VICKI LEAKEY, CGA

A recent announcement by Peat Marwick Thorne Chartered Accountants confirmed the appointment of Vicki Leakey (Business Administration-Finance - 1985/Kingston) as a manager in the Audit Department of the firm's Kingston office.

"I love what I am doing," explains Vicki. "This is really interesting work. The Kingston office offers so much versatility because clients tend to be somewhat smaller here and there are more of them."

Vicki has a variety of clients in the "not for profit" and manufacturing sectors of the business community.

Terry Hanrahan

1982 Graduate, Marine Engineering Technologist Technician program (METTP) CORNWALL

Terry puts that training to practice on a daily basis in his current posting in St. Catharines, Ontario. His unit is involved in a major repair and replacement of all mechanical systems of a Navy destroyer.

Although Terry's current posting is on land, as part of the Canadian Forces Technical Service Detachment, he did serve on board the HMCS Protecteur. Terry has sailed to Spain, Portugal, England and the South Seas.

"When you're single and just out of College, life at sea is great!" says Terry. "It's hectic on board but it's lots of fun in different ports around the world." "If I was posted on board another ship, now that I'm older and wiser, I'd send my pay cheque home and have just a little spending money."

Thinking back to his days at St. Lawrence in 1982, he recalls the military students had a bigger course load than the civilians. That made it a little more difficult to enjoy college life. And, it was also sometimes difficult being part of the military, studying in a civilian school. "I remember our group of about 40 arrived on campus and got off the bus and were quickly spotted as military by our short haircuts," says Terry. "However after a couple of Friday afternoon pubs we all became just regular St. Lawrence students."

Terry joined the Navy after reading an advertisement in a Halifax newspaper featuring the St. Lawrence program. The thought of going to college and getting paid by the Canadian Navy during his studies was "too good an opportunity to turn down."

The rank of Petty Officer First Class is just a stepping stone to a higher rank for Terry. Chief Petty Officer Second Class is his next goal which holds a position on ship as a Chief Engine Room Artificer (Chief ERA). Translated that means the head technician in the engine room. Terry says that what he learned at St. Lawrence, in part, has allowed him to increase his rank in the Navy.

"Just last week I was flipping through my old college books looking for solutions to some of the problems I'm dealing with in this major refit," explains Terry.

Terry has developed some expertise in the area of fire fighting equipment. A technical paper he wrote was recently published in the Navy Journal. Terry's paper addressed the environmental hazard of a chemical, that is used in most fire extinguishers. Terry outlined substitute chemicals which are not harmful to the environment and also a "water fog" system which is similar to a sprinkler system. The "water fog" system is different from a sprinkler system in that both the water and air are highly pressurized to spray very fine particles in extinguishing fires. This system can put out a fire with considerable less water than sprinklers and less damage to electronic systems.

Terry believes that his college years prepared him for what he is doing now. He also believes that St. Lawrence contributed to his belief in continuous learning. Terry is currently enrolled in an Economics course at Brock University.

Terry Hanrahan is just one of the many graduates from our Cornwall campus who studied at the College as a member of the Canadian Armed Forces. For many years the Canadian Navy has trained their technicians and technologists through the Mechanical and Marine Engineering Technology programs at St. Lawrence.

GROWTH IN GARDEN WORLD

*Spring has just arrived
but already there is growth
in Garden World.*

*A Brockville based landscape
business, Garden World
is owned and operated
by two former
St. Lawrence students,
Al and Rozalind Phillips.*

The company got its start in Smiths Falls Ontario in the early 1980's and then relocated to Brockville.

"During the last recession things had started to slow down with the business so I registered in the Brockville campus Civil Engineering program," explains Al. "I thought at the time that I might look at a new career or at least the fundamental skills learned in the program would help me with the landscaping business."

Before Al could complete his last semester at St. Lawrence, business had picked up to the extent that Garden World needed his full attention or the business would be lost.

"I don't know why you are interviewing me," says Al modestly. "I never completed my final semester technical report so really I am not a graduate of St. Lawrence. The difficult decision to leave the program and attend to the business appears to have been a good decision for Al. Garden World currently has clients from Kingston to Ottawa. Al claims 80% of their business is commercial.

Garden World has grown to employ close to fifty people (many who also attended St. Lawrence College) and the original "soft" landscaping business has expanded to include several new divisions: Interlock paving, equipment rentals, commercial landscaping, snow ploughing, and a retail garden centre.

