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Job Connect is a programme designed to serve the needs of both unemployed youth aged 16 to 24 and employers in Eastern Ontario. The goal of the service is to help individuals gain the skills and knowledge they need to find and keep jobs and to provide human resource expertise for employers who have work to be undertaken. It is delivered through a partnership of community agencies and St. Lawrence College.

There are three components: an Information and Referral Service for individuals to gather information on careers and occupations, the local job market, training opportunities and job search strategies; an Employment Planning and Preparation component to help individuals clarify their employment needs, establish short and long term goals and develop an action plan and prepare for employment and a Job Placement service for those who may need a bit more help finding work and developing skills relevant to their specific career goals. Participants in this last component are matched with employers looking for workers and they may benefit from a training subsidy.

The partners in this initiative have worked with hundreds of employers and have assisted literally thousands of young people to find work in our region. If you are between 16 and 24, out of school and out of work, find out more at the Employment & Education Centre of Cornwall & District (E.E.R.C.), the Youth Employment Assistance Headquarters (YEAH) in Brockville or at KEYS, Kingston Employment and Youth Services. Employers should contact the Job Connect offices of St. Lawrence College in either Brockville or Kingston, or the E.E.R.C. in Cornwall.


So enjoy the beautiful fall weather, and we hope that you'll enjoy Voyageur as well. As always, your comments are welcome, and we look forward to hearing from you.

Joe Jordan

Business Administration - Marketing '83 Member of Parliament for Leeds & Grenville



Joe Jordan was
destined to be
a politician.
Next to Joe's picture
in his grade eight
yearbook is the caption,
"Most Likely to
Become Prime
Minister."
As the Liberal MP for
Leeds & Grenville,
he's certainly headed
in the right direction.

Jordan enrolled in the accelerated Busi ness Administration program at the Brockville campus, completing three years of material in two years of study. "We were a summer intake," explains Jordan, "and I think that Glen Mackey and Alan Jones taught us every single course. Our class really bonded well, and I still stay in touch with many of them."

While studying at St. Lawrence, Jordan was an active participant in student life activities, and represented the campus as a member of four different varsity sports teams; golf, soccer, curling, and basketball. "I am a huge supporter of extracurricular activities. It's an important component in the learning process, and a big part of the student experience."

Following graduation, Jordan continued his studies at Clarkson University in Potsdam, New York, where he took an undergraduate equivalency, and then went on to earn a Masters of Business Administration in 1985. He then returned to teach Business at St. Lawrence, where he was also involved in a number of special assignments, including a secondment to the Ministry of Education to perform an Operational Review of the College, and international education projects in Ethiopia and Hungary.


"Working in Hungary was a very rewarding experience," says Jordan. "We set up one of the first post-communist programs, and did it in such as way so that even after we left, it continued to grow. The program has since expanded to three countries, and has really helped the resident institution to develop. It's a great example of an international education program that worked."

Jordan attributes his eventual move into politics to "pure genetics." "I am a third generation politician," he explains, "and it was something that I always wanted to do. As a kid, our whole family always knew what to do in an election. I can remember licking hundreds of envelopes. In those days being a Liberal politician in this area was kind of like being a Leafs fan: You hope and you hope, but you ain't got a hope."

When his father Jim, the MP from '88 - '97, decided to retire, Joe decided to take advantage of the opportunity and give it a shot. The election was a success, and Jordan now represents his riding in the House of Commons, sits on four committees, and works hard for the people in his constituency. With such a broad range of responsibilities, Jordan has made a conscious effort to stay focused. "My primary duty is make sure my constituents are well served by the various ministries of the Federal Government, but I also felt early on that it was important to focus on some narrow but very important issues. I tend to take a big interest in the environment. It is a critical issue that, as Canadians, we will have to come to terms with in the next twenty years. Our challenge will be to successfully align the interests of the environment and economics."

Jordan cites St. Lawrence as a key factor in his current success. "If I can get a film projector out of Jack Tennant (the Educational Media coordinator at Brockville)," he says jokingly, "then I can deal with anyone; separatists, foreign dictators - anyone! Seriously though, St. Lawrence provides a tremendous learning environment. I witnessed first hand, both as a student and a teacher, that anyone who is truly mo-



André Scheinman

Restoration Technology '81 Heritage Preservation Consultant



André Scheinman has found his niche.

