





COLLEGE COMPUTERS GO TO AFRICA WITH THE HELP OF AN SLC ALUMNI

WHEN Valentine Sualley (Business Admin – HR, '99) graduated from St. Lawrence College and shortly after, returned to his native Sierra Leone, he considered his education a gift.

Now it's the gift that keeps on giving.

Sualley returned to SLC on a hot August day nine years after graduating with a couple of tractor trailers in tow. When he left only hours later, he had filled those trucks with computers destined for the children of his country, courtesy St. Lawrence College.

Sualley started the NGO, Computers for Schools, in Sierra Leone in 2005 as a way to distribute refurbished computers throughout the country's educational institutions. Sierra Leone has been twice ranked by the United Nations as the least developed nation in the world, and continues to face tremendous challenges in rebuilding its educational infrastructure. Since 2005 Sualley's organization has distributed approximately 500 refurbished computers to schools in Sierra Leone.

"This donation from St. Lawrence

College is fantastic," says Sualley. "The College did so much for me when I arrived in Canada, and now to have them give back to my native country in this way is very gratifying."

The donation came about when the College's IT Technology Renewal Plan for PC Systems began implementation in August 2008 – resulting in a number of retired computers. As part of the recent announcement of Dell Canada as the College's technology partner, desktops, monitors and laptops across all campuses are gradually being updated and replaced with energy efficient models.

"Donating our old equipment to this program is a win-win situation," says Stephen Runions, director of IT for St. Lawrence College. "We're happy to be able to contribute in this way to the education of students in Sierra Leone."

That's what a dedicated but small group of alumni are hoping will happen if they should be successful in forming a CYW Alumni Chapter in time for a major conference in February of next year.


According to Terri McDade (CYW '79) associate dean of the School of Community Services, it's an idea that's been bubbling up repeatedly at meetings of the Ontario Association of Child and Youth Counsellors (OACYC) group for some time, and another CYW alumni has stepped up to try and move it from idea to reality.

Lee Anne Campbell (CYW '02) has been an active alumni member of the program's advisory council, and a part of OACYC. When a recent College program review elicited feedback from alumni about how the program could be improved, a greater role for alumni and opportunities for alumni interaction were the messages sent back loud and clear. It's then that Campbell stepped forward to help get the movement off the ground.

The start-up group, which includes Lee Anne and Paul Pennell (CYW '98), with support and guidance from McDade, and program coordinator Michael Burns, is asking those interested in getting involved to contact the group at alumni@sl.on.ca. It is envisioned that a small steering committee will need to meet over the fall to put the structure in place, and begin recruitment of members, and, ultimately, the election of an executive.

As one of the longest-running programs in the College's history, there are almost 2,000 CYW alumni, but almost half are "lost" – their addresses are no longer upto-date in the alumni database. Milton Ellis Milton Ellis has had a very successful publishing career at The Standard Freeholder, as well as an extensive background as a supporter and volunteer for community charities including the Cornwall Community Hospital Foundation, United Way, the Children's Treatment Centre, just to name a few. He is the founder of the Standard-Freeholder Great Kids recognition program and has extended this program to five other Ontario communities. He has shown a particular dedication to charities that deal with abused children and adults who suffered abuse as children. Ellis was also named volunteer of the year for 2003-04.

Ellis has made, through his active involvement and support of many charities a great difference in the lives of those in need. The Honourable Justice Rommel Masse is currently a member of the Ontario Court of Justice in Kingston. His work has given him unique insight into today's social problems and by all accounts he has gone above and beyond to address these issues with compassion.

Doug Hogeboom As a visionary leader and the former President of Empire Life, Doug Hogeboom is a major contributor to the Kingston community. He is on the Board of the Providence Care Foundation and has previously been a board member for both the Kingston General Hospital and Ongwanada Hospital. In 2006, he was the Campaign Chair of the United Way of Kingston, Frontenac, Lennox & Addington.

Keith has been appointed as a

member of the Order of Canada and was inducted into the Terry Fox Hall of Fame in 1996.

Leslie Myles Leslie Myles is the successful franchise owner of three local Body Shop stores for the past 25 years. She has demonstrated exemplary business practices and provides a fair trade environment for all associated with her business. Over the past 12 years, Myles has committed over 1000 hours annually to various worthwhile organizations and charities, among them the 'Women of Courage Program', Outward Bound Canada and its Foundation, GALS - Girls Active Living and Sports, Board and Committee work with the Boys and Girls Club of Canada, Limestone Learning

Foundation, Interval House Kingston and the Downtown Business Improvement Association of Kingston.

