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
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"ANDREW Morawski is one of Canada's most innovative and cutting-edge artists, specializing in metal art sculpture and painting. Andy is inspired by the beauty of nature, as can be seen in his creations of animals such as bears, wolves, butterflies and blue herons," declares his website at www.morawskiart.com.

An artist from a very young age, Andy was born and raised in Quebec and got his real introduction to art from neighbour and mentor, Edwin Holgate, known as the eighth member of the Group of Seven. Talented, inspired, and eager to learn more, Andy honed his skills in the Visual & Creative Arts – Fine Arts program at the Kingston campus of St. Lawrence College, graduating in 1983.

"What an experience in my life. I have great memories of college," says the 45year-old Belleville resident. "I had a great time," he says, recalling a session painting actual sneakers all over the walls of Sneakers Pub on the Kingston campus. Andy also noted that the professors supported and encouraged their students, without hiding the stark realities associated with making a living in fine art.

Undaunted by the challenges ahead, and with his hard-earned diploma in hand, Andy decided to visit Spain for a two-week vacation. His brief holiday extended to two years! While earning a living by painting murals in bars and pubs including one in Casablanca - Andy became the apprentice of Gomez Montoya, who had studied under Pablo Picasso.

With that experience under his belt, he returned to Canada excited and ready to pursue his career. So committed to his art, he was willing to make his own hammer, he says. His diligence and dedication to his dream has paid off.

Andy now has six sponsors, including Fortune 500 companies Dewalt and Lincoln Electric, who have given him over \$50,000 of brand new equipment. But he still uses his homemade hammer every day!

A recipient of the Toronto Junction Art

Festival's 'Peoples' Choice' Award, Andy's art was detailed in several magazines and was featured on two covers, Canadian Metalworking and Metalcraft. His wolf sculpture was unveiled on Breakfast Television. He'll be demonstrating his talents at Toronto's Home Workshop Show in February 2008 and also at Canada Blooms in March 2008.

Scheduled for unveiling at the American Welding Society show in Las Vegas in October, Andy's life-sized kodiak "Spirit Bear," a work currently in progress, may be featured at the 2010 Olympics in B.C. His butterfly sculptures are on exhibit at Infusion Art Gallery in Los Angeles and his steel roses can be found at Saatchi in London, England. A Discovery Channel program about Andy's passion is in the discussion stages.

Andy's 16-year-old son, AJ, has been following in his father's footsteps since he was nine. "He is a fabulous artist and an incredible welder," says single dad Andy, proudly.

Environmentally conscious – "I love recycling," - Andy has created "some incredible pieces" from recycled materials. "It's so exciting, so rewarding," to take something old and discarded and to make something new and beautiful, he says. And he learns from his mistakes, stating, "Failure inspires me."

When he's not working on huge sculptures that can take two to three years to create, Andy supplements his income with custom pieces, such as a large white-tailed deer and fish memorial and two geese in full flight sculptures.

Andy hopes someday to work at St. Lawrence College in some capacity, inspiring young students to pursue their dreams in the art field and teaching them "street art" smarts. He also looks forward to showing some of his creations at the new Marianne van Silfhout Gallery on the College's Brockville campus. "IT TAKES a certain amount of discipline and many late nights," says Janet Beaton, of her experience with long-distance education through St. Lawrence College, Brockville Campus, but the Nova Scotia resident found her virtual studies a very positive and rewarding experience.

Having worked as the Occupational Health and Safety Officer for the previous nine years at Saint Francis Xavier University in Antigonish, Janet – a self-described perpetual learner – felt that her learning curve at work had reached a plateau.

While looking to build her career and gain better understanding of her job, Janet was introduced to the Occupational Health Nursing program – Distance Education, by a friend, who had just completed the course herself.

Janet was very impressed by the layout of the program, calling it "user friendly." "It was set up for the learner," she says. "You knew exactly what was expected of you: objectives, learning out-

comes, and assignment due dates." She explained that everything was right there in the modules; she didn't have to worry about what to read or where to find it.

Janet cannot say enough about the program itself and the wonderful support she received from her course facilitator, Angie Dukelow, who was a key element in her success. "Angie was very informative and always returned my calls in a timely manner," says Janet.