Automation in the form of a new computer-aided design (CAD) system has really changed the way Al approaches his work.

"During peak periods we probably produce five or six project designs on the CAD system," explains Al. "This CAD system allows us to produce drawings to be used for sales and presentation purposes. We handle a lot of project tenders each year."


"When I was at the College, I found that I really had something to prove," says Al. "I was in my early thirty's and felt challenged by the younger students in the class. After three years of school, I felt more disciplined and that my mind was sharper back at work too."

The Phillips feel the growth of Garden World has been positive. Plans for the near future include "getting a handle" on each area of the business and opening an expanded retail Garden Centre at the Brockville operation.

When asked about activities in their spare time, Al says "Spare time, that's something we are working on!"

Rozalind and Al have two children, a son at University and their daughter at high school in Brockville.

Although Al may not have completed his last semester at St. Lawrence, it would seem his last project, Garden World, has earned him an "A."



The college's campaign to raise over \$1.5 million in private funds has yet been announced publicly and already close to \$350,000 has been raised.

Sharing Our Future off to a great start...

After several months of planning, the "Sharing Our Future" campaign has moved from the organizational phase into the fundraising phase. The campaign, the first major college-wide fundraising initiative for the college, is intended to raise a minimum of \$1.5 million in private funds to support several areas of need at St. Lawrence. Three funds have been established: The Equipment Renewal Fund, Student Assistance Fund and the Campus Centre Building Fund in Kingston.

"The demands on our college have never been greater", explains Dan Corbett, President, St. Lawrence College. "Increasing enrolments and shrinking government support require us to examine alternative sources of funding if we are to maintain the excellent quality of education and skills training offered here at St. Lawrence. The 'Sharing Our Future' campaign represents an opportunity for St. Lawrence to help itself by encouraging those who benefit most to support their college. I am very optimistic that the campaign will be a success."

Earlier this year, the executive management committee of the college together with a few present and former board members pledged close to \$100,000 towards the campaign.

Students in Kingston, Brockville and Cornwall have also thrown their support behind the "Sharing Our Future" campaign. Pledged over the next five years, student contributions are expected to exceed \$250,000.

An appeal directed specifically toward St. Lawrence staff has been launched and is expected to wrap up during the month of April.

"It was critical that we demonstrated internal support for the campaign from staff, students and board members prior to asking those outside the college for their commitment," says Dan. "We expect to launch the campaign publicly later this spring."

For the first time in the college's 25 year history, alumni of St. Lawrence will be asked to consider a financial contribution to their college. An appeal to all St. Lawrence alumni will begin in early May.

"We plan to contact over 10,000 graduates by mail and phone during the spring and summer", explains Frank Lockington, campaign coordinator for the project. "I hope that alumni will look upon this request for support as an opportunity to show their continued commitment to St. Lawrence."

Other groups which will be approached for support include: national corporations, local businesses and foundations.

The campaign will continue until early next year with pledged gifts from donors to be received over the next three to five years.

Houdini, I am told, was able to extricate himself from a trunk while he was handcuffed under six feet of water. David Copperfield made the Statue of Liberty disappear before thousands of astonished witnesses.

As a Trekkie, I regularly watch Spock and his friends turn into atoms of light and reappear whole in some distant place. Truth? Reality? or Illusion, tricks and sleight of hand? If the truth were told, some would like to believe that organizations that have achieved total quality have done so through some magical process which requires little real work but a lot of smoke and mirrors. Not true! What is this process on which we have embarked? How will it change us as an organization? More importantly, how will it affect our graduates?

Much has been written about Total Quality. The movement is not new. It is largely associated with the work of Dr. W. Edwards Deming, a statistician who formed many of his theories after World War II when he taught Japanese industries how to use statistical methods to improve the quality of their production. Deming's followers believe that a team approach that fosters plenty of employee input, a foundation of customer satisfaction, and the careful use of statistical tools and techniques to provide data for decision-making will result in a quality product and a high degree of employee satisfaction. Total Quality, however, is more than tools and techniques. It is a different way of viewing the world focussing on creating a workplace that encourages everyone to contribute. It is thinking in terms of processes to be continuously improved rather than in terms of laying blame on people for not having done a good job. Most importantly, it is keeping the customers constantly in the forefront and maintaining a willingness to exceed their expectations. To quote Ron Zemke, "Quality is what the customer says it is. Period."

