





Child-care worker Christine Bryce can't help but find it a little ironic she is being recognized by her peers.

Less than four years ago, the 27-yearold was living in Kingston, desperately trying to break into the field, armed with a diploma from St. Lawrence College's Child and Youth Worker program.

She was unemployed for a while, worked periodically at a group home and full time in the retail sector, mainly to pay the bills.

When she and her then-fiancé, also a grad Chris (Business Administration-Marketing) moved to Brockville three and a half years ago, the door finally opened for Bryce. She was hired at The St. John Bosco Children's Centre.

Top Child-Care Worker Honored

Then (in October of 1997), Bryce learned she is the recipient of the Teacher of the Year Award, a prize recognizing an outstanding child-care worker in the area.

This is the second year the honor was bestowed on an area child-care worker. The idea was suggested at licensed child-care centres in Leeds and Grenville to show their staff appreciation. It is also meant to commemorate Week of the Child.

Bryce, who teaches kids in the centre's school-age program, was one of seven workers in the running for the award. She was both thrilled and shocked to receive the award, as she didn't even know she was nominated.

She said the award is a nice gesture for a job that is too often under-appreciated by the general public. "You don't go into this profession to make money," she acknowledged. "And you don't go into this profession to get pats on the back."

Bryce, who nominated someone for the award herself, has a hectic schedule most days. Not only does the Smiths Falls native teach children ages eight to 12 before and after school, she helps out with the nursery school, tutors two children and acts as a support worker twice a week for a girl with special needs.

But that's not all. "When the janitor calls in sick, I clean," she explained.

And when no one's available to prepare meals for the centre's hot lunch program, you can guess what Bryce is up to. It's what she calls being flexible and she stressed she couldn't do it without the support and cooperation of her husband and co-workers.

Bryce attended university for one year after completing her OACs. She indicates that she wasn't really aware of the great offerings which are available at community colleges until she did her own research.

She returned home for the summer and through conversations with one of her friends, Bryce heard about the Child and Youth Worker program at St. Lawrence College. She then started researching the kinds of skills which social service agencies were seeking and the salaries which they were willing to pay. It appeared that child and youth care agencies were more enthusiastic about college graduates,

stressing to Bryce that the practical experience gained through field placements was invaluable.


Bryce applied to St. Lawrence's CYW program and started classes that fall, earning a couple of advance credits. She indicates that the course material was so relevant and when she participated in field placements, she was able to put what she was learning into practice.

Her last placement was in a school which didn't normally have CYW students from St. Lawrence College. However, Bryce contacted the school, and shared with staff the projects she was interested in pursuing in the school. She indicates that Professor Mike Rawes was especially supportive of her field placement efforts.

Bryce organized a Prevention Program in the school, with participation from approximately 120 grade seven and eight students. Topics included Dealing with Family Conflicts, Date Rape, Who to Contact in Emergency Situations and the Difference Between Positive and Negative Behaviour in Relationships.

Bryce says that she really enjoyed the course material in the CYW program. "What I studied, combined with the field placement, really prepared me for the work world. And, what I noticed at St. Lawrence was the friendliness of the staff. Not just teachers in my program, but everyone."

St. Lawrence graduate Froese LeBlanc is making a name for herself in the world of ceramic art. While her talents are manifested in a wide range of styles, every pottery piece is fired according to the ancient Japanese process of rapid firing, known as Raku.

Froese LeBlanc's interest in art began when she was in high school and after graduating, she studied Fine Arts/Fashion Design at the Kingston campus. She then attended Queen's University, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts in Canadian Studies.

But, Froese LeBlanc was not about to give up her real passion. While studying at Queen's in Kingston, she continued with her training at St. Lawrence, taking advantage of the Summer School of the Arts program, graduating with a certificate in Fine Arts in 1994 and with a certificate in Ceramics in 1995. Building on her experiences at St. Lawrence, she went on to post graduate studies in fine art at the University of Regina, Saskatchewan.

She indicates that after studying at St. Lawrence, she "walked into graduate studies at the University of Regina VERY well prepared." And, she continues, "with my BA. from Queen's and my two St. Lawrence certificates, I am well prepared and equipped to run my own business."

Her work has been featured at the Ottawa Guild of Potters, the Kingston Summerfest, Fusion, (the Ontario Clay and Glass Association), and the "One of a Kind Sale" of fine art in Toronto. Her work can be purchased at Canada's Four Corners, Ottawa, the Avalone Art Gallery in Merrickville, The Guild Shop (Toronto), and the Wagner Rosenbaum Gallery in Toronto.

