
inception. Voyageur has grown from a circulation of less than 4,000 in 1991, to well over 35,000 today.


We are certainly proud of the "new and improved" Voyageur, and hope that you are as well. Your thoughts and comments are always welcome, and we look forward to hearing from you!



David Salmon


Business Administration - Marketing (B) '83

The experts say that you can expect to change your job four or five times throughout your career. David Salmon is currently in his seventh position, this time as the President and Chief Operating Officer of his own company, BeverageOne.

According to its corporate web www.beverageone.com, site, BeverageOne is a software company that specializes in web-enabled wireless technology. The software is designed for use by wholesalers and distributors, and addresses sales force automation, customer service automation, management information systems and data collection. Salmon runs the day-to-day operations of the company, and he and his partner own the majority interest.

As you might expect, you don't just jump into this type of position straight out of College. Salmon's career path has been an interesting and successful journey up the corporate ladder.

"My career has been in marketing and general management," says Salmon. "I bagan my career with Sears Canada as an Assistant Buyer in their head office in Toronto. After that I was "head-hunted" back to Brockville, where I was hired as the Product Manager for Black & Decker, heading up the majority of their new product development initiatives. Then I returned to Toronto, accepting the position of Brand Manager with a division of Corby Canada. My responsibilities there included the strategic management and development of a multi-branded wine and spirits portfolio. This led to an opportunity with Corby's parent com-



pany of Louisville, Kentucky. I was offered the position of Director of Sales for Maker's Mark, where my job was to launch and develop the company's product into the international marketplace. After two years I was promoted to Vice President of Global Brand Development, which encompassed all of my previous duties, plus the management of the U.S. business and responsibility for all aspects of brand marketing, and day-to-day management of all nonproduction aspects of the business. During my tenure with Makers Mark I was responsible for growing the business so that the brand is now within the top 10-selling bourbon brands globally and the top five premium brands globally. In 1998 I was offered the opportunity to move to a senior position within the North American headquarters of Allied Domecq, Maker's Mark parent company in Connecticut."

During this time, Salmon had begun to have discussions with a colleague (now his business partner) about the potential for a new business concept he had been developing. His extensive management background, coupled with the knowledge he had gained in the wine and spirits industry on a global level, made him confident that he could successfully launch his own business. During the period of time when he was preparing to "go solo," he accepted a position as Director of Marketing for Kentucky Fried Chicken, and in a period of one year was able to initiate a new business concept and put in place the strategy that has stopped the erosion of KFC's core business.

"My career has been one with great opportunity," explains Salmon. "Ihave been lucky to experience all aspects of operating a company and developing brands in numerous businesses. All of this has given me a better understanding and ability to develop and manage my own business."

"I have always been interested in marketing and business management," he continues. "I guess what excites me is the ability to see things grow from concept, knowing that I played a role in it. I have also always been driven to lead," says Salmon, the former President of Brockville's Student Administrative Council. "I enjoy managing projects and teams of people. It is very exciting and fulfilling to work with people and see them develop and grow within their careers."


A graduate of the College's photography program in 1985, Bernard's career as a professional photographer has really taken off. Bernard's work is well recognized across eastern Ontario. His photos appear regularly in Profile magazine and a variety of specialty magazines, corporate publications and annual reports.

A native of Kingston and a graduate of Ernestown Secondary School, Bernard initially considered St. Lawrence for its Graphic Design program. However, once he arrived at the College in the early 1980"s, he soon shifted his focus to photography and has never looked back.

"I always felt really comfortable at the College," he says. "One of my main instructors was Emel Erkan. He was certainly a big influence on me. Now I try to give a little back to the College by coming into classes to speak to students about the industry, my career and my travel experiences."

Following graduation, Bernard began his work in the field with a position at CFB Kingston. Within a couple of years, he was off to Toronto where he practiced his profession for several years. Bernard returned to Kingston in the early 1990's and started his own business, Bernard Clark Photography.

"It's ironic that I moved back to




Kingston from Toronto because I am actually doing a lot of work there right now," he explains. "Most of my work right now is for magazine publications, the advertising industry and some corporate clients. I don't have a studio of my own because I actually prefer to go on location for shots. When I got into business for myself 11 years ago, it was the opportunity to meet a variety of interesting people that attracted me to look at this area rather than a permanent studio doing portrait work."

This business strategy has served Bernard well and provides him with some very exciting travel opportunities. One of Bernard's current clients is a California based publication called "Skin & Ink". Dedicatated to the art of tattooing, he has done several covers

for the magazine. Next month, Bernard is off to Samoa, north of New Zealand on a two week excursion to photograph people there for a new book he has been commissioned to work on.

Among the other major achievements to note include his work on the Juno Award winning album cover of The Tragically Hip's Phantom Power. Bernard has also produced work for Cottage Life Magazine and Canadian Geographic.

A recent shoot in New York City found Bernard outside David Letterman's studio photographing tattooed people on the street.







