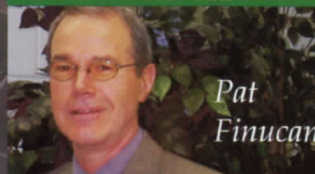

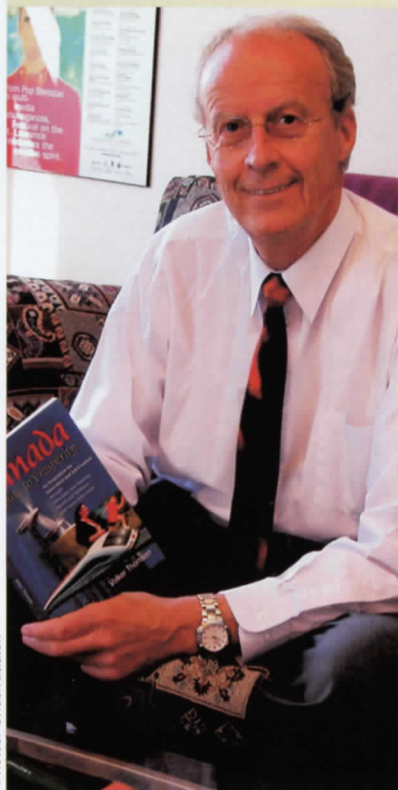

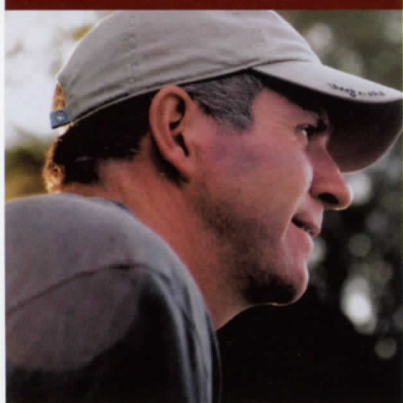

Sandra Hawkins



When Sandra Hawkins took the leap from a federal government position to become a full-time artist, she not only landed on her feet, but hit the ground running.

"In the spring of 1997, I left a career in the federal government to pursue my art fulltime," explains Sandra. "I had been a social scientist with a career specialization in socio-cultural policy issues relating to federal-aboriginal funding policies."

While she was still enjoying her career as a social scientist, Sandra took the occasional workshop in painting, drawing, or ceramics. Then, in 1994, she painted a portrait of her grandson Mackenzie, and it gave her such a wonderful feeling of fulfillment and joy that she never looked back. In 1997, Sandra earned her Certificate in Fine Arts from the College's Brockville campus and followed that up two years later with a Bachelor of Fine Arts, magna cum laude, from the University of Ottawa.

"It seemed that whatever I wanted to do concerning my art, the answer was always yes," Sandra says. "I worked hard but it was as if I had been by this way before and just needed reminding, yet it I was full of wonder at seeing a new way."

"In addition to my studies in fine art studio practice and theory, an ap-

prenticeship at the National Art Gallery working on the 1998 *Crossings* exhibition of art installations provided me with a solid foundation to "come-out" so to speak as an emerging contemporary Canadian artist in 1999."

Since then, Sandra's visual and media artworks have been shown across Canada and internationally at commercial and public galleries and at video festivals. She combines her art career with her love of travel and learning about new cultures.

One of the highlights of her artistic career occurred in 2004 when the prestigious X'ian Academy of Fine Arts in Xian China held a solo exhibition of her paintings, photographs and videos. The Canadian embassy in Beijing and Chinese government, Academy and artist representatives spoke about the exhibition during the opening ceremony, which was attended by over a thousand people. "I was absolutely flabbergasted at all the attention," she says. "I also delivered two lectures on the business of art for Canadian visual artists to more than 400 Chinese art students and presented a painting demonstration at the Academy. Two Ottawa-area artist-

run galleries, the Ontario Art Council and Foreign Affairs Canada contributed in my obtaining financial exhibition assistance. I find it particularly encouraging to have had so much recognition by my own city, province, and country."

When asked what drew her to the arts, Sandra explains that "intellectually, I'm drawn to my new career as a contemporary visual and media artist for the room it gives to discuss and push established boundaries about how we see ourselves as human beings. Emotionally, I enjoy creating and being in the flow of the moment."