Froese LeBlanc is having great success with her Quebec farmhouse-styled ceramic houses. She states that, along with many visitors to Ottawa who are purchasing the houses, a number of Members of Parliament have also

bought the u n i q u e houses. Most recently, one of her houses was featured on the cover of Craft CON-NOISSEUR, a

Catalogue of Fine Canadian Crafts.

She indicates that her artistic career has really taken off in the last year. She is excited about the opportunity of participating in the One of a Kind Sale, and says, "This sale really shows the level my work is at - and thus the level of the training I received at St. Lawrence!"

Froese LeBlanc gives credit to the artists with whom she studied while at St. Lawrence. "Their professionalism, their talent and the interest which they took in their students really encouraged me. I am always quick to mention the training that I received at St. Lawrence. Leta Cormier, Aurel Hart and Marg Grothier had a great influence on me."

Quality Colleges Stick Together



St. Lawrence and Sandwell College officials sign memorandum of understanding

St. Lawrence learned from England's Sandwell College during the ISO registration process. The two colleges met again earlier this fall to explore additional partnership opportunities.

Geoffrey Fisher, Board Chair and Douglas Keith, Principal of Sandwell College met at the Kingston Campus with President Dan Corbett, Mary-Gayle Dillon, Chair of our Board of Governors, and members of the Executive Committee on October 23 and 24, 1997.

Sandwell College in England, with three campuses at Wednesbury, West Eromwhich and Smethwick, has over 14,000 students pursuing learning programs designed to meet individual needs on a full-time, day release, block release, and part-time basis. Sandwell has just over 800 full-time faculty, support and part-time teaching staff, while St. Lawrence has just over 600 full-time faculty, support and part-time teaching staff. SLC has close to 5,000 full-time students and close to 24,000 part time registrants.

In May 1991 Sandwell achieved ISO 9000 registration (SLC attaining ISO 9001 registration in May 1996). A memo

of understanding was signed on October 23rd committing Sandwell and St. Lawrence to create quality opportunities for learning for college staff and students and the communities they serve.

Projects could encompass a range of areas (but not exclusively) the following:

1) Staff and faculty exchange projects that would enhance the professional development of individuals and help create a better working environment in the colleges.

2) Transfer agreements in targeted program areas that would enhance the learning environment for students. Such agreements might also include the work placement component for such programs.

3) A management agreement on the development of programs, processes and systems that might be jointly developed between the two colleges. Such agreement might relate to the development of distance education initiatives.

4) Opportunities relating to training programs in total quality management and the implementation of ISO systems in public institutions

5) An annual exchange of views relating to governance and strategic planning that could involve our respective Boards and community members.

Each institution will bear its own costs of development for projects and have agreed to look for funding opportunities to support this Agreement. Any revenue derived from this Agreement will be shared on a pro-rata basis as mutually agreed.

President Dan Corbett says he wants to "make this a students-first program. We are looking for ways of expediting a month-long exchange of six students starting this spring, as part of their regular learning program. The colleges would endeavour to arrange homestays to keep it cost effective. Secondly we are working to get a faculty exchange program going, perhaps with homeswapping to make it more feasible." Shirley Lalonde in Financial Services at the Brockville Campus will be travelling to England this coming January or February (1998) to share techniques on budget preparation with Sandwell financial staff.

St. Lawrence College officially opened its doors to a brand new student residence at the Kingston campus on September 25, 1997.


The new, 70,000 square foot facility houses 296 students. Finished in August and open to students beginning September 1, it is located at the southwest corner of the campus, close to academic and student leisure buildings. It provides students with affordable living quarters, an opportunity to make friends, and close proximity to campus amenities. It has also provided new jobs and pumped nearly \$6 million into the local economy.


"It's been a very successful project," says *Carolyn Harris*, Director of Physical Resources for the College. "We're very pleased with the building and the

feedback so far is that the students are too." The residence has filled to capacity the first year. In fact, the college has plans for an additional wing for the residence should sufficient demand for more rooms become apparent. With enrolment up over 7% from last year perhaps the new wing may be required in the not too distant future.

