We both strain our necks out the right window of the cab until the magic number of 4120 St. Urbain appears. A knock on the door brings a friendly smile and a warm greeting

Dwight is a 1977 graduate of the Visual & Creative Arts program in Cornwall. He is a native of Huntingdon and is now an artist living in Montreal. He lives in a comfortable,

modest, tidy, street level apartment with a small back court yard filled with vegetables. He shares his apartment with his cat "Raton". It's what I expected.

The Montreal Expos in particular. There's another unusual aspect to his "Baseball Watercolours". The baseball players portrayed in his work have no heads! His most famous headless artwork is the painting of number 44 of the Los Angeles Dodgers, "Darryl Strawberry". His latest work is a line-up of all the major league teams, again, with no heads.

"I'm not painting the people I'm selling an artistic approach," explains Baird. His approach is carving out a successful niche in the artistic field. "Sport" art is very popular in the United States and is now becoming better known in Canada. He has gained a fair bit of publicity and notoriety in the baseball arena. His work was featured in the 1992 All Star program. He now has completed 45 pieces for his baseball collection. He has shown his baseball collection several times in Montreal and plans to take his work to Spring training in West Palm Beach, Florida this year. And as Dwight says, "Anybody who has anything to do with baseball is in West Palm Beach in the Spring."

Baseball is not the only theme Dwight Baird has developed over the 15 years he

has been painting. The landscape of the land and the faces of the people of Newfoundland have been captured in vivid detail. As well, the sights and sounds of a carnival come to life in several watercolours.

"The art is only one part of being a successful artist," says Baird. I could paint all day, every day and if I didn't sell anything I wouldn't be successful."

The business side of being an artist is something Dwight has learned well. Not only does he sell the original paintings but he also sells postcards and posters of much of his work.

"The cards and the posters provide a regular flow of money to sustain my business," says Baird. "The original paintings provide some additional money for expanding my work."

Dwight says the business side took about 50 percent of his time. Now he has an agent who takes care of most of the business needs. Because of the detailed nature of his work it takes about a year and a half to develop enough material for an exhibit. The baseball collection took two and a half years to develop. Dwight's exhibits are an event. He wants people to remember his shows and incorporates lighting and music to provide a "whole concept".

Dwight says originality is the key to success in the art world. "Tve always painted things that most people don't," says Baird. Dwight Baird's originality stems from his training at St. Lawrence College. He says it was the encouragement of his teachers that made a difference for him. In particular, he remembers Robin Wall from St. Lawrence and his high school art teacher. He found out about the St. Lawrence art program when his high school art class visited the college.

It's difficult to find words that describe the beauty of Dwight Baird's work. Never before have I seen water-colours that describe in such fine detail the subject matter. His work is very focused. In particular the baseball collection (without heads) takes your eye to every shadow of light, every crinkle of the jerseys, every shade of the colour,



Dwight's advice to aspiring artists is "stick with it." "It's not easy establishing yourself in the art community and making money," explains Baird. "Life is full of setting priorities. My priorities are my painting and enjoying life. These are still lean years for me. But I don't have to make \$50,000. a year to enjoy what I do. I consider myself very fortunate. I travel a lot. I paint exactly what I want." and every crisp letter. Dwight's business sense is astounding! He knows how to sell - his work - himself. The combination of his artistic talent and his sound business skills is something original in itself.

Over the next 18 years, Ray would move up from Computer Analyst to Project Manager and eventually achieve the position of General Manager and Chief Operating Officer of Indal's Computer Services Division.

"In 1989 I was becoming restless and was looking for a change when the opportunity of joining Noranda came along. 
Throughout the weekend, a multi media memorabilia display illustrating the history of the campus, alumni and staff was open in the gymnasium. The display, produced by Jack

The next 25 years...



Gazing into a crystal ball is dangerous in these times of rapid change, but planning for the future is something that seems to come naturally to Dan Corbett, the newly appointed President of St. Lawrence College.

It is Corbett's experience with corporate strategic planning that best prepares him for his new role in focusing the strengths of St. Lawrence College. Yet his vision goes beyond the walls of the College.

"The forces and issues that will drive the direction of our College over the next few years are: one, that education is very much in the forefront of the public agenda, and it's being questioned as never before. Education is in the forefront of the corporate agenda as well," said Corbett. "And it all gets back to the whole issue of competitiveness and of building the country's prosperity. Our prosperity depends on our ability to educate and train our human resources for a world-wide marketplace. Over the last year or two the entire education system has been "bashed". The private sector, corporate sector and some levels of government have stated that education is not meeting the needs. What I see happening at St. Lawrence is that we are going to become much more needs focused. Not that we haven't been in the past. But I think the issue is now becoming very clear in the sense of how to educate and how to develop skills, so that we are meeting the national mandate of competitiveness and prosperity on a world-class basis."

