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Job Connect

Job Connect is a programme designed to serve the needs of both unemployed youth aged 16 to 24 and employers in Eastern Ontario. The goal of the service is to help individuals gain the skills and knowledge they need to find and keep jobs and to provide human resource expertise for employers who have work to be undertaken. It is delivered through a partnership of community agencies and St. Lawrence College.

There are three components: an Information and Referral Service for individuals to gather information on careers and occupations, the local job market, training opportunities and job search strategies; an Employment Planning and Preparation component to help individuals clarify their employment needs, establish short and long term goals and develop an action plan and prepare for employment and a Job Placement service for those who may need a bit more help finding work and developing skills relevant to their specific career goals. Participants in this last component are matched with employers looking for workers and they may benefit from a training subsidy.

The partners in this initiative have worked with hundreds of employers and have assisted literally thousands of young people to find work in our region. If you are between 16 and 24, out of school and out of work, find out more at the Employment & Education Centre of Cornwall & District (E.E.R.C.), the Youth Employment Assistance Headquarters (YEAH) in Brockville or at KEYS, Kingston Employment and Youth Services. 



St. Lawrence Achieves Honour Roll on Provincial Report Card

On April 5, 2000, the Association of Colleges of Applied Arts Technology of Ontario (ACAATO) released the most recent Key Performance Indicator (KPI) results. St. Lawrence College performed extremely well in the three indicators currently used as the basis for performance funding from the province. St. Lawrence showed substantial improvement from last year's results in each measure and our performance relative to other colleges was also impressive.

The KPI project is a collaborative effort between the 25 colleges of applied arts and technology in Ontario and the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities. Performance-based funding is currently 2% of the funding in 2000-01, and increases to up to 6% in 2002-03. Independent research firms contact college graduates and their employers six months after graduation to gather feedback on college performance.

Specific results for St. Lawrence College are:

- Graduate Employment Rate 90% (up from 86% last year and equal to the provincial average),
- Graduate Satisfaction Rate 84% (up from 71% last year and 4% above the provincial average),
- Employer Satisfaction Rate 94% (up from 84% last year and 3% above the provincial average).

The results of the Student Satisfaction Survey were also released with St. Lawrence College achieving an overall Student Satisfaction Rate of 70% (the same result as last year and 2% above the provincial average. The Student Satisfaction Rate and the fifth and final KPI measure, Graduation Rate, are currently measured but not yet a component of the performance-based funding formula.

"Although the KPI process is new for the College, we have taken it very seriously," said Charlie Labarge, Interim President of SLC. "It helps to ensure we are accountable to our stakeholders. We have improved both our own ratings in the performance measures and our results relative to other Ontario colleges. It is a credit to the quality system of continuous improvement we have implemented at St. Lawrence. However, we realize that quality is a journey, not a destination, and we are focused on improving our performance again next year."

Labarge continued, "we can certainly say, with pride, to our students, staff and graduates, that our college ranks extremely high in those areas that most fit our mandate to prepare our students for the workforce."

St. Lawrence College Students Named on Mitel's New Software Patent

St. Lawrence College and Mitel Corporation have collaborated on a new software patent.

Five Computer Engineering Technology students from St. Lawrence worked on a project, called Smart Logs, which entailed sorting the logged information by seeking specific patterns and creating a critical summary log with this new information. Currently, an experienced operator has to sit at this same computer to interpret many screens full of events, while looking for certain patterns occurring in certain sequences to determine the true cause of a system problem. The students completed their task in April 2000 and presented their project in an easy to read web page format which can be accessed by an operator anywhere in the world. Mitel was so pleased with the software design that they decided to patent it.

Professor Trevor Rainey said that this is the first time a project has been by Luetta Trenholme

patented in the five years the College has been involved with these projects. "The students received fantastic support from software designers and developers at Mitel, along with Professor Colin Banger at the College," noted Rainey. "They also got experience in reporting and making presentations in a professional setting."

Tonis Kasvand, software designer at Mitel and project leader for the Smart Logs project, along with Tom Gray, research coordinator (and St. Lawrence alumnus), met with the students regularly in Kingston and Ottawa over the past six months. "The St. Lawrence students demonstrated the skills, determination, and professionalism that Mitel looks for in people. Mitel will recognize any student on a patent we feel deserves it, and each student on the Smart Logs project earned this status" says Kasvand.

Rainey had asked Mitel Corpora-

tion in Ottawa to provide a project that would allow students to get the latest skills in software development. Mitel Corporation has a program called the External Research Program that provides research projects for students ranging from undergraduate to PHD levels. The five third year Computer Engineering Technology students - Tyler Elliott, Dennis Fortin, Rebecca Jones, Brian Mooy, and Audil Virk - were given the job in September 1999 to automate the process of interpreting telephone switch data before the end of April 2000.