The new residence, which has 147 double rooms and 2 barrier-free single rooms, is tastefully decorated with mapple furniture, full size refrigerators, and individually controlled heating and acconditioning. Each resident has individual cable and telephone connections as well as access to centrally located laundry facilities, recreation areas and study lounges. The rooms also have food preparation areas and large wire dows that open.

Perhaps the most appealing aspect is the privacy afforded to students. Each room is divided in the middle by the bathroom, which effectively provides two separate bedrooms and study areas for each student. They are joined by a common food service area across from the bathroom. Roommates can meet together in the central core, then study or sleep in their own private area.

The new residence is not just beautiful, it's also secure. With controlled card access, a central security alarm system, video monitoring, and a front desk that is staffed 24 hours a day, students feel comfortable knowing that they are in a safe environment. Most common rooms and hallways are fitted with blue emergency buttons that any student can push for immediate help, and a fully lit and patrolled path leads from the residence to the main campus buildings. Students who feel uncomfortable walking alone in the evenings can also call for assistance from the "Walk Home" program offered by the college. The building itself is constructed of non-combustible material, and is fully sprinklered and alarmed with smoke detectors.

The St. Lawrence College Residence Project which was completed in under 12 months, has resulted in local job creation and a boost to Kingston's economy. This project was designed and contract managed by the local firms of J. L. Richards & Associates Ltd. and Shoalts and Zaback Architects. The General Contractor, Thomas Fuller Construction Co. (1958) Limited of Ottawa, made extensive use of local sub-trades on the \$6.5 million project. The project also created four full-time and six parttime positions within the local operations of the facility manager, Marriott Management Services. The residence also hires students to help out with security and coordinating functions. In addition, eight residence advisors, who receive free housing in return, advise residence students on matters ranging from studies to social events to emergency situations.

On September 25, 1997, approximately 80 people gathered in the main foyer of the new residence for the official grand opening. The event was M.C'd by Blayne Mackey, Vice-President, Administration & Human Resources. President Dan Corbett presented plaques to Shoalts & Zaback Architects; J. L. Richards & Associates Ltd.; Thomas Fuller Construction; sub-contractors Santin Masonry Contractor, S. I. Guttman and Beehler Brothers Electrical Contractors; CIBC banking partner Catherine Stapleton; M.P.P. for Kingston & The Islands John Gerretson; City of Kingston Councillor Pat Hodge; St. Lawrence's Carolyn Harris and Bill Peairs, Residence Director Pat Lewis and Chair of our Board of Governors, Mary-Gayle Dillon. Student Association President, Corinna Smith, cut the ribbon, thus officially opening the new residence.

Teaching in China

Before the recent Asian monetary crisis, and the recent local ice storm, I was able to enjoy April to August teaching in China. As a first time visitor to Asia, I was impressed by the growth and possibilities in this sleeping giant. New banks, shopping centres and construction cranes seemed to arise overnight. I found the change dramatic. I wonder how an older peasant farmer must feel? Moreover, the return of Hong Kong, while great economically, had a few older people worried about the ability to retain traditional Chinese ways and values.

Being part of that change as a professor, and a link to Canada, was an honour and a privilege. Canada and Norman Bethune still generate warmth especially in the hearts of adult Chinese. As a Canadian, I felt very welcomed there, and I sensed from questions that many more students would enjoy studying here. However, the Canadian Embassy has followed an American lead in restricting student visas. For Switzerland, it takes three weeks with mostly acceptances, for a student visa. For Canada, it takes three months with many rejections (after a college accepts a student for a program). Canada has a great educational environment, staff, and country. We need to do more to promote educational entrepreneurship abroad, I think.

For me, this educational adventure with challenging new foods and living circumstances, attempting Mandarin, and being resourceful in unique teaching circumstances was valuable. However, being away without email for three months requires a patient partner, a supportive International Director, and fairly independent parents, sons and daughter which I am thankful for. By Chinese standards, where they are often apart from married partners for three to six years, this is easy. I have learned more patience. The students who demonstrated such joy in sharing friendship, sports, walks and personal conversations helped my lonely moments.

The students I taught from April to August in China were receiving credit towards first year in Business or Tourism/Hospitality at Centennial College. The subjects ranged from Master Student, English Conversation and Listening, and Writing, to International Business and Tourism. Some students in Beijing and Shanghai took this course in the evening after working for eight hours. One woman commuted two hours one way by train. These 20 to 30 year old people were confident and dynamic learners, and I developed friendships despite my fears that they would be shy and I would be awkward and strange. I enjoyed sharing Chinese meals such as Hot Pot, noodles, chicken (not Hong Kong style thank goodness) and Chinese pizza.

