

Co-owners of Lifestream Animal Blood Bank and 2004 First Capital Challenge Contest Winners

Two dedicated and professional graduates of the Animal Care Technology (now Veterinary Technology) program have used their dedication to the animal health profession and their vision to launch a new company in Kingston. Sandra Powell (ACT'75) and Joan Tremblay (ACT'77) entered the 2004 First Capital Challenge with their dream of opening Lifestream Animal Blood Bank. Their attention to detail and research paid off when they won the FCC competition and \$50,000 start-up capital.

Both women were drawn to the Animal Care Technology program because of their love of animals. Both have used their training at St. Lawrence College in successful careers bettering the lives of animals.

Since graduation, Sandra has worked in the Department of Pharmacology and Pathology at Queen's University, working with five different researchers. She took time off when each of her sons Joel (1980) and Aaron (1984) were born, but always returned work as a research assistant in hemophilia research with Dr. Alan Giles and Dr. David Lillicrap since 1986. "St. Lawrence College definitely made a difference in my life," says Sandy. "It gave me a sound foundation in both theory and technical skills. The Animal Care Technology Program touched on many different areas that were very useful to me in all of my positions at the University. The areas that I have worked



in have been very diverse. Each time I began a new position with the University I found that I had at least a basis to grow from and that in each grant position that I held I was able to rely on techniques that I learned at St. Law-

Upon graduation, Joan left Kingston to work for two years with Adventis Pasteur, a large pharmaceutical company in Toronto. She returned to Kingston in 1979 to work in Queen's Animal Care Services. Joan has been the Queen's Facility Manager of the ACS since 1996, managing a 23,000square-foot facility with 15 staff reporting to her. "St. Lawrence has given me

excellent education and skills to work in a variety of animal welfare positions." Joan reports she has many positive memories of teachers and their dedication to and support of students.

Joan and Sandy have had a great working relationship since meeting in 1986 at Queen's. Their jobs have been interwoven over the years and they have always felt they could rely on each other at work. Three years ago, Joan started boarding blood donor dogs for the hemophiliac dog colony at her country home. This cemented the friendship. Occasionally Sandy would suggest to Joan that they pool their resources and start their own animal blood bank since there was always a shortage of blood for the hemophiliac colony dogs. The idea was always put on hold since the women didn't have the funding to start the project.

A year ago, Sandy saw a notice in the Queen's Gazette advertising First Capital Challenge, a business plan competition open to anyone anywhere with a good idea who wished to start a business in Kingston. She saw this as 'a sign' and went to Joan saying,"I found the money!"

Sandy used her lunch hours to compile research on dog blood banks in North America, discovering that there was only one existing dog blood bank in Canada, and it was in Winnipeg. Both women devoted a lot of time

Kim Peterson

Vice President of Nursing Services, Cornwall Community Hospital Nursing '82 (Cornwall)

You might say that Kim Peterson has nursing in her blood. There is a long history of nursing in Kim's family that helped to foster her passion for helping others. "My mother and three of my aunts were nurses, each enjoying rewarding careers in nursing with an entirely different focus. I knew there were a variety of career paths I could follow. I had always enjoyed working with people and in nursing you have an opportunity to make a lasting difference in people's lives."

Shortly after her graduation from the Cornwall campus, Kim began working at the Cornwall General Hospital as a staff nurse on a medical-surgical unit. "I found it particularly gratifying to work with palliative care patients and their families," says Kim. "As a nurse, the smallest actions on your part can make a huge difference for the patient and family."

Kim's compassion and caring for her patients is evident in her nursing philosophy. "One of my teachers had told me that once you share tears with a family you become a part of the family. I found this to be true. People would come up to me when I was shopping and introduce me to their friends as "their" nurse."

After a few years working as a nurse, Kim decided to return to school yet again. She began taking courses towards her Baccalaureate of Science in Nursing. "The St. Lawrence College campus in Cornwall provided Ottawa University with office and classroom space so that I could take the majority of courses in Cornwall by teleconference." In 1992, Kim gradu-



ated from Ottawa University Summa Cum Laude receiving the gold medal for the nursing graduate with the highest standing and the Plaque Phil and Marie Gignac Award for the part-time graduate with the highest average.