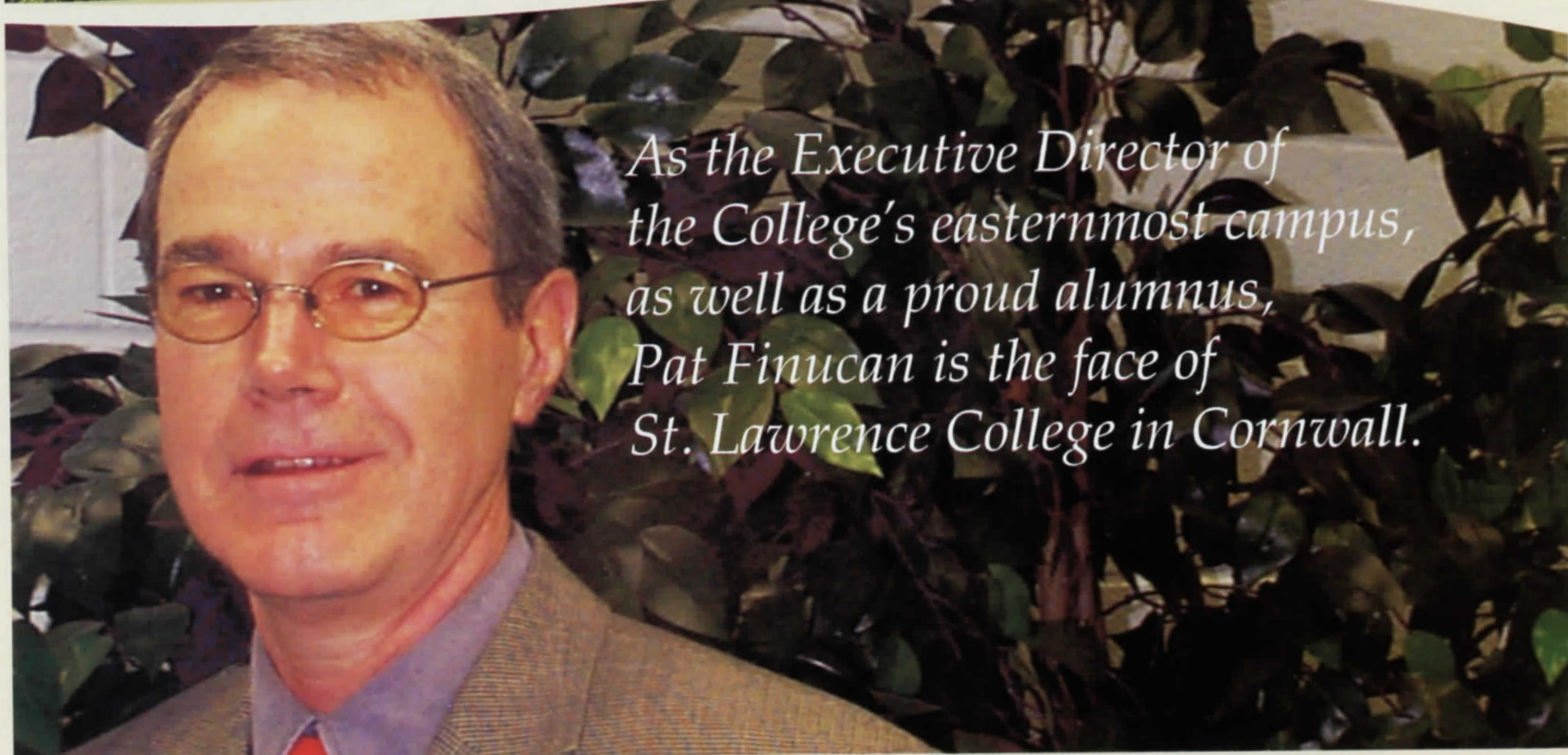
Sandra is true life-long learner, with an impressive academic resume which includes: Certificate in Fine Arts, St. Lawrence College, 1997; Bachelor of Fine Arts, magna cum laude, University of Ottawa, 1999; Post Graduate Studies, Sociology of Culture, Carleton University, 1983; Masters in Environmental Studies, York University, 1978; Bachelor of Arts, Sociology & Architecture, Carleton University, 1975.

"As the Executive Director, I'm responsible for creating and operating an effective array of programs to serve students," says Pat. "I take an interest in every aspect of the campus and maintain a high level of involvement in the community on behalf of the College."

That's for sure. Pat is definitely "out there" waving the College flag in the community. His volunteer commitments include serving as Captain of a small team on the Major Gifts Committee of the Capital Fund Raising campaign for the Cornwall Community Hospital; acting as President of the local chapter of an international educators organization called Phi Delta Kappa; being a member of the Board of the St. Lawrence River Institute of Environmental Sciences, the Steering Committee for Heart of the City (a downtown renewal project) and the Employee Employer Relations Committee (a provincial standing committee under the Academic Collective Agreement). Pat also recently joined the City of Cornwall's Economic Development Strategic Planning Steering Committee.

wasn't the start of his formal education. He had previously attended St. Francis Xavier University, York University and Queen's University, where he got a start on a Master's of Public Administration. Rather, he was one of the thousands of students who register with the College each year and pursue their education on a part-time basis. In this case, Pat ended up with a Statement of Achievement in French as a Second Language ('93), which he began while working in Kingston, and eventually graduated from in Cornwall.

"I took the French program because I fell in love with a French speaking woman," he explains. "I wanted to be able to converse a little bit with her family. But I also believe that the effort has helped me understand our bilingual community and I've had a lot of fun using my admittedly rudimentary French in conversations with people at work and in the community."

As a part-time learner, Pat met and participated with a number of evening students. It gave him a sense of what people wanted, what the challenges were to participating in a night course and also the pride that people took in

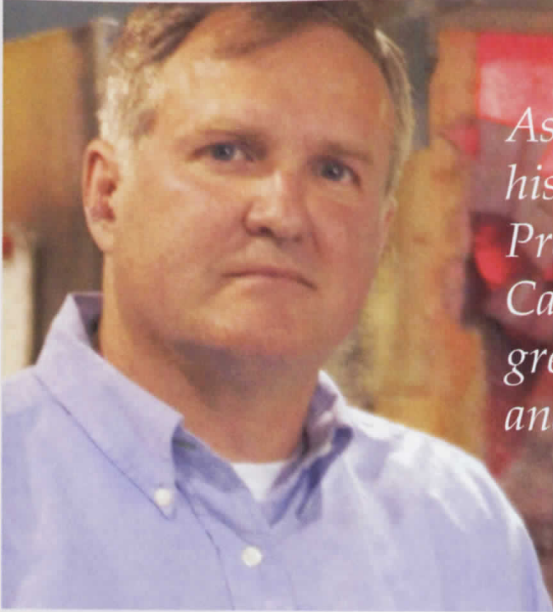
"I really admired the two French teachers who taught me, one at the Kingston Campus, and the other here in Cornwall. Both were highly skilled at getting an adult audience to participate and practice using the language. They were patient and fun to be with. It made coming out for classes two nights a week worthwhile."

Pat's career path has been an interesting one. Immediately after graduation from university he taught high school in Nigeria with CUSO (originally known as Canadian University Services Overseas). He later trained and worked as a Child and Youth Worker (as they are now called) at two Psychiatric facilities in Toronto, and came to St. Lawrence College, Kingston campus, as a remedial English teacher on August 1, 1970. "I taught a variety of courses in the Human Studies Department until the summer of '75, was Acting Chair of the Continuing Education department until '77, then returned to teaching for a year. I became Chair of Human Studies Department in fall '78 and began a series of academic leadership appointments

As David Murray contemplates his upcoming retirement as President and CEO of Grenville Castings Limited, he can take a great deal of pride in his career and the company he helped to shape.

Grenville Castings, with facilities in Merrickville, Smiths Falls, and Perth, is a manufacturer of aluminum automotive castings. It does in excess of \$80 million business annually and is a key supplier of parts to the North American automotive and heavy truck industries. Grenville Castings produces over 100 different products for these and other North American markets.

