While engaged in the workforce in Brockville, Gord's decision to return to school in 1981 seemed to be a large step, and he credits the teaching staff at St. Lawrence College in Brockville for encouraging him to pursue a career in Nursing. He strongly believes in the college being the "community's college" and is convinced that if St. Lawrence had not had a campus in Brockville, things might have turned out significantly different for him. "My experience at St. Lawrence College gave me a huge amount of self-confidence. I didn't limit myself, and I wasn't afraid to go further," says Gord. "The College gave me the foundation that provided the opportunity to do any number of things." The positive experience at St. Lawrence encouraged him to continue on to the University of Western Ontario, in London, working towards a BScN degree.

While earning his BScN, Gord's work experience included psychiatry, emergency nursing, intensive care, and working as a nursing supervisor for the corporation of the City of London. He

returned to the Brockville Campus of St. Lawrence College in 1987, to take on the position of Nursing Professor. Gord's interest in computers began shortly after he began his employment at the college, when he was introduced to the concept of "Script". He had never turned on a computer before, but there was no turning back for Gord. "I was hooked on computers," he comments. He credits Terry Burgess and Marie Obress, two current employees of Education & Information Technologies, with introducing him to a PC.

In 1993, Gord assumed the position of Director of the newly created Learning Centre at Kingston Campus, a role that was expanded in 1994 to include the Brockville and Cornwall Campuses, under the name of "Educational Technologies." He became Vice President of Education & Information Technologies in 1995, and Vice President, Business Development and Technologies in 1998, when his portfolio was expanded to include responsibility for development and delivery of nonfunded education and customized corporate training services. This was in addition to his continued responsibility for strategic and operational planning and management of the college's education, information and telecommunications services. Gord's present position of Vice President – Student Services, CIO & Registrar, includes the role of Registrar, added in 2004 and more recently – Student Services, in 2006.


As a member of the college's Executive Committee, Gord participates as a senior staff member on the college's Board of Governors. He serves as a governor on the Patient Care & Quality Assurance Committee for the Board of Governors of the Kingston General Hospital and has been on the Board of Directors of the Kingston Technology Council since 1999. He is presently serving his 3rd year as the Council's chair. He is also the current Eastern Region Vice-Chair of the Committee of Registrars, and was a key organizer of the Eastern Region Fall conference held in Kingston in 2005. He has been an invited speaker and presenter at many conferences and workshops over the past decade.

# Joe Spagnolo

In 1987, computers were just starting to make their way into homes; there was a buzz that something was happening. Computers seemed to be the "thing" to get into.

Joe took a chance and enrolled in the fledgling Micro Computer Engineering Technology program at St. Lawrence College's Cornwall campus. "He had a knack for it; it came easily to him," says his former software development professor Gordon MacKay, now coordinator of the Computer Engineering Department. MacKay says that although Joe had no knowledge of computers at first, he learned quickly, and was considered an "excellent student, a whiz kid." "He took the skills he'd learned at St Lawrence College and ran with them in a very unique direction," says MacKay, who is still in touch with his former student.

After graduation in 1987, Joe began work developing software for federal government clients at Software Kinetics Ltd. in Ottawa, where he had completed his internship while at college. The software development house exposed him to the technologies that drove the Internet at a time when nobody really knew anything about it, or about the unimaginable potential of interconnecting millions of computers all over the globe.

In 1992, with two other colleagues, Joe co-founded NRNS Incorporated, which he still runs today. Described as an information technology solutions company that focuses on network infrastructure and information security, their client base is the federal government, with National Defence and the RCMP as their biggest single clients. Joe is very satisfied with the direction and success of his business and especially its multi-faceted nature, which keeps him current and challenged — a priority for him. Of course, there is a down side, such as dealing with the tangles of governmental red tape, the long hours, and the liability of working for yourself — "the buck stops here," he says. But Joe remains motivated by these challenges as well. As both a manager and a consultant, he juggles the responsibilities that this presents.

A major accomplishment for Joe in his career so far, and validation for his hard work have been the two papers ("Practical Protection for Public Servers" and "Dynamic Virtual Private Networks for Coalitions") that he wrote and co-wrote respectively, and that were chosen for presentation at the NATO Information Systems Technology (IST) symposiums in France and Italy. He credits St Lawrence College and work experience at Software Kinetics with his success. Joe believes that although good technical skills are necessary, strong communication skills are equally as important – something that he admits he did not fully appreciate earlier in his career.