In a region of Ontario known for its Lhistorical significance, Andre Scheinman makes a living from making old buildings well, old again. André is a Heritage Preservation Consultant and credits a unique program once offered at the College's Brockville campus with helping him to take his personal interests in history, energy conservation and architecture and redirecting them toward a rewarding professional career.

As a Heritage Preservation Consultant André, offers a range of professional services including architectural/ historical research; site investigation; condition assessment; recording; restoration planning; development of drawings and specifications and site reviews.

I recently had the opportunity to

meet with André over lunch in historic downtown Kingston. A warm, late summer afternoon found us on the patio of the Kingston Brewing Company. André described to me his background and spoke passionately about the importance of preserving the cultural architecture in our region.

André grew up in Toronto and from an early age displayed an interest in the arts.

"I believed I was going to be a writer", says André. "In high school, I focused on poetry and writing. I was even published as part of an anthology."

He studied at the University of Toronto and took a personal interest in environmental issues. Soon after leaving the UofT, André began teaching and found himself leading an environmental education program in Kingston, sponsored by the federal government.

"This was in the early 1970's," explains André. "It was a time when the energy crisis was on everyone's mind." "Energy conservation in buildings was important and I began looking around at universities and colleges for courses to learn more about the field."

At that time, St. Lawrence's Civil Engineering Department, together with the federal government were offering a three year program entitled Restoration Technology. With his education from the UofT and some independent study in math and science offered by St. Lawrence professor, Paul VanNest in Kingston, André covered the program in just two years.

"We were an interesting group of people in the program," says André. "There were architects, contractors, engineers and students directly out of high school studying together. "Through my business today, I am in contact with many of my classmates who work in this field. I still work on projects with a Brockville engineer who was a professor of mine at the time."

André found work in his field immediately after graduating in 1981 with the Heritage Foundation and over a ten year period, worked his way back to Toronto with the Ministry of Culture. He also spent three years working on a Master Plan for Fort York for a Toronto based architectural firm but, eventually came back to Kingston where he started his own consulting business in 1989.

Sitting on the patio listening to André trace his career, I couldn't help but notice that others around us had an interest in speaking with him as well. Architects, contractors, and clients, walking down Clarence St. or sitting at a nearby table each wanted an opinion from André about a particular project they were undertaking. "Do you have a few minutes"..... "Could you give me a call....." Even the Deacon from a nearby Cathedral asks for quick drop in before 2pm to see about some aspect of his Church's structure.

Well respected in his field, André has had a hand in shaping the restoration of many of Kingston's historic landmarks. Within a block of our lunch location stood Kingston City Hall, the Old Post Office, The Old Whig Standard Building and, St. George's Cathedral. In each case, André had played a role in helping to restore the structures, thereby maintaining the historical uniqueness that defines Kingston.

Although André works with private building owners, the majority of his work is with institutions such as public buildings, churches, museums and national historic sites.



So you graduated last year and haven't saved a dime. Or maybe you graduated five years ago and now have lifetime savings of fifty cents. I know you've got lots of company. You're busy shaping a career and raising a family. How could you possibly save money with car and house payments and that haunting credit card bill that heats up your mailbox every month.

Bruce Tessier knows you. You've been in his office or at one of his booths at a trade show. He's heard you say that you'd like to have a savings and investment plan. He's heard you say you don't know where the money goes. He knows your car broke down and you repaired it at great expense, or worse, bought a new one with leather and a sun roof. Now you're breaking down under the payments!

Bruce is a financial planner. In fact he's certified and has been since 1992. The certification came after a lengthy preparation process. And he continues today. By Bruce's own description he worked harder than the typical guy in his day. He had to in order to reach his goals. The results are substantial and the work habits he developed at St Lawrence are fundamental to the business he now runs. The financial services industry requires Bruce to continually upgrade. Since achieving the Certified Financial Planner designation in 1992 Bruce has acquired a securities license, a branch manager's license to handle mutual funds and is within reach of a goal to obtain a branch manager's license for securities.

Goal setting is fun for Bruce. It comes naturally to him. And he gravitated to an industry that expects it. When Bruce led the team at Investor's Group the company asked him to set ten goals, financial and personal. Bruce reports that some of them were relatively minor but he also had big ones. And he's been achieving them at pace. The most deeply personal was to raise two kids and give them a great start in life with his growing financial independence. He and Joanne now have two happy little girls, Chelsea and Keisha. Their lives are filled with the fun that comes from having a comfortable new home with river view and swimming pool and parents that take the time to involve them in skating, dancing and travel.

