
"Life is a balancing act and isn't that great!" Susan Nobes Tindal, a 1973 graduate of the Public Administration diploma program has gone on to a

career in law, raised four children and made significant contributions to the strength of our community through volunteerism.

After graduating from Queen's University with a B.A., Susan worked for a year in banking. Her employer suggested that her career would have greater potential if she had a business background, and with that encouragement she enrolled in Business at St. Lawrence College. After a semester in Business, Susan switched to the Public Administration program-a life-altering decision, as you will read in a moment.

Susan married her Public Administration teacher, Dr. Richard Tindal, became a mother of four, all within a year of graduating from St. Lawrence. She also started teaching English on a part-time basis at the college.

Her journey into law started with some volunteer work with the City of Kingston's Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee. This work involved researching the history of buildings of historic interest in Kingston, which led to a need to learn more about title searching. This brought Cucan back to Ct I aver

Law. One course led to another and soon Susan was enrolled in the Law Clerk program. She was also teaching part-time, raising four kids, and volunteering in the community – but something was missing-a job. A Napanee law firm needed a Law Clerk; Susan took the job while she finished the program.

During the twelve years Susan worked as a Law Clerk, she continued to teach on a part-time basis. She also co-authored, with her husband, Local Government in Canada now in its 6th edition, took a Master of Education degree in Administration and Adult Education at Queen's and then, with the support of the law firm, completed a law degree at Queen's University. Upon graduation she became a partner in the firm. Since 1997, Susan has been counsel to the Napanee Children's Aid Society. In addition to teaching for the College on a part-time basis for twentyfive years, Susan has continued to take courses.

"It's nice to be able to pick individual courses to fit our needs in life and work", she says.

Dickinstilled in their children the value of lifelong learning and the value of a St. Lawrence College education. Scott graduated in Math and

Computer Science from Queen's University and subsequently from St. Lawrence with a diploma in Computer Engineering Technology. Sue graduated in Business Administration – Finance. Kate also graduated in Business Administration - Finance and earned a C.G.A. designation. Cindy graduated in Business Administration – Human Resources, earned her designation as a Certified Human Resources Professional and is currently employed in the H.R. department at St. Lawrence College.

Life is a balancing act. There is the constant need to balance family with education, career, and commitment to the community. Susan has been on the Board of Interval House in Napanee, a Board member and chair of the Kingston, Frontenac and Lennox & Addington District Health Council, and is currently a Governor and Board member of Kingston General Hospital. "We each have a responsibility to help create the kind of community we want to live in."

Suzanne Guild has always been involved in the lives of children and their families, so she was naturally drawn to the College's Child & Youth Worker program.

"My mom and dad were foster parents," Suzanne explains, "so I saw many children come and go from my home, and I was exposed to many areas of life including the foster children of women who were incarcerated at the Women's Prison in Kingston." In addition to having four children of her own, young people continued to be part of her life when she started a "Moms and Tots" program and a Family Advocacy Group to lobby the Provincial Government for family and children's rights.

"I knew that a college diploma would open doors and enable me to move into employment areas with greater confidence and accountability, and I have not been disappointed," Guild says. "However, I did not initially move into the program as a full time student. I waited until my own children were enrolled in the school system before I decided to return to college. At first I took a Psychology course at the Kingston campus and loved the experience. I then found the courage to enroll as a full-time student in the Child & Youth Worker program at the Brockville campus."

Having been out of the educational system for a period of time, Suzanne had a degree of self-doubt with respect to returning to the classroom, an apprehension common to many adult learners. "After spending

many years away from school," she says, "I faced the fear of not being successful. As it turned out, through hard work and excellent teaching, I was able to graduate with distinction, receive the Academic Council Medal and the Vice President's Academic List award for highest grade point average.

Suzanne is now employed with the Pathways for Children and Youth program (Southeast Ontario Autism Program) in Kingston, where she is the Community Counsellor and Coordinator of the "Getting Started Program" (for the families of autistic children).

"As an Instructor Therapist, I work directly with preschool children diag-

nosed with Autism," Guild explains. I run a program that will enable parents of autistic children to understand what will be involved in their child's future treatment. Because of my training at St. Lawrence College and other postgraduate experience I am able to conduct parent training seminars on Applied Behaviour Analysis and Advocacy Skills, offer training workshops to community agencies and local school boards, connect families with community agencies in a six-counties region, and prepare families and clients for Intensive Behavioural Intervention (IBI)."

In addition to her work with the Pathways for Children and Youth program, Suzanne remains connected to the College as a part-time professor in the CYW program in Brockville.

"My beliefs have guided me through my work with children and youth. Throughout the years and various jobs maintaining these values has brought me to the place I am today. Currently, in my position at Pathways for Children and Youth and as a teacher at St. Lawrence College, I draw upon the foundations that the CYW program provided to me: St. Lawrence College offered me a solid start to my career.