How does this apply to education?

Myron Tribus, a colleague of Deming's stated that "Quality in education is what makes learning a pleasure and a joy. ... Teachers must create an environment in which students want to learn, one where they will play an active rather than passive role. As a teacher, you have to help students to learn, and you have to teach them how to improve their learning process. That makes the student a co-manager of his or her education." Students from Mt. Edgecumbe High School in Sitka, Alaska have given presentations throughout the U. S., England and Canada on changing education through quality management. They were introduced to it by David Langford, one teacher who believed that teacher or administrator-directed classrooms are not effective enough to create lifelong learning. He believes that students need to be involved in the management, planning, analysis and change process within the classroom in order to make a quality experience that creates an independent learner. This paradigm shift in classroom management concentrates efforts on having many students doing high quality learning rather than on increasing the amount of low-quality work by simply trying to reduce the attrition rate.

On the road to Total Quality...

We at St Lawrence College have embarked on a program of Total Quality Improvement (TQI). As a supplier of education, we have to make sure that we find out what our customers are looking for and then decide what to do about it. Our customers are the students themselves, the employers who want to use the students' education and abilities, and governments who need well-educated people in order to function better. Fortunately, all these customers are looking for the same thing: people with knowledge, know-how, wisdom and motivation. In order to produce this kind of graduate, we need to concentrate our understanding and efforts on the process of learning. We need to help students learn to analyze what they learn and how they learn so that the activity of learning itself is something they become good at. Learning becomes an end in itself. This can have a profound effect on our programs, on the delivery of them and on our methods of evaluating students.

What benefits can students expect from our efforts in TQI?

First, students will have a more thorough involvement in the management of their own education. The focus should then switch from information to master to understanding the relationship between the work that they are doing now and the job they are preparing for in the future.

Second, students will derive a greater satisfaction from the educational experience at SLC. Our focus on meeting and exceeding the customers' needs should lead naturally to greater satisfaction. We need to make the experience so worthwhile that students will want to come back and bring a friend.

Third, students will be better positioned to enter the workforce. Some companies are actually stating now that the technical knowledge of the prospective employee is not as important as that person's ability to work in teams, to apply scientific methods to problem solving, to constantly ask the question "What can we do to improve?" Some educators feel disturbed by the use of business terms and expressions from the marketplace to describe our improvement efforts. To those I say, if our students are heading into that same marketplace, shouldn't they have the opportunity to prepare for it in more than the academic sense?

How will we affect the change? No smoke, no mirrors, no magic. This is a restructuring effort that does not come with a no-fail implementation roadmap. Quality is not a quick fix. It requires a long term view and an attitude of continuous improvement. The importance of self-motivation becomes obvious when we see the record-breaking performances of athletes in the Olympic games. When you listen to them after their performances what they are most proud of is that they have improved. Once quality becomes central to our programs, students will be proud of what they do, and this pride will be-



come as contagious as pride anywhere else. There is nothing magical about implementing a Total Quality Improvement program. It takes will, belief, teamwork and time. Mission Impossible? No! Our mission, as we have defined it lies in becoming better at meeting our quality policy:

- *It is the policy of SLC to provide quality instruction with the highest educational standards.*
- *We endeavour to provide correct, efficient, and courteous service to our students, to one another, and to the employers and organizations who use our services.*
- *In all our activities our focus is on continuous improvement.*

Funding

The government's transfer payments support program for 1993/94 was announced in the Ontario legislature November 26. Don Lemieux, Vice President of Administrative Services provides an analysis of the implications of the funding announcement:

* The announcement was that the 2% increase to the operating grant allocation which was previously announced by the Ministry of Colleges and Universities is no longer available. This means that St. Lawrence will not receive approximately \$600,000. which we had anticipated.

* The Minister did announce that \$56 million will be available for the post-secondary system (colleges and universities) for restructuring.

* St. Lawrence's College Executive Committee (formerly College Management Committee) will be actively pursuing new opportunities in programming and service delivery to assist us in offsetting the anticipated reductions.