Independence is a theme that runs through Bruce's goals. As a student Bruce experimented with entrepreneurial activity. One of his summer jobs was built on a loan scheme that The Royal Bank made available to students who wanted to learn how to run a business. A vegetable market didn't make him rich but he learned a lot from this experience. During the school year Bruce developed a relationship with an auctioneer. With his well worn Chevy pick up truck Bruce became the delivery guy of choice for the buyers who needed to get their prize piece of furniture home

from the Tuesday night event. Often making a dozen deliveries he'd finish at one in the morning and appear for morning classes on Wednesday.

Well taught courses provided a solid foundation for Bruce's career in business. Like all of us he has some special memories. Ken Wingert taught a much loved course in finance. Bruce found Ken's courses fascinating. He likes the analysis side of accounting best and it is the basis for the investment business that he now operates under the Berkshire Securities banner. Law was also an interest for Bruce. Enough that the course taught by Cornwall lawyer, John McDonald, led him to briefly consider pursuing that as a career. Now Bruce is a client of John's and an occasional golf partner at the Cornwall Golf and Country Club.

Comfortable enough to be enjoying his life with Joanne and the kids, Bruce also contributes to his community, both financially and with his personal time. He has held a number of positions with the Heart and Stroke Foundation and was recently President of the Cornwall Chapter.

1983 seems like a long time ago in some ways. Since starting out after graduation with the Menard construction and building supplies firm, Bruce has shaped a financial management career that had its roots in the accounting program at St Lawrence. Now he can see achieving a goal of financial independence by the age of fifty. And what about you fellow alumnus/alumna? Yes, we mentioned you in the opening paragraphs. Have you met with a financial advisor that can help you formulate financial goals and set you on the road to achieving them? Hey, you're a St Lawrence College graduate. Province Creates 1,097 New Spaces for Post-Secondary Students in Kingston

\$16.8 Million SuperBuild Grant



On May 25, Dianne Cunningham, Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities, announced the creation of an extra 1,097 spaces for post-secondary students at the Kingston campus through an investment of \$16.8 million through her government's SuperBuild fund. Cunningham's office confirmed that St. Lawrence College won the third biggest cheque of 14 provincial colleges in the second stage of SuperBuild funding.

The provincial money will allow the College to build a 9,000 square-metre building adjacent to the existing buildings. It will also fund the completion of a science lab in the Veterinary Technology Program area that began three years ago as well as enlarge and renovate the learning resource centre. The price tag is \$20.6 million. The College will be looking to the private sector through fundraising and partnerships to finance the remainder not covered by the government's investment.

Blayne Mackey has been named the SuperBuild Project Manager. The new position has been created to ensure that the new SuperBuild project is completed on time and on budget. Mackey will be responsible for the design specifications, the selection of architects and the general contractor, the ongoing liaison with the project builders, and the negotiations with the ancillary services to be provided in the new space.

Mackey, formerly Vice-President of Administration and Human Resources, said that over the years facilities have been so tight that administrators have had to constantly tear down walls and build new ones to accommodate the changing demands of the campus. "Too many students have been crammed into too little space because we haven't added any new academic space in Kingston in 30 years," he went on to say. "The very meeting room in which the news conference took place



Blayne Mackey, Project Manger, SuperBuild


housed the student pub only five years ago and the main building cafeteria sits in a hallway, which is impassable during peak hours."

The project will allow the College to not only address overcrowding, but will increase operational efficiency. The new addition is expected to be ready for the fall term of 2003.

tivated to learn, can learn. SLC has

literally turned people's lives around,



and that's a compliment to the staff and faculty here. I will always consider St. Lawrence to be part of my family."

As of September 1, Joe assumed an additional responsibility as the Parliamentary Secretary to the Prime Minister. His duties in this role will include

acting as a liaison with other caucus members, assisting with Question Period strategy, as well as representing the Prime Minister at various functions.