Myles is an outspoken advocate for women and has spearheaded the Anita Roddick Award for Women of Courage (survivors of abuse). This is a woman who will inspire and motivate the students of St. Lawrence College to not only be the best that they can be, but to hold out their hands to help those around them.

Her passionate advocacy for disadvantaged women, her support of people returning to the educational arena, and believing in people who need and require that extra courage to move forward in their life, made Myles an exceptional candidate for a St. Lawrence College Honourary Diploma.



RICK SHAVER SEES THE CORNWALL ALUMNI BRANCH AS THE COLLEGE'S COMMUNITY CONNECTOR

BY Rick Shaver's account, there have been five years in the 30 since he graduated from the business program at the Cornwall campus when he was not involved some way with the alumni branch or the College in Cornwall. And that's only because those were the years he left the city.

But since the early 1980s, and through both thick and thin, he's been on call when the College, its students, or his fellow alumni have needed him.

"It's been a great way to keep in touch with graduates, meet new graduates and help them along the way," says Shaver, whose day job is publisher of the Seaway News weekly newspaper in Cornwall. "It's very gratifying to me to know that, by keeping these connections, we've been able to help students."

Shaver enjoys the interaction with the young people he helps, and it's his fervent wish to see more of SLC's young alumni take an active role in the branch and bring with them new ideas and fresh perspectives. There are so many opportunities to connect current students with alumni and their community, and to connect alumni with each other,

says Shaver, that the only thing lacking is the human power to make it happen.

It's why Shaver, past president of the branch, and Donna Ferguson (Business Administration – Finance '82), president, are hoping that 2008/09 will be a year of renewal for the volunteerrun group. They want to hear from fellow SLC alumni in Cornwall about how the alumni can strengthen their role as a vital connector of College and community, and they're hoping many will join them in the endeavour. According to Shaver, alumni have supported the branch's activities in the past – attending the annual dinner theatre and various other events over the years – but both he and Ferguson would like to see more take the next step from attendee, to organizer.

MIKE Bulanda sat in his front row seat, clutching his convocation program, and looked at his watch. He had managed to arrive on time, despite a minor incident at a client's jobsite only hours before that had resulted in him being covered in machine oil. He managed to get home, clean up, change into a suit, and make it to the 2008 Brockville campus convocation in time to welcome the newest members to the St. Lawrence College alumni family.

Bulanda was not the slightest bit flustered. In fact, this was pretty familiar territory. He'd volunteered in the past to represent alumni at Convocation – handing out pins and speaking for a few minutes to the gathered graduates and their families. He had also done this – graduate from St Lawrence, that is – four times himself. The convocation stage is almost a second home in a career that has spanned 27 years and includes a number of trips back to his alma mater.

"Continuous improvement comes from continuous education," says Bulanda, whose original diploma was in Electrical Engineering Technology in 1981. "That's the best way to be competitive."

Today, his continuous improvement has resulted in a rich combination of education and experience that has landed him exactly where he wants to be: a self-employed troubleshooter that industrial plants call on when their processes and machinery are in need of Bulanda's unique combination of theoretical knowledge and hands-on skills. Electrical engineering, he says, taught him how to think. His subsequent return visits to St. Lawrence in the electrician program, and in the Maintenance Management certification, have put theory into practice.

"Continuous improvement comes from continuous education. That's the best way to be competitive."

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, today's students will have had 10-14 jobs by their 38th birthday. Canadian trends suggest we will have more

And it starts with the philosophy - shared by St. Lawrence College - that significant learning can and does occur outside the classroom and that academic credits should be awarded for an individual's learning without regard to where and how it was attained. The College recognizes that adults may acquire college-level learning through employment, volunteer activities, selfdirected study, travel, or other life experiences.

The Prior Learning Assessment and Recognition (PLAR) process at St.

Lawrence is designed to assist adult learners in identifying, describing, and demonstrating past learning that may be eligible for advanced standing or course credits towards the certificate or diploma of their choice. It is important to note that PLAR credits are awarded for appropriate learning that can be demonstrated, not just from the various experiences themselves. As well, in order to be eligible for credit, the learning achieved must be appropriate to the courses offered in the program of choice at St. Lawrence.