David began working in Production Control for Alcan in Kingston in 1978, after finishing high school. A year later he moved into the drafting and design area for extrusion die manufacturing. It was then that he began taking courses on a part-time basis at the College's Kingston campus, where he eventually earned his Mechanical Engineering Technology (Level II) statement of achievement in 1981.

"St. Lawrence played an important role in providing me with the technical education and background for manufacturing," says David. "The program's varied courses helped provide the general understanding to be involved in the technical discussions and decisions facing manufacturing organizations."

In the early '80s, David moved into numerical-controlled machine programming, and in 1984 he relocated to Markham to assist in the start-up of Alcan's new extrusion die manufacturing facility. In 1986, he moved into Alcan's Pickering facility as Production Control and Customer Service Manager, and in 1991, he took on yet another role with Alcan as the Operations Manager for their Aurora extrusion and finishing facility.

During this time David continued on his journey as a life-long learner, enrolling in part-time courses at York University, which led to a Bachelor's degree in Administrative Studies in 2002.

In 1994, he left Alcan to join Grenville Castings as the Plant Manager in Smiths Falls. "This provided a great opportunity to move closer to both of our families in the Kingston area," says David. Two years later he added Corporate Human Resources responsibilities to his portfolio, and two years after that he also took on the role of Plant Manager for the Merrickville operation. In 2000, David became President and CEO of Grenville Castings Limited.

"Looking back on it, my career path was not necessarily chosen. It was more like taking opportunities as they became available. I've always enjoyed trying new things through education and training, and taking on new roles in organizations. The varied education and experience through the two companies provided me with a broad knowledge of the required facets of a manufacturing business. Both companies have been very good at providing learning opportunities, both through roles and management education programs. This varied growth and the taking on of new responsibilities is what is enjoyable. I feel that continuing to learn is extremely important, and I believe very strongly in the concept of life-long learning."

When asked what accomplishments he is most proud of, David noted that, professionally, it is that the Grenville Castings Team has been able to build a Canadian organization that is a strong competitor in the North American automotive industry. "Grenville has a reputation as a company with strong product engineering and qual-

Highlights from *Ontario: A Leader in Learning*

THE RAE REPORT ON POST-SECONDARY EDUCATION IN ONTARIO

After a lengthy consultation process, this past February former Premier Bob Rae released his report on the state of post-secondary education in Ontario.

In *Ontario: A Leader in Learning*, Rae outlines a number of recommendations for the post-secondary system. Attached is a summary of highlights:

Financial Recommendations:

- \$300 million investment in Student Assistance
- will support recommended program changes and enhancements to make higher education affordable for all students, but particularly low-income students.
- \$700 million in base provincial funding to bring colleges and universities to the Canadian national average (\$400 million for colleges, \$300 million for universities).
- \$160 million for new pathways to assist 50% of Ontario secondary school students who do not go on to post-secondary education.
- This money will support new enrollment and outreach.
- \$180 million to expand graduate education.

Total System -

Capital Recommendations:

- \$200 million in facility renewal (maintenance).
- \$300 million in new facilities and infrastructure

Policy Recommendations:

- New legislation that enshrines the commitment that every qualified student in Ontario will find a place in college or university, regardless of means.
- Recognize apprenticeship as a post-secondary destination and treat the apprenticeship programming delivered by colleges as a core business.

Assign to colleges the government's role in administration and outreach to employers (for those apprenticeship programs in which colleges deliver in-school training).

- The federal government should focus its student assistance on living costs and follow the province's lead in providing substantial up-front grants and improved loans to meet student needs. Rae proposes that, in time, a coordinated system with the federal government would enable graduates to repay their loans at rates tied more directly to their incomes.
- In light of the declining federal support for post-secondary education, the federal government should renew its commitment to post-secondary education:
- More cooperation and collaboration between all institutions.
- A responsible funding partnership that ensures sustainable revenues for the sector.
- A commitment from the federal government to be a reliable and steady partner through transfers to the province for base operating support and investments in priority areas, such as apprenticeship and graduate education. The provincial and federal governments should build on real opportunities for productive collaboration.
- A new Council on Higher Education to help set targets for growth in participation and quality improvements and to report publicly on progress and performance.
- Tuition should not increase at all until the student assistance system is reformed and the government has made significant new investments. Tuition levels would then be set by institutions, subject to a new provincial regulatory framework that ensures predictability, transparency, and affordability for students.

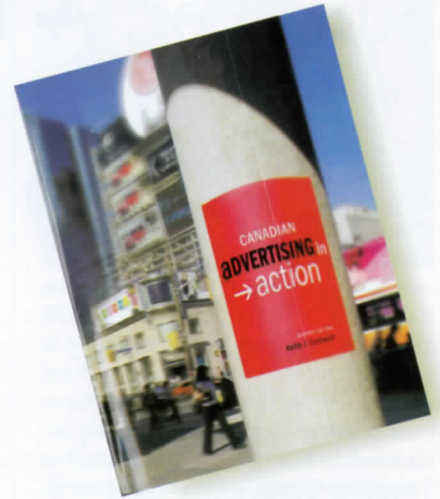

"Fund Colleges Now" Campaign Aims to Influence Provincial Government

In the wake of the Rae Commission's recommendation to fund Ontario Colleges at the national average, the Ontario College system launched an aggressive advocacy campaign called *Fund Colleges Now*. The campaign, which was intended to influence the provincial government into acting on that recommendation in its spring budget, was a system-wide collaborative effort that sought support from students, staff, alumni, employers, and friends.

The campaign, which utilized creative marketing strategies to deliver the key messages, aimed to drive people to a website where they could lend their support through an on-line petition.

As *Voyageur* went to press, the

response to the on-line petition was well in excess of 23,000. St. Lawrence led the system in terms of response based on market share and was the

outright leader in real numbers, by a significant margin, in the alumni constituency.

As this issue went to press, the new

provincial budget had not been announced. As a result, we yet don't know if the advocacy campaign was successful in garnering increased provincial funding. What we do know, however, is that there has been a great ground swell of support for the College system in Ontario, and that the St. Lawrence College community rose to the occasion and made its voice heard. For that, we are sincerely grateful.

Survivor: A Transition Camp for Students

Everyone survives

this very rewarding camping expedition – tents are not required, lodging is in our ultra-modern student residence, there are no mosquitoes or hassles with groundhogs – and you don't have to worry about the weather or munchies!