The second issue is wrapped around the words, 'economic restructuring'. We are not in a recession; we are in a major economic restructuring. This has caused a lot of social and economic upheaval. What you're seeing is a lot of people realizing that the career they had is no longer there... the company has disappeared. Or, the company is still there but the person's job or function has changed dramatically and his or her skills are no longer relevant to what it is he or she needs to do. In the last couple of years we have seen a lot of people coming into the college system. And, they are coming back to build a better future for themselves. In some cases they are coming for skills updating. In some cases they are coming to acquire new skills. Today, I sat in the cafeteria and talked with a lady who is 49 years old and she is learning all about computers because the job she had disappeared. Her skill is outdated but her ability to learn is not."

"Number three has to do with the whole integration of the College within the community. I think the colleges have a very clear and different mandate from the universities. We are much more career-based and more specific, more focused on what the needs of the community are. I think one of the big myths which is being dispelled, as our colleges come of age, is that you are not getting a second rate education by coming to college. You're getting a first class education by coming to college. You are acquiring skills by coming to college, skills which are desperately needed within the community structure. I think we need to get out

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there and say, the colleges are here and can respond to meet the needs of the private or public sector."

Dan Corbett firmly believes that a college, "properly focused and well represented" can deliver the kind of educa"There's been a lot of talk about integration and partnerships but we need to just go out and do it!" said Corbett. And Dan Corbett will be actively forging partnerships with community groups, government leaders, and corporate representatives. He does say, however,

That's not where the funding mechanism is," said Corbett. "Yet through the basic funding mechanism, over the years, we have developed infrastructure and expertise. So working with private industry and using private fund-

tion and training that will help build the prosperity of the region and the nation.

He suggests, however, that most of the people who are making the decisions are not from the college system. Therefore, often, the colleges are not considered in the economic planning of the community. What Corbett repeats, is the need to tell the communities that the colleges are one of the key instruments to better competitiveness and prosperty.

The new president recognizes, though, hat there's always room for improvement. At St. Lawrence, Corbett has inroduced this year, a process to better ocus the college's resources.

In our strategic planning we will be sking ourselves some very fundamenal questions. How customer focused re we? Defining our customer base is critical issue. Are the processes and tructures we have at St. Lawrence proprly focused? How tied in and interated are we with the economic develpment plans within our community? low closely are we working with the conomic development groups? Are we nticipative enough?" These are quesons and statements Corbett is asking nd saying to all units within the colge. These questions return to Dan orbett's third issue of integration with e community and the establishment "real" partnerships.

that we first need to ensure we know what the needs are of our partners. That's why, through the marketing research unit of St. Lawrence, an aggressive surveying process has begun to clarify community needs.

Dan Corbett defines "real partnership"

as being more than the College being a supplier of education, or skilled graduates, and the employer being a receiver of skilled employees.

"Partnership is value," explains Corbett. "There's value on both sides of the equation. We as a College need to

come to business and industry with a package or program of training that anticipates their future needs rather than one that reacts to current employment situations."

The issue of funding is crucial yet complex for the College. Corbett suggests that the college can deliver quality programs in the traditional format to the traditional secondary school graduate within the confines of the current provincial funding mechanism. However, it becomes more challenging when trying to customize training for business and industry. ing together, we'll accomplish a better means of customizing our training."

"What we need to do as a college is to start to focus on our strengths, our uniqueness and start to build on them," concludes Corbett. Focus and quality... two words that Dan Corbett uses a lot.



He is also quoted as saying that he will be "walking the talk". He is committed to the notion of anticipating the educational needs of the College's customers. He is a good listener.

Somebody famous said, "The true indication of a leader is someone with a point of view." Dan Corbett, the newly appointed President of St. Lawrence College, has many views, not only on the future of St. Lawrence but many insightful thoughts about the whole educational system.

This was more

My muscles were aching with every stroke of the paddle. Gananoque was about 30 minutes behind us. The pain was real but obscured in my mind as I focused on the unison dip and pull of 8 paddles pushing the canoe through the swells. The sights, along with the sounds of the water swirling to the top of the gunwales and the call of the stem-person, "one, two, three-SHIFT" transposed me to a time long-ago of hardy voyageurs exploring the St. Lawrence River in huge freight canoes filled with furs and foodstuffs.

