

In the fall, David was responsible for checking the concrete footings on the new residence. The shaft

hole for the elevator position had already been located and drilled, thereby fixing the entire building location. It was therefore critical that the footing forms be 'dead' accurate.

One of David's responsibilities is to check on material supplied to the job site. In the case of concrete, as an example, he would check quantity, location, time and safety of the placing procedure. His daily log would include all of these.


After graduation, David had returned to the Ottawa area where he grew up. He contacted people he knew in the consulting industry for assistance in finding some job leads. David was prepared to do volunteer work in the field to gain some experience and further contracts. He went to Fuller Construction seeking advice in his job search. David has worked with Fuller Construction on a pipeline pumping station, a bus terminal-overpass complex and a commercial building prior to returning to his 'alma mater' to help build the new St. Lawrence College residence.

David appreciates the teamwork and diplomacy he learned at St. Lawrence College, along with the math and surveying skills. Diplomacy and teamwork help David in dealing with all the various subcontractors; math and surveying ensure that the building is level, plumb and square.

Construction for the \$6.5 million residence is on schedule. The roof was being installed before Christmas and a model room is also being prepared for viewing.

Carmen Cousineau

Path Finder in Social Services

When Carmen was growing up in Cornwall, the chain was constantly off her bike. She was one of the first kids in her neighbourhood to have a bike. Establishing a pattern of generosity that is now a character trait,



Carmen lent the bike to all the other kids on her street.

Constant use by multiple riders led to problems with the chain. If it bothered Carmen, nobody knew.

Her Mum, Madame Page, was a no nonsense

French teacher according to long time acquaintance,

Deborah Mackay. Undoubtedly, her mother, who was a dedicated teacher, very respected by her students for her high standards, created the expectations that helped

Carmen become the skilled, caring person that she is today. Carmen will tell you that she's known since sometime in elementary school, where she often gave a hand to others in need, that she would always work with people.

Tow Carmen is a busy administrator at what is about to become one of the province's first Ontario Works sites. About a dozen communities are going to experiment with the workfare idea that the current provincial government has designed. Cornwall is one of them. It's natural that Carmen would be leading the implementation of something that's new. For nearly twenty years she's had a growing involvement with social services in Cornwall.

Her work experience in the field began with family case work and instruction at the Cornwall and District Association for the Mentally Retarded (now known as Cornwall and District Association for Community Living). She's moved through a number of settings since that beginning. But she speaks with fondness of the work she did with

the developmentally disabled. There she learned the importance of treating everybody the same, regardless of station. Her long time colleague and close personal friend, Diane Lalonde, a prof in the School of Human Studies, notes that Carmen has the ability to make people feel good about themselves, no matter what kind of difficulty they're experiencing at the time.

Diane laughs when she remembers the lively presence that Carmen was, both as a student and later as a colleague, at the Cornwall General Hospital. All business when it came to looking after her clients, Carmen could also have some fun. One colleague, a serious reserved fellow, with a reputation for conservative, if not staid clothing habits, was surprised to receive a very bright red leather tie in the Christmas gift exchange.

Following the period at the hospital, and perhaps anticipating the trend toward entrepreneurship in the public sector, Carmen held several jobs at once. She taught part time at the Cornwall campus of the College, designed training programs in Technology and Trades, coordinated projects to raise literacy levels for employed people and acted as a Vocational Assessment Technician. This variety brought Carmen into contact with an array of government initiatives aimed at social change or response to social problems. The process schooled her in the area of work transition as Cornwall was in the midst of the painful process of losing much of its industrial base in textiles. Carmen was heavily involved in helping women find their place in the workforce. And the literacy work helped many prepare for the introduction of new technology.

Naturally, Carmen's next move was to the Industrial Training Council. This organization's mission was to assess need for training and then to sponsor appropriate training events. Here Carmen was able to bring her experience as a teacher and program organizer together with her understanding of social issues and sensitivity to individual need. Her comment about the development of her career is that she has been able to keep working directly with the clients receiving service even while she has moved through organizing and administrative levels in various agencies.

As happens continually with government programs the Industrial Training Council was phased out of existence. Its work will be taken over by the Local Training Adjustment Board. In the meantime, however, Carmen was out of work. Resilient as ever, when the province's NDP government created the jobLink Project, Carmen became its new director. It didn't last in this form. But in the space of about a year and a half it served in excess of 2,600 people who wanted help getting into the workforce and/or off welfare. Carmen organized this service under the direction of the City's and Counties' Social Services departments. It was a complex task involving two municipalities, dealings with several provincial government officials and an advisory committee representing various community interests.