For the past two summers, St. Lawrence College has offered a highly acclaimed and very successful Summer Transition Camp, called, "Survivor St. Lawrence College." Approximately forty students who had been accepted into an academic program at St. Lawrence College and who had been diagnosed with a learning disability were eligible to "go camping with us." The camp was a three-day, overnight experience that took place at the end of August at our Kingston campus.

A number of workshops, including topics such as learning strategies, assertiveness skills, "true colours", and adaptive technology and a wide variety of social events were integrated into the camp. Participants were given the opportunity to become more familiar with our campus, in addition to learning about the vast array of resources and services available for students with various learning disabilities.

During this recent academic year, St. Lawrence College had 215 students with self-identified learning disabilities. *Learning disabilities* refers to a number of disorders which may affect the acquisition, organization, retention, understanding, or use of verbal or non-verbal information. These disorders affect learning in individuals who otherwise demonstrate at least average abilities in thinking and/or reasoning. Some students with learning disabilities may learn well through lectures, but have extreme difficulty reading; others may express themselves very well orally, but spell or write poorly.

To acquire success in college, stu-



dents with learning disabilities require both a relevant psycho-educational assessment that diagnoses the nature of their learning disability and also recommended accommodations and strategies to facilitate them in meeting their challenges. Efforts are focused at helping students identify and use their learning strengths to their advantage while accommodating their learning weaknesses. By learning to better understand their unique patterns of information-processing challenges and particular strengths, students are better able to

began my Business-Human Resources diploma program at St. Lawrence College, Mike Evans, Special Needs Counsellor, was the first person I made contact with, and I was amazed at how understanding and helpful he was. Though he was required to ask for relevant documentation relating to my learning disability, he never questioned me or made matters harder for me; he was always understanding and took the time to be accurate in reviewing my psycho-educational assessment and to develop an excellent educational plan

The positive experiences of the participants shared in such comments as:

- *It was really helpful, with lots of fun, and we definitely recommend it!*
- *You guys did a fantastic job, and this experience was really awesome.*
- *The camp gave me the opportunity to meet other people who have learning disabilities and to better understand mine and theirs and what accommodations and strategies will better prepare all of us for more success.*

realize their potential in our college environment.

Students must learn to articulate how their learning disability impacts them in a variety of situations. Counsellors Mike Evans and Jeff Taylor facilitate those students who require a referral to one of the College's external clinical psychologists for a psycho-educational assessment. Jeff and Mike also develop, with the student, a profile of appropriate individual educational plans and accommodations to assist them in their academic endeavours; learning strategies and adaptive technology instruction are definitely on the student's agenda.

Ian True, one of the key student coordinators of the camp, mentions that his high school career was full of insecurity and self-doubt. "I had a great deal of experience getting lost in the system and encountered many people who did not take the time to understand what those with learning disabilities must be going through. When I

for me. He always made me feel comfortable.

Mike referred me to many people who were helpful to me and my challenges. Rick Bresee, the Adaptive Technologist, reviewed my adaptive technology needs and assisted me to acquire and become familiar with state-of-the-art technology to "level the playing field" for me in respect to my specific learning disability. I found Sonya Lem, our Learning Strategist to be invaluable. Sonya was always precise in suggesting tools and exercises to increase my repertoire of skills. She was also the initial Camp Coordinator and coordinated last year's camp with Ric. My marks dramatically increased after receiving all this valuable assistance, and I was amazed at the passion and understanding that all of these very talented individuals bring to their careers. Without them, I most likely would never have made it through college, nor would my marks be among the top in my class."

with Learning Disabilities

Ian helped to create a "College Survival Manual" for students with learning disabilities that students find user friendly. Brockville Cafeteria Signs on to Healthy Eating Campaign

The College's Brockville campus has officially become a provincially designated *Eat Smart! School*, meaning healthier food selections will be promoted in the cafeteria and at least one kitchen employee will always be health-unit certified in the handling of food.

"The goals of the program are to reduce chronic and food-borne illnesses in Ontario and certainly to create an awareness of healthier food choices," said Alexis Green of the Leeds, Grenville and Lanark Heart Health Coalition.

The College, its cafeteria contractor, Brown's Fine Food Service, and the Health Coalition have worked together since last autumn to implement the program.

"Menus at the cafeteria have been modified to increase healthy food choices for students and staff," said cafeteria Manager Crystal Roy.

"For example, we offer whole wheat and whole grain breads, we're making available light mayonnaise and lighter salad dressings, we have a salad bar, and we promote soups and salads as side dishes instead of French fries," Roy said. "We already had a lot of these things but we were not really promoting it," she said. "With the changes we've made, we'll be promoting it a lot more."

At February's event launch, the College received an Award of Excellence for meeting the program's high standard of excellence.

Testing of New *E. coli* Detector Benefits Environmental Students

Environmental Science Technician students currently studying at the College's Cornwall campus are benefiting from the most recent developments in the study of *E. coli* detection. "*E. coli* bacteria", once a scientific term known only to scientists, is now as common as the name of the small town where the potential of this deadly bacteria became evident to all Canadians.

The St. Lawrence River Institute of Environmental Sciences has investigated several prototypes of *E. coli* sensors as part of a special research project with the Thompson Rosemount Group Inc, Pathogen Detection Systems Inc. (PDS), and Queen's University. These prototypes for rapid, on-site *E. coli* detection were developed by PDS, a new venture company that is refining, marketing, and commercializing the technology. The Thompson Rosemount Group, Inc., a Cornwall consulting engineering firm, was one of the major industrial sponsors of the research and development of this new technology.

Stage-two testing of a second generation prototype is now being conducted at the River Institute. It is one of the first labs to use the *E. coli* detector on a routine basis, to test for *E. coli* in a variety of water and wastewater samples. In the near future, the unique design will facilitate direct connection to water treatment plants and distribution systems thereby greatly reducing the labour-intensive process currently in place, reducing possible delays in receiving results, and reducing the potential for human error.

"It will be a smart system which will communicate with other vital components and provide detailed information in a fraction of the time," says Jeff Ridal, Executive Director of the St. Lawrence River Institute.