A great inspiration and model for Joe has been a Professor from London England he has dealt with as part of his international work. Considered one of the "fathers of the Internet in the UK," the Professor, who at 70 "is as sharp as a needle," still does international work. "To be able to keep that level of relevance at his age and still be at the top of his game is really impressive," says

"I was kind of stuck in a rut, had done dead-end jobs for a long time," Sarah admits. Then she saw an ad in the newspaper for a brand new course that was being offered at the Kingston campus of St. Lawrence College: Culinary Management Co-Op Diploma Apprenticeship.

"I'd been cooking since I was a little kid. It was always a hobby of mine. I decided that since I didn't know exactly what I wanted to do, I would take this course and see if it was the right path for me. It turns out it was!" she says confidently.

Originally from Cornwall and Ottawa, today, this busy 23-year-old Kingston resident is an Entremetier (a First Cook), at the Brown's Bay Inn on Wolfe Island, who tremendously enjoys her job and its many responsibilities.

"We're really pleased with Sarah," says the Inn's General Manager, Tammy McIntyre-MacDonald. "The skills that she brought with her have certainly made it easier for us to train her." She explains that Sarah's understanding, knowledge and skill level of food preparation are "solid," and that she adapted very quickly from a learning environment to a commercial kitchen.

Sarah started her SLC course in September 2004 and admits that her first year was a big challenge. "I had been out of school for a couple of years, so to go back again was a little bit hard. But it was fun!" These challenges didn't stop her from achieving top honours that first year with a remarkable 4.0 G.P.A. and earning two prestigious awards as well: the Culinary Excellence Award, an academic accolade that included at \$750 bursary, and the Executive Director's Academic List Award for the highest G.P.A. in first year studies. Sarah graduated from her second year with an impressive 3.952 average.

Sarah credits a lot of her success to the dedicated faculty members who guided her through the course, stating: "These people cared so much about our personal success. They are amazing at motivating their students."

Thomas Elia, Executive Chef and Co-Ordinator of Culinary Programming for the School of Skilled Trades

and Tourism and the founding Chef of the program, was "our mentor," says Sarah. "He was hilarious, down-toearth, really personal with every single one of his students. I've never seen a teacher like that. Not just him – his entire staff was like that!" she adds.

"We're very proud of her success," comments Thomas. "Sarah was an exceptionally good student and it's very gratifying for us to see a student move into a successful position. That's what we're here for," he adds with a smile.

Sarah says that the Kingston campus has "amazing" kitchen facilities and she enjoyed the practical lab. "Every meal that we made we got to eat!"

A portion of the course includes placement for paid apprenticeship. Sarah apprenticed at Briar's Resort on Lake Simcoe at Jackson's Point near Toronto from May to October 2005. "They taught me a lot. I learned large menu planning," she says, noting that the staff accommodations during her apprenticeship – over a dozen people

"To lead is to serve," says Volker Thomsen, President & CEO of St. Lawrence College.


Service to St. Lawrence College, it's students, and communities, the province, and the country has been at the forefront of all of Volker Thomsen's efforts.

Takuro Oba graduated in 2005 from the Electronics Engineering Technician program and was successful in finding a job in Kingston with a local computer diagnostic and repair firm. After ten months, he returned to Japan to begin the process of formally emigrating to Canada.

St. Lawrence College's international alumni are increasingly deciding to stay in Canada to gain work experience and continue improving their English language skills. Citizenship and Immigration Canada allows graduates of full-time programs – other than English or French as a second language – to stay in Canada and work in their area of study for up to two years. (Some restrictions apply.)

After graduating from the Esthetician Program in July 2005, Kena Li found a position at one of Kingston's

top spas. She attributes her success to the professional training she received at St. Lawrence College. It made her stand out during her work placement, which in turn led to her full-time position. She continued to work hard and in a short time moved up in the company. Her education and work experience have given Li a new level of confidence.

"My personal skills improved a lot during my time at the College and work – especially my English," she says. She would be happy to either stay in Canada, which she finds very beautiful, or to return home to China with her new-found career.

Jun Ni, a citizen of China, successfully completed the Post-Graduate Business Administration Human Resources program in April, 2006. This one-year program has a lot of appeal to international graduates. They can come to Canada, improve their English during the academic year, and stay for another year to work in their respective field of study. Jun hasn't decided yet if she will apply for a skilled worker visa after her one year or return to China.