OSAP

Revisions to the 1993/94 Ontario Student Assistance program have been confirmed. Some of the major changes include: students will receive more loan assistance and less grants; average student debt levels will increase, however, the maximum two-term student debt load will remain at the current level of \$5,570.; instead of paying grants during the academic year, loan debts in excess of \$5,570 per year will be forgiven when the student leaves school; the amount of money available for both special bursaries and the Ontario Work Study program will be doubled.

Secondary School Scholarships

The College's Board of Governors has now completed another year of providing financial assistance to selected St. Lawrence students by way of the Board's Tuition Scholarship program. Each year, one student from each of our area's secondary schools, is eligible to receive one semester's free tuition at St. Lawrence. A total of 34 scholarships were presented for the 1992/93 academic year.

Technologies Development

One of the issues coming from our review of strategic issues is the need to focus on developing our technology infrastructure. At the same time, the provincial government is placing a high priority on the development of a telecommunications strategy for Ontario. Within St. Lawrence College, we have developed a telecommunications platform which has the capability of becoming the leading edge in the college system as well as a valued service to the communities in our region. Bill Harris, formerly Director, Information Technology, is being assigned to work with a team of people from St. Lawrence and from outside the College to develop a plan to advance the telecommunications capability of the College and to integrate our plans with the Ontario government. Bob Short, the first President of St. Lawrence and an expert in the telecommunications field will be acting as a resource person to this study. In addition to this project, Bill will be leading the development of a Human Resource Information System for St. Lawrence.

College to be Smoke Free as of Sept. 1993

On December 8th the Board of Governors approved the following resolution on the recommendation of the College Management Committee: That the Committee recommends that the Board approve the administrative decision to move toward a smoke free environment by September 1993, in all buildings of St. Lawrence College, except for limited and approved licensed events which will result in no incremental cost to the College.

New energy efficient lights

St. Lawrence, in cooperation with Ontario Hydro, recently completed a \$880,000. project to replace all internal lighting fixtures at the Brockville and Kingston campuses with new, more energy efficient units. The College will save about \$145,000 per year in energy costs. The project was funded jointly by the Ministry of Energy, Ontario Hydro and the College.

Graduate doing his part for energy conservation

James McCormick, son of St. Lawrence retiree Hortense McCormick, and a 1988 graduate in Business Administration-Finance has been honoured for his contribution to the success of the Cornwall Energy Efficiency Communities Project. This project is a pilot project in Cornwall and is supported by the Ministry of Energy. James displayed patience and tolerance in assisting the Energy Efficiency Team comply with the special reporting requirements of the Ministry. His methodical assistance in the accounting reporting for the team was greatly appreciated.

Cornwall Micro Students build a Security Robot

Patrice Desrochers from Curry Hill and Robert Van Loon from Williamstown impressed teacher Ken Jones with their technical report. Using bits and pieces they picked up from home and from their car, these students produced a security robot that travelled a set path and monitored smoke, sound, temperature, and movement while displaying its surroundings on a monitor which was located in another area. Completely computer operated, this robot proved to be quite an achievement for these students who hope to graduate at the end of January.

Two outstanding teachers retire from Brockville Campus

Ed Lypchuk joined the College in August 1970. He taught mathematics and electronics in the Technology Department. Ed developed and wrote the proposal for the popular Business Technology-Information Communication Systems program. Gene Motluk began teaching in the Business Department in 1971. Gene was responsible for starting the Hotel and Restaurant Management program. The campus hospitality center is now called "Motluk". Both received the College Award of Excellence for their contributions to St. Lawrence at a special ceremony in December. Gene and Ed will be remembered by everyone associated with the college as excellent educators, up-to-date in their disciplines, and effective and caring teachers.

College establishes a Program Planning Steering Committee

The College's Program Planning Steering Committee is currently refining the definitions for CORE and SPECIALIZED (as in "Area of Specialization") into objective and observable criteria. All College programs will then be assessed according to these categories. The Committee's hope is that this categorization will greatly facilitate the identification and marketing of our families of quality programs. The process should also make the annual program review and planning activities more efficient.

The Steering Committee believes there is a dynamic among these categories which is evident in the life-cycle of certain programs. This ready categorization of programs may simplify the process of supporting the movement into new program areas as we move out of old/insupportable ones. Given the current funding situation, it is increasingly important to trim present programming before we can add new programs.

In addition to pursuing this work the Steering Committee will be addressing such issues as program quality and areas of new program development. The individual members of the committee welcome your interest and questions concerning this important process.