Travelling to Chongqing, Changhai and Beijing to teach gave me a glimpse of the diversity of people and cities. My impoverished Mandarin was filled with slang and regional words that were not very well understood. Further travels to the Forbidden City, the Great Wall, the giant Stone Buddha, the Bamboo Forest, Tian'anmen Square and the Summer Palace gave me another glimpse at people and cultural arts of the dynasties in a 5,000 year history.

I hope that Chinese and Canadian colleges can grow in partnership and understanding as these two large countries try to find their paths to some justice, meaningful employment and shared prosperity in changing economic times. "Red China Blues", a book by a young female Globe and Mail correspondent, offers some interesting insights. "Westerners (the foreign devils) Through Chinese Eyes" is another one offering some wit, humour and tears. I would be glad to discuss any insights and questions you might have.

I was pleased to be part of a college effort, and appreciate the advice of *Dan Corbett*, and the support of *Alice Welsh*, the union, and *Ron Kelly*, who told me to take a good pair of walking shoes. Thanks also to *Catherine Barr* who arranged a Vtel conference with visiting Chinese learners.

As of October 20, 1997, the new student computer lab on the second floor was up and running. The lab has 40 computers and two laser printers. It is open from 8am-9pm Monday to Thursday, 8am-4pm on Fridays and 10am-3pm on Saturdays. A computer lab supervisor works in the lab 8am-4pm Monday to Friday. The IBM computers are a combination of 486, DX66, Pentium 75 and Pentium 200MMX models. Available programs include Corel Suite 8 (Corel Word Perfect 8, Corel Quattro Pro 8, Corel Presentations 8, Envoy 7 Viewer and Corel Address Book 8); MS Office Pro 97 (MS Access, MS Excel, MS Word and MS Power Point); Visual Basic 5; Lotus 123/ 97; Netscape Navigator Gold 3.07; Internet Explorer 3.0; IBM Anti-Virus for Win 95; and Adobe Acrobat Reader 3.0. All computers have full Internet access and Windows 95 operating system. President of the Student Association Corinna Smith says, "We appreciated the generous donation of space from the library. It has been a great help to us." The grand opening was held on November 18th.


New Appointment as Director of Human Resources

MET, COLLEGES WORKING ON ACCOUNTABILITY FRAMEWORK

While the government is clearly committed to improving accountability for the public investment in education, the current funding formula rewards performance based on only one indicator: enrolment. Members of COP have agreed to work together on the development of three additional indicators: post-college outcomes, graduate satisfaction, and employer satisfaction.


MET and ACAATO have agreed to establish working groups to define the indicators and design collection instruments/procedures for the indicators so that colleges could begin collecting the data in 1998-99 and the results

could be used to distribute a portion of funding as early as 1999-2000.

St. Lawrence's VP Academic Jeanie Sawyer is chairing the graduate satisfaction working group. Marketing Director Greg Libitz is a member of the employer satisfaction working group.

The working groups have been meeting since December 1997. Each is expected to define the KPI, identify the data elements used to calculate the KPI, design an instrument to collect the data, develop an implementation plan, and recommend the basis on which college performance should be measured. Their work is expected to be completed by March 31, 1998.

AUDIT PASSED WITH FLYING COLOURS

The external quality audit took place at the Brockville Campus on Thursday, October 16 and at the Kingston Campus on Friday, October 17, 1997. The two auditors from KPMG Quality Registrar Inc. were Jonathan Steeves and Christopher A. Parra. Vice-President, Academic, Jeanie Sawyer, Director of the School of Human Studies, Sally Granger, and Total Quality Facilitator, Diane Lalonde, accompanied the two auditors during their visit. In Brockville, Marketing, Computerized Activities and the Quality System Management were audited. In Kingston, Training Procedures, Hiring/Work Placement/ Staffing, Program Review and Quality System Management (senior executive and management representative) were audited.

Jonathan Steeves stated, "The Quality Management System at St. Lawrence College continues to be effectively implemented. It's excellent; implemented as you intended. We continue to see commitment of both leaders and all staff interviewed. Overall, the system is in compliance."

Sawyer noted that she was very pleased and wanted to thank everyone who took part in the audit and for supporting the system. She particularly wanted to recognize Sally Granger and Diane Lalonde for their hard work and support.