St. Lawrence College students in the Environmental Program will benefit greatly from their exposure to such avant-garde developments in the field. "When they graduate and begin working in their field, they will already have some knowledge of the up-and-coming automated water treatment sys-

tems," explains Donna Orwell, Program Coordinator at St. Lawrence College. "They will be notified of the testing information as it is collected and will be aware of the many other potential applications of the *E. coli* Detector."

The partnership between the College and the St. Lawrence River Insti-

tute, and the College's proximity to the Institute's scientific labs makes the St. Lawrence College Environmental Program unique in its program delivery. Students learn not only the most current regulatory applications but also participate in some of the newest developments in their field.

Autism and Behavioural Science Kingston Campus to Offer Post-Diploma Program

Over recent decades, the incidence of autism has been escalating. In Ontario, there is a severe shortage of trained behaviour science practitioners to provide programming for these children. To meet that demand, St. Lawrence is offering a one-year, post-diploma degree certificate program in Autism and Behavioural Science.

The increasing need across Ontario for more qualified personnel trained in autism and behavioural science is due, in part, to a significant escalation in recent decades of the incidence rate for autism, estimated at between three and five children in every 1,000. An expanding client population has placed additional pressures on the delivery of effective social services to children with autism. Improving services and creating a more robust service infrastructure requires a sufficient number of delivery staff with specialized autism expertise.

Employment opportunities for program graduates will be available in autism services and children's services. This includes employment as Instructor Therapists in the regional providers of the preschool program, employment as private providers of Intensive Behaviour Intervention (IBI) therapy to families under the supervision of

regional providers of the preschool program, employment as autism specialists in other service agencies providing autism services, and possibly employment by school boards to deliver programs for children with autism. Employment opportunities may be more abundant in under-served areas, particularly in the north and rural areas. The provincial goal is to have at least 80 trained Instructor Therapists by April 2006 and at least 180 by 2009.

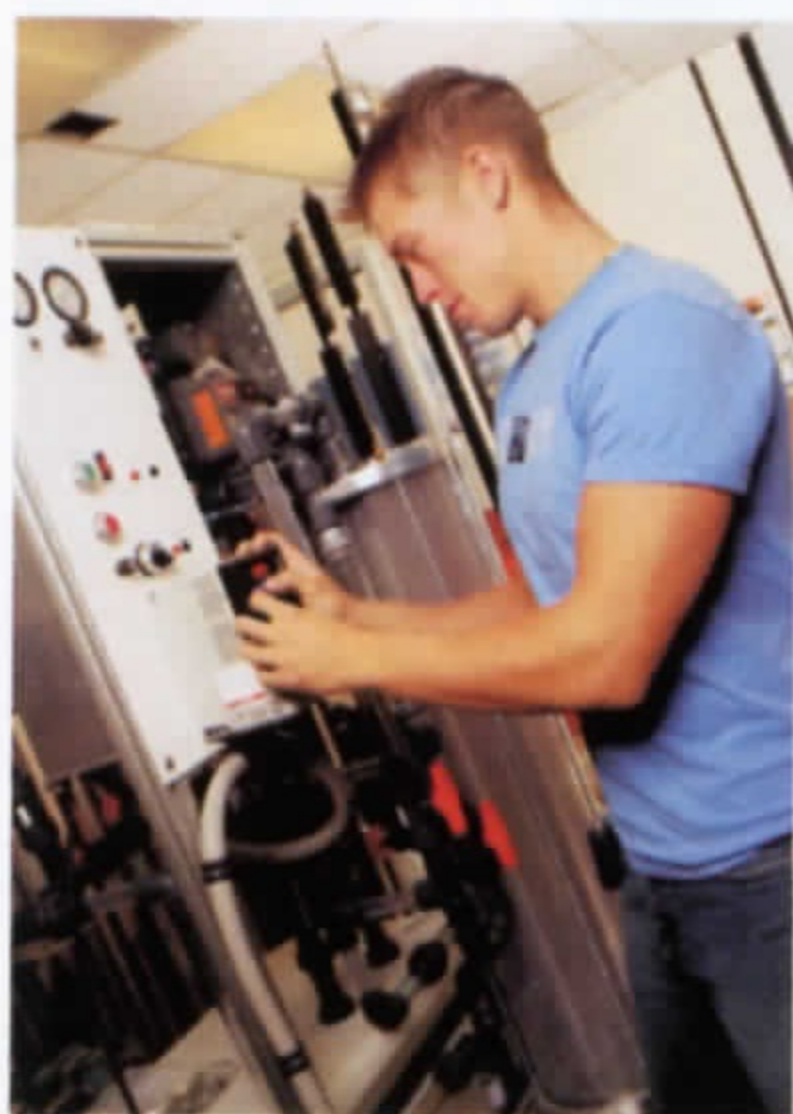

Beginning in September 2005, this innovative program will be launched to give students the opportunity to learn about everything from wind power generation to solar air and more.

"The field of alternative energy systems continues to evolve and individuals trained in this field will be in high demand as we continue to embrace alternative energy solutions. Increasing energy costs and the Kyoto accord are just two of the reasons that this is an excellent opportunity to become a leader in alternative energy," asserts Don Young, Dean, School of Computer and Engineering Technology, School of Skilled Trade, St. Lawrence College.

The field of alternative energy is rapidly developing as our awareness of scarce resources, increasing energy costs, the Kyoto accord, and other changes will begin to affect the way we design and build in the future. This new program, the only such program in the province, will give graduates the skills needed to meet these challenges. Hands-on experience with solar air and water systems, photovoltaic systems, wind power generation, and other emerging technologies will be a part of the program, supported by real opportunities to apply skills through work

Two-year graduate Energy Systems Engineering Technicians will be capable of helping both home owners and business owners incorporate alternative energy solutions and realize energy savings through comprehensive energy audits. Energy Systems Engineering Technologists will build on these skills in their third year by incor-

porating more analysis and design. Graduates will assist with design, construction, and alternative energy efficiency and management concepts in the design and construction phases of new buildings and in building renovations.

"We are excited about the possibilities this new program will open up in the field of alternative energy systems. Both high school graduates and those who have already worked in the construction field should seriously consider this innovative new program, as it will give them the opportunity to be leaders in alternative energy," states Robert Woudsma, Professor, Energy Systems Engineering Technology Program.