Soon after this, Kim began working as a Clinical Nurse Specialist for Medicine and Rehabilitation. "Tacted as a resource for other nurses, teaching them to keep their technical skills up-to date. I still had contact with patients, focusing on those with complex needs. I also assisted the manager with quality-improvement projects." Once again Kim decided to pursue her studies on a part-time basis through distance education. The University of Calgary offered a Master of Continuing Educa-

tion in Workplace Learning. This program was of particular interest to Kim because it focused on how people in organizations learn as individuals and in teams. A number of the courses dealt with the role of management in organizations. Prior to finishing the program, Kim had moved into a position in management, that of Program Manager of Medicine.

"In this role I was responsible for a 20-bed medical unit, as well as a number of other smaller programs such as Palliative Care, Discharge Planning and the Diabetic Clinic. I moved into a Senior Management role in 2002 when I became the Chief Nursing Officer for the Cornwall General Hospital. I had overall responsibility for nursing at the hospital."

Kim was the Chief Nursing Officer when the two acute-care hospitals in Cornwall amalgamated, forming the Cornwall Community Hospital. She has now been appointed to the position of Vice President of Nursing Services and has overall responsibility for an estimated budget of \$27 million and for 330 employees.

"While I am no longer at the bedside I know that I make a difference in patients' lives by supporting the nurses who provide the care. As an acute-care hospital in Cornwall, we are in a better position to give those nurses the tools and the resources they require to provide excellent nursing care. I am very passionate about the Canadian healthcare system and see examples of nurses going above and beyond to provide

Mike Kalivas graduated from Brockville campus's Business Administration program in 1985 and immediately began working full-time for Jon's Restaurant, established by Mike's parents in 1960. SLC Receives Nearly \$4 Million Dollars from College Sustainability Fund

Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities Mary Ann Chambers recently announced that St. Lawrence College will receive \$3,848,709 from the College Sustainability Fund, which was unveiled in the 2004 provincial budget.

The College Sustainability Fund earmarked \$25 million in one-time funding to help stabilize colleges, particularly in smaller, rural, and northern areas.

St. Lawrence College President and CEO, Volker Thomsen, was pleased with the announcement. "Four years ago, we started our strong lobbying efforts with limited hope, but after getting a first boost last year and now this substantial help, we are encouraged to keep it up," he said. "The support of everyone who helped us get the message out made a difference, and the fact

that our communities are behind us helped to build a very strong case."

"Although we still need to continue the difficult restructuring that ultimately will secure SLC's future success," Thomsen went on,"I am confident that we have much about which to be optimistic as we continue to move forward."


the Ontario government's agenda of increasing the number of students in postsecondary education and providing higher levels of learning for all sectors and regions of the Ontario workforce. A high quality, accessible and affordable college system is important not just for the students and employers it serves but it makes an important contribution to a strong and competitive economy.

ACAATO is an association of college presidents and board members who are committed to enhancing the quality of college education. Ontario's 21 colleges of applied arts and technology and three college institutes of technology and advanced learning serve 200 communities, employ about 30,000 people, serve about 150,000 full-time and 350,000 part-time students annually and have more than one million graduates.

2004 Honorary Diploma Recipients

As part of the convocation ceremonies held on each campus last June, the College conferred Honorary Diplomas on a number of individuals whose outstanding accomplishments have served as an inspiration to our students.

This year's recipients included: Don Green(Brockville), noted philanthropist and co-owner of Delta Foods International; Ryan Hreljac(Cornwall), the 12-year-old boy who established the Ryan's Wells Foundation and has raised over \$800,000 for clean water projects in impoverished nations; Michael Rasenberg (Cornwall), minor sports volunteer and Manager of Paramed, a private, community-health-care service; Dr. John Cowan (Kingston), Principal of Royal Military College and former VP of Finance and Operations at Queen's University; Dr. William "Bill" Leggett (Kingston), Principal of Queen's University and former VP of McGill University; Jane Murphy (Kingston), gardening advocate and President of the Kingston Horticultural Society; and Sarah Harmer (Kingston), Juno-Award-nominated musician from Kingston, who will be accepting her Honorary Diploma at a special event in the future.

SLC President and CEO Volker Thomson was particularly taken by the message shared by Honorary Diploma recipient Dr. John Scott Cowan. Included below, in its entirety, is Dr. Cowan's acceptance speech to the graduates at the convocation ceremony held in Kingston in June.

"I am greatly honoured to be included in this graduating class; I was completely taken by surprise when St. Lawrence College offered me this great gift. But since it is an honorary diploma, it means either that you worked a lot harder for your diploma than I did for mine, or at least, that when I was working for mine, I didn't know that was what I was doing, while you had the advantage of knowing exactly what you were doing.