"Since China is booming, I believe if I go back with my overseas education, work experience, and good English language skills, I will have very good opportunities," she says.

Either way, Ni credits her St. Lawrence College education in helping her
get her current position in Vancouver
as an assistant manager, where she is
required to recruit and train employees
in a fast-paced service industry environment. She also feels that the education helped her gain information about
employment in Canada in general.

Ying Liu, who has just finished the Practical Nurse program in Cornwall, has already been offered a job in London, Ontario. Like the others, Liu praises St. Lawrence College, citing the great

teachers and the practical experience for contributing to her success. She feels that these have been the best years of her life and that Canada is a second home to her now, in addition to her native China.

The International Education Department continues its recruitment efforts worldwide, currently focusing on China, India, Japan, Mexico, the Caribbean and Latin America. With a goal to increase the number of international students to 5% of the student body, approximately 250 students, Barry Keefe, Director of Recruitment and International Education is kept busy.

"We are grateful that the Board of Governors remains committed to our goals and sees the necessity of international education – both inbound and outbound – in this day and age," Keefe says.

As well as recruiting, Keefe is simultaneously charged with creating partnerships that will enable Canadian students to complete a semester or a year of their studies overseas. Currently, a St. Lawrence business graduate for example, can continue his or her studies in Australia, completing a bachelor's degree program in as little as 18 months.

Choosing to move far away from home to study and pursue dreams is a big decision for all young people. To move to the other side of the world takes courage and an adventurous spirit.

It is a credit St. Lawrence College that their international alumni feel so positive about their experience in their adopted country that they choose to remain after graduation. By working in Canada, they will continue to learn about our culture and become the global citizens needed to forge international diplomatic and trade relations in the future.

Intended primarily to forge closer ties between SLC and the Universidad del Valle de Guatemala in Guatemala City, the visit provided Pat Finucan with the opportunity to highlight our partnerships with the River Institute and Laurentian University and to share information on our Computer Engineering, Environmental Technician and Tourism Management-Eco-Adventure programs.

Following the tour, Finucan hosted a luncheon, where MPP Jim Brownell and MP Guy Lauzon were in attendance, as well as representatives from the offices of the Mayor and Cornwall & Seaway Valley Tourism.

"We felt privileged that the Ambassador would visit us. We're very committed to recruiting more international students, as well as providing opportunities for local students to study abroad. His support for our activities is most welcome," said Finucan. The campus currently has 24 international students, coming mainly from China.


This is history told in the first person, at times heartbreaking and dramatic, while also highlighting the

# "Triple Play" High School Students Start College Early

This past winter term, fourteen high school students from Limestone District and Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Boards completed a "Triple Play" at St. Lawrence College. The students enrolled in a college course, also completing a high school co-op course with work experience.

"Triple Play" was one of several provincially funded initiatives piloting ways for high school students to champion a better learning and career path. The triple play is: college/school/work. In this case, high school co-op students enrolled in a college course during their co-op period and performed their workplace portion of the co-op on days when the college course did not run. They earned full course credits at high school and college for this combined activity.

A regional team was invloved in the project, including Pat Garrod, Superintendent for Secondary Curriculum at the Limestone District School Board; Mike Lattner, Special Assignment Teacher with the Algonquin and Lakeshore Catholic District School Board; and Cam McEachern, Manager, Academic and Research Services at St. Lawrence College. All partners had to work quickly to get the pilot program launched. Garrod and Lattner turned to their high school co-op teachers who then invited co-op students to sign up. McEachern worked with Kingston campus deans and faculty to line up college courses that best suited the high school

students and their timetables. Once underway, Vincent Durant, Coordinator of St. Lawrence Accounting programs, took over the project management as part of his special secondment to the Vice President Academic's office. Terry Spence, Secretary in the office of the Vice President and Campus Director, supplied essential administrative support throughout the project, arranging for student registrations, textbooks, bus tickets, and two special events to start and end the project.

A December Orientation Session brought together college instructors, high school co-op teachers, administrators, parents, and the Triple Play students for an opportunity to meet one another.

"The opportunity to give students an early taste of college-life while finishing their high school careers will definitely help them succeed," said Chris Whitaker, college Vice President Academic and Executive Director, Kingston Campus. "Students who are more informed about their career choices are more successful wherever their paths lead them."

