructive.

In 1987 Mitch returned to his native Prescott area to help establish a nontraditional community based help centre for families called, "Family Focus". Most of his time, (about 60%), is spent counselling young people and parents. He was instrumental in the setup of a parents' support group. But he is most proud of his involvement with the "Prescott Youth Connection". This is a self-directed group of young people who work together learning persistence and other life skills and providing support for each other. Mitch provides some guidance but the members of the group have a lot of autonomy.

Mitch Robinson is a member of several community groups in the Prescott area and contributes to the advisory committee for the Child and Youth Worker program at St. Lawrence. It is the way Mitch gives back some of the things he says were given to him so generously. Mitch and others like him are providing a service to the community that is often overlooked. In today's society where many adolescents feel out of touch, out of control and desperate for some meaning to life, Mitch and his colleagues provide a caring, empathetic safety net to catch those who have fallen between the cracks in the system. Indeed the same purpose in life, that Mitch so passionately describes as his own, touches and influences the desperate lives he tries to help.

It might have all started over a cup of coffee.

A simple comment about what the future might hold if dreams could come true.

Ideas exchanged, enthusiasm unleashed and possibilities explored.

Five years later, Sharon Freeman (McCaffrey) APR'88 - Kingston, and Josie Peras-Walsh APR'87 - Kingston have proven that a good concept, combined with lots of hard work, many sacrifices and sheer determination can turn a simple idea into reality.

"I guess the idea for FIFTY-FIVE PLUS really got started when I was on the work placement portion of the APR program at the college", explains Sharon. "Josie was working full-time at the 401 Value Inn in Kingston as Sales Manager when I was there on my field placement. We had both worked on the student paper at the

college at different times and felt the APR program had really given us many of the fundamentals needed to work in the magazine business"

With an old typewriter and Sharon's very used car as collateral, the two applied for a Youth Ventures loan and started FIFTY-FIVE PLUS.

"It was right around the time that everyone was talking about how Kingston had just nudged out Victoria, B.C. as the retirement capital of Canada", says Sharon. "We saw the market opportunity."

Advertising is key to the financial success of almost every magazine and FIFTY-FIVE PLUS is no exception. Initially, advertisers such as pharmacies and retirement homes were relatively easy to interest in the new publication. Lifestyle advertising for the seniors market was quite a different story. In time however, more and more businesses were interested in reaching this new market.

"In a way, I believe the recession has helped us in the long run", explains Josie. "The change in the economy has forced many businesses to re-examine who their market is and in our case to look at alternative ways of reaching seniors."

Not to say that the recession has not been a challenge for the two entrepreneurs. After the initial start up in the Kingston market, Sharon and Josie purchased the assets of an Ottawa seniors magazine, Meridian in 1990, expanding just as we entered the recession. FIFTY-FIVE PLUS is now published in both markets and offers articles and information on the local, regional, national and international issues of interest to seniors. With the expansion, circulation has grown from 10,000 copies to 30,000. The magazine is published six times per year.

Explains Sharon, "We have always received article submissions from local writers but recently we have been receiving them from across the country." Although there have been a number of inquiries from other individuals interested in the FIFTY-FIVE PLUS idea for other regions of the country, Limestone City Publications, their company which technically publishes the magazine has no immediate plans to expand further.

"We are continuing to build in both the Kingston and Ottawa markets", states Josie. One initiative to help build interest in the publication is an annual business show held in Kingston to help raise the profile and understanding of this growing market.

"This will be our third annual FIFTY-FIVE PLUS Magazine, Retirement Lifestyle Show", explains Josie. "We'll be featuring exhibitors, entertainment and giveaways at the show." The show is scheduled to take place at the Portsmouth Olympic Harbour, June 11, 1992, 9am to 8pm. Admission is free.

FIFTY-FIVE PLUS has another connection to alumni of St. Lawrence. After all

the articles have been written, edited, photos taken, and advertising sold, the layout and design of the magazine is handled by a Kingston-based graphic design company, Creative Effects. Creative Effects is owned and operated by Donna Bishop, APR'86 - Kingston.

So how do publishers, half the age of their audi-

ence communicate so effectively! "I'm not sure many of our readers know there is much of an age difference", says Sharon. "I believe some of those who do know there is an age gap see us as they would see their grandchildren. We receive so much mail, probably 500 letters, inquiries or responses to particular items between issues."

Sharon quotes from a letter received recently from one of their readers, "It's a happy day when FIFTY-FIVE PLUS arrives in our mail box."

"It is that type of feedback which keeps us moving" says Sharon.

Although the publication may not be expanding in the immediate future, Sharon and her husband Will, are expecting their first child this summer.

"I'm sure there will be some adjustments", says Sharon. "But I plan to keep

doing pretty much the same as I am now".