Cathy Moise

Social Service Worker (C) '95

Think you're busy? Take a look at the picture accompanying this article. How'd you like to take a social work program and look after that gang at the same time? The youngest of them were two year old twins when the journey began. Cathy Moise is the woman at the left in the photo. A mother of five children, Cathy always wanted to work in the school system. After discussion with her husband, she decided the best route to her dream was through the Social Service Worker program at our Cornwall campus. As you can imagine, homework and study often had to wait 'til the children's needs were met. And Cathy's husband works long hours running his grocery store which is just up the street from the campus. He gave tremendous support to Cathy's aspirations and Cathy is obviously grateful when she talks about him.

Cathy had worked in an office environment prior to starting her family. She had not pursued a post secondary education. When she first returned to school she had doubts about her academic readiness. This combined with the demands of the young family caused her to start her program with part time study. This gave her a feel for things and she realized that her ability was greater than she'd assumed. She got high grades. One of her teachers, Diane Lalonde, remembers Cathy as a top student. Diane knows a thing or



two about combining a career with family responsibilities. Her comment on Cathy: "It takes a special person to get straight A's while raising five kids." Obviously Cathy's classmates respected her. They chose her to be their spokesperson at graduation. Reflecting their values and the values of the program she pursued with dedication, Cathy still remembers the themes of her valedictory address. She spoke about Honour, Optimism, Perseverance and Enthusiasm.

These are qualities that Cathy took with her to the work world after that graduation. Her dream of working in the school system came true very quickly. Cathy was hired to work with a very special student in an elementary school. This young person had Cerebral Palsy and needed constant sup-

port, physical and emotional, to cope with the demands the able bodied world takes for granted. On a daily basis, Cathy provided the manipulation of limbs and other exercises prescribed by doctors and designed by physiotherapists. With support from the school, Cathy developed and implemented the Circle of Friends program to help this disabled youngster integrate with other children in the school. The best part of this experience, says Cathy, was seeing her young charge grow in confidence, despite the ongoing challenges of her condition, repeated surgical interventions and a much hated set of leg braces needed for support when briefly out of the wheelchair.

Cathy is entering a new phase in her career this fall. From work with a physically challenged child she is now going to work with older children who present behaviour problems. Her teachers know that she will respond to the challenge. Anita Lauzon-Savage remembers Cathy as a 'gentle soul'. Cathy in turn tries to pattern her work on that of Anita. "The things she believes in are the things I believe in; she's fair but tough" says Cathy.

The Social Service Worker program is proud of Cathy's success after graduation and continues to send well prepared, caring people into the community to help others who need it.



Kingston Expansion Project Underway


The first phase of the \$22 million expansion of the Kingston campus is now underway.

Renovations to the Veterinary Technology Labs in the School of Health Science started in early summer and are expected to be complete early this fall. In Stormont Hall, students will be exposed to a new animal handling facility, surgical theatre and new labs.

The remaining two phases of the project, a "link building" which will connect the Leeds Hall to the main building and the expansion of the Learning Resource Centre and dinning hall are expected to get underway in early November. An official ground breaking ceremony and opening of the new VetTech facility is planned for November 1st.

The expansion project, which is scheduled for completing for the fall of 2003, will create an additional 1200 spaces for students to study full time at St. Lawrence College. The opening of the new facility will coincide with what is known as the "double cohort". In 2003, high schools across the province are expected to eliminate the traditional grade 13 and students in the four and five-year streams of study will graduate at the same time and be seeking access to post secondary education.

St. Lawrence will be ready to accommodate these additional students with new facilities and a host of challenging programs. By fall 2003, full time enrolment is expected to approach 5,000 and part – time studies will see close to 20,000 registrations annually at the campus.



The expansion project will be funded through a grant from the Ministry of Training, Colleges & Universities, business partnerships and private donations.

Patented by Mitel Networks

Exciting news came late in the final semester for some of Kingston's Computer Engineering Technology and Electronics Engineering Technology graduating students. The students had the opportunity to show off their group projects to Mitel, where it was announced that three of the projects would be patented. As part of their program, students choose a work project for a client in September and work on it throughout the year. Students juggle classes, tests, and school activities to maintain client meetings and finish their projects. Between the two programs, a total of 8 software projects and 3 hardware projects were developed. SmartLogs 2 is software that allows Mitel engineers to accurately identify problems in telecommunications equipment or software through a web browser. The design of SmartLogs allows it to be used anywhere in the enterprise where a status log is generated. This beneficial research will help designers, engineers, and technicians pinpoint problems quickly and accurately, saving time and energy in the maintenance process.