Any adult (19 years of age or older) or any secondary school graduate who believes she/he has prior learning that can be demonstrated and that is related to the St. Lawrence program of study may apply for PLAR.

than 6-8 careers in our lifetime. It's part of the reason why St. Lawrence College has become a lifelong learning partner for many of its alumni.

Whether it's continuing education in the form of returning to meet professional requirements – such as that required in nursing – or building upon the certificate or diploma already earned, there are as many paths to returning to relearn as there are alumni. And while the College is currently not tracking returning alumni as a separate group, an amazing 39% of recent grads questioned as part of the 2008 Key Performance Indicator (KPI) survey reported they had either completed or acquired some college or university prior to their most recent trip back to school.

For Lorraine Carter, Vice President, Academic, it's no surprise that so many former students find themselves in familiar halls. What started primarily in Continuing Education, where course catalogues were a source for recent grads looking for what Carter calls "credentialism" to polish their resumes and enhance existing career choices, has grown to include: the recent launch of Second Career (see sidebar, page 11) to help those whose jobs no longer exist to get the education they need to find new ones; or Ontario Learn which provides online learning from the comfort of your home offered by a variety of colleges with credits transferable to all; or an ever-growing offering of post-graduate and degree programs. The College has adapted to the needs of both its traditional intake of high school students, and the returning, adult learner.

"One of the goals of the college system is accessibility. It's our raison

I've learned have helped me learn about myself. It's like layers."

Those "layers" are also becoming more prized in the workplace. According to Canada Job Futures, prior work experience is a significant indicator of career success for those who return to school. For example, 72% of graduates of college level social service worker programs with previous work experience found a job in their field within one month of graduation. Further, a re-

port by Canadian Policy Research Networks found that in 2002, adult learners aged 25 to 54 were more likely to pursue a college diploma (36%) than a university degree (29%).

But what about creating the best of both – the combined practical applied learning at college with the theory of a university program? That's exactly what is happening this year with the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree program at the Kingston campus. This September the program will welcome its first batch of three-year Business diploma alumni into the degree program and Chelsea Frappier for one is excited but nervous.

"We've done all the reading online, but we're going in kind of blindfolded," says Frappier. Luckily, she's not alone. The "we" includes four of her fellow grads from the Business Adminis-

tration – Accounting program at Cornwall, who are all entering the program together. She's thankful for the company, but this valedictorian of the class of 2008 was determined to go into the degree program from the moment she read about it on the internet last summer.

"This is amazing. Not only do you get to transfer (your credits) but you get the best of both," says Frappier. When she graduated from high school, she had considered university, but was unsure what or where she wanted to study. It was her mother, also an SLC Business alumna, who inspired her to stay in Cornwall and go to the College and take Business. "I love that St. Lawrence College has that first year that's general in nature and lets you experience so many different things," she says.

Tragically, Frappier's mother was diagnosed with cancer and passed away during her daughter's second year, and now she's thankful she chose to stay close to home to get her diploma before obtaining a degree. And her discovery of the opportunities of entering the BBA degree program was a welcome distraction during a tumultuous time. "I'm just starting to get my focus and this has really helped," says Frappier.

The BBA is a collaborative degree program with Laurentian University. Coordinator Greg Libitz points out that it bears all the markings of the program of the same name at Laurentian, and that the same standards – from entrance grades to required courses and electives, to professorial qualifications - are required. After all, students may attend St. Lawrence College, but their degree will say Laurentian University.

So what's the benefit to the SLC business grad? How about the opportunity to get a degree without leaving home? Or class sizes that would make the Ivy League jealous? Or, perhaps best of all, the ability to finish the degree sooner?

According to Libitz, a business alum with a three-year diploma "will do it in three terms." And when you consider the math – three year diploma at college



A Second Chance

When the door closes on one career, can another one open? The answer is yes, and a new provincial government strategy can help pay for it.

Second Career is a new initiative launched over the summer to help the recently-laid off to get the training they need for a fresh start. And St.

Lawrence College is a partner in the initiative.

The aim is to re-train in areas where there is job sector growth — such as in healthcare and hospitality and tourism.

tuition rate, plus three terms at university (versus the traditional four years of university) - it doesn't take an accounting grad to see there's a significant advantage. "The most economical way (to get a business degree) is to complete the diploma and flow through to the degree," admits Libitz about the one of the best, unadvertised, opportunities in higher education.

Perhaps even more important to alumni who are working and raising families, the degree can also be taken

part-time. "We were very conscious about trying to make the core courses later in the day for just that reason," says Libitz.