Workfare is the next stop on this change cycle. Now the welfare recipient is going to have to work for the welfare cheque. And the jobLink site that Carmen manages has had to get ready for the transition to a new philosophy and a whole new service. Hilda Seguin, Cornwall's Director of Social Service

and Carmen's boss, shakes her head when she talks about the amount of work that was necessary to prepare for the implementation of workfare. She points to the 200 page business plan required for this program known as Ontario Works. Hilda explains that Carmen had to conceive and write this plan while still running the jobLink site. Indications are that she succeeded. Provincial social services rep John Wilson has indicated that the plan Carmen wrote has been well received by the Ministry. It is expected that the result of Carmen's work will be that Cornwall will be one of the leading communities in the province's effort to change the face of welfare.

And of course Carmen has not forgotten her alma mater.


She cheerfully credits the college with getting her started on an exciting career. She says that the insights into how people work, why they do the things they do, that she began to understand as a Social Services student in the late 70's are the foundation for her success.

To help the current class Carmen returns to the campus every year to talk about fashioning a career in her field. According to Diane Lalonde the students admire and appreciate the blend of theoretical expertise and practical experience that Carmen brings them. Diane likes to bring Carmen back because she's such a great role model for the students. She's an innovator who has broken new paths for St Lawrence's future Social Services grads to follow.

Rene is a graduate of St. Lawrence College's Restoration Technology program, is almost a graduate of the Forestry Technician program at Sir Sanford Fleming and is the owner of the highly successful Micro Market Inc. Oh yes, did I mention that Rene also has a St. Lawrence diploma in Computer Programming?

Rene's path from a two-year-old Dutch immigrant to an expert in the computer business is eclectic and colorful. He spent his youth as a self-confessed "party animal" taking courses and trying to decide what he really wanted to do in life. He came into the Restoration Technology program in 1980 after having spent a summer traveling in Europe and being fascinated by ancient buildings and architecture in cities such as Lisbon.

The company was computerizing and Rene got the nod to support this venture. Rene started taking part-time courses in computers at St. Lawrence and did very well. At about the same time another very fortuitous event occurred in Rene's life; he met his wife Patti who worked at St. Lawrence. Rene credits his wife's foresight in recognizing his natural affinity with computers and for encouraging him to develop it.

Rene enrolled in the one year intensive Computer Programmer program in 1983. He was soon excelling in the program and credits his teachers; Jim Lyons, Jim Miller, Mike Kelly and Mary-Anne White for the positive climate.

After graduation, Rene started teaching part-time for the College in computers and also started working at J.R. Business Equipment as a Computer Systems Specialist. He is very proud of the fact that he "brought the company to a point where computer sales exceeded all other sales".

In 1986, Rene decided to go it alone and became an independent consultant and computer trainer. He started providing training services to a variety of clients such as MicroAge, the Ministry of Natural Resources and Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce. For the next two years he supported computer training efforts at St. Lawrence College and initiated and supervised the development of a computer training facility. He developed and marketed all courses as well as providing instruction.

Micro Market also has an impressive list of success stories in establishing their specific market niche. In 1995-1996, Micro Market was the major supplier of computer products to the Leeds and Grenville School Board as well as school boards within the Kingston area. Both Rene and Shawn are very proud to be good corporate citizens. They have been awarded numerous citations for their community support. They believe in the value of giving back to the community.

All Micro Market staff are multi-skilled and are an integral part of the company so turnover is low. Rene is also a believer in partnerships and will only work with companies who "believe in the same things we do". The success of the business is very gratifying although it does take a lot out of you.

As if the business is not enough, Rene is also Vice-President of the Brockville District Advertising and Sales Club, President of Lyn and District Softball Association and Chair of the Local Training Advisory Board. 

Quality system passes six-month review

The quality system at St. Lawrence College is operating as it should, according to the results of a six-month surveillance audit conducted in November.

St. Lawrence's ISO 9001 registration requires a system review at the end of six months, and auditors from KPMG Quality Registrar Inc. were at the college on November 11 to carry it out. Focusing on the areas of program design and development, management of the quality system, service delivery and continuing education, they went through a series of probing questions with department representatives. The result was a clear recommendation that St. Lawrence maintain the ISO 9001 certification of its quality system.

"Once again, the college has come through and exceeded expectations," said Andy Hofmann of KPMG.