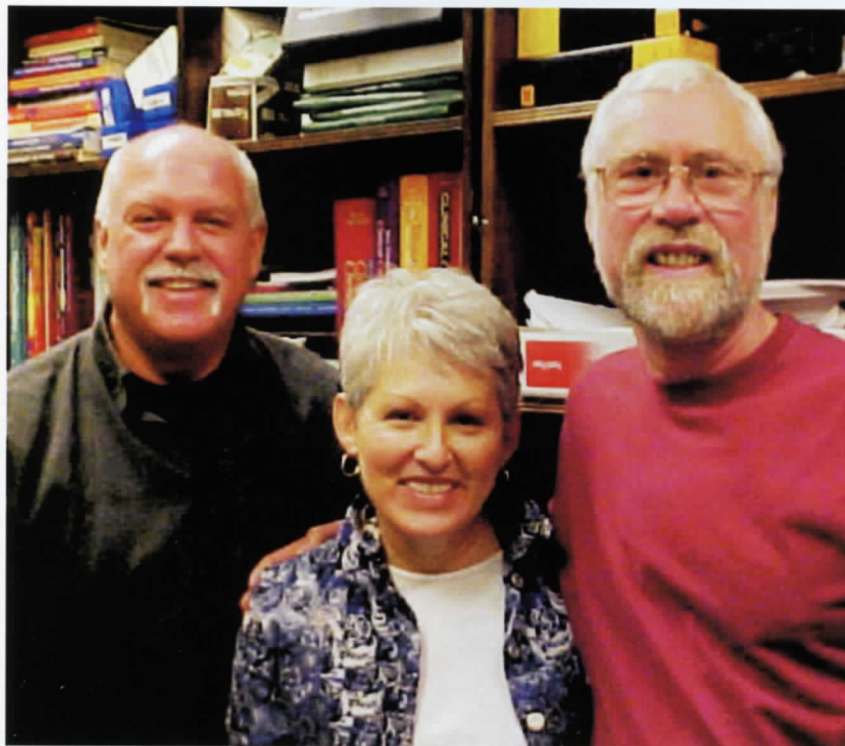

Volker Thomsen President and CEO

Volker Thomsen assumed his duties as President and CEO of St. Lawrence College on October 1, 2000. In September 2004, St. Lawrence College Board of Governors appointed Volker Thomsen for a second five-year term, from 2005 to 2010.

A resident of Kingston since 1999, Volker has more than 30 years experience as a successful founder, shareholder, and CEO of a group of companies in the food, natural health products, pharmaceutical manufacturing, and marketing sectors. Furthermore, during the same period, he has been involved in renewable energy, particularly in Denmark and Germany. Volker has also been actively engaged in the arts, both in Europe and in Canada. In this capacity, he is the visionary behind *Festival on the St. Lawrence*. This international festival in Northern New York and Eastern Ontario is focused on music,

art, and heritage on both sides of the river.

Volker has worked in his international businesses located in over 20 countries, including Canada. In addition to founding numerous successful international companies, for many years he has participated on the boards of these companies as a director and as a shareholder. He was also a leading director of a small co-operative bank in his hometown Flensburg, an old Danish city on the German/Danish border, and remained on its supervisory board for fifteen years.

His interest in education and training began early in his career when he was teaching international trade and economics. He has been involved in adult education in its many different facets during his career and in 1989 was certified by the German certification authority as a teacher/educator of apprentices and managers. Having expe-

rienced apprenticeship training first-hand, Thomsen is a strong advocate for apprenticeship programs, vocational programs, and community colleges in Canada. He is a member of the Ontario MTCU (Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities) Training Branch Steering Committee for Reforming Apprenticeships, where he has participated in reforming apprenticeships and in creating the innovative Co-op Diploma Apprenticeship program.

An avid sailor, Volker Thomsen lives on one of The Thousand Islands near Kingston with his wife and two children.

Voyageur last interviewed Volker for the Winter 2001 issue, and felt that the occasion of his renewal by the College's Board of Governors merited a return visit.

A Conversation with SLC President and CEO

Voyageur: *Has the job been what you had expected it to be? Any surprises?*

VT: The single biggest surprise was that I didn't expect my job to be as rewarding, creative, and effective as it turned out to be.

Coming from the business world, I was used to relatively fast action, changing constantly according to the needs of the situation. The kind of success to which I've become accustomed is in reaching my goals. So it was a surprise to discover that I could also do this in a public sector as well as a private sector setting. Now that I'm nearing the end of my career, I find it easier to translate goals into reality than I did earlier on.

I didn't really have any other expectation of my time here than trying to improve the way we deliver education. I wanted to enable all of our students to be successful, regardless of what society tells them success ought to be. We should not pre-judge success against a set of social standards. Certainly, they are there, but success comes in many forms, and is different for every individual. We shouldn't be trying to fit everyone into the same mold.

Voyageur: *In what areas do you feel the College has made its greatest strides over the last four-and-a-half years?*

VT: I think we've accomplished most in two areas. The first is in restructuring our own organization, and the second is in embracing programs and faculty expertise that put more of a highlight on the strengths of a community college.

In terms of our own restructuring, I'm proud to say that it led to a new vision and mission statements that are significant for our whole region. In them, you can see that the Board of Governors encompasses two key ideas: that we want to support and embrace lifelong learning, and that we'll do this in all the communities that we serve.

Now, this may sound like an easy thing to do, but it is extremely difficult, particularly since the College system is not well supported financially (Colleges in Ontario are currently funded 40% below the national average, and universities are 20% below). So it is a real challenge to keep our campuses alive and vibrant in several communities. However, we've managed to stick to our vision and missions despite the sometimes desperate financial challenges.

Also, I think we've emphasized our com-

mitment to basic skills and training. Particularly in Kingston, where we share the educational world with partners like a world class university and a world-class military university, that kind of dominance can make it difficult for a community college to shine. Therefore, I'm particularly proud of the fact that St. Lawrence College has taken over a leadership role in many areas, like alternative energy. We've also done so in the cultural scene, with new programs, like Digital Arts for Musicians. Our Summer School of the Arts programs at Brockville have gained world-wide recognition, and the fledgling Music and Theatre program there is also world class. *Festival on the St. Lawrence*, an international set of events along the St. Lawrence River in both Eastern Ontario and Northern New York State that celebrates music, arts, and heritage, is another, more all-encompassing part of fostering cultural, economic, and social development in our region.