Being an adult learner, with three children and a full-time job, it would have been difficult to pick up and relocate to get this training. The long-distance education opportunities offered through St.

Lawrence College made it possible for Janet to achieve an academic credential not offered anywhere in Nova Scotia.

This program has ensured her employability for the future, she says.

Course facilitator Angie Dukelow says that graduates from the three-year course are employed in a wide variety of companies including casinos, airports, and city corporations.

"There is a great deal of work out there for this type of nursing," says Angie, "and nurses have found this specialization to be very rewarding." As an Occupational Health Nurse, one works in a preventative capacity with the same group of people consistently and is able to see things through from beginning to the end. Occupational Nurses are in charge of assessing risk and preventing injuries before they happen. "Proactive nursing" Angie calls it.


Distance education is growing in popularity and has become a viable option for those who can't attend the College in person. In fact two of Angie's students have taken their long-distance education from halfway around the world. Paula Bichel, who relocated with her husband and children to Indonesia, is continuing her course from there, and another student, a military flight nurse, works on her assignments while stationed in Germany between missions to Iraq.

The program, which requires registered nursing credentials as a prerequisite, includes such courses as emergency preparedness, ongoing health status assessment, counseling, and health education. Mid-term testing is done in an open-book format, and finals are given by a college-approved proctor in the home community.

Adding to her learning, Janet says her internship, working with the Occupational Health Nurse at a local hospital, gave her invaluable experience and perspective in a different work environment.

Janet, who graduated "Class of '06 – with distinction" is now researching other programs to take through correspondence with St. Lawrence College. The lifelong learner is proud of her success and especially the positive role model she is being for her three children.

WHEN HER seventh and last child was three years old and would soon be ready to start school, 42-year-old Terri Forrester knew that she was ready for a new challenge. She'd lived her life for her family, and now the more independent her children became - the eldest being 22 at the time – the more she realized she needed something of her own. "Although not without some trepidation, hard work and blind faith, it was serendipitous," Terri remembers, "the way everything fell into place like it was meant to be."

She'd been out of school for over two decades, and although she had no idea where it would lead her, Terri attended an information session, after seeing an ad announcing a new course being offered at St. Lawrence College's Cornwall Campus.

The components of the two-year Environmental Technician program seemed to be everything she'd always been interested in as a young girl: chemistry, microbiology, ecology, health and safety, and, of course, environmental studies.

Even as a child she'd felt a kinship to nature, performing experiments with her chemistry set and catching frogs for observation that she kept in the wading pool in the back yard. She recalls going off on her bike to pick up garbage from the side of the road. Even then, her sense of stewardship guided her actions.

As she was researching her future possibilities, there was a strong focus on water quality, following the Walkerton affair, and environmental awareness was growing. After the introduction of the course at that information session, she said, "I was sold right away."

Terri remembers that although not all the students in the program were fresh out of high school, she realized on orientation day that she was the oldest in the class and felt terribly out of place and became convinced that she would not be able to return for class the next day. She credits the support and 'pep talk' offered by Program Coordinator Donna Orwell with keeping her in the course.

In fact, Terri gratefully acknowledges the College and praises all her


professors, whose expertise contributed to her success. "The teachers bent over backwards to help their students," Terri says. "They really enriched the program. If you wanted more information, they would get it for you, or hook you up with volunteer opportunities, if that's what you wanted."

Terri also feels the association with the River Institute on site, and their facilities that are made available to the students are an invaluable asset to the program. "The course," she says, "covers such a wide spectrum of information and issues in the field that the career possibilities stemming from the training received are endless. Students who graduate from the course are very well prepared for the outside environmental work world." A very high percentage of her class is now working in related fields, such as consulting firms, conservation authorities, water and waste water treatment plants, or doing lab work.

Now a Sr. Environmental Officer with the Ministry of the Environment – a position she admits she still pinches herself in disbelief over - Terri is in charge of enforcing environmental regulations and responding to complaints pertaining to industry, business, and the private sector. She says the best thing about her job is the constant learning. "I love my job," says Terri. "I love the challenge. There isn't a day that I'm doing the same thing as the day before."