This is my first college diploma, though I do have three university degrees. That raises the perennial comparison of diplomas and degrees. Much of the public thinks that degrees are automatically better than diplomas. And they might assume that I'd agree with them, because of my own degrees and my lifelong work in universities, including both Queen's and RMC. And they would be wrong.

A third of a century ago, I was a young faculty member in the medical school at the University of Ottawa. It was then that I first found out that diplomas are not worse and not better than degrees, but rather that they are different, and valuable in their own right. I was trying to set up my new research laboratory, and, at first, I hired new BSc graduates as research assistants. The subsequent scenes of slapstick klutziness were punctuated only by the sounds of breaking glassware. On the bright side, no one was seriously maimed, but on the other hand, nothing useful was accomplished. Indeed, I had forgotten that I too had not learned much about good laboratory practice until my years as a graduate student. A more worldly colleague suggested I try to hire graduates of Algonquin College, from what were then fairly new technology programs. I did, the research laboratory then ran beautifully, and my university snobbery was cured. I never forgot what graduates of a College of Applied Arts and Technology contributed to my major university-based research projects.

But a diploma is more than a tool to get a job. This is a convocation for graduates of the

School of Business and for Continuing Education graduates. Many of you have also had strong business aspects to your programs, so you've been exposed in your courses to plenty of business principles. But many business principles are also life principles. Let me give you a couple of examples:

First example: In Business they teach us that: "A valid contract requires that both parties receive something of value." Yes, it's a business principle, but it's probably also a feature of every relationship of any sort that actually works.

Second example: In Human Resource Management they teach us that getting the best out of those we supervise means: building on their strengths (facilitating success); providing adequate rewards; adjudicating disputes fairly; and helping them to advance.

Yes, this works in business, but it also works for command roles in the military, and it also works in raising children in the family. So we have a hint here already that some of what you are learning here has uses far beyond business.

Well, I've looked at the curricula for most of the diplomas being awarded today. Almost all of you have taken one or more communications courses. These practical courses emphasize grammar, logical discourse and clarity of self-expression in applied settings. And almost all of you have taken one or more courses that have focused on principles and useful applications of mathematics. So now I have to reveal to you the awful secret, which is that in the midst of your quest for useful skills, St. Lawrence College has been able to sneak in some liberal education, in its most traditional form.

In the Middle Ages, the pillars of liberal education were the subjects of the trivium and the quadrivium. The trivium of three logical and linguistic disciplines (which were grammar, logic, and rhetoric) formed the basic platform. The similarity to what St.

Lawrence College calls "Communications" is clear. The quadrivium of four mathematical disciplines (which were arithmetic, music, geometry, and astronomy) was the advanced program of its day. These more advanced subjects were not viewed from a theoretical perspective at all, but rather were taken as descriptive of and explaining the actual world. That sounds suspiciously like your "Applied Mathematics" to me.

The trivium and the quadrivium were called the "liberal arts" because they were viewed as the minimum suite of subjects necessary for "liberi" - a Latin term that translates as "free men." This is an important concept, that there is a broad educational requirement for those who would be free, and that there is a way of defining what that reasonable minimum might be. It implies that men and women who wish to be responsible, free citizens need a certain suite of educational exposures to be able to meet all their responsibilities. These responsibilities include being effective participants in the democratic process and being able to assess the logic, cogency, and truthfulness of the arguments that candidates advance. These responsibilities include having enough knowledge and judgment to make wise choices for individual self-fulfillment and for collective security.

You thought that earning a business diploma would get you a job. Well, it probably will (and for many of you, it already has). The success rate in this for St. Lawrence graduates is very high indeed. But you get something else too, and that is a deeper understanding of the world and a level of personal development that helps you make good choices. And it is the collective making of those good choices that will determine our collective future and our persistence as a free people. On this day of great joy and recognition of accomplishment by all of you, do not forget that what you have learned will not only get you employed, it will equip you to think better and see farther. And considering the state of the world, that's good equipment to have."

The World Among Us -

The International Community at St. Lawrence College

"We live in a global world. We owe it to our students to reflect that diversity on our campuses." These words were spoken by Barry Keefe, St. Lawrence College's Director of Recruitment and International Education, when discussing the current commitment to increase the number of international students in the classroom.

In its strategic plan, approved by the Board of Governors, St. Lawrence College has agreed to the "enrichment of the campus environment and enhanced global awareness through the integration of international and foreign students in our programs and services."

