

Kim Peterson, class of '82 Nursing, never stopped learning.

When Kim graduated from St. Law rence High School in Cornwall, she decided to go to College to become a Legal Assistant. "That definitely wasn't for me", she recalls. That career path was too much "research and paperwork" and Kim wanted her focus to be more people-oriented. Although Kim's mom and three of her aunts were nurses, she never thought she could do it. "I didn't like blood and gore." After the birth of her first child, however, Kim decided to go back to school, this time in the helping profession of nursing. And, she's never looked back.

Today, Kim is the Program Manager, Medicine and Emergency, at the Cornwall General Hospital. While working and raising children, she has managed to earn a Bachelor degree in Nursing Science through part-time studies at the University of Ottawa. In addition, she is currently writing her final project before receiving her Masters in Continuing Education from the University of Calgary. Her last years of study were completed over the internet. That doesn't mean she worked in solitude. "We spent three weeks in Kingston at the beginning of the program getting to know each other and establishing our support group. We have a chat room which is our virtual cafeteria. That's where we talk about our teachers, complain about our marks and do whatever most students do when they get together after class," she admits jokingly.

Working as a nurse has been very rewarding. Kim's work has allowed her to make a difference in people's lives, particularly in the area of Palliative Care. "It's amazing the huge impact you can have on how people will be remembered," she explains. "After you've shared tears with someone, you become one of the family. I can't tell you how often I've gotten a big hug from a patient's family member right in the middle of the grocery store. You become very close." According to Kim, the gratification she gets from her work more than compensates for the challenges it presents.

Kim also has the opportunity to work with students from her alma mater. College students do their preceptership at local hospitals. "We get a chance to see what kind of employees these students will make in the future," says Kim. When she hires nurses, Kim looks for problem solvers, people with critical thinking skills and a good sense of humor, people who can take on more responsibility and who are willing to continue learning. "These qualities are important. I can teach them how to use certain equipment, but how they interact with people is something that comes from within," she explains.

Her classmates from college also play an important part in Kim's life. "They're great resource people," she explains. "We contact each other to share ideas and information."

As for the future, Kim says she wants to concentrate on becoming better at being a manager. "It's an exciting time in the hospitals," explains Kim. With the challenges of restructuring upon them, Kim is keen on helping to make it work!





For Brockville Police Service Constables Dan Francois and Mark Pearce, policing is about trying to make a positive difference in the community.

an Francois has come full circle, and has acquired a wide variety of experiences in the process. A native Brockvillian, Francois graduated from the LASA program and immediately went to work as a Federal Corrections Officer at the Joyceville Institution. From there he moved on to northern British Columbia, spending 2 years in the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, before returning to Brockville in January of '98 to serve and protect on the very streets he grew up on.

"Policing in your own hometown isn't as difficult as you might think," says Francois. "It's actually quite an asset to know the city as well as I do. The BPS also has a good policy which helps us to avoid situations where we might be dealing with family members and friends, so there are no conflicts."

In addition to working the Mountain Bike Patrol in season, and being a Breathalizer Technician, Francois is sharing his experiences with current LASA students as a part-time teacher. "I teach the Communications and Computers in Law Enforcement course," he explains. "It's hectic juggling my schedule sometimes to fit into the timetable, but the Chief Barry King is very supportive. He really believes in the program here, and likes to see us on campus giving something back."

Mark Pearce enrolled in the LASA program at the age of 28, after spending 5 years in the military. "I was looking for a secure occupation with a good wage and benefits," he says. "I also figured that 2 years of hands-on education at college was better than 3-4 years of university."

Although he found the Law & Security program challenging, Pearce, a Kemptville native, was a focused stu-

dent. "I participated in some intramural sports, like volleyball, and trained with the varsity Cross Country Running team, but I didn't get too much into the social side of things."

Pearce also sought experience by volunteering in the community. "I volunteer with the YMCA, and while I was a student I took part in the VIPP (Volunteer in Policing Program), and worked with the BPS as a summer student in

Both officers credit the LASA program and college staff with helping to prepare them for the profession. "This course was the best prep in this field that I could have possibly have gotten prior to Police College," states Francois. My instructors Ross Bell and Don MacKenzie were really helpful as well, especially in terms of helping with the job search preparation."