As Jordan begins to prepare for the next federal election, he recognizes the important place St. Lawrence will have in the future of this region. "Personally, I am a supporter of the college system,

and a champion of St. Lawrence College," he says. "One of the challenges that this country faces is making sure that we have a highly skilled workforce. Globalization is putting more pressure on us to deliver that input. It's also time that Canada recognizes the need for a national post-secondary education system. We need to create a Federal Minister of Education, and develop a national strategy. The education system needs to be recognized for the value it contributes to our society."

Clearly Joe Jordan is someone who enjoys his job. "I am a political junkie", he says. I love the politics of politics. Sure, there are lots of long days, but it's very exciting to be in on the action. I feel like a kid who has a free ticket to the circus." Who knows, perhaps Joe's year-book will be right after all.

We're on the grow!

Blayne Mackey is the project manager for our new building and retrofit of existing space. Blayne leaves his position of Vice-president, Administration & Human Resources to take on what most of us see as an enviable task. However, there is a great deal of work to make this dream a reality for the anticipated "double cohort" that will arrive on campus in Fall 2003. The architect has been chosen and the many teams of stakeholders are being formed to provide input to the project. Of course each of us has our own priorities, so careful management of the project requires the skills Blayne brings from his engineering background and his former position as Director, Physical Resources.

Needless to say the money does not come without some accountability. The Academic Division is focused on projecting program expansion, new program development and staffing needs. The College is anticipating more than one thousand additional students over the next five years. Much of this growth is expected on the Kingston campus. Our current full time student enrollment is approximately 3800 students and we anticipate this will grow by another one thousand students. The bulge will be in 2003/04. This is the time of the arrival of two graduating classes from Ontario secondary schools. Secondary school reform introduced to high schools in Fall 1999 will see the first graduates from its four year curriculum in 2003.

We have renewed our working re-

lationship with the Limestone District School Board and the Algonquin and Lakeshore District Catholic School Board to develop new linkage agreements and to keep our faculty and their teachers informed about the changes that are taking place with curricular reform. In March a teacher from the Limestone Board delivered a workshop on secondary school reform for college faculty and staff. St. Lawrence faculty have and will continue to host teachers and students from the elementary and secondary panels on the Kingston campus to provide workshops on science curriculum. Our new science labs and our program strength in this area provide an opportunity for students and staff to explore careers in science.

WE'RE MEETING WORK FORCE DEMANDS!

The ability to predict the future would be a wonderful asset as we work to create the programs that employers need to meet the skills of today's work force. Our Program Advisory Committees continue to provide us with invaluable input as we go through our annual program reviews and plan for new programs. Our stretched resources and increasing demands make this a delicate balancing act. Over the past two years we have made a number of changes to the program mix in Kingston. Thought you would be interested in a brief update.

The School of Business has responded to the demand for skilled workers in the field of technology. The former Business Information Systems Program has now been revamped. We have two new programs -- the two year Computer Networking & Technical Support Program and the three year Computer Programmer Analyst Program. We've updated the labs to keep these environ-





ments current with technology developments. Students report that the program is demanding but the success of this spring's job fair clearly indicates they are very much in demand.

Not to be outdone, the faculty in our Advertising & Public Relations Program and Business - Marketing worked to develop a new three year Integrated Marketing Communications Program. This program builds on the two year APR Program and brings with it a state-of-the-art MacIntosh Computer Lab. The programs are meeting the industry standards for the integration of technology into the world of advertising, public relations and marketing.

In response to our thriving tourism based economy, the Kingston campus is now delivering the **Hotel & Restaurant Management Program.** Community partners are working with us to provide the resources for our students for their on the job training. The Co-op program is designed for students who wants to further strengthen their experience in the service industry.

The predicted shortage of law enforcement officers due to retirement has created a demand for the new Police Foundations Program. An important part of this program is its emphasis on wellness and physical fitness. We've made upgrades to our gym facilities with the support of our Student Association. The emphasis on community policing enables our students to work on special projects with local police forces who provide us with invaluable support.

In response to the new entry to practice requirements for nurses in 2005,

Queen's University and St. Lawrence College are working together to develop an undergraduate program in nursing that will lead to the B.N.Sc. Degree. This would draw on the resources of each institution to offer the four year program. No agreement has been signed at this point but both parties recognize the importance of continuing to prepare well qualified nurses.

We are working with our educational partners to find opportunities to encourage students to look at careers in the technology sector. The College offers a number of programs in Engineering Technician and Technology that lead to lucrative careers.