Terri can't say enough about the high quality of education she received while at St. Lawrence College, and especially the fact that it took place in her own community, without which, she says, "it simply wouldn't have happened."

WITH THE August 2006 announcement of Volker Thomsen's retirement as St. Lawrence College's President and CEO, the College Board of Governors launched a comprehensive search process for a new President and CEO. Over a period of eight months, the board evaluated a pool of talented leadership candidates from across Canada and beyond from

the fields of education, business and industry. In the search for the best person to assume the position of President and CEO, the Board of Governors were delighted to discover that the best candidate came from within the institution: Chris Whitaker.

Chris has been a member of the St. Lawrence College team since 1987 and has had a range of progressive leadership experiences as both a teacher and a senior leader on the College's Executive Committee. Over the years, he has worked collegially in all three employee groups of the College including Training Consultant to business and industry, Professor of Management, Dean of Business, and, most recently, as the Kingston



Campus Executive Director and the Vice-President, Academic. In addition to his duties as President and CEO, Chris is currently completing a Ph.D. in the Community College Leadership program at the University of Toronto/Ontario Institute for Studies in Education (OISE).

We sat down with Chris shortly

after the announcement to talk about his vision for the near and long term for St Lawrence College.

O: Chris, you're brand new to the role of President and a familiar face to many at St. Lawrence. What skills and experiences do you bring that will be of greatest assistance to you in this position?

My experience with the College will be an advantage to me and hopefully to the organization as we move forward. Having been here for about 20 years, and working on all three campuses in a variety of roles, I think I know what the College is about, and I think I know what our strengths and our challenges are. I understand the needs and the uniqueness of each of the communities we serve and the culture of each campus.

In terms of skills, my ability to communicate and work with people to build relationships, both within and outside the College, will be important for our success. My approach is one of collaboration. I view us all as contributing in different ways to the goals we have as a College – we all have a job to do. I think one of the big jobs of a President is to set the tone for what we want to do and to work with others to help articulate how we will get there.

Leadership's an interesting thing. It's not about everybody following the leader, but it's about making everybody realize that we're all leaders, and if we all get behind the common goals, then we can achieve our objectives that much quicker together.

Q: What are your top three goals for the first year?

First, we need to develop and communicate a college-wide academic plan that ensures consistency, quality, and viability in all our programs, and the right program mix across our campuses. We want to continue to encourage and support the individual campuses in terms of identifying local programming needs, but we need to do that under the umbrella of a college-wide academic plan and within a sustainable model. For example, we offer a number of similar programs at each

campus, and if those are all strong, viable programs with appropriate market demand, then we should maintain and improve them. If they're not, we should ask ourselves if it would be better to invest our resources in a smaller number of programs with greater prospects for success.

Second, we must renew our focus on teaching and learning, as it is the core business of the College. To do this, we need greater support and investment in the people we have working here and in the support mechanisms that contribute to student success. This is the reason behind the recent hiring of additional academic managers - not because we think faculty and staff need to be managed more closely, rather that people need to be better supported. If people feel that they're valued and supported, they will do great things; they will take risks and they will be willing to change. We need to improve student success and retention rates in many of our programs. This is obviously in the interest of helping students achieve their goals, but it is also in the College's interest to keep programs healthy. By working with academic program teams, student services, and also with our student associations, who are very keen and very willing to get involved and support those activities, we can make a significant difference

Third, I will stress the idea that we are one College. I don't think we should be afraid of that idea, or see it as a negative thing in any way. We should be proud of our history and our accomplishments. Here we are in our 40th year, and we really need to celebrate our success as a College and the strength that comes from having three campuses from Kingston to the Quebec border united in a common goal. We need to find the right balance between respecting local community needs and seeing those within the context of one College that collectively has a lot of knowledge and expertise to draw on. We need to get past the fear and sense of competition between the three campuses and recognize that we are stronger by working together as one College,

as opposed to operating as separate, autonomous, and individual campuses.

Q: What sort of communication strategies will you rely on? Will you have a blog?