And where are my four children? Two are in high school, one is contemplating entering the trades program at SLC and the oldest is about to graduate from the Business Program at, where else but, St. Lawrence College."



Cornwall Teachers Develop New VoIP Device

It's the talk of the town. Three of our Cornwall campus faculty have formed a company and are promoting a set of new VoIP products they have developed. After a news conference in November that launched the two products, the company drew tremendous attention from the media and the communication industry.

Their creation is a specific VoIP (Voice-over-IP) device that, in simple terms means "audio communication using the Internet." Previous technology was designed for large enterprises; the trio has brought that technology to the consumer, a feat that is unmatched anywhere in the world.

Gordon MacKay, president of the company called PentaGRF Inc., teamed up with co-workers and alumni Dave Simzer and Marc Lamoureux as well as Marc's brother Guy (also alumni). Using technology they were teaching in the classroom, the three co-workers developed two types of VoIP devices that are geared specifically to small businesses and the consumer. The most unique aspect of their product is that it allows you to make long distance telephone calls using the Internet, without a computer. Users can call anywhere in the world at a very low cost. "In fact," explains MacKay, "if both

callers have the device, there would be virtually no cost except for the Internet connection costs of course."

Their goals, at the offset, were simple: make the technology affordable, enable inexpensive long distance calling, use existing telephone hardwareincluding cordless phones

and answering machines, and do it without the need of a computer. They hosted the news conference that were able to accomplish all of this, in addition to providing high quality communication and using low bandwidth, overcoming two of the main problems that have been affecting current VoIP technology. The result is the VoxIP, st which is the standard phone-line version, and the VoxIP et, which works with high-speed internet services.

"This project has taken over our lives during the last year and half," laughs Gord. "However, we've had tremendous support from our families and from the campus." That support came from people like Mike Petinella who designed the company's logo and

Pat Finucan, the Campus Director who launched the products. Pat also purchased the first production units which he presented to the City of Cornwall, to the United Counties and to several lucky high schools. "The College is eager to support the endeavours of its engineering technology faculty," says Finucan. "We wanted to share this technology with our co-educators and keep them aware of the viability of the high tech world and the contribution that our College is making to its advancement. The products are being manufactured at United Tri-Tech Corp. in Cornwall.


There is rapid growth in renewable energy worldwide. More windpower generation systems have been built worldwide in each of the past six years than any other form of power; however, due to its historic reliance on nuclear, fossil and large hydro energy production systems, Ontario has not benefited from this trend. We can see that Ontario is now experiencing a shortfall in electrical production as a result of the fact that no fossil or hydro plants have been built in more than ten years. This problem can be alleviated with new, renewable power generation. The Kyoto Accord and public opinion will quickly result in these projects becoming mandatory for Canada.

ment: federal, provincial, and municipal. These policies should cover all the forms of alternative energies that can be utilized. Strong and effective leadership is paramount in order to achieve these policy goals, if the drive toward recognition and utilization of alternative energies is to succeed. In order to achieve these goals, we need to focus on more public education, as well as on the impact of the different types of systems and energies that can be utilized.

Canada can, and should, become a leader in the move to renewable energy. Consider that, 40 years ago, one single solar cell module cost \$14-16. Now the cost is around \$4, and is expected to drop below \$1 by 2007. These competitive prices are but one indication of why countries like Japan, Germany and Scandinavia do their energy planning based on wind and solar resources, with appropriate contributions from other technologies like fuel cells, hydro and biomass. In Canada and particularly in Ontario, there is, a unique opportunity, to combine hydro and biomass resources with other alternative technologies such as solar and wind power.

At the Solar Energy Society of Canada conference that was held this past August at Queen's University, I presented a paper entitled: Without true leadership and ownership, alternative energies will not succeed: The need for policy creation and renewal at the federal, provincial and municipal levels. most notably a series of national workshops organized by Pollution Probe. As their core focus, they aim to build a vision and strategy for the development of green power in Canada, in particular to develop a national policy on renewable energy, together with the federal and provincial ministers of energy and the environment, and to discuss the requirements for the development and promotion of green power in Canada. The workshops, being held across Canada from October 2003 to March 2004, will bring together not only government representatives, but also policy experts, investors, developers, marketers, educators, and other stakeholders. I Love the Night Life...

(Life as an Evening Learner at SLC)

"It's my salvation. It keeps me going."

Betty Fudge, 79, is speaking of the evening courses she takes through St. Lawrence College's Department of Continuing Education. Fudge, a grandmother, left school when she was 14 years old to begin working. Since 1991, she has been pursuing her Writing certificate part time at the Kingston and Brockville campuses. She says she just wants what her grandchildren have – a piece of paper from a post-secondary institution validating her efforts of a life of learning.

It seems as though Fudge is just one of thousands of students who, for reasons all their own, participate in the evening and weekend course offerings at St. Lawrence College.