Pearce concurs. "Ross, Don, and Tim Lynch all had different styles, but they really complemented each other. Also, the library staff, Sara Manoll and Sandra Denard were very helpful. They were inexhaustible sources of knowledge."

Francois and Pearce also agree that policing can be a very satisfying career. "It's so different on a day-to-day basis," says Francois. "There's always something to learn. For me, probably the best part is dealing with the community. I've had the opportunity to meet a lot of new people, and the overwhelming majority are great - very helpful."

"For me, it's the satisfaction of a job well done," explains Pearce. "I really like our 'Adopt-A-Cop" program, where we are assigned to specific high schools. If I can make a positive effect on someone's life - changing it for the better then I know there's a good reason for me being here."

Volker Thomsen One on One with SLC's New President

In Thomsen, a recent resident of Kingston, has more than 25 years experience as a successful founder, shareholder, and CEO of companies in the food, natural health products, pharmaceutical manufacturing, and marketing sector.

Fluent in English, German, and Danish and with a knowledge of six other languages, Mr. Thomsen has worked in international businesses located in Germany, Canada, England, France, USA, Denmark, Ireland, Holland, Spain and China.

Mr. Thomsen's interest in education and training began early in his career when he taught international trade and economics. He has been involved in adult education in its many different facets during his career and in 1989 was certified by the German Certification Authority as a Teacher /

Educator of Apprentices and Managers. Having experienced apprenticeship training first-hand, Mr. Thomsen is a strong advocate for apprenticeship programs, vocational programs and community colleges in Canada.

In addition to founding numerous successful international companies, Mr. Thomsen has participated on the Boards of these companies as a shareholder. He was also a founding Director and remained for 15 years on the Supervisory Board of a cooperative bank in his hometown.

An avid sailor, Mr. Thomsen lives on Treasure Island in Kingston with his wife and two children.

Voyageur magazine met with Mr. Thomsen in late November, and is pleased to present the following excerpts from our interview.



Volker, what brings you to St. Lawrence College at this point in your career?

I think it's a challenge of something different. I think it's the urge to do something meaningful. When you have worked your whole life for yourself, and you've done this in a very dedicated and idealistic manner, you are very fulfilled. When I sold my companies, I did this [came to St. Lawrence] as a change in my life.

I think this is a real challenge and a real opportunity, not only for me I think, but for St. Lawrence College. I started as an apprentice, and was deeply involved with the college system, mainly in Europe. I'm a great believer in a dual educational system, which means that I'm a great believer that every young

person should have a chance in life. In our present educational system, I think that is not the case.

I believe that it's extremely important that we broaden the scope of the College. We will cater much more to those who are left out. One group which will grow substantially in the future is our seniors. In our vision we are saying 'learning for life.' This means they will play a major role in our future activities and plans. I really think that is my personal vision. I realize that it's often difficult to change things, but even if am able to participate in starting change, that would be a major accomplishment.

I think we have opportunities to move in different directions. I am presently working with a group called CMC, Canadian Microelectronics Corporation, and we together are going to try to go in totally different ways. In other words, we will try to work together with the School Boards, the government, and all parties involved, to take a different approach. The next few years there will be roughly 40,000 people too little for that field. One of the reasons is, of course, that they are probably not really looking for university graduates, but they are looking for skilled people people who have a good base in mathematics. I think it could be a major opportunity for St. Lawrence College, together with CMC, and particularly with the School Boards, to invent some type of a new program, which would be

three of four years in duration. There is a need for thousands of young people. It's a marketing issue, of course. We have to get the message across to these young people that they will be attractive [to employers].

This is a very long answer to your question, but I am disgusted that things like Nursing programs are going to be moved to universities from the colleges. This tendency is a totally wrong development. The more we increase our demands, the more we will get away from having people who are dedicated. We will have people there mainly because of the money, the prestige, and other things. I will, of course, fight for having a strong Nursing program at our end.