I haven't ruled out the idea of a blog. There's also email and other written forms of communication, but I think nothing really replaces face-to-face. Email is nice, memos are nice, blogs are nice, but they're all one-way communication. The best way to build confidence, trust, and positive relationships, I think, is to talk to and listen to people. Whether we are dealing with staff, students, or external stakeholders, it is important to establish dialogue and ensure people feel they have been heard and consulted with. I do think we need to improve our communications generally around the organization, in particular tri-campus college communication. We have to use all the different means available, because different people need to be reached out to, listened to, and engaged with in different ways. I'll spend a fair bit of time at each campus, as it's important for people to have an opportunity to talk to me, as well as to other College leaders.

Q: What opportunities do you see for us in the Ministry's direction for greater integration across the educational system?

There's tremendous opportunity because there's so much separation between those levels right now. In the Ontario system, historically we have not done a good job of bridging between the various systems, whether that's from high school to college, or from college to university; our systems have all developed in relative isolation from each other. The goal of having seamless pathways between the different systems is to help the student succeed. Education should be viewed as a continuum where transitions between systems are made easier for students, and they understand options open to them.

The Ontario government has the Learning to 18 strategy to increase graduation rates from high school. We also

have the Reaching Higher post-secondary plan, with the goal of increasing participation in post-secondary education. Where I see an opportunity is to bring those two strategies together. Some of the things that we've been doing at the college, and piloting within the province, such as dual credit programming between high schools and colleges, for example, offer tremendous opportunity. It gives students the chance to experience college by taking a course or a series of courses that gives them credit toward both their grade 12 and a college diplomas at the same time. That's a model that's been proven highly successful in many other jurisdictions. The success rate of those students completing high school, and their subsequent retention once they get into college, is phenomenal compared to students who don't have that experience.

There are also opportunities for improvement in the relationship between colleges and universities. There is a push now for greater transferability and mobility within the post-secondary system, a lot of it being driven by the learners, the students, the consumers of education who are asking: Why can't we get full credit if we want to take our college diploma and continue on to pursue a degree? This is a complicated issue and one that is being taken seriously by the government with the creation of the Higher Education Quality Council of Ontario.

Q: Do you expect us to expand our own degree offerings?

That's an interesting question and one I get asked a fair bit. There are no plans to expand at present, and my primary objective is to stay true to our mandate and mission as a College of Applied Arts & Technology. We offer very valuable and highly respected credentials of our own. The reason colleges got into degrees in the first place is because gaps were identified in the capacity of existing postsecondary programming to meet educational needs related to new emerging skill sets. St. Lawrence got



into degrees to meet that need, not because we wanted to be like universities. I think we have a lot of great universities, and I think we have to view universities and colleges as complementary, and not necessarily as competitive.

The other reason we have been getting into degrees is to address unmet needs within our communities for degree education. We have two degrees offered now in collaboration with Laurentian University to respond to these needs:

Bachelor of Science in Nursing and Bachelor of Business Administration.

Q: What role do you see for alumni in our future?

Our past, current, and future students will have a huge impact on our success as an institution. We need to continue to engage alumni in many ways because they are ambassadors of the College.

It's those folks who can talk with pride about their experience at the College.

Whether they realize it or not, they have a role in determining our future by spreading the word about their experience at the College and what they thought, what they think, about the institution.

Many of our alumni are also parents of children who are now, or someday will be, considering their options for post-secondary institutions. We continue to draw a lot of our students from our local communities and they stay in their local communities after graduation,

The primary purpose in restructuring the academic division is to strengthen our focus on learning and student success. Our success in securing a sustainable future lies in our willingness and capacity to work together, valuing the diversity and distinctiveness within and across campuses, while recognizing we are stronger together. The new academic structure will support our efforts to advance our strategic directions within the context of a challenging and dynamic environment.

Congratulations to Lorraine Carter as she moves to the role of Vice President, Academic from her position as Executive Director, Brockville Campus. Following the completion of her Master's Degree from Queen's University and doctoral work in Legal Studies at La Trobe University in

in 1986 as an academic counselor and
later teaching full
time in Human Studies, Lorraine has held
progressively more

responsible academic leadership roles in Futures, Student Services, Applied Arts and the collegewide Schools of Continuing Education and Engineering Technology and Trades before taking on the lead role in Brockville seven years ago.