The Smart Logs project, along with many others, was on display at the annual Technology Open House at St. Lawrence College in Kingston on Wednesday, April 12, 2000.

Mitel has already hired Audil Virk, and two other Computer Engineering Technology students this year from St. Lawrence College.

St. Lawrence Partners with SmartForce

St. Lawrence has entered into an agreement with SmartForce Canada Ltd. to offer their "e-Learning" solutions to students and staff at the College.

"The partnership will give 5,000 students and staff at the College access to more than 250 business and computer software training subjects using the Internet," explains Charlie Labarge, Interim President of the College. "There is no charge to our full time students for access to these courses. It's another way we can add extra value for students choosing to study at our College."

While offering a variety of practical computer-based skills, many of the subject titles can also lead to industry recognized certification. Microsoft Certified

Software Engineer (MSCE), Microsoft Office User Specialist (MOUS), A+, and N+ are but a few of the curriculum packages available under the agreement. This specialized accreditation is well recognized in the information technology sector today.

"The world wide web has fundamentally changed the way we acquire knowledge. Higher education is in the knowledge business and as educators, we must embrace this change," states Jeanie Sawyer, St. Lawrence's Vice-President, Academic. "Our learning environments must ensure that students are learning with technology, not simply by technology. The new knowledge tools of computers and the world wide web

allow us to have flexible, personalized and faster communication. The key now is to utilize these tools while supporting the core process of interaction with the teacher."

"As educators we have a responsibility to provide our students access to these knowledge tools and to ensure that they know how to learn with them," says Sawyer. "The e-learning approach of SmartForce provides us with accessible, quality curriculum to do just that. Our graduates will have a competitive advantage in the workplace where they will be required to keep their skill sets current. Lifelong learning in the 21st century is seen by employers as the driving force in the knowledge-based economy."

Unique Microchip Design Opportunity for Electronics Students

Microchips are in everything from cell phones to hearing aids and automobiles. Right now there is a world shortage of people with microchip design experience and universities cannot supply the demand.

St. Lawrence College's Electronics Engineering Technology students have an edge. Five of their professors (David Athersych, Lindsay Geoffrey, Jake Hofstee, Hugh McLaren and Trevor Rainey) have each been seconded to the Canadian Microelectronics Corporation (CMC) in Kingston over the past few years. They have come back to the College with microchip design technology which they have integrated into the Electronics Engineering Technology program.

Last year Hofstee, on secondment to CMC, brought back an agreement from CMC and Gennum Corporation (a Burlington microchip fabricator) whereby Gennum would provide space on their production runs for our students. This has enabled the College to be the first in Canada to offer courses in microchip design integrating layout, simulation, production, testing and documenting its behaviour. This partnership now makes the Electronics program unique. Previously this was only available to graduate students at university.

"This provides fantastic motivation for students to see their microchips fabricated and allows them to test their actual designs, says Geoffrey. "Up until now they could only simulate it." In the past two years, companies have been coming on campus to hire students because of this initiative, and are very impressed with the capabilities of our grads.

Another Electronics technical project using microchips is a design for airbag deployment. The project detects the deployment of an automobile's airbag. It then dials a pre-set cell phone number, e.g. 911. When that number is answered, the system sends a verbal message informing the listener that an accident has occurred and supplies the latitude and longitude of the accident location. The project has other applications, e.g. anti-theft. It could notify the owner if his/her vehicle was being broken into. It could also continuously transmit vehicle speed and location for tracing or monitoring.


Brad Hill Inducted into Sports Hall of Fame

Kingston professor and former Vikings coach, Brad Hill, was inducted into the Kingston & District Sports Hall of Fame at their annual dinner held on May 5.

Hill, a professor in the Business Department at the Kingston campus, was delighted to receive the honour. "I was absolutely thrilled," he said. The text of the plaque is as follows:

Bradley Burns "Brad" Hill

An excellent 400-metre runner in his youth, Brad won many provincial and national championships. He reached the semi-finals of the Olympic Trials in 1964. He ran his best time in the event, 49.1 seconds, in 1965.

He continued to compete and win national and provincial medals in masters competition. At the age of 37, he posted a best Canadian time of 50.9 seconds to place second at the North American Sub Masters Championships.

In 1977 Brad joined the Business department at St. Lawrence College, where he organized and coached the college's first cross-country running team in 1978, which won the next four Ontario colleges' championships.