These are the type of things that I am going to stand for in the future. I think that is a good combination, be-

cause I am not doing anything, really, but fulfilling the original mission which was laid down for the colleges. But because of our overall system, we even as a college now, and all the colleges, are trying to become universities. That's not the direction that St. Lawrence College will go. Even if we will participate in having a few applied degrees, that's just participating in any trend. If you have a trend, you have to fulfill that too, and we may have some expertise in our house where we are better than universities, where we have no conflict with Queen's, and then I want to do that too, but that can only be a very minor part of our business. The main part - the core business - must be to give young people the opportunity to acquire skills which will make them successful.



At this early stage in your Presidency, what are your first impressions of the College?

When I started out in the food industry as a young man, the food industry was only focused on production, not really on the marketing. In a way they didn't care what they produced. Whatever they had in raw materials they were manufactured, they were put on the market and people were happy to get it-they were hungry.

So, of course, there was a tremendous change as I look back these 35 years I've been in the food business. You know, millions of food stores in the western world were eliminated, tens of thousands of wholesalers and producers. It's become a very small group of very big players.

Why did I survive in that field? Because I found niches. I was producing better quality at much lower costs. I had no overhead, and not a big advertising budget. But in reality I started out with niches, and branched out to areas where we knew what we were good at.

What I am trying to say is, our college is basically in the same situation as the industry was before: production. And, if you produced you would easily sell your product. We believed here in the past that students would come to us.

I think that time has changed, and it will change even more drastically, so we really have to be much more marketing and customer oriented. We have to have the right products, the right programs, and we have to have the right attitude - a really customer service oriented direction.

Overall, I'm impressed with the amount of loyalty and dedication, and the amount of identification with our college. That's wonderful.

The greatest weakness I see with our colleges is the funding system. I really think that we are totally underfunded. It's discouraging that education, and particularly the education which is aiming at the broad base of the population, that this type of thing is underfunded. You have to have a discipline that people don't go and spend in wrong directions when money is ample, but I really believe that we are underfunded. This is partly our own fault. The weakest point, from my point of view, in the whole system, is the association of colleges. I think that we are not speaking in one voice.

I have an indication that the universities are really presenting themselves

to the Ministry through one voice, and are in a very strong way united. Just to give you one example, I feel that

this SuperBuild thing that we are going into is, of course, a necessity - it's a wonderful opportunity to expand but also to upgrade some of the present facilities. I think that would have been a great opportunity for the presidents to say thank you to the government, and at the same time say we cannot do it if we are underfunded.

There is a big problem coming up, you know, this underfunding, which is caused partly because we wait two or three years before we get the funding. Imagine we have to increase our business by 20 - 25% and we have no money up front. How are we going to do that? So there will be a big battle coming up. I would wish (and it's one thing I would work very hard at) is that we, as the presidents of the colleges, would be more united and present a stronger case at the Ministry level. That would be one of my key goals. It is really an important issue."





What role do you see the Alumni playing in our future?

"I really think that the alumni are our basis, or the foundation of this organization. I would hope that our alumni would, more than even now, feel attached, attracted and drawn to St. Lawrence College, so that they will support it, not because we pressure them into it, or because we talk them into it, but that they will do that voluntarily.

Why are things happening like they are at Queen's [their major fund-raising Capital Campaign]? It's because people - former students - are drawn to their school, and they gladly give back a share of their success to make sure that future generations can have that same type of success.

In that area we are in the beginning stages, but I think if we all work together and have this type of spirit, it will come by itself.

The alumni will play a much greater role in the future, and from today's point of view, I try to work closer with

the students. I invited the Student Government to tea, and I said that if we really want to have a partnership, you have to invite me to tea too, and they actually did that. And in a relatively short time, we have established a wonderful relationship, because they feel that it's a partnership of equals. They feel that I really mean what I say, and that I really look at the students as our main client. My second client is the industry that employs these people, and my third client is the academic body and the faculty. I think they should be kept free of unnecessary bureaucracy.

The alumni should, and will, play a larger role in the future. We are seeing the first small indications. The moment where you start, it's just like putting the seed in the ground - it will grow. I'm sure that all those people who have had this as their base in their life and who have been successful, they will look proudly back at St. Lawrence College,

and they will identify themselves with us. I think we all need to try to identify our lost alumni and bring them back in touch with us. That's very important."