The auditors appeared pleased with how well the system was functioning. "This was an opportunity to see how a first-class ISO 9001 system runs," Hofmann said. "The college is doing very well and very consistently versus what is described in the standard."

St. Lawrence representatives were equally pleased with the results of the first surveillance audit: "I'm delighted with the support and commitment shown by out faculty and staff," said Jeanie Sawyer, Vice-President, Academic and Management Representative for the Quality System. The auditors will return in another six months to ensure the system is continuing to function effectively.

Report Recognizes Value of Ontario Colleges

The report of the Advisory Panel on Future Directions for Postsecondary Education makes a number of recommendations that St. Lawrence College and its President, Dan Corbett, can support.

"We are pleased with the report's recognition of the value of two parallel systems in postsecondary education in Ontario," Corbett says. "Colleges and Universities make different and distinct contributions to the social, cultural and economic well-being of the province. We also like the emphasis placed on safeguarding the value of an Ontario College diploma and - provided a level playing field can be achieved - we support the move to a more deregulated postsecondary environment".

The Advisory Panel traveled the province this fall, hearing presentations from all Ontario Colleges and Universities and receiving 185 written submissions during the fall. The panel's recommendations were presented to the Minister of Education and Training, John Snobelen, on Monday December 16, 1996.

"The challenge inherent in these recommendations," Corbett says, "is to maintain access while redistributing responsibility for the cost of postsecondary education. We believe, as the panel seems to, that postsecondary education is a 'public good'. It must not be denied to anyone capable of the work and willing to undertake it."

Minister Snobelen has said he will review the recommendations carefully.

Following the release of the report, the Minister announced that funding for Colleges and Universities will be frozen at the current level in fiscal 97/98.

Mary-Gayle Dillon is new Board Chair

At a recent Board of Governors' meeting, Mary-Gayle Dillon was elected as Chair of the Board, replacing Deborah Souder.

Dillon was appointed to the Board in September of 1994 and has filled the position of Vice-Chair since 1995. She is the Executive Director for KASE (an industry education council) in Kingston.

Dillon has been involved in volunteer and professional organizations and with St. Lawrence as a member of the General Arts and Science Advisory Committee. At the same meeting, the Council of Regents announced the appointment of Wilsie Hatfield to the Board. Hatfield, a graduate of the Royal Military College in Kingston and the University of Alberta, is currently employed as Manager of Maintenance Services at DuPont of Canada, Maitland Works.

Hatfield's volunteer involvement in the local community includes the local YM/YWCA, various Brockville arts organizations, Chair of the St. Vincent de Paul Hospital Board, Vice-President of the Chamber of Commerce.

At the December meeting, Dr. David Kirby and Dennis Monaghan were officially welcomed as members. Dr. David Kirby is the Director of Continuing and Distance Studies at Queen's University and holds a Ph. D. from London University. Dennis Monaghan enjoyed a distinguished executive career at Exxon. He is currently the President of the Chaffey's Lock Improvement Committee and a Board Member of 2000 and Beyond, the economic development program for Rural Leeds.

The first term for each of these members will be until August 31, 1999.

Marketing team finishes second in competition

After several first place finishes, the St. Lawrence College marketing team from Kingston under the direction of their professor, Kip Tuckwell, finished a very respectable second at the recent Ontario Colleges Marketing Competition hosted by Sheridan College. The St. Lawrence College team placed first in three events and second in another.

First place awards were achieved by Lucia Tignanelli and Justin Chenier in Advertising Problem Solving, Lucia Tignanelli and Corinna Smith in Retail Problem Solving; and Shawn Peters in the Job Interview. Spencer MacKinnon and Justin Chenier finished second in Marketing Problem Solving. Centennial College placed first overall and Algonquin College finished third.


These two colleges along with St. Lawrence, finished first in nine of ten events.

During Harry Lawson's past 27 years of teaching veterinary technology at St. Lawrence College, he has been a volunteer for the Canadian Association for Laboratory Animal Science (CALAS) serving on the 12 member board of the national organization from 1992-94.

This past year, CALAS recognized Lawson's dedication to improving the standards of animal care and his years of service, by naming him the recipient of this year's Charles River Canada Award. This honour is almost always granted by the association to a doctor in veterinary medicine. He is only the third untitled winner since 1979. Harry is the second St. Lawrence staff member to win this award - Dr. Sarah McLaughlin was the other.



Bill Kirby elected to ONTABA Board

The annual conference and general meeting of the Association for Behaviour Analysis (ONTABA) was held in Toronto on November 21 and 22, 1996. Professor Bill Kirby of St. Lawrence College's Human Studies department was elected to the Board of Directors for a three year term.