The next audit is scheduled for April 2, 1998 in Cornwall and April 3, 1998 in Kingston.

TREVOR RAINEY GOES TO CAMP

Canadian Microelectronics Corp. (CMC) approached St. Lawrence College in January 1997 about an idea to run a bootcamp for newly hired graduates from electrical engineering programs across Canada. *Trevor Rainey*, Professor of Computer Engineering Technology, agreed to secondment to CMC where he and Tony Marsh did the research on a pilot program to be run in Ottawa. Rainey and Marsh worked on the curriculum design and made use of several very knowledgeable designers from Ottawa, Toronto and B.C.

The tough stage involved choosing the correct people from industry to offer workshops and case studies on every aspect of microchip design from marketing to manufacturing to packaging.

Rainey says, "We were able to get the services of 23 top designers and senior managers from a variety of companies from Ottawa, Toronto and Texas to come and speak every morning for two hours on an important practical aspect of microchip design."

Carleton graduate students did a prerun of designs used in projects and labs. They also helped out in labs to tutor participants on the use of the many computer simulation tools. The camp had 16 students for four weeks of inten-

sive training in July. Participants came from B.C., Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal.

"It was a miracle to have pulled if off in such a short time, and it was a huge success," says Rainey.

The day after it was over, Rainey took off to Prague and Ireland with Stuart Payne, Professor in the School of Human Studies (another story)!

St. Lawrence College ranked third this year, after Conestoga and Centennial. By event, Corinna Smith and Emma Smith placed fourth in the Retailing event; Tina Doyle and Mark Robinson placed fourth in Marketing Research; Ted Hodgins and Jane Lewis placed first in Direct Marketing; Amanda Covill and Shane Jenkins placed second in Entrepreneurship; Corinna Smith and Mark Robinson placed second in Sales Management; Corinna Smith placed second in Sales Presentation; Shane Jenkins tied for sixth in the Job Interview; and Emma Smith placed third in the Marketing Quiz Bowl.

OCMC '97 Chair of the event was Professor Kip Tuckwell. Coaches were Business professors Danielle Burke, Bill Crowe, Brian Hoobin, Bryan Rodney, Kip Tuckwell and Judith Wilson. Judges for these events were local practitioners working in marketing, finance, retail and business consulting.

Last year St. Lawrence placed an overall second after being first in 1994, 1993 and 1992 (there was no competition in 1995). Kingston Campus last hosted the competition in 1988 and our students came in first that year. The competition will be held at Durham

St. Lawrence Enrolment at All-time High

Enrolment at St. Lawrence College is at an all-time high, Vice-President, Academic, Jeanie Sawyer told the Board of Governors at the September Board meeting. The college is reporting fulltime enrolment of 5,329 students across its three campuses. She expects the increase to level out at approximately 7 per cent over last year. "We are extremely pleased with these results," Sawyer said. "They suggest that with the support of our community councils and our advisory committees, we are maintaining a good strategic fit between our curriculum and labour force demand."

Several programs have shown major growth over last year: Hotel and Restaurant Management in Brockville, Business Technology Information/ Communication Systems and Microcomputer Engineering Technology at Cornwall, and Graphic Design, Behavioural Science Technology and Business at Kingston. As well, the third year of the new Biotechnology program at Kingston is now underway, as are new programs in Fitness & Health Management, Motor Vehicle Techniques and Electromechanical/Mechanical Engineering Technology at Cornwall. The new Teacher Assistant program is also underway in Brockville. St. Lawrence College is one of Ontario's 25 Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology. Last year, the Ontario colleges enrolled 136,000 students in full-time, post-secondary programs in 200 communities across Ontario.

The Ministry of Education & Training has confirmed that St. Lawrence College has a full-time post-secondary enrolment growth of 4.1% in the Eastern Region this year. Enrolment statistics for all of the region indicate: Algonquin is down 2.5%, Durham up by 5.5%, La Cité up by 2.3%, Loyalist down by 4.2%, St. Lawrence up 4.1% and Sir Sandford Fleming down by 5.0%. College Registrar Rick Dunn passes on congratulations to all who worked hard to achieve such positive results.

Business Technology Program Increases First Year Enrolment

Professor *Bill Tennant* indicates that first year enrolment in the Business Technology-Information Communication Systems program is at an all-time high. In September of this year, 48 students registered for the program and there are 25 second year students and 30 third year students in the six semester program.