Still other programs, like Hotel and Restaurant management for example, are offering post graduate opportunities to their grads with advanced placement in sister programs, such as the upcoming Tourism Management offering directed to


Hotel and Restaurant grads this winter term. Since the two programs share much of the same courses, grads from either program can secure a second diploma simply by coming back to complete those courses specific to the program.

In some respects, St. Lawrence's varied options in 2008 may appear a radical departure from the days when the path to higher education followed a fairly straight route from high school, but in fact, it's as true to its mission today as it was in 1967.

"We're delivering education into the hands of those who require it," says Libitz. "It's all about choice and now that choice is in the hands of the learner." Whether those hands are that of a teenager or a fortysomething, the principles of accessibility, affordability and community development that were part of the original mandate for Ontario's colleges remains in effect. And best of all, it's the students who benefit most.

"There's nothing better than a classroom that has a broad range of ages and experience," says Lorraine Carter.

"I was 21 years old when I got out of college," remembers Bulanda, who describes himself as a "stubborn student" who actually finished high school after graduating – the first time – from St. Lawrence College. "I didn't know I'd like being a student so much," he chuckles, "but next time I go, it will be for fun. I think I'll take scuba diving."







THERE'S WISDOM FOR ALL IN THE WORDS OF VALEDICTORIANS

At seven convocation ceremonies, over four days and in three different locations, the Class of 2008 crossed the stages to become the newest members of the St. Lawrence College alumni family. With diplomas and certificates in hand, the graduates heard from their valedictorians some words to remember. . . we've excerpted a couple below:

COLIN COCKERELL – Cornwall, Motive Power Technician 2008

... The challenging part is speaking to every person and department in this room being only one person whose experiences cannot speak to all of yours. Plugged In

ENERGY STUDENTS PUT SEVEN ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS ON THE CONSERVATION TRACK

WHEN alumni go back to school, it's called "Return to ReLearn". But when SLC students go back to the schools of the Limestone District School Board, it's all about energy.

In the ground-breaking partnership with the Limestone Board and the Ontario Power Authority, teams of students from SLC's Energy Systems Engineering Technician (ESET) and Technologist Program conducted energy audits at seven Limestone elementary schools over the course of last year.


The result is comprehensive energy cost reduction plans developed for the pilot schools, which the LDSB has already begun implementing. Approximately \$170,000 has been invested on the suggested recommendations from the audits.

The seven pilot schools were Lord Strathcona Public School, Harrowsmith Public School, Central Public School, Winston Churchill Public School, First Ave Public School, Centennial Public School and Welborne Ave Public School.

One PV system was installed at Central P.S. over this summer, and a second system was installed at Winston Churchill PS August 27 and 28. In September, three solar walls and two photovoltaic (PV) systems were to be installed at four schools in an effort to enhance energy efficiency and conservation. Solar walls will be installed at Central PS, First Ave. PS, and Welborne Ave. PS sometime early this fall.

Audits will be performed on a further 15 schools in the 2008-2009 school year.

"It is very exciting for the Limestone District School Board to be involved with this ground-breaking project which combines education, energy conservation, and school operating costs,"



says Brenda Hunter, Director of Education, Limestone District School Board.

This innovative partnership is assisting the Limestone District School Board in enhancing the energy efficiencies within its buildings as well as providing profound real-world learning experiences for both St. Lawrence College and Limestone students.



Writers in Waiting

ALTHOUGH there are days when I wonder how to deal with one more comma splice, I do have the best job at St.

Lawrence College. Why? It is my privilege, every day, to read the incredibly profound words of many of our students. What do community college students know about writing, you ask? What could our hands-on, practical learners have to say that would be astonishing?

The depth of wonder, reflection, analysis and moral intelligence in the writing I see every day is astounding. It can easily be found beneath the contractions, "sprinkled" commas, and instantmessaging language. It often emerges like a languorous sunrise from the dark-

ness of second-language surface errors. As students explore new writing styles and are encouraged to express themselves in more meaningful writing formats, they slowly begin to see themselves as capable of written expression. When asked to be concise and clear, rather than wordy and overly erudite, students begin to understand that they have something to say - something any reader would be interested in perusing.

One of my favourite tasks in this job is to tell students that they are good writers. Many of them have not been successful in high school English and firmly believe that their writing is unworthy. Those with specific learning challenges have a legacy of red "colouring" on returned assignments. The assumption that poor spelling, punctuation and grammar (which I

often do
see) equate
with poor
writing is held
dearly in our society.