What key message would you like to send to the 35,000 alumni and friends who are reading Voyageur?

"The key message is, let us together create an environment which really will be helpful for the future generations, and an environment that we all can be proud of.

I will finish with our new vision, and say that we have to inspire and acquire learning for life, for our students, but also for ourselves. And we have to do this with love and passion. That's really important."

College Names New Regional Campus Directors

On December 21, the College announced the successful candidates for the three new Regional Campus Director positions. Lorraine Carter, former Director of Engineering, Technology and Trades, will lead the Brockville campus. Pat Finucan, former Director of Academic Operations in Cornwall will stay on board in Cornwall, and former Director of Business Chris Whitaker will take the helm in Kingston.

The Regional Campus Directors are charged with participating in the provision of leadership, strategic planning and decision-making for the College. They are accountable for ensuring the financial viability of their specific campus, and will oversee the academic and administrative operations of the campus including the planning and delivery of academic programming and related services. In addition, they will ensure a strong campus presence in their region by: working closely with the Regional Campus Advisory Board; promoting the College's strategic plan and campus' programs within the community; establishing strong relationships with local educational educational institutions, business and industry, social agencies, and municipal, provincial and federal community offices; assisting in the activities of the St. Lawrence College Foundation.

St. Lawrence Marketing and Marketing Communications students are considered a legend among Ontario's community colleges. A team of eight students competed against fourteen other community colleges at Conestoga College in Kitchener on November 16 and 17, 2000 under the guidance of veteran coach Professor Kip Tuckwell. St. Lawrence took first place, with Centennial and Conestoga at a tie for second place. Third spot went to Sheridan.

St. Lawrence has had five first place finishes in 8 years and in between a 2nd and a 3rd place finish. Conestoga is the only other College to do well with two wins in 1997 and 1998.

Job Connect

Job Connect is a programme designed to serve the needs of both unemployed youth aged 16 to 24 and employers in Eastern Ontario. The goal of the service is to help individuals gain the skills and knowledge they need to find and keep jobs and to provide human resource expertise for employers who have work to be undertaken. It is delivered through a partnership of community agencies and St. Lawrence College.

There are three components: an Information and Referral Service for individuals to gather information on careers and occupations, the local job market, training opportunities and job search strategies; an Employment Planning and Preparation component to help individuals clarify their employment needs, establish short and long term goals and develop an action plan and prepare for employment and a Job Placement service for those who may need a bit more help finding work and developing skills relevant to their specific career goals. Participants in this last component are matched with employers looking for workers and they may benefit from a training subsidy.


The partners in this initiative have worked with hundreds of


istry of Training, Colleges and Universities dealing with youth employment (Employment Preparation), recently won an Amethyst Award, presented annually to a public service agency for outstanding leadership and professional achievement. In particular, this award is for the design and implementation of the Province's Youth Employment Program, Job Connect and Summer Job

Service. The program has surpassed expectations and achieved tremendous employment results through their province-wide delivery network. To quote from one Ministry source, "It's also a testament to the quality of work being done by the delivery agencies. Our good work with them has resulted in their good work with the public..."

In recognition of the quality of the delivery network, the Ministry in turned announced an award to acknowledge outstanding work in the field. Barry Keefe received the Star Performance award for Business Partnership Development on behalf of the Brockville and Kingston Job Training Services team in Toronto on November 17, 2000. "This award has special appeal because it was determined by a panel of Ministry

staff and colleagues from the delivery network," says Barry. "They were intrigued with the level and variety of partnerships developed and the success this has meant for the young people we serve. These relationships have helped us to find full or part-time work for over 1,100 youth in the past year and to provide approximately \$1 million in training funds in our communities."

There are 130 agencies in the delivery network providing service to virtually all communities across the province. Sharing in the success of the program are Janet Ashford, Susan Aylesworth, Patricia Campbell, Ray Dixon, Rosemarie Gavin, Alan Hoy, Michael Payne, Robin Penrose, Glenna Schaillee, Angela Skeete and Alison Wilson.