The students who worked on Smartlogs were David Fram, James Hughes, Jon Moller, Kristan Stewart, and Ryan Taylor from the Computer Engineering Technology Program. 'Software Tuple Space' allows applications and devices to communicate with each other from a central location. Tuple spaces work on and will eventually allow applications to cooperate over the Internet. The project developed extensions to tuple spaces that will greatly improve its capability in handling the quick interaction needed for applications that cooperate to give service to users. The students who worked

these projects to protect the valuable intellectual property that was created within them. The work done by the students showed that they have a firm grasp on technology and have the capability to design solutions for difficult real world problems, "said Tom Gray, Manager – Technology Research and Engineering for Mitel Networks.

on the Tuple project were John Day, Ian Lakins, Oriane Leger, Wayne Young, and Wendy Young from the Computer Engineering Technology Program. The 'Hardware Tuple Space' project extended the basic tuple space idea to handle situations in which numerous applications are cooperating to manage interactions among multiple users. The speed provided by a hardware solution enables the tuple space idea to be extended to accommodate very large systems. The students who worked on the Hardware project were Charles Rae and Derrek Wood from the Electronics Engineering Technology Program.

College Professor Dr. Colin Banger provided technical support on the SmartLogs and Tuple Space projects, with Professor David Athersych cosupervising the Tuple Space project. Professor Aubert Pereira supervised the Hardware Tuple Space project.

"Mitel will patent the outcome of

Coordinator at Mitel and project leader also added, "SmartLogs has the potential to be incorporated into Mitel's product lines and internal development tools in the near future, while the Tuple Space projects will continue to be researched. These students are inventors," said Trevor Rainey, Coordinator of the Computer Engineering Technology Program. "The industry is now recognizing these outstanding achievements. The experience that the students receive using the latest in technology is extremely valuable. These research concepts for Mitel are a great opportunity for both parties." Kasvand referred to St. Lawrence College as "Mitel'shidden diamond." "While other companies scour Canada and the globe for young talent, we've found it in our backyard."

SLC to Issue New Student Life Transcripts

Grads can also Expand their Alumni Profile

St. Lawrence College understands that not all learning takes place in a classroom. Through active participation in extracurricular activities, students can develop skills such as: goal setting, commitment, teamwork, time management, and leadership. These qualities complement students' academic achievements, and produce more well-rounded graduates. That's why St. Lawrence is leading all other Colleges in Ontario by being the first to offer a new Student Life Transcript.

A Student Life Transcript will complement our traditional Academic Transcript, and will formally document individuals' extracurricular participation and achievements. Activities eligible for documentation on the transcript include things like: holding a position on Student Government, acting as a

peer tutor, or playing on a varsity sports team. A complete list of activities is listed on the right.

Upon graduation, the information from individuals' Student Life transcript will be transferred to their alumni record. This will assist the Alumni Office in identifying grads for special reunions, etc. Current alumni can expand their alumni record in this area by sending in a new Alumni Record Form (page 32, or online at www.sl.on.ca/alumni), outlining their own significant extracurricular involvement.

The first initiative of its kind in an Ontario College, St. Lawrence's Student Life Transcript is a joint venture between the College's Student Governments, Student Services, and the Alumni Office.

Interested in a writing career? A postgraduate program, slated for Fall 2002 at the Kingston campus, could be your ticket to the growing field of technical writing.

The Technical Communications program, according to Arlene Cronin, Director of Academic Planning, will serve graduates of St. Lawrence and other colleges and universities. It will hone those writing skills most in demand in science and industry. The one year program will be a mix of classes and work placement. Most courses will be offered on-line as well as in the classroom.

In support of the new program, an

on-line course, "Fundamentals of Technology," is being offered this fall through Continuing Education. Designed for applicants to the program whose diploma or degree is not in a technical field, anyone who wants to be up to speed about today's technologies can take the course. "Fundamentals of Technology" is a web-based concepts course that explores a range of engineering, manufacturing, transportation, communications, and information system technologies.



The First CVDT Graduates

The first graduates from the Canadian Veterinary Dental Technician (CVDT) program offered by the College's Kingston campus have been announced. Vicki Bowen, Tanya Lee, Christa Murr, Stacey Ortuein, Michele Wallace, France Filiatreault, Shelley Packer, and Maureen Page (an SLC grad), completed the post-graduate course for veterinary technicians / technologists.



The CVDT programs allows Vet Techs the opportunity to gain more knowledge and skill in the field of veterinary dentistry. Barbary Donaldson, Professor, Veterinary Technology, and Dr. Fraser Hale, Board certified Veterinary Dentist, work together with students on a part-time basis.

The course consists of home study, a two-day et lab delivered at the College by Dr. Hale, the collection of 100 dental cases, assignments, and a final exam. The course can be completed in one year, but the average timeframe is two years. It is indeed a commitment on the part of the people who enroll in the course.

Graduates from the program have learned about dental equipment use, care and maintenance, radiography, charting and record-keeping. 

Eighth Annual St. Lawrence College Foundation Golf Tournament


The eighth Annual St. Lawrence College Foundation Golf Tournament was held on May 31 at the Loyalist Golf Club in Bath.


Barb Donaldson, former Professor in the Health Science Department in Kingston, is now the Coordinator of the Veterinary Assistant Program.