Under Lorraine's leadership, our academic structure on the Kingston Campus will consist of six Academic Schools organized into two Faculties. The Dean of the Faculty of Arts is Sally Granger, and the Dean of the Faculty of Science is Don Young. Each School will be led by an Associ-

ate Dean. Programs have been aligned according to field of study and projected numbers of students. The two Faculty Administrative Offices will each have a Manager of Academic Operations, providing leadership to support staff to ensure effective and accessible delivery of service to our students and staff.

In addition to new positions associated with these changes, we have filled vacant leadership positions created in Brockville and Cornwall, as a result of Lorraine Carter's appointment and the retirement of Pat Finucan. Reporting to the Vice President Academic, Campus Deans will continue to provide academic leadership, supervising academic faculty, staff, and program activity and will be the lead for the College in their respective communities. They will work collaboratively with the Dean of Arts and Dean of Science to ensure consistency of programming on a tri-campus basis and in support of an integrated academic plan for the college.

He is currently writing a book about the Order of Canada for which this painting was solicited.


Justin Chenier, Kingston, ON, Advertising and Public Relations 1997

Cheese, Fish, and Behavioural Intervention – Applied Research is off to an interesting start at SLC

The Kingston region once had a vibrant cheese-making industry, but consolidations in the agricultural, industrial, and retailing sectors dramatically reduced this local industry over the past thirty years. The changes have gone hand-in-hand with other shifts in local industries, demographics, and consumer preferences along the St. Lawrence River region, as globalization profoundly alters the economic and social landscape.

St. Lawrence and other Ontario colleges see a role in helping our communities to be competitive, not only through first-rate teaching, but by developing an applied research program that strengthens programming and helps local industries to flourish. St. Lawrence is matching its instructional strengths with local industry needs to pursue new economic opportunities. The college has established its own Research Ethics Board and has secured NSERC eligibility, which means it can meet grant and research administration standards set by the National Science and Engineering Research Council. Now in its third year, the college's fledgling applied research program has seen several faculty members lead small teams in preliminary studies to focus on ideal research programs.

Take CEBRIC for example. St.

Lawrence Kingston is drawing on its combined programming in Human Studies, including its new Behavioural Psychology degree program, to conceive

a new Centre of Excellence in Behavioural Research and Intervention in our Community (CEBRIC). The vision is complete and grant-writing is underway. In Cornwall, a partnership with the St. Lawrence River Institute has Environmental Technology faculty developing a study of mercury levels in fish. Police Foundations classes on all three campuses are becoming involved in developing fitness standards for specialized, emergency tactical teams. The College's vision is to see applied research at work in classroom equipment and process trials, industry-focused workshops, research facilities, and other assistance to help people live and work better... Which brings us to the cheese.

Preliminary studies in both the School of Business and in the College's Culinary Arts program point to research opportunities to help local agriculturalists thrive. The College can help business people find technologies and markets to develop and sell their products better. And cheese is a case in point. Tibrata Gillies, a part-time Culinary Arts instructor and local chef, possesses years of experience in food handling and a long-standing interest in softcheese production. She is representative of the two dozen college faculty seriously exploring research programs that can enrich their programming and serve the St. Lawrence region. "It's an inspiring opportunity," she says.

Faculty Spotlight

JIM HAMILTON – Sales & Marketing Professor, Kingston Campus

SALES and Marketing Professor, Jim Hamilton has been passing on his skills at the Kingston campus of St. Lawrence College for almost three years.

Jim moved from Cornwall to the Limestone City in grade seven and attended The University of Western Ontario achieving an Honours Undergraduate Degree in Actuarial Science.

What amazes me the most is how these students grapple with families, kids, jobs, and a full-time courseload. To me, that's one of the most inspiring things – that they're able to achieve success with all those extra responsibilities.

He also received a Masters in Business Administration from The Richard Ivey School of Business in London, Ontario.

Teaching was not a goal that Jim originally had in mind. Besides owning his own company, he'd been Vice President of Marketing for several organizations. "Most of my work experience has been with start-up companies," he explains.