By project's end, 14 students completed their college courses very well: one Triple Play student was top in her college class! A May wrap-up session brought teachers, students, and parents together again to evaluate the experience. All the students were very pleased. "I have learned how to organize my time and also what to expect when I go to college," said one Triple

Play graduate, while all the others nodded in agreement. Several students reported improved confidence and determination for a selected program and career choice. One said: "The most important thing I have learned by participating in this program is that I want to go to school next year! I applied and got in!" One parent was especially impressed: "My daughter wasn't doing her best, was pretty unhappy, she sure didn't know what she wanted to do...I was really getting concerned last fall. Her Triple Play course matched her work placement really well...in our family business! She started coming home just so positive and recently decided she would enroll in college to get her business diploma. She knows what she wants to do now, and she is so much happier. This opportunity was such a fortunate thing."

While these students start college this September with an advance course credit under their belt, more high school students will be learning about Triple Play and other forthcoming pilots through which they can encounter college better, sooner. Thanks to this year's success, an expanded version of Triple Play will run this coming winter, 2007, at all three St. Lawrence campuses in cooperation with their local school district boards. Perhaps the last word belongs to another Triple Play student who formerly had no college ambitions: "It doesn't matter how old you are, you can always continue your education."

#### Distance Education Online

St. Lawrence College is a member of the OntarioLearn Consortium, which consists of 22 Ontario community colleges that have partnered to develop and deliver online courses. From the beginning, OntarioLearn has maintained a focus on delivering the highest quality distance education to part-time learners. From its inception in 1995 with just a handful of Colleges, the program has grown to now involve 22 colleges, delivering 750 unique courses to more than 30,000 learners.

Through this virtual classroom environment, students can pursue their educational goals —whether the completion of a single course or the fulfillment of a college certificate or diploma. Students can take courses from their home or office, accessing their course at their convenience. Learning is facilitated by an instructor who is available to answer questions, encourage discussion on course topics, and provide feedback. Course instructors and fellow classmates may live anywhere in Canada, or the U.S., or somewhere else in the world.

Online learning is a form of independent study for those who cannot attend on-campus classes on a regular basis. This flexibility allows them to complete a course or program at a time and place of their own choosing.

St. Lawrence offers on-line courses in business, communications, computer studies, health sciences, justice, social sciences, technology & trades, general education, hospitality, mathematics, psychosocial rehabilitation, recreation, and more.

The 'Employment Readiness in Construction Trades project', a joint initiative of St. Lawrence College and The Frontenac Community Futures Development Corporation, has received the 2006 'Youth Initiative Award', presented by the Ontario Association of Commu-

writing and other related training in employment-readiness skills.

The goal of the course was to provide participants with skills that would enable them to find employment in the construction industry within the County of Frontenac. The course was

nity Futures Development Corporation (OACFDC). The Award was presented by Anne Prichard, Executive Director, Frontenac CFDC, to Wanda Williams, Director, Student Services and Continuing Education, Kingston Campus, at the annual OACFDC conference in Cornwall.

Employment Readiness in Construction Trades was a new venture this year, undertaken by the Frontenac CFDC and St. Lawrence College, in partnership with Northern Connections, Sharbot Lake High School, and Frontenac Telephone Company. The Kingston Construction Association and the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities Apprentice Client Services also assisted. Training consultant Bob MacCallum from St. Lawrence pulled the initiative together by creating an eight-week training course to introduce participants to the construction trades and to prepare them for entrylevel positions in the field. Its main focus featured hands-on carpentry experiences, but it also covered trade theory and safety as well as résumé

designed so its graduates would qualify to start the challenging three-year provincial apprenticeship training program that leads to the qualification of Certified General Carpenter or other apprenticable trades. And it succeeded. A local construction company accepted and employed two of the graduates as carpenter apprentices. Five others found employment in the construction field and another two graduates found new directions and went back to school.

Along with the recognition, St. Lawrence College received a cheque for \$350. The award money will fund a new Continuing Education Bursary available to a part-time student working toward a certificate or diploma. Applicants must be residents of Frontenac County, including the Townships of Frontenac Islands, South Frontenac, Central Frontenac and North Frontenac. Applicants must demonstrate financial need.