Lori Crossley has worked over four years as Program Developer in the Department of Continuing Education. According to Crossley, more than 1800 people take classes in the fall term alone – just on the Kingston campus. That doesn't include the correspondence and on-line students who enroll through the Brockville campus. "I think there's a community of learners who always want to take something," says Crossley.

Christine Dodge is one of those learners. For over 12 years, Dodge, 39, has been taking part-time courses for professional development – with the odd general interest course thrown in for good measure. She works full time coordinating the Pediatric Postgraduate Medical Education Program at King-

ston General Hospital, and is a mother of two. Even so, finding time to attend class is important to her.

"I make the time. I love to learn – it's an ongoing process for me," she says. Additionally, Dodge has found the College responsive to students' needs. She has seen other students with families and financial commitments, who still want to improve their career opportunities. She recalls a group of them continually requesting courses in psychology and sociology until they received all the credits they needed. She believes that they were able to influence what was being offered.

According to Crossley, slightly more than half of the classes offered in any given semester are for credit. People look to the college for the certification and skills' upgrading that is required for career advancement. Crossley says Introductory Accounting, Human Resources Administration, and Conversational French are always full with a waiting list.

There are trends. Right now, demand for Digital Photography is huge, whereas some courses, such as Introduction to Computers, have served their purpose, and enrollment is on a decline.

Besides the credit courses, all three campuses at the College offer a large array of general interest programs. Brockville and Cornwall host *Encore* – daytime courses for seniors and older adults. Brockville campus runs the

Summer School of the Arts, which has gained an admirable reputation for its top-notch workshops taught by well-known artists.

Kingston campus introduced the Learn at Leisure concept in spring 2003, which promises 'enriching opportunities for the fun of it." The classes operating under this banner are designed to provide participants with an enjoyable half-day, day or weekend, learning something new in a relaxed and informative atmosphere. Ballroom and Latin Dance, a myriad of cooking classes in the new culinary lab, even Armchair Oceanography, are just some of the courses offered. 'Grandkids and Me' programs provide an intergenerational experience, with titles like Geology Field Trip, Fabulous Fossils and Memories Forever.

Whatever the reason - career advancement, skills development, personal enrichment or plain old fun continuing education programs are popular. The learners provide St. Lawrence College with a unique evening and weekend atmosphere that differs from the daytime bustle. Students move about with excitement, smile at each other and have conversations with strangers in the elevator and the parking lot. New friendships are created. And, they keep coming back. As for Betty Fudge, she's looking forward to the day she mounts the stage to receive her certificate. All of her grandchildren have promised to come and cheer.

College Opens New Training Centre in Smiths Falls

In August of 2003, the Brockville Campus of St. Lawrence College opened a training facility in Smiths Falls primarily to serve the needs of local organizations. The *Centre for Training and Development* had been delivering training from the Comfort Inn (Mariners' Inn) four days a week for almost a year, when it became evident that a more permanent site was required.

With the assistance of the Smiths Falls Community Development Officer, a suitable location was found at 7 Maple Avenue – previously the Family Medical Centre. After a month of renovations, provided by the landlord, the doors were officially opened during a ribbon-cutting ceremony attended by the local business community, politicians and College management. Mayor Dennis Staples welcomed the College to the community of Smiths Falls and acknowledged the important role the College will play in assisting the town attract new industry. "This is a great moment for our town, it sends a message that we are a growing and vibrant community," said Mayor Staples. Volker Thomsen, President and CEO of St. Lawrence College, told the audience: "It will be up to the citizens of Smiths Falls to tell us what courses and

programs should be offered at this campus. For us to be successful requires the support of the community."

The facility boasts three nicely appointed classrooms, a fifty-seat conference-type classroom, office space and a small café. Currently, Stanley Tools is taking the Manufacturing Leadership program Tuesdays and Thursdays and Grenville Castings takes the same program on Wednesdays. This is an ongoing commitment of two years by both organizations.

Starting in January, this location will provide a series of part-time evening offerings, such as art courses, conversational French and Spanish, Building Systems, the Ontario Management Development program, Sewing, Manicure and Pedicure courses. The *Encore* seniors program will be delivering Flower-garden Design, Fiction Writing, Bird Carving and the "Eight things we can learn from the Celts."

"We are very excited about the possibilities that this facility has for the College and the Brockville campus. We are now able to make our industry training and part-time evening courses accessible to the region of Smiths Falls," says David McFadden, Director of Continuing Education and Training.

Ross says his possible future goals include trying an "Ironman" Triathlon in a couple of years, where he will have to swim 3.7 kilometers, bike 180

kilometers and run 42.2 kilometers. He has already completed two "Half Ironmman" triathlons.






Brij Bali, in addition to his role as Director of Student and Alumni Relations, has taken on the additional responsibilities of College Registrar.