I came back to reality quickly with a splash of cold St. Lawrence water in my face. The time was the week prior to Canada Day 1992 and the dream is still vivid in my mind. About 20 St. Lawrence College students, staff and alumni climbed into 26 foot Voyageur canoes and launched from Confederation Basin in Kingston on a five-day expedition to Cornwall. Dignitaries, friends, family members, and well-wishers lined the stony shore to cheer and wave as the canoes disappeared around the Fort Henry point.

Over the five days more than 40 would have a turn paddling between the islands as we wove our way through 110 miles of sometimes calm... sometimes turbulent water.

Frank Lockington was the chief organizer of the expedition. And what a lot of organization it took to make sure the event was a success. Frank and I are both Alumni of St. Lawrence, (and proud of it!) and work in the Marketing Services department of the college. We had spent the better part of four months getting sponsors, supplies, tenting sites, etc. and setting up media coverage.



Steve Winters, a professor in the Math and Science Department was also a great help. Steve's experience with the big canoes and working with large crews helped to reassure us that the expedition was possible.

The news media were exceptional, with their support, as well as were businesses and individuals from the Brockville, Cornwall and Kingston region.

Our first stop was a St. Lawrence Parks Commission site near Ivy Lea. The first leg of the journey was the longest. We covered about 25 miles with a couple of rest stops and lunch in a picturesque bay. During the day the sun was hot, the air was cool on the water and we made good time in spite of the brief interruption of the storm. That night the "Voyageurs" dined on sirloin steak—not the typical fare of voyageurs of the past. It was an early night for most as the day's exercise had taken its toll on the adventuresome bunch.

The second day we headed for Brockville. The rest stops were more frequent and we enjoyed the scenery as we pushed through the heart of the 1000 islands. Many boaters and people on the shore waved a welcome and shouted encouragements. Each canoe crew, in turn, provided a loud and boisterous salute with paddles raised in the air. The camaraderie was beginning to build. We were having fun and experiencing an adventure of a lifetime! To our knowledge nobody else had tried this. We were talking to reporters (on the cell-phones) from radio stations and newspapers as we progressed down the river. My fellow "Voyageurs" were chastising me, (in fun), for spending too much time on the phone and not enough time paddling. Our expedition was unique in more ways than having cellular phones in canoes. Not often had staff, students and alumni of the three campuses of St. Lawrence College gathered together. Not often had the businesses and organizations of the communities co-

sponsored an event of this type. Not often had a decree from the mayor of Kingston been sent by canoe to the mayors of Brockville and Cornwall. And, not often had voyageurs barbecued Italian sausage and chicken breasts in the Brockville St. Lawrence Park.

The next morning we paddled to a special ceremony on the river-front of Brockville. Mayor John Doran welcomed us to Brockville and to the city's Riverfest celebrations. With a turn of the canoes, a dip of the paddles and a push of the wind we were off to Prescott. (Fortunately the wind was at our back throughout the voyage.)

The third day we travelled further than we had planned. We made it to Cardinal. Rather than loading the 500 pound canoes on the trailer and returning to the Prescott camping site with the canoes we convinced a local marina owner to take care of them over night. We all scrambled into the college bus and returned to Grenville Park.

Rain greeted us the morning of the fourth day as we departed from Cardinal. The mood of the voyageurs had changed. The rain, along with the warning we were given that we would be paddling through some swift water from now on, meant a feeling of apprehension for some and a feeling of fear for others. Those of us who were less experienced paddlers were given the option of staying with the road crew.

But most wanted to take part in this more adventurous part of our journey. The mood shifted back to one of joy, freedom and peace, as the sun broke through the grey morning sky. The stroke was easier now with a strong breeze blowing us into McLaren Park just west of Cornwall. That night we were treated to a feast of barbecued shish ka bob, chicken, fresh strawberries, liqueurs, wine and beer. We sang songs around the campfire celebrating that we had completed the majority of our trip. There was a short paddle in the morning to a point where we pulled the canoes from the water and portaged to a site just a few metres west of our final landing point - the shoreline beside the Civic Centre in Cornwall.

We put the canoes back into the water with 10 Voyageurs in each boat. Everyone wanted to be part of the landing in Cornwall. Each boat surged through the water with a force not felt before even for the experienced canoeists among us. Each of us stroked with all our might. We turned to corner of the point that was blocking our view of the final landing point. To our surprise there was a huge crowd waiting for us. Then the fireworks started to salute our arrival. The scene was unforgettable! Motor boats escorted us in, tooting their horns. As the smoke from the fireworks drifted to the water it enveloped us and for a few seconds we lost sight of our landing. "Frank we better turn back they're shooting at us," I joked. Just for a second my mind drifted back, once again, to how it might have been for those Voyageurs of long ago.