Over the years Russ developed and provided ongoing support to many local advisory committees which are trade specific, as well as developing, promoting and implementing new trade programs to the College such as Carpenter, Cook, Industrial Mechanic/Millwright and Refrigeration and Air Conditioning.

Native Student Circle Celebrates with Harvest Time Feast

Seh:kon! Aahnii! Greetings! Kwe Kwe! Boozhoo!

I bring greetings to the alumni and friends of St. Lawrence College from the Native Student Circle, the Native Counsellor, and Onkwanonsha.

The Native Student Circle has its home in a lovely, one hundred and fifty year old building on the Kingston campus, which is often referred to as the "Root Cellar". The building was, in fact, the root cellar of the original farm whose property was purchased by the College in 1969. In 1996 the Root Cellar became the home of the Native Student Circle, and its name was changed to "Onkwanonsha", which is the Mohawk word for "Our House". The alcoves that once held the harvests of the farm are now home to Native craft classes, a Native resource centre, a food exchange program and a gathering place for many celebrations and activities.

The most recent of these celebrations was our Harvest Festival which took place on November 3, 2000. As with all of our events, many students and staff of St. Lawrence, as well as community members attended throughout the day. The sound of the drums and children's laughter were a constant backdrop as we gathered to give thanks for another year of the bounty of Mother Earth. The very real representation of our Mother's gifts was the feast which included many of the traditional foods of the Eastern Woodlands people. Some of these dishes have become familiar to the Kingston campus from our many events and gatherings over the years dishes such as Three Sisters soup, bannock, wild rice pudding, and game meats such as venison, moose and buffalo have all become favourites.

The Harvest Celebration is only one of a number that are part of the Iroquois Ceremonial Cycle. These include: the Midwinter Gathering in January, at which time we celebrate our community, our children who are our future,

and our stories and traditions; the Sweetwater Celebration in March recognizes the flowing of the maple sap, and the change of seasons from another long winter to the welcome coming of spring; there are women's water ceremonies in the spring and fall, and we welcome the students in September with an Orientation Day Social and Feast.

As a resource of Aboriginal culture, Onkwanonsha also offers teaching circles, traditional craft classes and workshops, women's circles, and a community kitchen where we make some of our traditional foods.

At this time, I would like to extend an open invitation to all students, staff and faculty of St. Lawrence College, to take the short walk to Onkwanonsha and see what we have to offer. The first thing you will notice is the unique look and feel of "our house". The beautiful arched brick walls and ceilings, the lovely green carpeting, the soft lighting, and the quiet are all things that our visitors comment on. But please, come in and meet the people. There is a small, dedicated, and friendly circle of students who form the Native Student Circle. They will welcome you, offer to "show you around", and ask if you'd like a coffee.

I would also like to introduce myself as the Native Counsellor on the Kingston Campus of St. Lawrence College. I am Onkwehonwe (of the Original people), Haudenasaunne (Iroquois-People of the Longhouse), and Kanienkaha:ka (Mohawk).

Having graduated twice from St. Lawrence College, I am very pleased to be working with students as a member of the Counselling staff.

My office is located in Onkwanonsha, and you can usually reach me on campus on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays. You are most welcome to "drop in" to see me, and if you wish to schedule an appointment, I can be reached at extension 1545.

I provide a variety of counselling services such as academic, career and personal counselling. In my personal counselling practice, I integrate some traditional Aboriginal approaches to healing, such as the use of the Medicine Wheel. This states that all human beings have four aspects of self - the emotional, the physical, the mental and the spiritual. All of these aspects must be considered and addressed in a holistic approach to healing.



Construction in Kingston to Start in the Spring of 2001



On May 25, Dianne Cunningham, Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities, announced the creation of an extra 1,097 spaces for post-secondary students at the Kingston Campus through the investment of \$16.8 million of her government's SuperBuild fund.

The provincial money will allow the College to build and renovate 70,000 square feet of space on the Kingston Campus. A new building will join the two existing buildings. It will house new classrooms, offices, a Health Centre and casual student study spaces. An added bonus will be the elimination of those long walks between buildings in inclement weather. Major changes to the front entrance off Portsmough Avenue will house an expanded Customer Service area and Learning Resource Centre. The Veterinary Technology Laboratories will undergo a major renovation in order to upgrade them to meet current standards.