In January, 1983, Brad founded the Kidd-Crothers Athletic club, to provide an opportunity for local middle distance runners to fulfill the goals of "Commitment, Maximization, and Fun." The club produced many provincially and nationally ranked athletes. Brad also coached the cross-country and distance teams at Queen's University. He received a National Achievement Award from the Premier for outstanding contribution to sport in Ontario. In 1999, Brad was an inaugural inductee into the St. Lawrence College Sports Wall of Fame.

The Brockville Campus is currently engaged in a revitalization process which establishes a benchmark for St. Lawrence College.

After several years of declining enrollment and profitability, the campus is beginning to see positive results from the implementation of a development plan approved by the College Board of Governors in June 1999. As the smallest of the three campuses, Brockville has had the greatest difficulty in dealing with declining levels of public funding for post-secondary education which characterized most of the 1990's and continues to persist in 2000. Operating a full service campus in a small market poses unique challenges in this environment. It is increasingly difficult to offer a range of programs appealing to all learners in the community in a cost effective fashion. The March 1998 decision by the College Board of Governors to pursue restructuring initiatives on the Brockville and Cornwall campuses was preceded by major college-wide cutbacks in 1994 and 1996. For Brockville, the spring 1998 decisions meant a number of programs would be moved to Kingston to increase enrollment, and approximately 20,000 square feet of physical space needed to be rented or decommissioned.

The experience of several years of restructuring coupled with strong community reaction to the latest changes reinforced the belief that a more proactive community based approach to planning was required. Former President Dan Corbett initiated a community consultation process to develop strategies to mitigate further short-term losses and maximize long-term value delivered to the community. The process

was coordinated through the "City-College Committee" which provided a forum for staff and community representatives to develop a vision for the future of the campus. A preliminary report was presented to the college board of governors in October 1998 (Charting the Course: Setting Direction for the Brockville Campus) resulting in the final set of recommendations approved in June 1999.

The plan entitled "Revitalizing the Brockville Campus" provides a strategic direction and framework to establish a viable program mix responsive to the needs of learners and employers. It strives to achieve strategic alignment between college activities and the social and economic development of the region. In charting the new course for the campus, the plan is premised on the following:

Vision

To be the multipurpose education and training facility of choice for students from Leeds-Grenville seeking local access to college education opportunities.

Mission

To develop and deliver a core set of programs and services and to continuously develop selected areas of program and service specialization that respond to the unique economic and social characteristics of the Leeds-Grenville region.

"The Little Campus That Could"

Goals

- Develop and deliver a sustainable set of programs and services that meet financial targets.
- 2. Develop and deliver a sustainable set of programs and services that meet the economic and social needs of; and therefore deliver value to, the region.

In order to achieve these goals, implementation plans are being pursued in three key delivery areas of full-time, part-time, and corporate training programs.

In the area of full-time programs, the goal is to reach 525 students by 2001/02. As the core business of the College and the primary source of revenue, full-time program growth is critical to campus success. The plan for a 60% increase in enrollment by the spring of 2002 is based on the development of a balanced program mix appealing to the needs of all learners in the community and aligned with industry employment demand. This will be accomplished by offering programs in each of the four general categories of Business, Technology, Health Sciences, and Applied Arts.

Progress to date includes new programs in Computerized Business Systems, Hospitality Services, and Practical Nurse. Plans for September 2000, have additional programs in Police Foundations, Real Property Administration, Business Administration, and a Nursing "fast-track" program.

A growing market for part-time studies exists given the trend towards greater recognition of learning as a lifelong activity. The Internet has also opened up new opportunities for dis-

tance education through on-line learning. In addition to offering traditional evening courses, the Brockville campus is pursuing part-time programming in several other areas. All distance education programs available through St. Lawrence College are now centralized at the Brockville campus. In addition to several established print-based programs, St. Lawrence has entered a consortium of 14 Ontario colleges to offer courses on the Internet. Over 150 courses are available through Contact South, which in many cases may be recognized as credit in diploma and certificate programs.

Responding to the educational needs of the growing segment of retirees and seniors in the community, a program designed specifically for the 50+ age group has been started. Modeled after a successful program in Cornwall, the Encore Senior's Education Centre is currently running short daytime courses.

In keeping with the goal of leasing surplus physical space to groups with complementary services, the campus is now home to the following organizations:

Upper Canada District School Board

The Upper Canada District School Board operates the T.R. Leger Alternative School from the third floor of the campus. St. Lawrence College's Cornwall campus has enjoyed a similar relationship with the T.R. Leger School for several years. The primary focus of the programming is upgrading and high school equivalency, which enables the school to become a feeder for St. Lawrence College programs.