When he heard about an opening at St. Lawrence College, Jim's interest was piqued. Talk about being in the right

place at the right time! "The opportunity was in an area where I had a lot of experience: sales and customer relationship management. I saw it as a way to determine whether or not I liked teaching," admits Jim, whose wife, Kate, is a teacher with the Algonquin Lakeshore Catholic District School Board. The couple has two sons: five-year-old Joe and three-year-old Kevin.

This new position would enable him to, "teach at a very practical level," says Jim. Teaching students not only what they need to do, but also how to do it "is something that really appeals to me."

With "both students coming out of high school and adults coming back to school, you get a mix of very, very motivated individuals. What amazes me the most is how these students grapple with families, kids, jobs, and a full-time courseload. To me, that's one of the most inspiring things – that they're able to achieve success with all those extra responsibilities. It bodes well for them," he says.

After testing the waters with a parttime position, Lady Luck was again on Jim's side: a full time position uniquely matching his skill set became available and he was fortunate to be selected.

"The folks at the College are just phenomenal," he says, commending professors – some of whom he's deemed mentors. They "really know how to engage and inspire the students," he explains, noting a few have graciously passed on some of their tips and tricks of the trade.

Although Jim admits that he tries to "emulate what the good ones do," he does have his own personal and successful approach to teaching his students. "I really like getting the students engaged in role-playing situations that simulate real business scenarios that I know happen everyday. As soon as they walk out the door, it's stuff that they're going to see." He incorporates extensive role-playing and video self-analysis into his classes. "Certain educational technologies really support and enable the learning process to happen in both a self-directed and group manner," he

explains.

Jim also allocates a portion of his time to applied research. A year ago, he and office-mate Al Parkin, took notice of the substantial activity in the organic food market and the commercial issues affecting local farmers. "We decided to do some basic research," he says to examine how the market was evolving in the Kingston area and what could be done locally. "We've just completed our initial phase of that and now we're onto very specific projects," he adds, to help enable farmers to compete more effectively in this expanding and rapidly changing market.

Community- and sports-oriented, Jim was co-chair of the Hockeyville Bid Committee, serves on the board of the Kingston & District Sports Hall of Fame and organizes the College's annual Volker Cup, a faculty-student ball hockey game that raises funds for the United Way.

Teaching at the College has been a learning experience for Jim, as his knowledge about the campus, its facilities and its opportunities has grown. "SLC is great and getting better every day!" he says proudly.

CORNWALL CAMPUS

Sister Valade's crowning achievement is the 1983 introduction of the concept of palliative care as a specialized discipline at the Hotel Dieu Hospital, Cornwall. For Sister Valade, care of the dying was an essential part of the mission of the Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph. Palliative care is largely taken for granted today, though less than 25 years ago it did not exist as a formal part of health care in our community.

Born in St. Raphael's, Ontario, Sisiter Valade's early career saw her working as a secretary for National Defence in Ottawa. She entered the order of the Religious Hospitallers of St. Joseph in 1944 and embarked on an illustrious nursing career, which began following her graduation from the Hotel Dieu Hospital School of Nursing in Kingston in 1952 and spanned the next four

decades, including a specialization in paediatric nursing. She studied theology at Mariallac College in St. Louis and achieved a Masters in Pastoral Studies from St. Paul University. Sister Valade has been a member of the Board of Directors of the RHSJ health centre and St. Joseph's Continuing Care Center for 30 years.



Angelo Towndale (left)


Angelo Towndale works tirelessly in Cornwall on behalf of traumatized children. He was the driving force behind the creation of the Big Brothers/Big Sisters organization in Cornwall. The achievement for which he is best known today was the establishment of the Children's Treatment Centre. In the early 1990s, Angelo responded to reductions in government funding of programs for abused children. He raised a sum of money and gave it to the government, anticipating that it would be matched. The government of the day chose not to respond and sent the money back to its donors. Undeterred, Angelo organized community leaders to raise enough money to treat abused children without government support.