In Cornwall, the relationship and evolving partnership with the St. Lawrence River Institute will have long-range, far-reaching implications for all of Eastern Ontario.

Voyageur: In our interview in the winter of 2001, when asked how you envisioned St. Lawrence in 2005, you touched on a number of ideas. These included: being more engaged in skilled labour, more outside and on-line business, greater health for the Brockville and Cornwall campuses, and for yourself, you hoped to have the same level of energy for the job that you had when you began. Are you satisfied with how things have gone in these areas?

VT: Interestingly enough, this question makes it quite clear to me that I have indeed focused on the areas that I mentioned back then! Looking back, we've succeeded in these areas on a grand scale.

Related to apprenticeship, St. Lawrence College succeeded to inspire a new focus not only locally, but also provincially and nationally. Our first breakthrough was with a provincial campaign, presented through Bob Runciman's office (he was then Chair of the Cabinet in the Mike Harris government). In the May budget, apprenticeships and skills training in Ontario received \$88 million new and additional funding. This is outstanding when you consider that the college system as a whole received only \$70 million. And it, of course, encouraged other colleges to re-emphasize apprenticeship.

Another new activity is the first Co-op Apprenticeship Diploma program. This very innovative program, a global example, is now evolving well after a series of pilot programs, three of which are at St. Lawrence College; the Culinary Management Apprenticeship Co-op Diploma, the Mechanical Technician/

University of Ontario Institute of Technology. This is another real breakthrough for Ontario. Now, all of our qualifying diploma graduates, even our Arts majors, like the students in Musical Theatre, can have access to a degree in Commerce. These students, for example, already have wonderful vocal and presentation skills that could be used in any profession. Now, with a diploma even in one of these very artistic programs, with a bridging semester and two more years, any of our students can achieve both a diploma and a Commerce degree in only four years.

I'd like to emphasize one other thing. We've convinced the provincial government that the current funding model worked against the small, northern, rural and francophone colleges...it really only worked in large urban centres where growth is also large. For example, consider the example of 15% growth in a metropolitan area college versus 5% growth in our colleges. Under the current model, we are receiving less funding in spite of the 5% growth, because large growth in the metro college would have taken a larger chunk of a declining pot. But a new emphasis on all colleges has created a willingness on the part of the government and the other colleges to create a much more workable model that should give us some better opportunities.

One of the other positive outcomes of our advocacy campaign was the Rae Review of Post-secondary Education, the first of its kind. Its impact is starting to be felt, and it will continue far beyond our present situation. I think it will have significant implications not only in Canada, but beyond. It will, shortly, give Ontario students the same opportunities as students in other provinces by providing additional funding to bring our students up to the national average.

As far as my energy level goes, there is no doubt in my mind that I have both more energy in some respects and less energy in others. On a spiritual level, I think I definitely

have more energy. On a physical level, of course you live with your aging body, and it catches up with you. But if you live a healthy lifestyle you can limit that impact!

I can't say that I'll ever be completely satisfied. The older and 'wiser' you get, the more you realize that your time is limited. There are more things I want to do, and I doubt I'll get the chance to do them all. But I'm satisfied with what I've accomplished so far, and I hope that I can, for a little while, keep the high level of energy going. After that, others will continue to build on it.

Voyageur: Has the presidency of St. Lawrence College changed you? If so, how?

VT: It certainly has! My years as an entrepreneur were particularly focused on business matters. I became hungry for an area where the challenges are spiritually focused, and I could be creative. It was clear to me that I wanted my new centre point to be creative, not so much business-oriented.

I was stunned to discover that the public sector was even more focused on the financial than the private sector! The College system was more centered on money than on the success of the system in general. This was because the funding model dictated the whole focus of the college educational system be put on financial matters.

Yes, we must be lean and efficient, be we also MUST invest in the skills and dreams of our future generations. Not only have I changed, but I hope I've had an impact on re-centering where we must be in terms of education and life-long learning. To be involved in teaching is to be engaged in life-long learning. In the past five years at St. Lawrence College, I've learned more than I ever have before. Everyone should have that kind of access to building their dreams.

Voyageur: Lastly, what do you feel are most critical factors for the success of St. Lawrence College in the next five years?

VT: When we consider all the areas I've mentioned, the most critical factors will be to implement the changes we've begun.

That will not be easy, but I'm surrounded by a group of talented and highly dedicated people. I've no doubt that we'll succeed in most areas, and we'll be able to serve our communities in a way that will help to make them vibrant economically, socially, and culturally. That's the success I want for them.

teacher, Sandra is also the author of *The Business of Art for Canadian Visual Artists – Third Edition* (ISBN 0-9731049-1-0). This book is available in Kingston and Ottawa at Wallacks Art Supplies. She maintains ongoing professional affiliations with Gallery 101 in Ottawa (Board 1999-2001), CARFAC (Canadian Artists Representation/Front des Artistes Canadiennes) Ontario (Board 2001-2002), the Canadian Artist Representation Copyright Collective (CARCC) and V-Tape Distributor Toronto.

Sandra says that St. Lawrence College played a pivotal role in her developing as an artist and in pursuing it as a career. "Shifting from an identity as a hobbyist to full-time professional artist required the insight that what I was doing was part of a visual discussion that had historical roots, and that it was ongoing. Through the College's art history courses, I gained insight that there was a broader social context in which I could participate."

She has very fond memories of her St. Lawrence art instructors. "In 1995, I met Henry Vyfinkel at the Symposium of Canadian Painters in Watercolour, held in Gananoque. I learned to consider my natural movements in space and to incorporate this as part of my painting process. During the next two years, I took another of his workshops and also completed the Certificate program that he had spearheaded at St.

Lawrence College. He planted the seed of my current practice and philosophy that painting is "performance-based," a trace of action in time. Also, I very much enjoyed Margaret Gauthier's course, *Figure Gesture Sketching*. She showed us how to capture the essence of people's personality through using blobs of colour and pencil to render their actions in a split moment in time. Andrea Green's courses in *General Art History* and *Modern Art History* were especially pivotal in my decision to pursue the Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at the University of Ottawa and subsequently begin a career as a fine artist."