Manpower

With over 2,500 offices in 48 countries, Manpower is the largest staffing and training organization in the world. It provides job placement services in office, call centre, industrial, technical, IT, skilled trade, and professional environments. It also provides IT and computer applications training to temporary employees and clients.

Kampus Kids Child Care Centre

Formerly housed at the Brockville Psychiatric Hospital, the Kampus Kids Child Care Centre opened its doors in April 1999. Operating from the northwest corner of the building, it also features newly constructed playground facilities adjacent to the building. The centre is licensed for 47 children each day including infants, toddlers and preschoolers.

Other on-site partners include Brown's Fine Food - food service operations, Sodexho Marriot Services - housekeeping, and YM/YWCA - athletics/ student life.

Efforts to implement a focused campus development plan have produced clear results in terms of new program initiatives and improved enrollment demand. There is a growing sense of renewal and positive momentum for the campus both internally and in the community after a period of restructuring and reduced enrollment. Over 100 new full-time students began programs since the start of the new year and preliminary figures on applications for September 2000 look promising. The ongoing efforts of dedicated college staff combined with the support of the community will ensure the Brockville Campus of St. Lawrence College remains an important contributor to economic development in Leeds and Grenville.

What's Up on Campus?

The Student Association: Voicing Student Success

1999 began with hosting by-elections to fill vacant Board positions, and building spirit within the SLC student body by decorating and celebrating Easter in the Student Centre.

It was then that the executive team began planning the Orientation '99 lineup...with the theme today is the first day of the rest of your life. After many meetings, phone calls, faxes, and emails, a plan began to come together and on September 3rd, 1999 Team SA welcomed more than 1,200 new faces to the Kingston Campus! All of these events were designed to help new (even returning!) students become acquainted with the campus, the Kingston community, and most of all, to meet new people and have a good

Not having time to rest, Team SA continued to plan more exciting events for the student body, and filled the poster boards with announcements for upcoming events. Before the end of semester one, Team SA hosted a Thanksgiving turkey stuffing, a haunted house

themed as the mad laboratory of Frankenstein, a United Way silent auction and semi-formal, *plus* the annual Christmas Santa Party and Fundraiser.

Other accomplishments during semester one included my election to the Association of Canadian Community Colleges (ACCC) Board of Directors and Executive Committee as the student advisor. This allowed me to voice college student concerns on the Canada Millennium Scholarship Program, and provide representation at a nation wide "Think Tank" on student debt in education, and many other concerns to be heard on a national level. In addition, I showcased our College and college communities to other ACCC members within Canada. Vice President of Finance, Cassandra Chapman, was elected as the Financial Advisor for the Ontario Community College Student Parliamentary Association (OCCSPA). Again, this allowed for students concerns to be voiced at a provincial level, and the ability to lobby the government on pressing concerns with OSAP and increasing tuition levels. Executive Vice President, Debra Debney, became the Ontario College Application Service (OCAS) Representative and in this role lobbied to lower the application fee and other fees incurred with the application process to post-secondary institutions.

The pace picked up in semester two with school wide elections for the 2000/2001 student government, various meetings, and plans for Organ Donor Awareness Day and Spirit Week activities. March brought a St. Patrick's Day "pub" in the student centre, final preparations for the changeover of Student Government, *plus* the athletic banquet where our College athletes were honoured for their accomplishments during the year and the Student Association for their contributions to the athletic program.

Throughout the year, the Student Association allocated money toward new parking lights in the parking lots, new library books and resources for students, a "vet ware" package for the veterinary technology students, additional bus shelters, and many other projects. The SA made donations on behalf of students to the Heart and Stroke Foundation, the United Way, the Sunshine Foundation, and the Children's Wish Foundation.

It was a very exciting year in the Student Association, with many challenges and changes, but as past Vice President of Student Life (1997/1998), Amy Watkins, told me: "the Student Association is a thrilling roller coaster experience, and it will change you forever!" As President of the Student Association for 1999/2000, I would like to thank all the Board of Directors, Student Association staff, students, College staff, faculty and administration that made this year a year of incredible accomplishments, school spirit, and allowed me to represent the voice of the students. You afforded me the opportunity to meet many new people and make lasting friendships - Thank You! St. Lawrence's Alumni Plan

In 1999 the College's Board of Governors endorsed a Development Plan which called for increased staffing, as well as the creation of a new Director in Alumni & Development. Since that time we have developed an Alumni Plan which focuses our Mission, and outlines our Key Result Areas for the next three years. The following highlights are excerpts from that plan.

Mission

"The Alumni Office exists to meet the needs of the alumni community through the provision of programs and services which encourage the development of a life-long relationship with St. Lawrence".