Keefe started the International Education Department two years ago, and is beginning to see his efforts and the College's commitment pay off. For 2004/2005 there are over 100 international students enrolled across the three campuses.

César Balbuena is the College's international recruitment officer, hired in December, 2003. He has already been on missions to Mexico and China to promote St. Lawrence as a post-secondary destination and agrees that the College is off to a good start. He cites the area's natural beauty, proximity to major cities, and the quaint atmosphere of Eastern Ontario as having a huge appeal and a great enhancement to attract students into our programs.

"Many students prefer the smaller towns because it really allows them to learn English and experience Canadian life," says Balbuena. He goes on to explain that in bigger cities there are more ethnic communities and students can find people everywhere speaking their native language.

Carol Li, a Chinese student who graduated from Business – Human Resources on Cornwall Campus in June of this year agrees: "Big cities have too many Chinese people; the chance to practice English would will be smaller. Cornwall is a quite, peaceful place. Toronto is just too noisy."

Li credits Pat Finucan, the Cornwall campus Executive Director,

Yollande Laperle, Manager of Student Services, and the teachers for assisting in her success. She went on to say how teachers were kind and nice and, recognizing the fact that English is a second language for some students, often took the time after class to ensure their comprehension.

Saeed Zahran, a 20-year-old student from United Arab Emirates, who is entering second year Computer Networking, acknowledges the teachers on Kingston campus "The professors help you if you have any difficulties." He also appreciated living in residence his first year at the College, saying that it was easy to make friends there. Zahran values his time in Canada, and while having new and different life experiences, he says it's fun.

Israr Ahmad, a native of Pakistan who came to Canada via the United States enjoys his classes and like the others, has high praise for the faculty. Ahmad is in third year Business Administration - Marketing on the Kingston campus and attributes his enjoyment to the faculty and the personal attention that is available. He feels the learning is a quality experience with its emphasis on education in day-to-day life. Prior to attending St. Lawrence College, Ahmad admits that he never really enjoyed school. Now he says, "I don't want to leave this place. It has been a real confidence builder."

With testimonials like this, Keefe seems to have a good base from which to build up the International Education Department. Moving into the future, Keefe's short-term goal is to increase the number of international students to 5% of the student body, approximately 250 students. To help with this, recruitment efforts will be expanded to include Korea, Japan, India, and Taiwan in Asia, with additional efforts in Latin America, Europe, and the Middle East.

Keefe also plans to create student mobility programs which will provide opportunities for student exchanges, with the College's Canadian students being encouraged to complete a semester or a year of their studies overseas with a partner institution.

The last area of immediate focus is the continued development of international projects. The College has been involved with a number in the past, including missions in Hungary, China, and Malaysia. More recently, St. Lawrence College participated in a project in Romania funded by the World Bank through the Association of Community Colleges of Canada. Drawing on expertise in the Job Training Services Division, staff from the College spent two weeks in Romania consulting with government agencies in the design and development of adult-training centres. The College hopes to participate in other similar opportunities that will utilize the expertise of staff and faculty.

With the backing of the Board of Governors, the support of the executive team, and the willing participation of the faculty, it would appear inevitable that global integration is well underway at St. Lawrence College.



As St. Lawrence College continues to grow as a destination of choice for international students, an increasing number enquire about the possibilities of immersing themselves into Canadian culture through a stay for at least part of their time with us as homestay guests. Students pay for room and board as they would in a residence, but they get to interact on a daily basis with a Canadian family. Both the host family and the student gain insights into their own and one another's culture.

Medical Laboratory Science Program Recognized by Canadian Medical Association

St. Lawrence College's Medical Laboratory Science program passed its Canadian Medical Association assessment with flying colours. The survey team who visited the Kingston campus in May commended the program for the high level of commitment shown by personnel, both at the College and at the twenty placement sites where students take their third year of training. The surveyors recommended a full sixyear accreditation.

Accreditation is a process that protects the public interest by ensuring that graduates are meeting a national quality standard. Only graduates from an accredited program are permitted to write the national credentialing examination set by the Canadian Society for Medical Laboratory Science. Working as Medical Laboratory Technologists (MLTs) in hospitals and private laboratories, graduates comprise an essential component of the health-care team. They represent the third largest group of health-care workers; only nurses and doctors are more numerous.

