Frequently Asked Questions Entrance auditions at SLC

What are the requirements for SLC entrance auditions?

SInging

- You will sing TWO songs; one ballad and one up tempo. Choose pieces that showcase your skills as an actor and singer. Ideally your selections should be cut to around a minute and a half.
- If you are attending an in-person callback, an accompanist will be provided, and your sheet music should be marked accordingly.
- <u>This video</u> contains information on preparing sheet music for an audition.

Acting

• You will perform a monologue of your choice. The monologue should be from a contemporary play that is age appropriate and preferably around a minute in length.

Dance

• You will perform a short dance combination and demonstrate several foundational dance skills. Please learn the combo video from the unlisted link sent with your audition booking.

What kind of prior training do I need?

We advise prospective students to take dance, theatre arts, and music courses prior to auditioning for the program. Private dance, voice and piano lessons and participation in community theatre are a great way to gain experience prior to auditioning.

Our program is physically demanding, and you can expect to be scheduled for approximately 35 hours of class per week. It helps to develop good personal habits around sleep, physical fitness, nutrition, time management and punctuality prior to attending.

What kind of vocal instruction does the program offer?

In semesters 1-4, students receive a 30-minute lesson with a voice teacher to build vocal technique, and a 30 minute coaching with an accompanist to help build skills of preparing their music for performance. In semesters 5&6, students receive a 60-minute lesson with a voice teacher, and a 30 minute coaching with an accompanist.