With Sharon working out of her home in Battersea, north of Kingston and Josie, from her home in Ottawa, Limestone City Publications operates very much in the cottage industry style we heard was coming in the future. Sharon and Josie have also seen the future, it seems to be FIFTY-FIVE PLUS.

The College Standards and Accreditation Council

"Somewhat of a mundane topic you think?... think AGAIN!"

The Ministry of Colleges and Universities is in the process of establishing a College Standards and Accreditation Council (CSAC) that is proposing a fundamental change in the orientation of college programs across the province.

The establishment board of CSAC, that is co-chaired by Deputy Minister of Colleges and Universities Dr. Bernard Shapiro, and Richard Johnston, chair of the Council of Regents, suggests that college programs need more liberal arts type courses and more emphasis on generic skills.

In a discussion paper that was released in March 1992, the CSAC establishment board, which will disappear once CSAC commences its work in the 1993/94 academic year, sets the framework for a new approach to college program standards, program review, and program accreditation.

Dr. Shapiro presented the report to a large crowd in the lecture hall at the Kingston Campus of St. Lawrence on April 15, 1992. Students, staff and administrators from the three campuses of St. Lawrence participated in a lively and thoughtful discussion of the implications of some of the recommendations contained in the report.

Some wondered why the ministry thought a change in the approach to college programming was necessary. Shapiro explained that in the evidence supplied through the Vision 2000 process, a process which examined the mandate of the colleges, there seemed to be

a lack of understanding among the general public of what constituted the college credential, (the diploma and the certificate). Secondly, it was pointed out, through Vision 2000, that there was a wide variety of standards or objectives for similar programs at different colleges.

But the issues which caused the most comment at the April 15th presentation and which were raised by many of the participants in the Vision 2000 process were generic skills and "general education". At least in the submissions that were funnelled through the St. Lawrence College report on Vision 2000 most, in particular employer groups, wanted the college graduate to have better generic skills, which are defined by the CSAC report as: "the practical portable skills of literacy, numeracy, computer literacy, interpersonal skills, and analytical skills including critical thinking and problem-solving. And, many would agree that college graduates should have a better understanding of the world around them, through what has been labelled as "general education". The problem seems to be in understanding the difference between generic skills and general education, and how to define each.

This difficulty was illustrated at the April 15th presentation when an example was posed of what would be defined as a general education course, "physics", in a Fashion Design program, but the same course, "physics", would not constitute a general education course in a Computer Engineering Technology program. Other examples sug-

gested that some general education courses could be deemed to be generic skills, which according to the CSAC report need to be measurable "outcomes" and could be taught as integrated components of all college courses. However, the report suggests that general education not be expressed in outcomes and not be integrated in existing curricula but be a variety of subjects outside a student's traditional program of study.

Many questions were raised by the St. Lawrence people who attended the session on the 15th of April. Many good suggestions were made to modify the recommendations so as to better meet the needs of future students and the training needs of businesses, institutions, and industries. It is a credit to the staff of St. Lawrence and to the Ministry of Colleges and Universities that the core of the colleges... the courses and programs are given such extensive examination both on a local and provincial level, with the intent of building the quality education our students deserve. It is questionable that there is the political will to see such extensive change to the colleges made. It may even be questionable that this change is necessary. But what seemed conclusive through the example of comments and arguments made at the CSAC presentation is that there are a lot of concerned, thoughtful St. Lawrence people who really only want to help our students succeed.



DREAM A LITTLE, BUT BE REALISTIC

ALUMNUS TELLS HIGH ACHIEVERS

Richard Munk, a St. Lawrence College graduate who is currently a senior partner in Bernier & Partners/Business Planning Group, Chartered Accountants/Management Consultants was guest speaker at the College's 18th Annual Awards Banquet, Cornwall.

Munk remembers himself as being a leader but also as being a little rebellious in the late 1960's, early 1970's. Speaking to the group of "high achievers," Munk listed seven steps he feels are important if students want to transfer current success to their careers and to their lives. He insists that clear goals are essential and that one must determine the obstacles that could get in the way. "Dream a little," he said, "but be realistic."

Munk suggests that a positive attitude is very important; one must accept the responsibility of his/her own actions: "Don't make excuses," he maintained. We should also seek advice from others. It is important to associate with positive people and to form a network with other successful people. "You have to love what you are doing enough to want to do your best" he said. "We have to learn time management too; set priorities and become known for our dependability."

Finally, commitment to life-long learning is essential. "You must continue to read, research and attend seminars," he said. "But most importantly, you must learn how to deal with failure successfully. Failure builds character. You've got to learn to identify what went wrong, make adjustments and then move on. To be successful one must be well-rounded, have strong family ties and give something back to the community."