Tennant says that there are many contributing factors to the fact that students appear to be really enjoying the program. One positive component is the V-Tel session which is well-received by the students. He conducts a one hour class from Brockville on Mondays to launch the topic of the week and assign the project. He then meets with those same students later in the week in Cornwall for a face-to-face class. Tennant says that the students are gaining great experience because they are learning to operate the v-tel equipment and are performing technician duties.


Specially adapted communication courses, such as EK11 and EK 12 have been designed to meet the needs of corporate customers. Students are gaining the skills which they need to meet employers' demands, rather than studying the same communication course as the business student, for example.

Mitel Corporation has been involved with the Bus. Tech. Program since its inception. Cliff Knowles was a member of the original advisory committee and following his departure, Peter Sevigny became involved with the program. The program was transferred to Cornwall campus from Brockville in 1994 and Knowles has again become directly involved with the program. Since 1996, Knowles has been Chair of the program's advisory committee.

A number of years ago, Mitel donated a 2000 Light Telephone Switch which has been most beneficial for student use and learning. The switch allows students to develop switch board applications appropriate for hotels, motels, nursing homes etc. The Switch was transferred to Cornwall with the program so that students can continue to utilize the equipment.

Tennant indicates that they are excited about the possibility of offering a post-graduate semester to interested customers. He says the college has been approached but the final decision has not yet been made. Tennant is optimistic, though, and says that every student who completes "semester seven" will be employed.

The Business Technology program is good news for Cornwall. Many of the students are mature students who are getting the skills they need to contribute positively to the economy of the community.

"

In Fall 1998, the College expects to see implementation of the system come to fruition.


Three wins in three consecutive years is a record that Tom can be very proud of.

Technology Consortium Receives Industry Canada Support

On October 15, 1997, Peter Milliken, Member of Parliament for Kingston & The Islands, announced a contribution of \$500,000 to help prepare youth to work in the information and technology sectors operating in Eastern Ontario.

The funding will support a study and pilot program to be headed by Advantage Kingston! and a partnership of educational institutions through the Advanced Technology Education Consortium (@TEC). Advantage Kingston! is an incorporated, non-for-profit community-based organization with a mandate to assist Kingston's adjustment to government and private sector downsizing.

"This program brings together government, educational institutions and the private sector, all of whom have a role to play in creating opportunity for young Canadians," said Mr. Milliken. "I am pleased, that through Industry



Canada initiatives, the Government is helping Canadians in the Kingston region to develop the skills they need to fill the gap in the growing advanced technology market."

The pilot program and the initial startup of the initiative will involve Advantage Kingston!, St. Lawrence College, Queen's University, the Royal Military College and the Canadian Forces School of Communications and Electronics, as well as private sector partners. Kingston is a prime location for this initiative not just because of advanced technology opportunity in the region, but also for its strength as an educational centre.

"This is an important event in the history of post-secondary education in Kingston," said President Dan Corbett. "It is the first time we have worked together on the curriculum side on a project of this magnitude. It is entirely appropriate, given the importance of the high technology sector to Canada's future competitiveness. We look forward to increasing our connectivity and making a positive contribution to the economic development of the region through the Advanced Technology Education Consortium."

Advanced technology job vacancies in the Eastern Ontario region alone are estimated at between 4,000 and 6,000 with high-tech growth estimated to be 20% per year.

Top 12 Resume Turn Offs

Listed below are the top 12 resume turn offs.

Although grammar and spelling mistakes are without a doubt the number one problem, the remaining issues are in no particular order. The results are based on a survey of 120 Manpower Recruiters, Managers and Regional Managers along with a number of clients in the Human Resources' profession:

- 1) Grammar and spelling mistakes.
- 2) Misspelling the recruiter's name.
- 3) Resumes with pictures of the person.
- 4) Stains and wrinkles.
- Information that is legally out-dated (i.e., age, sex, religion, number of children, marital status).
- 6) Funny gimmicks to attract attention (i.e., funny cover letters, food samples, scented paper, brightly coloured paper).
- 7) Wrong address.
- 8) Hand written cover letter.
- Second page of resume without phone number and name (this is especially true when faxing).
- 10) Out-dated and unnecessary information (i.e., won top sales representative award 20 years ago; won track and field award in grade 10).
- 11) Resumes that do not clearly state the name of company the dates of employment and the position in chronological order.
- 12) More than three pages (no matter how many years experience).