No, we have not introduced a creative writing course at SLC. What we have done is to ask our students to become new writers in a learning environment where they can succeed. The C+ on their final high school English essay can be forgotten, and the resultant "I can't write" (which I hear frequently) can be reframed.

You would be interested in my job? Sorry, it is not available. I am too busy pondering the future of our college writers...

Bursary announced for business degree students

EARNING a university degree at St. Lawrence College just became even more accessible with the establishment of an entrance award available to an eligible student entering the Laurentian University Bachelor of Business Administration program at SLC.

The Bachelor of Business Administration Entrance Award will be awarded to a new student who is enrolled full-time in the BBA program and who has demonstrated great potential for success and academic commitment. Applicants will be asked to outline their career objectives and any experiences and/or achievements that will help them to achieve these goals. Students entering first year, as well as those who have been accepted into the program with advanced standing, are eligible to apply.

"This is great news for students considering the Laurentian BBA program at St. Lawrence," says Greg Libitz, Program Coordinator. "Scholarships, bursaries and awards are of enormous benefit in opening doors to higher education for deserving students." The BBA program provides students with the opportunity to earn a four-year Laurentian University degree at the Kingston campus of St. Lawrence College. In addition to the required business curriculum, students can choose from a range of university-level electives to configure a course of study that best meets their needs and career aspirations. SLC moves to the front of Wind Power education

ST. Lawrence College has moved to the forefront of the "green collar" movement, by completing a bilateral agreement with Trillium Power Wind Corporation (Trillium Power) to establish a series of training and educational programs that will assist in the development of offshore and onshore wind developments in Canada.

Once these programs are in place, the College will be uniquely positioned as the only educational institution in North America to offer a comprehensive series of courses for maintaining offshore, near-shore and onshore wind developments.

Trillium Power president and CEO John Kourtoff says the agreement is an indication of the opportunities in the green economy and he thanked provincial environment minister John Gerretsen for connecting his company and SLC over a year ago.

"We have been working for over two years to develop this unique program in Ontario. Our strategic partnership with our European training partners, noted as the best in the world, will provide Ontario with cutting-edge skills for the development of green-collar enterprises and manufacturing in Ontario to meet the exacting requirements of offshore wind development," says Don Young, Dean of Applied Sciences at St. Lawrence College. "Trillium Power's support for our programs is very important because they are strategically committed to working together to implement clean energy and sustainable economic development solutions here in Ontario, and elsewhere in Canada."

Trillium Power's Kourtoff added: "Offshore wind in The Great Lakes is far more powerful and consistent (due to its inherent characteristics) and therefore able to reliably meet the energy demands of Ontario residents and businesses. Offshore wind is highly cost-effective when compared to similar sized onshore wind projects, and more so when compared to non-renewable energy projects such as natural gas and others on a lifecycle basis."

"Trillium Power Wind 1, planned for mid-Lake Ontario south-east of Prince Edward County, is an important green-collar enterprise that can assist in shifting Ontario's highly-skilled workforce to well-paying, sustainable, 'green tech' manufacturing and services jobs that are highly sought by all jurisdictions around the world."



SLC pays out in Saskatchewan

THEY'RE a small, but distinct group of St. Lawrence graduates. They've never stepped foot on any campus, nor have they attended any of the big convocation ceremonies. But for 212 graduates of the Leadership for Managers certificate program – delivered by SLC's corporate training office in Kingston – it's the education, not the location, that counts.


In Fall 2007, St. Lawrence College welcomed its most far flung graduates when the first class of managers of six Saskatchewan-based casinos received their certificates. And since then, a total of 212 students have graduated from the program, with even more planning to do so into 2009.

And best of all, they didn't leave home to do it.

When the Saskatchewan Indian Gaming Authority was seeking management training for the mid-level managers of its six casino properties, they found the SLC program fit the bill. The Leadership for Managers instructional team delivered the first six sessions at the Wanuskewin Heritage Park in Saskatoon, before moving to the training centre at SIGA's newest property, Living Sky Casino at Swift Current.

During the intense, five-day program, students learn about topics such as Change Management, Strategic Planning, and Labour Law. SIGA has been so pleased with the results, they've committed to offering the certificate into 2009, and are in the process of reserving another 300 seats for a one-day Dispute and Conflict Resolution session.

The Leadership for Managers certificate was first piloted in the Kingston area, and another session is expected in Kingston in 2008-09.