It was Canada Day and the people in Cornwall know how to celebrate our nation's birthday. There was a huge crowd on the lawn in front of a bandshell right on the shoreline. Canadian flags were everywhere even in the sky. Rockets that launched with a thunderous bang took Canada flags high in the sky to float gently down with parachutes. There was a carnival atmosphere with rides, popcorn, hot-dogs and lots of people of all ages enjoying the sights and sounds of this birthday party.

The Voyageur Expedition was over. We landed safely. We were treated to another feast and a warm welcome from the citizens of Cornwall. Truly the St. Lawrence College Voyageur Expedition was an example of just what can be accomplished when people from different communities with different attitudes, and different backgrounds have a common goal to achieve. It was a testament to the fact that Canadians can put their differences behind them to work for a common good.


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PREMIER'S AWARDS

Post Diploma Educational Opportunities

St. Lawrence College has been advised by Ryerson', School of Business Management, Faculty of Business, of their program which provides for a completion of a business degree for graduates of community colleges. Under the program, "graduates from a three year business diploma program who have a minimum grade point average of "B" will be eligible to apply for direct entry into the third year of Ryerson's four year Bachelor of Business Management Degree program."

Alumni interested in this opportunity can obtain a copy of the letter which outlines the details from Ryerson, by contacting the Alumni Development Office at St. Lawrence.

A project to "re-shape post-secondary nursing education in southeastern Ontario" has been initiated by Queen's University and supported by St. Lawrence, Loyalist and Fleming Colleges. The intent of the project is to develop a post RN baccalaureate program at Queen's that will complement the diploma programs in the three colleges.

This will allow St. Lawrence graduates to proceed to a baccalaureate degree in Nursing at a local university in less time than currently possible; will provide for easier transferability of credits and will eliminate costly duplication in basic nursing education. Program Heads and faculty from the four educational institutions will be meeting over the next eight months to develop a framework and address the complexities of designing a compatible and feasible post RN program.

Here at St. Lawrence, the Alumni and Development Office, together with two students from the Business Administration - Marketing program at conducting a study to examine the interest in continuing education opportunities for alumni. The project will also help to establish alternative methods for distributing St. Lawrence's part-time studies information.

STUDENTS INVOLVED IN SHUTTLE EXPERIMENT

On October 24, Civil Engineering Technology students at St. Lawrence College, celebrating its 25th anniversary, performed the experiment at the front entrance of the College.

The recent space shuttle mission included an experiment involving Civil Engineering students from St. Lawrence College.

While on board, Canadian astronaut Dr. Steve MacLean conducted research in space technology, space science, materials processing and life sciences on behalf of researchers across Canada.

Dr. MacLean also used some of his free time to perform a physics experiment entitled "Spin the Astronaut" developed by students at Kingston Collegiate & Vocational Institute and St. Lawrence College in Kingston under the direction of Professor Angus Ross of the Engineering Technology Department.

"Spin the Astronaut" is a demonstration of the law of conservation of angular momentum and was performed to determine Dr. MacLean's moment of inertia. Moment of inertia can be thought of as the resistance to motion, or the amount of work it takes to get a mass in motion. This is a basic principle of physics.

These physical laws are more easily shown in space than on Earth and prove that physical laws remain true in both environments.

William Shepard, a fellow crew member, set Dr. MacLean spinning. Dr. with arms drawn in and then repeated the whole process holding food canisters of known mass. A third variation involved Dr. MacLean spinning and kicking his legs out in the middle of the spin.

How did "Spin the Astronaut" get off the ground? Professor Ross and Dr. MacLean are personal friends and have known each other for ten years. Over the years they have discussed ways to encourage Canada's youth to become interested in science and technology.

Ross said, "We both felt high school and college students would be interested in developing an experiment."

When Dr. MacLean was selected for the flight, he offered to work with Professor Ross, provided he got permission to develop a student experiment. He also invited Ross to attend the lift-off of the Columbia. K.C.V.I., celebrating its 200th anniversary, was approached. Mr. Yelda Miedema, Head of Science and Ms Elizabeth Turcke, a science teacher at K.C.V.I. worked on the experiment last spring with a group of their students. They have a videotape of the experiment.

Dr. MacLean will be coming to Kingston in January 1993. He will be showing St. Lawrence College students a videotape from space, students will then be able to record the astronaut's rates of spin and using known measurements such as Dr. MacLean's height, arm length and mass, can calculate his moment of inertia.

Other experiment participants: Andy Orr/third-year Civil Engineering; John Hamilton/first-year Civil Engineering, and Craig Howland/first-year Civil Engineering.

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