Vision

The goals of the alumni area are to:

- Strengthen our relationship / ties with alumni.
- Continually revise and expand the alumni data base.
- Enhance the scope and professionalism of the alumni operations.
- Maintain a regular distribution schedule for Voyageur, and work toward enhancing its economic viability.
- Establish alumni branches, beginning with our campus communities.
- Work towards establishing a regularly scheduled series of formal campus reunions.
- Enhance alumni involvement in alumni-driven special events and class reunions.
- Enhance communications so that programs and services are alumni-driven.
- Foster internal feelings and external exhibitions of affinity and institutional pride.
- Cultivate "friend raising" with the alumni constituency, in order to build support for the Foundation's "fund raising" initiatives.

Key Result Areas (KRA's)

Our Key Result Areas for alumni operations are: data base, Voyageur alumni magazine, programs and services, branch development, reunions, and profile.

Performance Measures

For each of the above mentioned KRA's, the following are the specific performance measures.

Data Base:

- install Raiser's Edge software, allowing the office to organize and sub-catagorize the various sub-groups of alumni.
- provide opportunities to clean and revise the data base through the distribution of Annual Appeal packages, and a regular circulation of Voyageur.
- determine our current number of clean addresses, compared to the total number of graduates, and work on improving those measures over time.
- increase the number of current e-mail addresses and employment information.

Voyageur Alumni Magazine:

- establish and maintain a regular, triannual, distribution schedule.
- develop a data base of potential advertisers, and work to increase that revenue.
- create a set of editorial policies and procedures.
- migrate to "publications format" under Canada Post guidelines for improved economic feasibility.
- increase number of contributors (authors).
- introduce spot colour on inside pages.
- seek input from alumni with regard to content and format.
- utilize Voyageur as a cost-effective distribution vehicle for the 00-01 Annual Appeal package.

Programs and Services:

- review status of programs and services.
- utilize data base created for Voyageur advertising to solicit alumni discounts.
- develop and produce an Alumni Perks bookmark for distribution in graduation packages.
- maintain a directory of post-diploma programs and university articulation agreements with universities.
- grow and evolve the slate of programs and services based on feedback from an survey, as well as from alumni branches.

Branch Development:

- survey the field, develop, and produce a Branch Development Handbook.
- arrange for and promote initial information meetings in Brockville, Cornwall and Kingston.
- determine the amount of interest in branch activities.
- work with branch executives and volunteers as required to grow and develop active branches, with possible future expansion to other centres.
- over time, consider the viability of establishing a St. Lawrence Alumni Association.

Reunions:

- provide support and guidance for alumnidriven class / club reunions.
- develop a plan for a systematic, rotating series of formal campus reunions (eg. Brockville one year, Cornwall the next, Kingston the next, etc.)

Profile:

- purchase an alumni banner & investigate the purchase of bulk promotional items.
- work with the three student governments to sponsor a student awareness event on each campus each year.
- work toward an enhanced profile at convocation ceremonies.
- several previously mentioned strategies also enhance alumni profile.

Critical Success Factors

In order for the alumni plan to be successful, the following critical success factors must be in place: long-term college commitment, resources, campus and community support, and most importantly, the support and involvement of the alumni themselves.

Summary

St. Lawrence is committed to our alumni operations through the above plan, and is looking forward to working inconcert with our graduates to ensure the successful fulfillment of our stated mission.

Are You Interested in Turning Your Nursing Diploma into a Degree?

Under a special agreement made between the Association of Colleges of Arts and Technology in Ontario and the University of Western Sydney, students completing a three year diploma of nursing at a College of Arts and Technology in Ontario, such as St. Lawrence, will be given two and a half years of academic credit towards a nursing degree at the University of western Sydney which is located in Sydney, Australia.

The University of Western Sydney (UWS) is a member of the internationally recognised Association of Commonwealth Universities. Accordingly, the academic awards conferred by the University are internationally recognised. Consequently, the UWS nursing degree is an internationally recognised degree.

Completion of the UWS nursing and health science double degree, which is a four year undergraduate degree, requires three semesters of study for RN s who hold a three year (or equivalent) Canadian College nursing diploma.

To date many Canadian nurses have graduated from UWS and some students have taken the opportunity to have a holiday (or working holiday) during their stay in Australia. Canadian RNs (English speaking), are eligible for Australian Nursing Registration - no examination is required.

OF WESTERN SYDNEY

Currently the UWS nursing degree program is offered at our University in Sydney, Australia, however, the degree program may also be offered in distance mode soon.

UWS also offers Nursing Masters Degrees (13 specialties currently offered), and some are also available in distance mode; research degrees including the doctoral program are also available.