# Honourary Diploma Recipients (Spring Convocations, 2006)




Mme. Rosemond Laberge




Sister Pauline Lally (on behalf of the Sisters of Providence)


Her nominator adds the following quote that Sister Lally wrote in a letter to then-Minister of Immigration, Judy Sgro: "We are a country of immigrants and refugees, and the sign of the health of our country is how we treat the most vulnerable." At the Spring 2006 Convocation ceremony, Sister Lally encouraged students to recognize both their own unique gifts, and how those gifts could be put to work in the world: "For all our human frailties, limitations, and inconsistencies, each of us does carry within us a vision and a possibility of a better society....There is a universe out there waiting just for you, and your own particular, authentic brand of trued giftedness as you live lives of right relationships. Barry O'Connor's ardent dedication to providing young people with opportunities and pathways to a successful future is evident in everything he does. Mr. O'Connor started



A native of Kingston, Mr. O'Connor has four degrees from Queen's University, including a Masters of Education. A tireless worker with both local and provincial organizations, Mr. O'Connor states that "public education creates a common ground of learning essential for the maintenance of democracy, human dignity, and the quality of our lives." His passion for inspiring hope in children goes well beyond the classroom; he's encouraged youth to reach beyond themselves physically, emotionally and intellectually through his long standing service in volunteer coaching of sports. A leader in the community in so many organizations, Mr. O'Connor believes that education is about the future and that students are our future. He does whatever he can to ensure that each child has the hope of a bright future, whether that means college, university, or the world of work.



The Honourable Robert Keith (Bob) Rae

The Honourable Bob Rae was Ontario's 21st Premier, and was elected eight times to federal and provincial parliaments before his

retirement in 1996. He has had an extremely significant and lasting impact on post-secondary education in Ontario, in his capacity as advisor to the Honourable Dalton McGuinty, the current Premier of Ontario. He is the author of the historic and influential report: Ontario: A Leader in Learning -Postsecondary Review. Mr. Rae is a partner at an international law firm, and has extensive experience in negotiation, mediation, and arbitration; he is an expert on issues of public policy. A Rhodes Scholar, who also holds Honourary degrees from three universities as well as his Honourary Diploma from St. Lawrence College, Mr. Rae is Chancellor of Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, and is the author of two books, From Protest to Power and The Three Questions. In the preface to Ontario: A Leader in Learning, Mr. Rae comments "Education is what drives us forward, inspires innovation, and creates an engaged, democratic society." Mr. Rae has urged the government to accept all the reforms he suggested together, as they are all vitally connected; "We won't get where we need to go by piecemeal tinkering. By virtue of your decision to explore this subject, you signal the pre-eminence of higher education in Ontario. Now it is time to take action."



Mr. Bill Cruden

Bill Cruden's passionate advocacy for education and the college system, as demonstrated by 22 years as President, and now President Emeritus, of St. Law-

rence College, is well known. During his

time with the College, Mr. Cruden managed to find time to extend that advocacy to work for the Association of Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology of Ontario (ACAATO) as former chair, stretching his commitment to the provincial level. In addition to his much-beloved leadership, his commitment remains alive in the Alumni Relations office that he founded at SLC to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the institution. Mr. Cruden continues to advocate for college students; he is the founding VP Academic at Nova

#### Expanding Opportunities Campaign in Brockville Goes Over The Top

Donors, students, staff and friends of St. Lawrence gathered in Brockville on May 16th to celebrate the successful completion of the \$2.1 million Expanding Opportunities Campaign for the campus.

"Support from our community has been extraordinary," said David Beatty, Chair of the St. Lawrence College Foundation. The outdoor event, held on the front lawns of the campus, provided an opportunity for many of the campaign's donors to see first-hand the tremendous enhancements the campaign helped make possible for the campus.

"As we stand here, we can see our new residence in the background, the landscaping efforts of our "Green Team" in the foreground, and listen to the talents of our students from the Musical Theatre Performance Program. Each of these enhancements to our campus here in Brockville make a difference," explained Lorraine Carter, Executive Director of the campus.

The campaign raised over \$2.1 million in support of a \$5.3 million campus redevelopment initiative. Other funding for the project came from the provincial government and the college.

At the campaign celebration, Beatty announced the extension of the campaign to include support for the creation of an art gallery on the campus, which would support the expansion of the campus' Creative Arts program and the Thousand Islands Summer School of the Arts. A lead contribution from the estate of former student Marianne Van Silfhout helped to kick off the project. Over the next six months, the Foundation will seek to secure an additional \$150,000 to complete the appeal.

Construction on the gallery project will begin next spring and the facility is slated to be opened in the fall of 2007.