It has been said of Angelo that he has a deeper vision of why he is here on earth. He is relentless in his pursuit of services for the abused child. The result is that the Cornwall community has a Children's Treatment Centre funded entirely by private donations raised by our community the only one of its kind in the country. Not long ago a student in one of Cornwall's high schools stood in front of her class to explain why she was proud to be a Canadian. She said that our country was great because abuse victims like herself could be cared for at the Children's Treatment Centre.

BROCKVILLE CAMPUS

Ben TeKamp (left, in photo, above right) A beloved member of the Brockville community, Ben TeKamp is an outstanding contributor to both the community and St. Lawrence College, including a term as a Director on the Board of the St. Lawrence College Foundation.

Mr. TeKamp is the past mayor of Brockville, a position he held for nine years. He is celebrated



for his active community volunteer work, above and beyond that required in his political role, and also for his self-deprecating sense of humour, which is best displayed by his willingness to support local causes by dressing up like Elvis for Riverfest, like a flower for Communities in Bloom, and like Charlie Chaplin for the St. Lawrence Stage company. He traveled to Belarus in 2004 in support of Canadian Aid for Chernobyl and is an active supporter of the Safe Communities Coalition. He has also refereed prestige rowing competitions at an international level, including two Olympics. In 2006, TeKamp was chosen as Brockville's Citizen of the Year.


Med Lab Graduates Excel in National Exams


In 2005, an article about St.

THIS YEAR, St. Lawrence College celebrates its 40th birthday. To mark this occasion, we've collected some archival photos from our first five years (1967-1972), along with a few pictures from recent years. We hope you enjoy seeing how much has changed – like the facilities, programs, and hairstyles - and how some things just seem constant – like the smiles and tremendous sense of accomplishment on graduation day.

BUILDINGS

Following an Act of Provincial Parliament in 1965, the College system was founded through the visionary leadership of then Minister of Education, Bill Davis. A Board of Directors was appointed, and led by our first Chair, Walter T. Ziegler. The Board immediately approved a plan to create St. Lawrence College, and in 1966, it was initially determined that Brockville was to be the site of the main campus. In 1967 the 59-acre former Ontario Psychiatric Hospital farmland at King St. and Portsmouth Ave. in Kingston was acquired for a \$1 government transfer.

Shovels were soon in the ground at sites in all three communities, and buildings quickly took shape. At the same time, program offerings were advertised, with the earliest courses offered in temporary quarters in local high schools.

DID YOU KNOW?

Long before our first buildings opened, SLC began its proud history of delivering quality programs. In 1967, the Kingston campus opened to 250 students in temporary quarters in the basement of Loyalist Collegiate and Vocational Institute, while Cornwall got its start at General Vanier Secondary School, and Brockville first offered evening courses to 70 students at Thousand Islands Secondary School.

PEOPLE AND PROGRAMS


In our first years, we offered three-year programs in Business Administration, Home Economics, Chemical, Civil & Electronic Technology; two-year Technician programs in Electronics, Instrumentation, Mechanical Drafting and Industrial Chemicals, as well as Early Childhood Education and General Business; and one-year programs in Secretarial Arts.

Today, St. Lawrence College has approximately 5,000 full-time students and 20,000 part-time registrants in over 80 academic programs in Business, Health Sciences, Human Studies, Trades & Technology, and Creative Arts. We employ over 1,000 full-time and part-time staff.

THE PRESIDENTS OF ST. LAWRENCE COLLEGE

In our forty year history, the 'Top Job' has been held by only six men (and yes, no women ... yet!)

1967 – R. C. Short, St. Lawrence College's first employee and President. Appointed in September 1967, he stepped down three years later to head the Canadian Cable Television Association.

1971 – W. William Cruden (Bill), Director of the College's then Polytechnical Division. Appointed President on January 1, 1971, he led the College for more than two decades stepping down in 1992. He received an Honorary Diploma from St. Lawrence College in 2006.

1992 - Dan Corbett was appointed President in 1992 and stepped down August 31, 1999.

1999 – Charles Labarge was appointed Interim President in September 1999 and served until the end of September 2000 when the new on-going President was appointed.

2000 – Volker Thomsen was appointed President on October 1, 2000 and retired from the position July 31, 2007.