ONTABA is currenlty developing standards of practice for the use of applied behaviour analysis. This has always been a significant component of the Behaviourial Science Technology

program at the Kingston campus. These standards are currently being developed and are scheduled to be reviewed through a series of regional consultation meetings in 1997. Once the standards have been officially approved by the Board of Directors, ONTABA plans to seek provincial government support for the accreditation of Behaviour Analysts in Ontario.

Bill advises all graduates of Behaviourial Science Technology to join ONTABA in order to ensure they will stay informed of these developments and have the opportunity to have input into these standards.

Staff & Animals About to Move into New Humane Society Facilities

One Binnington Court, the new home of the Kingston Humane Society, should be operational early in 1997. Barb Donaldson, Professor in the School of Health Sciences and President of the Kingston Humane Society from 1992-1995 spearheaded the acquisition of new quarters for the Humane Society.

By 1995, the Humane Society housed at 231 Dalton Avenue had clearly grown out of its facilities, able only to look after 29 dogs and 50 cats at any given time. Donaldson, then President of the Humane Society, called in a business consultant on the Board's behalf to review their operations. Out of their report, it was clear that new facilities were needed. As President, Donaldson tackled the major goal of getting a new home for the Humane Society.

In May 1995 the Humane Society purchased a building - 1 Binnington Court. At this point, Sue Nelson, a Library Technician at St. Lawrence, became the new President and Donaldson stayed on the Board of Directors as the Building Coordinator.

Donaldson designed the facility room layout in consultation with staff at St. Lawrence, the Canadian Council of Animal Care (they inspect SLC facilities), the Ministry of Agriculture, Animal Care people at Queen's University and numerous others. She also had a lot of people review the room layout for disease prevention and control. All this information was given to Mill & Ross, the architectural firm chosen, together with the budget constraints of the Humane Society. Mill & Ross then came up with the current plan.

A fundraiser in the fall of 1995 raised \$60,000 in support of the project.

The Construction Renovation students from St. Lawrence renovated the office area during the fall of '95 and winter of '96. They completed the renovation with the future potential to include a Spay/Neuter Clinic as well, which Donaldson designed and coordinated in consultation with Dr. Mimi Barrow.

The new facility is now nearing completion. The teaching rooms moved from Dalton to Binnington on December 18th. The Humane Society staff is moving early in the new year, along with the transfer of all the animals.

The facility project from start to finish will cost \$800,000. Renovations, which will include two classrooms, will have been completed for a total of 4,800 square feet, with an add-on of 3,000 square feet. The Spay/Neuter Clinic and KHS offices occupy 2,000 square feet. As many as 46 dogs and 90 cats will be housed at the new Humane Society at any given time.

Donaldson says that every room has turned out even better than anticipated. The facilities are state-of-the-art for animals and something that the Kingston community can be very proud of.

One hundred and twenty Veterinary Technology and Animal Care Techniques students will attend weekly classes in the new facilities starting in January.

"To the best of my knowledge, the Kingston Humane Society is the only humane society that has this type of relationship with a college. It is a completely unique arrangement and an excellent opportunity for our students" Donaldson says.

Brockville Green Line Investment Challenge

We're in the money! On paper at least. First year students at the Brockville Campus have been putting their classroom learning into practice. Professor and St. Lawrence College grad, Jim Miller, has had his macroeconomic class participating in the fall Green Line Investment Challenge for colleges and universities. The challenge, sponsored by Toronto Dominion Bank, provides students with the opportunity to develop and employ individual investment strategies, market predictions and hunches.

St. Lawrence College placed in the top 10 overall among 60 competing schools with an investment return of \$504,148. This was just \$17,859 behind first place Lakeland College. The overall finishes represent averages of all the teams at each school. Some individual teams made over one million dollars. Brockville's highest team made \$554,653 and was made up of Yvon Besner, Angela Rupert, Natasha Cosby and Angela Roux.

The students enjoyed their experience so much that they have formed an economics club to play again during the winter semester. They have no economics classes this term but they still want to compete!

Students receive six college course credits through the Prior Learning Assessment process for successful flight training done at Cornwall Aviation. In total, the candidate spends 15 months in the program and graduates with a diploma in Business from St. Lawrence College and a Commercial Licence with a Multi-Instrument Rating.

The program includes many facets not commonly found in the world of flight training, including ground school programs on interactive CD-RON allows students to view the les many times as they wish.