"In summary," says Sandra, "Brockville campus's 1000 Islands Summer School of the Arts and the Certificate in Fine Arts contributed to my confidence to take the leap of faith and to begin a new career as a contemporary fine artist."

through to the end of calendar year 1991." At that time he transferred to the Cornwall Campus to lead the Business Department. 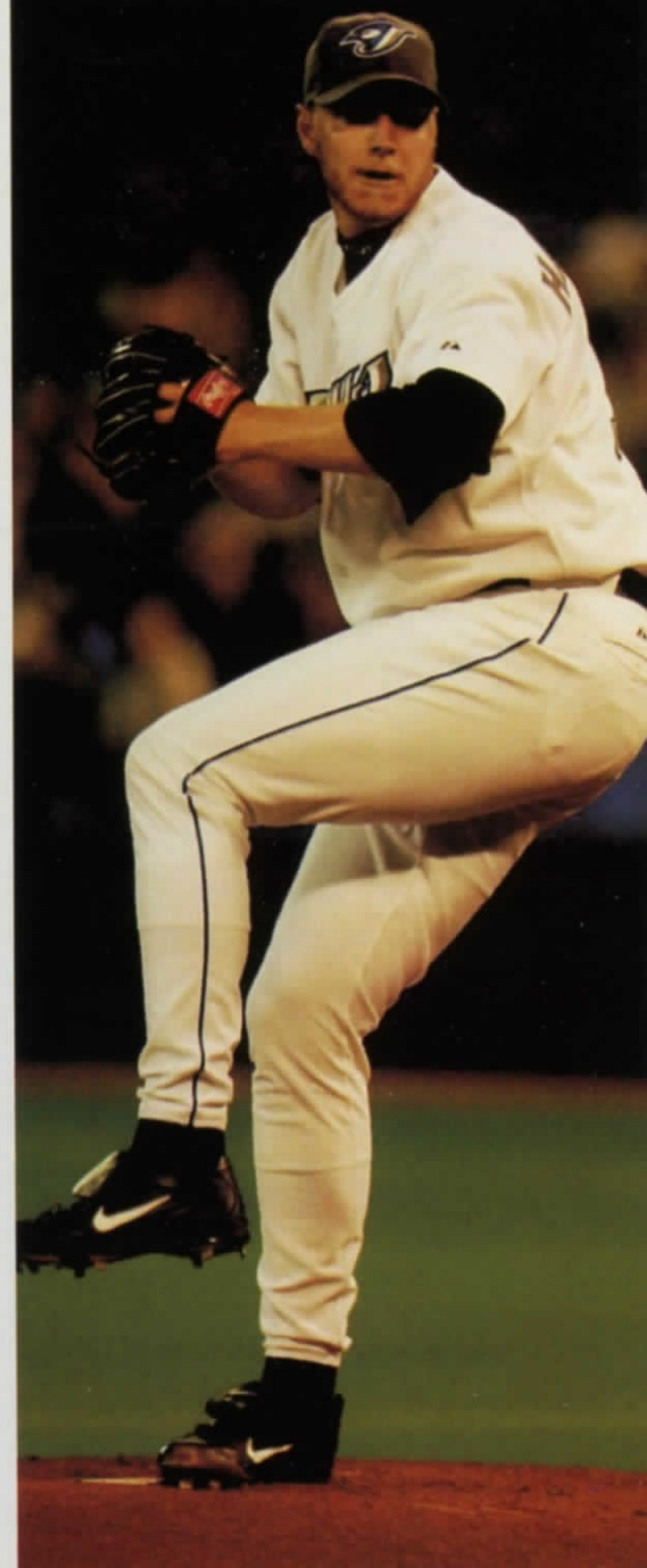

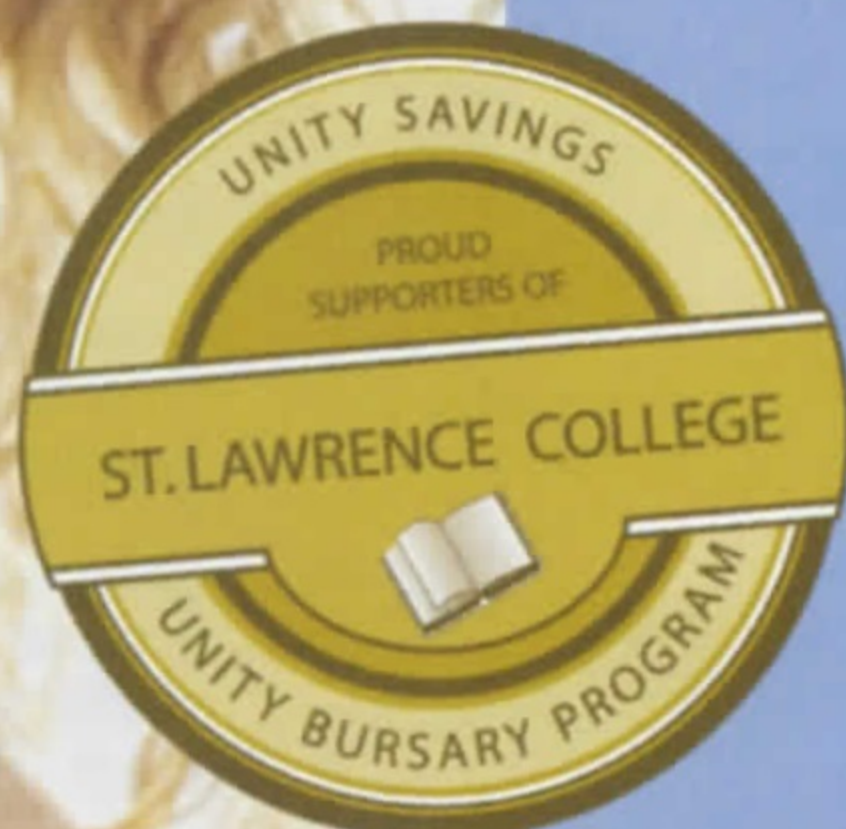