Approximately 85% of all physician decisions regarding diagnosis of illness and treatment are based on laboratory test results. It is the Medical Laboratory Technologists who perform these tests. The recent emergence of

new diseases, such as SARS and West Nile Virus, has raised the profile of the profession. Canada faces a critical shortage of MLTs, and it is predicted to get worse as many current workers retire in the next few years. St. Lawrence is proud to be able to continue doing its part to help meet that demand.

Brockville Secures Funding Grants to "Green" the Campus

The Brockville campus recently received over \$5000 in funding grants from the Ministry of Natural Resources to help "green" the campus grounds. The funds will be used in the rehabilitation of the creek flowing through the property. The project has been named the Buell's Creek Habitat Restoration Project and has been modeled on the Master Site Plan as approved by the College's Board of Governors.

One grant will be used to plant an "eco-forest" south of the parking lot that is located east of the campus buildings and for riparian plantings around the existing pond. Riparian planting is defined as plantings on the bank of a watercourse. Plantings are done in a zigzag fashion to hold the soil in place and prevent erosion and to provide a habitat for smaller animals and birds. This project will be completed by the end of this year.


The other grant will provide additional funds to be used to restore the wetland and surrounding area adjacent to Buell's Creek, where it runs through College property. Funds will be used to purchase and plant trees and shrubs. The expected date of completion on this part of the project is June, 2005.

The Buell's Creek Habitat Restoration Project has the support of the Leeds Land Stewardship Council, the Grenville Land Stewardship Council, Trees for Peace, and the Cataraqui Regional Conservation Authority. These agencies are providing guidance and help in the restoration process.



At the recent "Communities In Bloom" awards ceremony, the Brockville Blossoms team received an "Environmental Award of Excellence" for their work on behalf of the campus. This award was in recognition of the planting of 53 trees in the eco-forest and the 600 native shrubs around the pond, and of work done with the Alumni Association in planting the trees along Alumni drive. The Brockville Blossoms team were also given verbal recognition, in the comments by city staff, for their work on other projects in the community.

Unique Bachelor's Degree in Behavioural Psychology Underway in Kingston

The College is excited to announce that a new Bachelor of Applied Arts Degree in Behavioural Psychology is now being offered at the Kingston campus.

The program is the first of its kind in Canada! This comprehensive four-year undergraduate degree offers class-room instruction, as well as 1,100 hours of supervised placements in three different community agencies. Students will acquire the requisite knowledge and skills in behavioural psychology to be employed in a variety of social-service settings (e.g., addictions, correctional services, developmental disabilities, autism) or to pursue additional post-secondary education (e.g., graduate school, teaching, social work).

This new program builds on the College's proven 30-year track record of the three-year diploma in Behavioural Science Technology. It has been inspired by the success of graduates who came to the diploma program with a previous B.A. Graduates of the new degree program will have the best of both worlds-a traditional university degree plus the College's "hands-on" focus. They will be 'career ready' after graduation, like those in bachelor's programs in nursing, occupational and physical therapy, teaching, and social work. It really is 'The Bachelor's Degree with the practical edge!'

Dr. Sheelagh Jamieson and Dr. Gary Bernfeld are this year's full-time faculty (and a total of six will eventually teach in this program.) They are strong advocates for college-trained, front-line staff who have the functional, professional skills necessary to effect behavioural change in their clients, thus improving the quality of their lives. Gary is the Coordinator and has taught in the BST program since 1999.

Standards are being developed for graduates of BST Diploma programs who wish to be admitted to an upper year of this program. These are the only applicants who may someday receive advanced standing in the degree program. Andre & Sons (Ontario) Ltd., and the engineering firm is J. L. Richards and Assoc. Ltd. The project is valued at \$11.3 million.

New Residence Slated for Brockville

It's been a banner year for St. Lawrence College residences. Following on the heels of another expansion to our Kingston residence, set to open in September 2005, and the new 44-bed residence now open in Cornwall, our Brockville campus will soon have a residence of its own.

Since receiving approval from the Board of Governors in March, the design team has been active finalizing our plans, in partnership with general contractor, Dacon Construction. Designs have now been submitted to the City of Brockville for final approval, and we expect to be breaking ground on the 59-bed facility in early October.

The Brockville residence will feature fully furnished double rooms, each with its own bathroom, on-site laundry facilities, and a common lounge and study room. Residents will sign an

eight-month lease at a rate of \$550 per month, including utilities, local phone service and basic cable.

The Brockville residence will be ready to house students in September 2005. Students need secure, convenient, quality housing when pursuing their education, and we are delighted that St. Lawrence College will be soon able to meet this demand on all three campuses.