Look for our new Technical Communication Program designed to prepare graduates to work as technical writers - another spin off of the technology driven economy.

Our Business & Industry Training Services and our Continuing Education Department continue to work with local employers and our public at large to meet their training and general interest needs. This fall will see the launch of a new Esthetics Certificate Program. This twenty-five week program is responding to a growing job market for estheticians. We've created a new facility to support this program.

VIRTUAL COLLEGE

Creating a web-enabled learning environment is a reality at the college. The Online Teacher Program developed by our own faculty member, Janet Robertson, boasts a large number of our faculty as students. Technology and the web have transformed post secondary education and our faculty are working to integrate its use with their instruction. This fall nine faculty will take part in a special pilot project to move courses to the web. And this is only the beginning.

STUDENT LIFE

Our students take advantage of the many resources offered by the Student Association and Student Services. Counselling, health services, financial aid, library, peer tutoring, a strong intramural and varsity athletic program and other activities are all part of student life

in Kingston. The Student Association's open access lab for computing has been a very popular resource for our students. The day care centre continues to provide a training site for our Early Childhood Education students while offering an important resource for our students with children. The Native Student Circle supports both Aboriginal students and others who find the quiet of the Root Cellar a welcome respite in a hectic day. And what a boon our residence has been to our campus. Campus life has a new dimension with our residence now in its third year of operation.

We have grown and changed over the past three decades. Opportunities abound for new programs for the Kingston campus. We're focused on growth and working to position our program mix to meet the learning needs of students and the work force needs of our community. Our community has grown and so should we. With Kingston noted as the retirement and sailing capital of Canada and as a welcoming community for students we are optimistic about our future.

Encore Seniors Contribute to Cornwall Campus Beautification

Cornwall Campus beautification plans got an unexpected boost this summer thanks to senior initiative and gardening enthusiasm. Members of Encore Seniors' Education Centre not only sought and obtained funding for a "Golden Garden" project, but by dint of much hard work and perseverance transferred these funds into a colourful and welcoming floral centrepiece on Campus grounds.

The "Golden Gardens" program was sponsored by the Candian Wildlife Federation in conjunction with the International Year of the Older Person (IYOP) in 1999. When Diane Raymond, past Encore president, learned about the nationwide undertaking she immediately thought of the College beautification program, and with Beverly Hincks, program coordinator, submitted an application for funding.

New orientation concept a hit!

The "Get Connected" week at the Cornwall Campus drew dozens of community groups to what is considered one of the most exciting orientation weeks the campus has ever had. "The campus was buzzing with activity", says Pat Finucan, Director of Academic Operations in Cornwall.

The week actually began on Friday, September 1, when frosh were welcomed with the same friendly enthusiasm that awaits new students every year. It was a day of familiarizing themselves with faculty and with the program they were about to begin, touring the buildings and orienting themselves to classroom and service locations. In the afternoon, the Student Union bombarded the newcomers with ice breaking activities, mixer games and music.

After the long weekend, the whole college community returned in full force. Blaze 101.9 - Country and Variety 104.5 radio remotes roamed the halls to capture the back-to-school buzz on air. It was Human Studies Day, the first of four theme days filled with interactive displays inside and outside the walls of the campus. Community agencies such the Cornwall Police, Addictions Services of Eastern Ontario, the Eastern Ontario Health Unit, Young Adult Clinic, and others provided important facts and items of interest to the many

students who will be experiencing life on their own for the first time. "Students should be aware of the services provided by our local agencies," says Shirley McGlynn, co-ordinator of Orientation. "You never know when someone may need specialized help, and hopefully, those requiring help will remember the contacts that were made during the first week of school."

On Entrepreneurship Day, Wednesday, September 6, Cogeco Cable TV filmed five live programs in the main foyer. "We've captured the essence of the campus on film," explains Finucan. of a particular restoration project. His work on The Gildersleeve House c. 1820, and Elizabeth Cottage has received special 'award recognition' by the Frontenac Historic Foundation.

"At the present, I have 11 projects underway," Andre states. It's a busy time for me just now."

Working out of his home in Kingston, André manages to separate his consulting work from other aspects of his career. He writes and lectures exten-



E=MC2 Enrichment Program

Each year Queen's University hosts a multitude of enrichment courses for secondary students across Ontario. Students apply for these courses and are accepted based upon teacher recommendations. Over 60 courses are offered, ranging from astronomy to witchcraft. More than 2000 students attend during the 2 week period.