The College appointed the joint Architectural firm of Shoalts and Zaback in partnership with A. J. Diamond and Donald Schmitt and Company. The design is well underway and construction will start in May, 2001. The Veteri-

nary Technology Labs will be open for September 2001, the new facility for September 2002 and all the renovations will be completed by September, 2003.

Blayne Mackey, formerly Vice-President of Administration and Human Resources, is the Project Manager. His extensive experience in planning and building educational facilities made him the obvious choice to lead this project. He is leading several design groups in defining the College's needs for the architects.




2000 Premier's Awards Nominees

The Women of '87

Their faces haven't really changed all that much in the ten years since graduation. They were my first students; today they'restill younger than I was when I began teaching at the College. The lives they are living, the choices they are making, and the changes that are happening to them reflect what it means to be a young Canadian woman today.

I met these four women in 1987 when they were beginning their first year of college studies and I was starting my teaching career. I had come from a senior operations position in retail that had taken me all over Canada and parts of the States. In '87, most of our firstyear students were straight out of high school. We met in a tiered classroom on a warm September day. I was, understandably, quite nervous. For years I had been an effective trainer, manager, and motivator of others but the connection was clearly employer - employee. These students could walk out and I knew it. What could I do to capture their attention and to excite them about learning? I made the classroom work practical and took them on a lot of field trips, to manufacturers, museums, and major shopping centres.

Lynn has lived in a French - English mileu all her life and today works in the public sector in Ottawa; her bilingualism and logical thinking have forged a successful career. After graduating from the College in 1990, Lynn completed a university degree at Mount Allison. Her memories of her studies at SLC include dropping in for a chat in French with me so she wouldn't feel so homesick.

Cheryl recently returned to Ottawa from Atlantic Canada where the closing of Eaton's stores have forced her to

change her immediate plans and to wonder if she can continue a career in retail management. I remember Cheryl for two reasons; first, she sat in the power seat - second row, extreme left side - in each of the classrooms we occupied over those three years, and secondly, she had a tremendous sense of humour - dry, slightly caustic, and delivered completely straight-faced. Her work was always top notch and her presentations are amongst the most memorable in my thirteen years of teaching.

Jennifer is one of the most focused students I have ever taught. She knew the straightest path to an answer for a problem and just put herself full-out until her aims were accomplished. Her store design project in a retail course was imaginative, captivating, and authentically Jennifer. Her writing was clear, concise, and cohesive. No wonder Toronto-based Jennifer now works in corporate communications for a major bank.

In 1990, I took these women and all their classmates (About 30 of us) for a field trip to the Festival of Fashion in Toronto. We stayed at the newly-renovated Royal York Hotel. The Royal York's marble bathrooms, the elegant furnishings, and our all-night chats are one of the finest memories of that year. I took great pleasure at being allowed

into their dreams, frustrations, and hopes for their futures.

I remember walking, through the tunnels from the Royal York to Union Station, with Sherri. This was her first visit to Toronto, and I don't think she had ever seen such a steady torrent of people let alone experienced the upstream

struggle of walking against that flow. Today, Sherri is an Educational Technology Consultant for a school board and the mother of two young children. Building community was one of Sherri's strengths at school and that continues today.


These days, as then, the hallway outside my office often has a lineup of students ready to talk over assignment questions, to discuss the 'meaning of life,' to weep over broken hearts, to rage at injustices, to look at photos from my travels, and to nibble on a 'morning glory' muffin from the cafeteria.

Today, I get e-mails - lots of them - and phone calls from grads bringing me up to date with their lives and sharing memories of the 80's and 90's. Sometimes I meet them in town, busy at their workplaces, along Princess Street or at the market.

This year, these four women came to Kingston for the weekend to get together and share memories and dreams. My son, who was a young teenager when I began teaching, was visiting me and he took the picture of the five of us.

My connection to students and grads is as close as many of the other staff at the College. We want to connect while you are in school and love to catch up after you graduate. Won't you call or e-mail today and let us know how you are doing?