2007 – Chris Whitaker was appointed President on August 1, 2007.

ST. LAWRENCE COLLEGE FOUNDATION: ANNUAL REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

The St. Lawrence College Foundation has completed another successful year. While revenues for the year were slightly below that of 2005/2006, many significant objectives for the Foundation were achieved.

Student award and recognition events are sponsored by the Foundation each fall, and this year a record number of students received financial assistance.

Donors came together with the award winners and college staff to celebrate the outstanding accomplishments of student leaders in Cornwall, Brockville, and Kingston.

On the fundraising front, the Foundation, with the support of the Development Office, surpassed its target of \$250,000 in donations destined for our endowed bursary funds. Under the Province's Ontario Trust for Student Support, we were able to secure significant matching funds for these donations.

Our Brockville campus has enjoyed the fruits of our efforts exhibited through the Expanding Opportunities Campaign. While the Campaign officially wrapped up in May 2006, many of the initiatives that were born out of this fundraising effort were felt across the campus. As well, our plan to extend the appeal to include the construction of a new art gallery at the Brockville campus received a major boost. The lead gift of \$250,000 from the estate of former Fine Arts graduate Marianne van Silfhout was realized. Construction on the Marianne van Silfhout Gallery at St. Lawrence College is expected to be completed in 2007.

Stewardship of our donors is critical to the future success of our Foundation. In 2006/2007, our board went through the preparation of an extensive "Investment Policy" document. This work will



help guide our financial advisors as we aim to earn a significant return on our Bursary Endowment Fund while protecting our capital funds.

The St. Lawrence College Foundation also made several strategic expenditures back into the College and our students this year. Our Bursary Endowment Fund grew by \$725,000 and at March 31, 2007, exceeded \$3.8 million. Over \$750,000 was invested into capital renewal projects in Brockville, Kingston, and Cornwall, and students received \$144,000 in financial awards.





"Peter has held many leadership positions in our community and is a very successful graduate of our campus," says Pat Finucan, Cornwall Campus Executive Director. "He cares enormously about the success of our communities and our College. He is ideally suited to lead our Foundation."

Rebuilding in Sierra Leone – one of our own is making a difference

AFTER 13 years in Canada, Valentine Sualley (Business Administration – Human Resources Management, 2001) has found a way to contribute to his native Sierra Leone, which is rebuilding after a decade of civil war. Computers for Schools Sierra Leone (CFSSL) is a new non-governmental organization founded by Valentine in November 2005. The organization's purpose is to distribute refurbished computers throughout the country's educational institutions.

Valentine is from the eastern part of Sierra Leone, where the brutal civil war began in 1991. He came to Canada in August 1994, as part of the delegation to the Commonwealth Games being held in Victoria, British Columbia. With civil war still raging at home, Valentine successfully sought refugee status and was able to stay in Canada.

Once his status as a convention refugee was established, Valentine set about the task of gaining an education. His lawyer referred him to St. Lawrence College, and he was admitted to the Business Administration program on the Kingston campus. Valentine gives

much credit to his experience at the College.

"The training I received at the College was the core preparation I had for what I am doing today," he says. "The quality of education and training I received from this prestigious and renowned institution very well prepared me to face the challenges of management and fundraising."

After the war ended and Valentine returned to Sierra Leone in 2004, he realized he wanted to do something meaningful for his country, which has twice been ranked by the United Nations as the least-developed nation in the world.

"There was no doubt in my mind that by establishing CFSSL I was going to make some contribution to rebuilding my war-torn country," he says. The organization has already received and distributed about 500 computers from several countries, including 200 refurbished by high school students in Sharbot Lake, Ontario.

Valentine has built some great partnerships with individuals and organizations to aid in the cause, but he admits



there is a lot of work to be done to bring CFSSL to another level. "We are at the point where the entire Sierra Leone school system now depends on us for computers, as this facility now gives hope for Sierra Leonean students to be able to compete globally."

With one of their major computer sources closing recently due to funding difficulties, there are challenges ahead. However Valentine and CFSSL remain committed to finding the used computers and the funds to ship them to Sierra Leone. "So one would agree with me, that there is still a lot to be done," he says.