Dr. Sarah McLaughlin, Wayne Sudds, and Barbara Donaldson, professors in Veterinary Technology, conduct one of these mini courses in Veterinary Medicine. Students who select this course are bussed to St. Lawrence College each of the 5 days to partake in various aspects of experiences designed to give them a basic overview of veteri-

nary medicine and related career options.

Students become involved in animal behaviour, nutrition, CPR, grooming, Humane Education, dentistry and radiography. On the last day of the week, the students are bussed to Barb's horse farm to spend the morning handling horses. Then, everybody gathers on the front porch of the farm house for a barbecue and wrap up session. The afternoon is spent at Queen's where the students present a Show Case of their experiences.

This year we hosted 35 students who gave us great reviews and ranked us tops. They learned a lot and had fun. It just does not get any better than that!

On July 7, Pat Finucan, Director of Academic Operations at St. Lawrence College in Cornwall, began a visit to Oyama, Japan, where he was the guest of Sanai Miyasugi, President of the Chuo Welfare Medical College. After a few days in Japan, he continued on to Beijing where Madam Youming Hao, Principal of the Beijing Chaoyang Foreign Language School hosted his visit.

The opportunity to visit Japan came up two years ago when a local, Ian Callan, came home from Japan to visit his family. "He stopped by the College," recalls Pat Finucan, "and asked if we would be interested in having connections with Japan." A year later, Sanai Miyasugi, President of the Chuo College came to St. Lawrence College to discuss arrangements

for 40 of her students to visit in September 2000. "We introduced the Japanese students to the various social housing and health services in Canada", says Finucan. During their visit to Cornwall, students will reside with SLC students. "We will spend the next six months trying to raise money to help send St. Lawrence College students to Japan in the Spring of 2001." Finucan's expenses for the trip were picked up by Chuo College where he will firm up plans for

the Japanese students' visit to Cornwall in September and where he was asked to speak on Canadian Social Services to the Elderly, and on the programs offered by St. Lawrence College. "This exchange of knowledge in the field of services to the elderly is exciting," says Finucan, "especially when you consider the well-known respect the Japanese have for their elders."

Once in China, Finucan was busy finalizing negotiations for a study pro-

gram the Chinese high school is planning for their students. Thirty-seven 13 to 15 years old students arrived in Cornwall at the end of July and returned after a one month program. "We had a great program organized for them", says Finucan. Evelyn Scott, a teacher from Belleville and the person responsible for introducing St. Lawrence College to the Principal of the Beijing school, taught English classes to the Chinese students during their stay. Kim Marion, her associate, also arranged a number of socio-cultural activities for them including trips to Montreal and Quebec City, Toronto and Niagara Falls and Ottawa. Accommodations for the 37 students and the 5 staff who will travel with them were

co-ordinated by Denis Carr at Chateau Cornwall and elsewhere. "It was truly a co-operative affair", says Finucan. And, it's a great opportunity for St. Lawrence College. "Based on this year's success, we hope to have a similar program run at the Cornwall campus every summer."

While in China, Finucan also visited the Canadian Embassy in hopes of learning more about developing working relationships with Chinese educational institutions.

Brockville's Comstock Residence Demolished

A long standing landmark in the City of the 1000 Islands, and former home for many SLC students, the Comstock Residence was torn down this past summer. Although always owned and operated by the Brockville General Hospital, Comstock was known for years as the unofficial residence for the College's Brockville campus.

The building was originally built as a school and residence for the hospital's Nursing students, with labs in the basement, and three floors of rooms above. When St. Lawrence began teaching Nursing in the 80's, the residence started to accept students from other college programs, and eventually became more open to the public.

"Over the years vacancy rates dropped as students migrated to north end appartment complexes," explains Ray Morrison, the Controller at BGH. "The residence took on a larger percentage of office space, and the last remain-

ing students moved out of Comstock in September of '99."

Demolition of the residence was recently completed to make way for hospital expansion. The new building, scheduled to open in the fall of 2002, will retain a few aspects of the old residence, such as its distinctive front entrance arch, and the original cornerstone. An historic plaque will also remain on the grounds.


